When we bought the Fort Clark property in 1971, I talked with city and county officials about our plans and hopes for Ft. Clark Springs, including our reasons for selecting Ft. Clark as a site for a new large recreation-oriented community. I told the assembled group (Willy Mendeke was Mayor and Tommy Seargeant was County Judge) that the fact that Brackettville was just across the highway from Ft. Clark was a big plus factor in our decision to buy and develop Ft. Clark into Ft. Clark Springs. We wanted proximity to a town that could furnish civic, social and spiritual amenities to residents of Ft. Clark Springs and Brackettville certainly offered all of that--together with an atmosphere of friendliness that is attracting more and more people across the country to seek "small town" rather than big city life with all its problems.

I also told the city and county group that Ft. Clark Springs could not grow and prosper without companion growth in our neighbor community across the street. Both communities had to work together, build together and

develop together. I believe a very good basis has developed during the past decade for growing co-operation between Brackettville and Ft. Clark Springs and I know the residents of Ft. Clark Springs want to continue to expand all possible co-operative efforts between our communities.

We all realize that we need each other and that we respect each other, and that's a sound basis for a growing partnership in our joint dedication to grow and develop together.

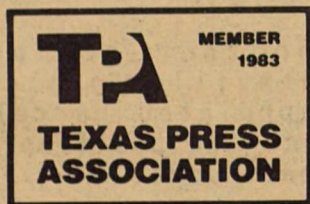

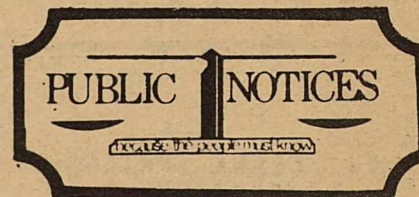
Persons receiving awards for Outstanding Older Texans were: John Lamb, Vidalia Sanchez, Jesus Ureste, Tomasa

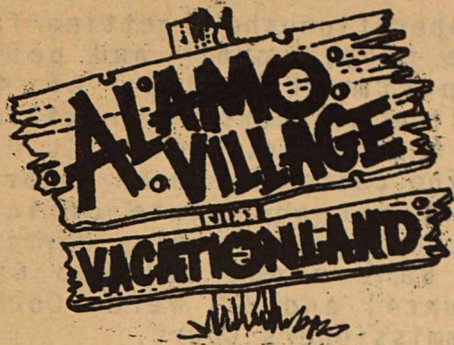

ODDLY ENOUGH!



In flight, mosquitoes beat their wings about 1,000 times a second, reaching speeds of eight miles per hour, making their familiar humming sound. Mosquitoes are like helicopters in that they don't run to start or stop flying; they lift up immediately after their wings start beating and must flap their wings constantly to stay aloft.

Though their eyes are large in proportion to their bodies, mosquitoes have very poor vision. Until they get within a few inches of an object, they can only make out movement. They rely on their antennae to smell and hear and that's what leads them to you. That's also what makes it easier than you might think to fool a mosquito and keep it from biting you. Many people use an insect repellent such as Cutter Insect Repellent, which works by confusing the mosquito's sensors. That way the mosquito can't tell whether you're worth biting. It could help you have a better time outdoors this biting bug season.



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**SONORA PERFORMANCE TESTED
BILLIES SOLD**

SONORA --- Seventy-one head of performance tested Angora billies sold for a \$742 per head average at the fourth annual Angora Billie Performance Test and Sale held Wednesday, July 18 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Ranch near here.

The average is slightly below last year's record high of \$775, but sale officials considered the sale excellent considering dry conditions which plague much of Southwest and West Texas. The sale animals grossed \$52,680.

The top endexing buck of the performance test was consigned by Haby and Haby of Uvalde. However, it was not sold at auction.

The high selling billie, which was also the second high indexing animals, was consigned by Ruth Espy of Sonora and sold for \$2,400 to Joseph Stroman of Mountain Home. Last year's high selling buck was auctioned for \$2,150.

Ruth Espy also consigned another high selling buck which was auctioned for \$2,350 to Joe David Ross of Sonora.

D.L. Cloudt of Rocksprings purchased another high selling goat for \$2,300. That goat was consigned by Joe David Ross.

Volume buyers included Joseph Stroman, who purchased seven head for \$10,950 and the T. Cecil Meador Estate of Eldorado, which bought nine

head for \$4,065.

A record number of 380 billies was consigned to the 112 day feed test trial. The 90 percent were consigned to the auction. Willard Jordan of Sulphur Springs was the auctioneer.

The test is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System and cooperating Angora breeders.

SAVING WATER THIS SUMMER

The summer fun of swimming, cool drinks, and even car washing, all require an ample water supply that we often take for granted.

By now, most Texans should know that our groundwater supplies are being depleted faster than they can be renewed. That means everybody needs to do their part to conserve water.

Sylvia Baker, Extension home economist has some suggestions for how to reduce the amount of water we casually waste at home:

* Keep a thermos of cool water on the kitchen cabinet or a jug of water in the refrigerator. Running the tap to wait for cooler water sends about five gallons of water per minute down the drain.

* Take a quick shower. Every inch of water in a tub represents about 4 1/2 gallons of water and a shower without

a water saving device typically uses 5-10 gallons per minute.

* Use full loads of laundry to clean those summer clothes. Washing machines can use 40-60 gallons of water per load.

* Resist using the toilet for a trash basket. Every flush uses 4-7 gallons of water.

* Watch out for water hoses with the water left running. A water hose can deliver several hundred gallons of water in an hour. For that reason, it's probably better to fill the kids' wading pool than let them play with the hose.

* You can save water as you wash your car too. After you wet down, turn the water off or use a hose with a shut off nozzle. Use buckets of soapy water to wash it and then give the car a final rinse with the hose.

If you would like a free water conservation checklist with more suggestions for saving water at home, Baker says you can call or write your county extension office.

DONORS NEEDED FOR BENEFIT PICNIC HONORING BATTERED WIVES AND CHILDREN

Donors are needed for a community wide benefit picnic this fall to help purchase a shelter for battered wives and children in the Del Rio area.

Funds are needed for Benefest, a community picnic, tentatively planned for late September or early October. Benefest is being sponsored by its donors, the Val Verde Women and Family Violence Center and the Del Rio News-Herald.

Already, three anonymous donors have contributed a total of \$200 toward the \$1,000 goal set for Benefest by its organizers.

The funds will be used to buy brisket and other needed items for the picnic. Proceeds from the picnic will go toward the purchase of a shelter for the family violence center.

At least 16 more donors of \$50 each are needed to make the picnic possible, organizers said.

Renna Ayres, center director, has been operating the shelter in her home in Del Rio for the past year. Some 12 to 16 area women per month

have turned to the center for help since it opened as a public non-profit organization in February.

The center expects to qualify for state and federal grants after being open for nine months, but needs the community to help it get into its shelter, Ms. Ayres said. The center is now being run through the help of volunteers and private donors.

The family violence center provides a safe home to battered women and their children with 24 hour access and a 24-hour hotline service with trained volunteers. It is a member of the Texas and National Council on family Violence.

Ms. Ayres said Del Rio offers the only family violence shelter in all of region 9, a 22 county area of West Texas which includes Uvalde, Brackettville and Eagle Pass.

Most of the women who turn to the center have been physically abused and many children contact the center for help on behalf of their mothers, Ms. Ayres said.

The center also helps young people who have been victims of abuse, molestation or incest.

Ms. Ayres praises the

cooperation she's getting from the city, county and police department. Many of the police officers refer victims to the center, she said.

The center has been endorsed by local and state offices, including Rep. Dudley Harrison of Sanderson, Del Rio City Council and Val Verde County Commissioners Court.

Contributions to the center are tax deductible.

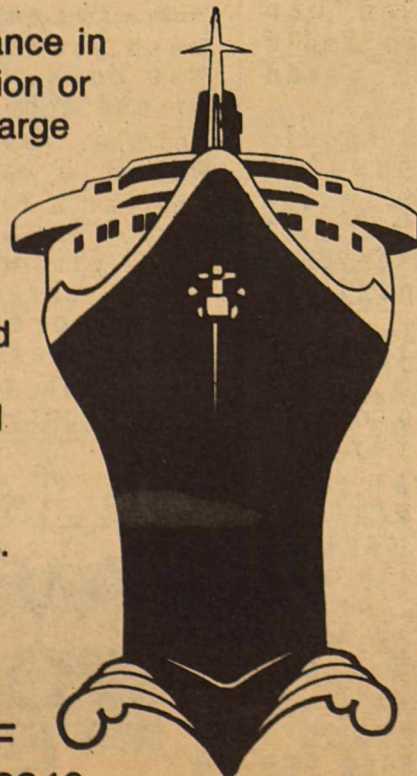
"I want to urge anyone considering participating in the veterans land program to get their completed applications in to us by July 31," Mauro said.

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Mauro, who serves as chairman of the veterans land board, stressed that "there is still plenty of money available at the old rate" and that all applications that are currently being processed and all completed applications received by the veterans land board postmarked by July 31 will receive the 8.5 percent rate.

Mauro said a new "Fast-Tract" subdivision program implemented by the veterans land board has been successful in "providing Texas veterans with a greater selection of high quality land to choose from."

Mauro said the new "Fast-Tract" program is based on subdivision developers joining the veterans land board "in a cooperative effort to help veterans find and purchase land suitable to their needs."

"As a result of the success of this new program, we now have prime acreage available for Texas veterans near Austin, Waco, Corsicana, Amarillo and San Antonio," Mauro said.

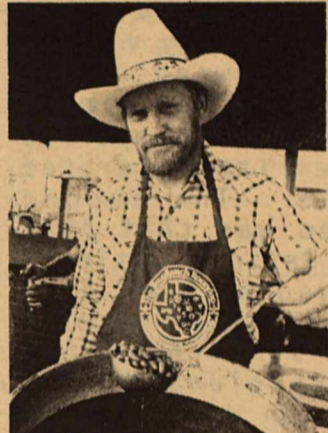
The veterans land program offers \$20,000 low-interest fixed rate loans to eligible

veterans to purchase a minimum of ten acres of land.

New "Premises Work Charges"

There has been an important change recently regarding telephone wiring. The change involves the installation and repair of jacks and "inside wiring."

Inside wiring is required from the point where our lines end in a "network interface." On most new homes, this interface — a large plastic box — is usually installed near the power meter. (In new apartments, it's usually located near the circuit breaker box.)

If you don't have a new home, you probably don't have a network interface (we just started installing them in 1982). Instead, you have a similar device called a "protector."

Like a network interface, the protector is the point where our line ends and your inside wiring begins.

Until recently, we did all the installation and repair of wiring inside our customers' homes. We will still perform that work if you ask us — but the way the work is charged has now changed.

If we do the wiring, we'll now bill you "Premises Work Charges." These charges are billed for each 15-minute period required on the job. Charges cover all costs associated with the work, including materials, but costs differ for installation and repair.

Here's how the charges break down if we do the work for you:

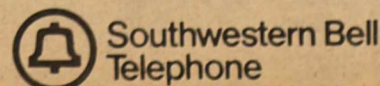
If you don't wish to have Southwestern Bell Telephone perform the work, you now have two other options. Those are hiring someone else (such as an electrical contractor), or doing it yourself (materials are available from many retail stores).

New rates — Small increase to you

By now, you are probably aware that Southwestern Bell Telephone received final approval for a rate increase effective June 1, which included the change in Premises Work Charges. I say you are "probably aware," because most customers will hardly notice it on their local exchange phone bill.

The rate award sounds like a lot of money — and it is, but the increase for residence flat-rate local exchange service is only 30 cents per month, or less.

Most of the increase (about 89%) was put on one group — Texas' long distance companies (who pay for access to Southwestern Bell Telephone's network).

This past week has been one of those weeks that demonstrate the different aspects of being a Sheriff in a county like ours where the responsibilities of the office come into full bearing and makes one aware of the fact that no man stands alone. As I have no deputies I am most grateful for the vital support and cooperation I receive from the officers of the various law enforcement agencies here in Kinney County.

A special THANKS to the following officers of those particular departments that have assisted me in the past hectic week: Border Patrol Agents Roy Dyer, "Pee Wee" Corder, Tom McDonnell, and Luis Valdez and others, DPS troopers "Buddy" Burgess & Robert Cano, Chief of Police Richard Dempkowski and Game Warden Bill Lindeman. These officers have assisted me in a way that has allowed our law enforcement system here to operate like a well oiled piece of machinery. Without their efforts I would have been overloaded and bogged

down with the workload.

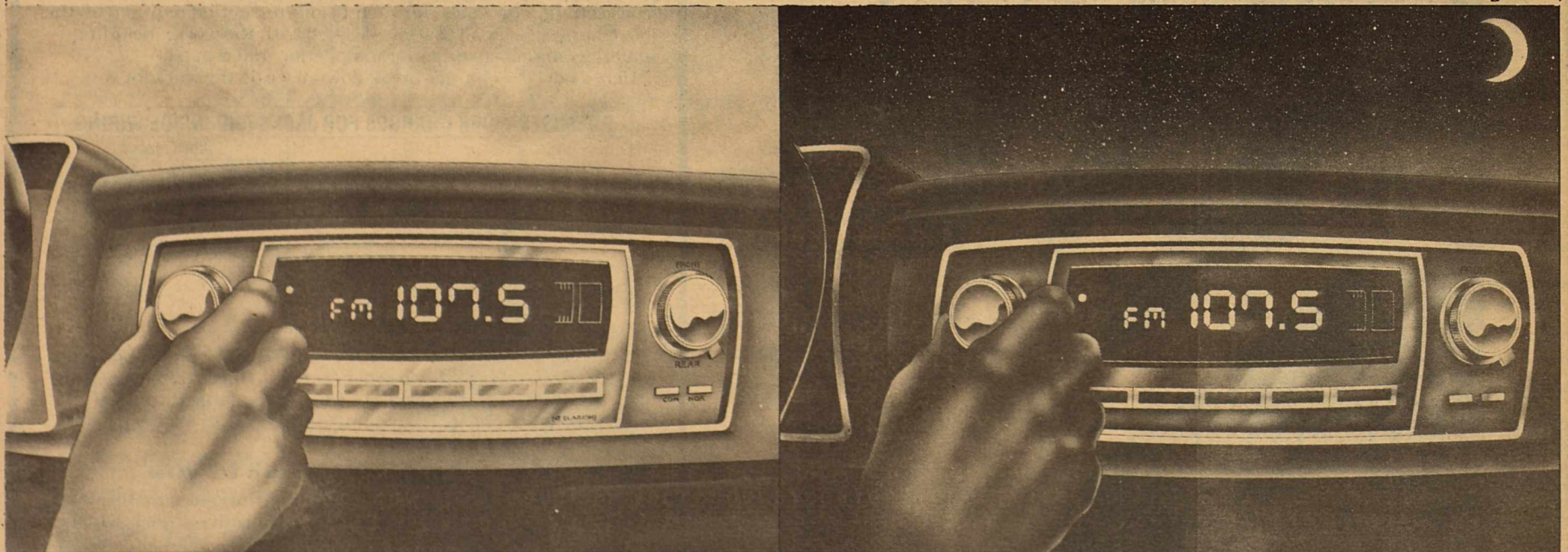
We recovered the bodies of two Mexican Nationals believed to be illegal aliens on the same day, Thursday, July 19th. One body was recovered at the headgate of the canal on the Moody Ranch in Southwest Kinney County shortly after noon and the other was recovered at approx. 9:00 pm on a ranch east of Spofford. The first body is believed to be that of a drowning victim who possibly drowned while trying to cross the Rio Grande into Texas. The body appeared to have been in the water for several weeks. The second body recovered was that of a 40-year-old Mexican National who is believed to have died from a combination of alcohol poisoning and sunstroke. His traveling companions stated that he had been drinking 140 proof pure alcohol for several days prior to their crossing the Rio Grande into Texas and had continued drinking until a short time before death. He had started hallucinating shortly before he expired.

District Court was held Monday and Jose Sanchez was tried and convicted of Arson resulting from his actions of February 24, 1984 when he tossed several gas-soaked rags through the rear window of the home of Jovita Santivannes on El Paso St. He fled to Ozona

where he was arrested and brought back to Brackettville by myself and Chief of Police Donnie Nance. Sanchez received 5 years probation and ordered to pay restitution for damages to the house.

A budget workshop for the fiscal year 1984-85 was held by the Kinney County Commissioners Court, Monday, and lasted well into the evening. The Commissioners and County Judge should be commended for their efforts to set a budget for the effective operation of our county government for the next fiscal year without having a tax increase that would cause an increased burden on our taxpayers or putting the county into a debt that we cannot pay. They have put in many exhausting hours of hard work to reach this goal and still have many more to go before a final budget can be agreed to and approved.

Larry Ronald Stiver, 43, of Greensborough, North Carolina is being held in Kinney County jail on 14 felony warrants from the state of North Carolina charging him with felony embezzlement and felony obtaining property by false pretense. He is fighting extradition and the state of North Carolina has begun proceedings for his extradition to that state to answer the charges. At the time of this writing he

is being held in lieu of bonds totalling \$115,000.00. Stiver was arrested outside his Ft. Clark residence on the night of July 15th after a routine check was made on his North Carolina drivers license by DPS Troopers "Buddy" Burgess and Robert Cano after he was stopped for a traffic violation east of Brackettville.

Shortly afterward a "hit" on Stiver as a "wanted person" was returned by teletype from the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) and he was arrested. It is expected that a warrant from the Governor's Office will be issued shortly and he will be returned to North Carolina to answer the charges against him.

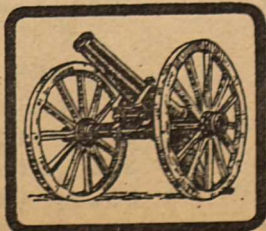
