Valentino admits to true 'old country' roots in his musical upbringing. He approaches an evening of entertainment with a careful blending of traditional country two-stepping music and contemporary country music, as well as, 50's rock-'n-roll, 'Cajun' music, waltzes, contemporary rock-'n-roll, bluegrass, and 'Valentino' music.

Valentino's stop in Kerrville comes prior to a 'date' with Miss Rodeo Texas, Miss Lashawn Wardlaw, at the 'Longhorn Sale of the Century' at the Shahan HV Ranches in Brackettville, Texas on Saturday, June 16. The band will appear with Miss Wardlaw and perform for cattle ranchers from across the country.

The band then leaves for Red River, NM to perform the grand opening of Stage Coach Willie's, a ski resort nightclub in the Rocky Mts.

Along with writing and recording his own music, Valentino's specialty is the fiddle. Most performances

include a fiddle show that is a variety of unique ways to play this classical instrument of country tradition. He plays it behind his back, while lying on his back on the floor, and even while being held upside down by his ankles.

Every show includes a most unusual brand of humor in Country Johnny Shackelford, bass player and banjo picker. With a different hat for every song, and a tendency to make the most remarkable comments at the most unusual times, Country Johnny keeps any audience from ever becoming too serious. 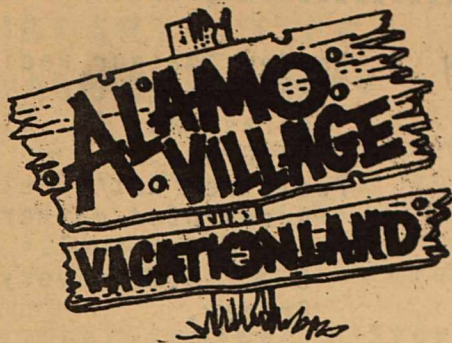

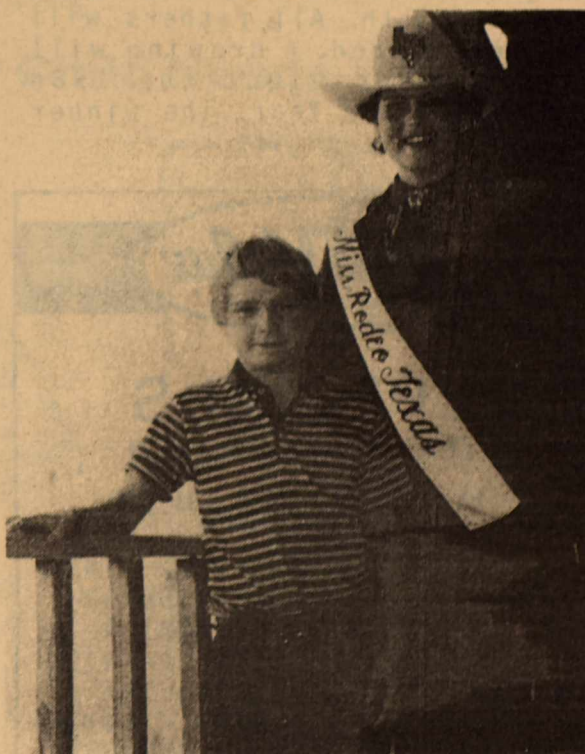
Young Celebrities Meet

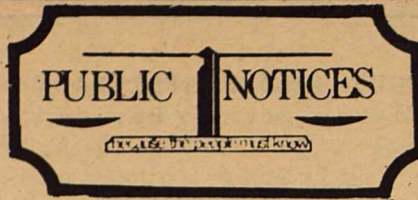
OUR SENIOR CITIZENS INVOLVEMENTS



JUDY HOOKER NAMED TO DEAN'S LIST

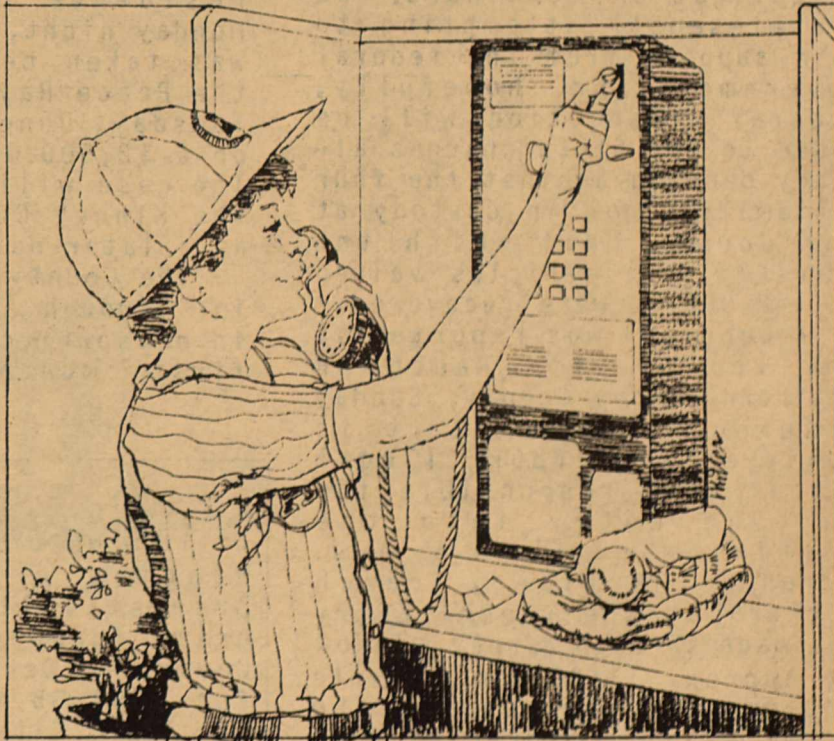

THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

The investigation into the "Guatamalan Connection" is continuing and information being gathered shows that the international car theft ring involved in this matter is widespread. So far 10 states and parts of Canada and Mexico are known to be involved, as well as Honduras and Guatemala.

The 'agents' sent into the U.S. to obtain and drive the stolen vehicles back to Guatemala are, beyond any doubt, well-trained, hard-core professionals. As reported last week, they are well schooled in United States law enforcement procedures and the methods and limitations of American interrogation.

I will keep you informed, as allowed, without endangering the case as the investigation continues. We are presently attempting to gain support from the federal government and, hopefully, federal prosecution will be added to the state charges already pending against the four Guatamalans now in custody at the County Jail. With the arrests, four vehicles valued at \$42,000.00 were recovered.

A burglary was reported at the Leo Frerich Ranch in southern Kinney County, Sunday afternoon, June 3. It is believed that four illegal aliens were responsible for forcing entry into the residence of Mr. & Mrs. Eulalio Martinez, ranch workers at the ranch. Entry was made through a rear window at approx. 11:30 a.m., while the family was absent. The crime was discovered at 2:30 p.m.. Unfortunately, this time lapse allowed the burglars ample time to escape without apprehension. The investigation is continuing with the U.S. Border Patrol assisting.

Aliens captured in the area are being screened with the hopes of finding those responsible and recovering the stolen property.

"This is just another example of the increase in crimes being committed by illegal aliens pouring into our country via Mexico. When will our people get fed up and tell our legislators that 'Enough is enough!'. We need to force them, by strong public opinion, to pass strict, enforceable laws to stop the ever increasing numbers of illegal aliens committing crimes and taking American jobs in larger numbers every year. We are, in fact, being invaded by thousands upon thousands of illegal, undocumented aliens every year. It is past time for the American people to wake up and realize how serious this problem is. It is getting worse day by day.

Charges of Aggravated Assault were filed against David Luna, Tuesday, June 5, after a disturbance at the residence of Joe Flores, Monday night, June 4. Mr. Luna was taken before Justice of the Peace Raymond Talamantez Tuesday, June 5, and released on a \$2,500.00 Personal bond. The case will be presented to the Kinney County Grand Jury at a later date.

The County Jail has brought in, through April, \$110,576.00 in prisoner care fees for the first 7 months of this fiscal

year. If this monthly average continues at the present rate, we should gross close to \$190,000.00 in prisoner care fees for fiscal year 1983-84. Not bad for a county jail. These funds have assisted a great deal in getting Kinney County out of debt and in a more stable financial condition. At this time, in 1982, Kinney County was at least 3 months behind on paying their bills and owed a local bank over \$100,000.00. The monthly payroll was in doubt every month and the financial future looked dark. I do not mean to imply that the Sheriff's Department and County Jail operation solely handedly got the county out of debt. This was done by hard work and cooperation by all county officials and sacrifices by county employees who took cuts in pay and work hours. The county is now out of debt and has over \$100,000.00 in the General Fund and C.D's in excess of \$40,000.00. The jail operation has helped, but the most important part has been played by all county officials and employees.

We should be proud of the dedication, hard work, and loyalty of these people. I, for one, am proud of what I could contribute to this and of my loyal staff. They work long, hard hours for minimum wages to provide security and meet the state standards for the jail operation that is paid by our tax dollars.

The City of Brackettville will conduct the second Public Hearing on the City of Brackettville request for grant funds under the Texas Community Development Program for 1984/85 on Monday, June 11, 1984, City Hall at 6:30pm.

The first priority determined at the hearing on Monday, May 14 was the replacement of the Ground Storage Water Tank which was ordered to be replaced by the Department of Health. A grant application for \$82,600 was directed to be formulated for final consideration and approval. All citizens are invited to attend and comment on the proposed applications and future plans.
