

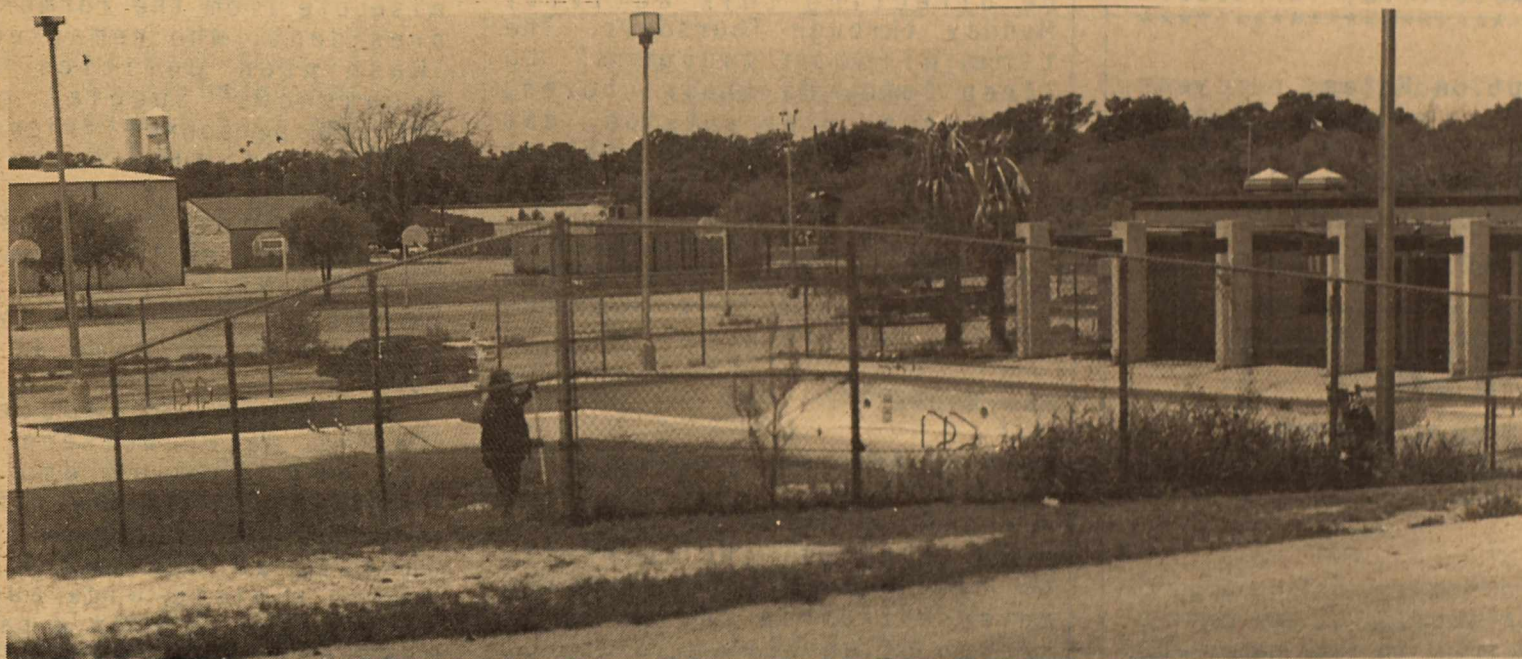

COMMUNITY POOL TO OPEN

A meeting was called by Bob Harris and Father Ed Bush at the First Baptist Church in Brackettville. The purpose of the meeting was to form a committee to open the swimming pool to the youth of Brackett for the summer. The organization was thus formed and named Brackettville Community Pool Association. The funding of the pool will be a joint effort of the churches of Brackettville, the city, the county, various civic organizations, and concerned citizens. All funds will be used for the sole purpose of the operation of the pool. Any funds left over at the end of the season will be used for the next year's operation or returned to the county.

Ronnie Watson was voted chairman, Courtenay Schwandner as Vice-Chairman and

Secretary, Mr. Bert Blackwell as Treasurer.

St. Andrew's Episcopal Church will use their Liability Insurance and Workmen's Compensation for pool coverage. A special account will be set up through St. Andrew's church for the pool.

The county will lease the pool to the organization and the city will provide the water and chemicals. The county will also provide the opening repairs to the pool facilities.

Dee Dee Bowers was appointed Pool Manager. She will be responsible for hiring lifeguards.

Opening date was set as June 11. The pool will remain open Monday through Saturday, 10 am to 6 pm until August 18. Video machines will be placed

at the pool to help with the revenue. Admission will be \$.50. Pre-season ticket sales will be needed to fund the pool for opening.

'CACTUS JACK' WEEKEND

'Sideshow,' a musical comedy by Rick Smith, will hold center stage on June 1, 2, and 3 in Uvalde, during a weekend of activities honoring John N. 'Cactus Jack' Garner, former Uvaldean who became vice-president of the United States.

The award-winning play will open Friday, June 1, at 8 p.m. on the stage of the Grand Opera House for a five performance run. Features include unique sets and costumes, a nine-piece orchestra, and a cast of 40 local people. Joel Casey of New York City is the director and David Leighton conducts the orchestra.

The show's title is a misquote from the former vice-president, who remarked that 'Washington politics are a freakshow.' Special guests include personnel friends and family of the late vice-president.

Following the premiere performance on Friday evening, a 'First Nighters' party will be held on the lawn of Garner's former home at 333 N. Park St.

Also on schedule for 'Cactus Jack' Weekend is an all-day symposium, 'The Personality and Politics of John Nance Garner' on Friday, June 1, at the Grand Opera House. A state-wide audience is expected to hear a panel of speakers who knew Garner during his days in Washington.

On Saturday and Sunday, the annual 'Cactus Jack' Festival will be held at the Uvalde Fairgrounds, west of town on Hwy 90. Featured will be horse races, barbecue cook-off, musical entertainment, food and game booths, arts & crafts show, carnival and western dance.

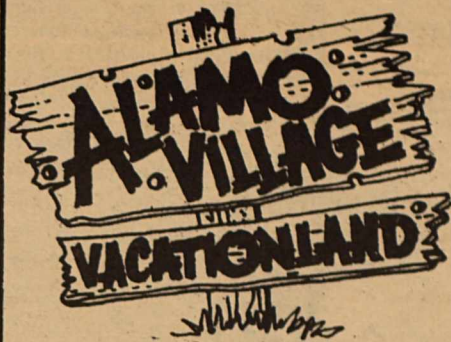

FLY AND MOSQUITO CONTROL ALERT

Effective fly and mosquito control in our Community is essential to our health and comfort.

During this next week, the City will commence spraying each Tuesday evening, utilizing an ultra low volume aerosol generator which employs a technique that applies undiluted Malathion insecticide in very low quantities. Two or three ounces will cover a full acre as each ounce is converted to over 19 billion droplets.

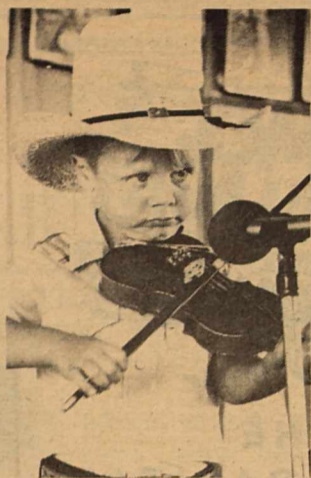
We will be spraying throughout the City with a concerted effort around the creek bed and drainage areas.

*Note: there are no harmful sideeffects or need for any precautionary measures.



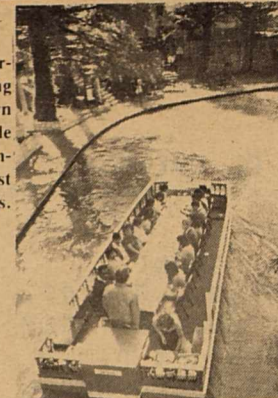
The largest group of water animals are the mollusks, soft-bodied animals without bones.

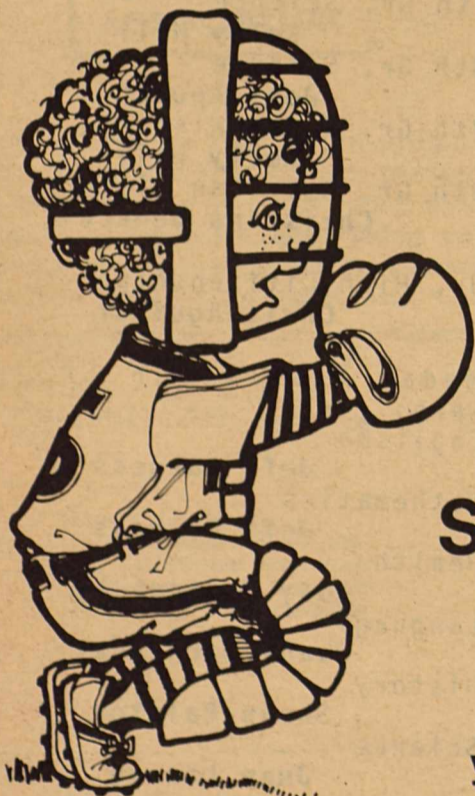

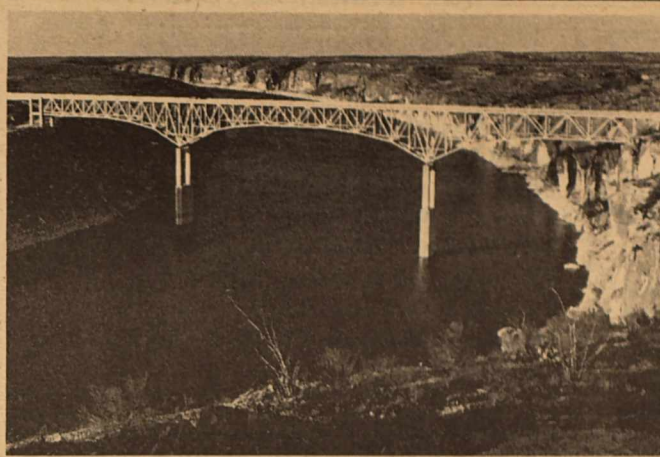

Coming Clean About Laundry

- Before you start, sort in loads... white, light colors, darks and gentle cycle items. Close zippers, inspect and empty pockets and turn dark colored items inside out to eliminate lint problems.
- Although it may seem to take time, safety pin socks together... saves lots of sorting later.
- Read the care labels on clothes and use bleach according to their instructions.
- Treat spots and stains with a laundry stain remover such as Shout from Johnson Wax before washing. This eliminates pre-soaking and helps remove tough stains and soil.
- Spots and stains should be treated with laundry stain remover while they are still fresh. Wash items with the hottest water possible for the fabric type and don't forget to use enough detergent—consult label directions.

TEXAS SAFE BOATING WEEK

Governor Mark White has proclaimed June 3-9 "Texas Safe Boating Week." In a ceremony at the State Capitol, Governor White joined with representatives of a coalition of groups involved in boating safety programs to remind Texas boaters of the need for required safety equipment and responsible action by boat operators.

With nearly 600,000 registered boat owners in the state, Texas ranks as the third largest boating state in the country.

"Millions of Texans enjoy boating each year, and we would like to remind them of a few simple guidelines which make boating not only safer, but more fun," said Franklin Pillsbury IV, president of the Boating Trades Association of Texas. "With proper safety equipment and a knowledgeable, responsible operator, boating on Texas' many fine inland and coastal waterways is one of the most enjoyable and economical recreational opportunities available."

Information on proper boat operation, safety requirements, and boating safety courses is available from the groups participating in "Texas Safe Boating Week" activities.

The Boating Trades Association of Texas is a statewide organization of dealers, manufacturers, distributors and others involved in the marine industry. An ongoing BTAT goal is to enhance the pleasures of recreational boating by reminding boaters to take necessary precautions to enjoy Texas waterways safely.

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THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

Investigations of the "Guatamala Connection," involving stolen 4WD vehicles being transported from the U.S. to Mexico and Guatamala, continues at the time of this writing. There are seven states and approximately 100 law enforcement officials involved with the case and are attempting to unwind the twisted, tangled and often frustrating information and evidence.

As I reported last week, we became involved in the investigation with the May 18th arrest of two Guatamalans found to be driving stolen vehicles through Kinney County.

Two more were arrested, after a high speed chase on Hwy 90 west, that same evening. The other two were indentified as Gerarado Roiz Vega, 30, Nicaraguan Army Captain living in Guatamala, and Jose

Francisco Giron, 27, a Guatamalan national. They were charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle upon arrest. Bond has been denied on the grounds that it is believed they will attempt to leave the United States upon release.

Complete details of the investigation cannot be disclosed at this time. However, strong evidence was found in the form of maps and other papers confiscated from one of the men. Indications are that they are part of a large, well-organized auto theft ring based in Guatamala with several connections in metropolitan areas of the U.S.

DPS auto theft agents from throughout the state, as well as myself and FBI agents, are involved in the investigation. Further evidence indicates that the four Guatamalans are well-trained and schooled in U.S. interrogation and investigation methods. They are fully aware of their rights and laws protecting them through our legal system. Rights and protection that

would not be granted in their own country. It may take many hours of investigative interviews to break through their well-schooled barriers, before the pieces to the 'puzzle' will fit.

The slow, sometimes frustrating, wheels of American justice and investigation are beginning to turn. I am confident that many more arrests will occur in the near future, causing the organization to be severely damaged, perhaps destroyed.

Our system has many faults and frustrating limitations by the legislatures that are continually placed on law enforcement officials. It is still the best in the world. Those of us in law enforcement are proud to put in the long hours of tedious hard work necessary in an investigation. When the final nail is hammered in place, hopefully, the investigation will meet the requirements of the judicial system and the guilty parties will receive their just rewards.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS RIDERS CARRY TORCH THRU FT. CLARK SPRINGS

Two riders, bearing the torch for the Special Olympics, were welcomed at Ft. Clark Springs on Saturday night, May 19.

Jimmy Coleman, San Antonio, and Charlie Ferrell instigated the torch relay ride 12 years ago. The riders left Plaza del Sol Mall in Del Rio on Saturday at 9:00 a.m. with a police escort, headed for Austin. The riders and horses change every sixteen miles. There were two torches, in order that one is lit at all times.

The other relay members are Billy Davenport - San Antonio, Yankee McPherson - San Antonio, Easy Hall - New Braunfels, Louis Burns - Brownwood and fellow townsman, Monroe Henk.

Henk and Hall left Ft. Clark Springs at 9:00 p.m. Saturday, for Uvalde. Their expected arrival was 7:00 a.m. From there they travel to San Antonio. Tuesday morning, May 22 they plan to breakfast in Sequin and arrive in San Marcos that afternoon. They will arrive in Austin on the Eve of the Special Olympics. The lighted torch will be

delivered on Wed., May 23, at the 6:00 p.m. during the evening ceremonies of the Olympics.

"This is the 12th ride to help promote the good work of the Special Olympics. We spread word of the project as we ride through the various communities. The Special Olympics is a wonderful thing. By carrying the torch, we are contributing in our own small way," concluded Mr. Coleman.

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AREA STUDENTS TO ATTEND SOUTHWEST BASKETBALL CAMP

On June 3rd, Tammy Frerich, Amy Blackwell, Yvonne Luna, Bonnie Frerich, Lisa Frerich, and Kelly Hall will attend the Southwest Basketball Camp at Ranger Junior College, Ranger, Texas. This camp was the first overnight camp in Texas.

The camp was started 15 years ago with 30 students and growing to one of the most attended camps in the Southwest.

The camp features some of the state's leading coaches and some of the nation's top coaches as guest lecturers. The Southwest camp is conducted by Ron Butler, the camp's original founder.

TEXAS HOUSEHOLDS MAY QUALIFY FOR ENERGY AID

AUSTIN - Some low-income Texas households may be eligible for help in paying their utility bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Resources Commissioner Marlin Johnston.

Commissioner Johnston said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households which this month received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income, or needs-tested Veterans Administration benefits.

Potentially eligible veterans are those who receive payments under Section 415, 521, 541, or 542 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code or under Section 306 of the Veterans and Survivors Pension Improvement Act of 1978.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a one-person household having less than a \$355.49 gross income per month. The gross income limit is \$581.49 for a two-person household, \$798.49 for a three-person household, \$985.49 for four persons, \$1,162.49 for five, and \$1,359.49 for six.

Eligible households must be subject to energy cost increases - because of higher bills or rent due to rising utility costs.

Households in privately owned or rented housing are eligible if the cost of utilities is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Johnston said application forms are mailed automatically to households receiving food stamps, AFDC, and SSI. Households receiving needs-tested veterans benefits must request an application from DHR in June.

Those who have not received an application and think their household may be eligible should contact a local DHR office.
