

SHERIFF'S CORNER

A 1981 Jeep and a 3-wheel motorcycle were reported stolen from a hunting camp on the Monte Earwood Ranch approx. 16 miles East of Brackettville off Highway 90 by hunters who have the ranch leased for hunting. Upon investigation at the scene it was determined that the thieves entered the ranch through a gate after shooting the lock off with a shotgun.

The Jeep and the motorcycle, valued at over \$10,000.00, were stored in a shed near the hunter's camp along with two other hunting vehicles and the thieves broke into the locked shed and after removing one of the older hunting vehicles, drug the jeep and the motorcycle outside. It is believed that they then loaded the vehicles onto a trailer and left the ranch. Tracks at the scene indicate they went East towards Uvalde.

Two days after the report of the incident above, Hugh Asher, who owns a small ranch directly across the highway from the Earwood Ranch, reported that thieves had stolen 4 tires and wheels valued at over \$500.00 from a stock trailer parked near the ranch house. Mr. Asher lives in San Antonio and comes out to his ranch on week-ends. Tracks found at the scene matched those found at the scene of the crime on the earwood Ranch and it is believed that both crimes were committed by the same persons.

Another incident on highway 90 East a few miles from the other incidents is also being investigated. DPS trooper Buddy Burgess found several cows out on the highway Sunday afternoon and upon futher investigation found that a fence had been cut and a vehicle had driven into the ranch. Attempts to track the vehicle over the rough, rocky terrain proved to be futile and it is not known at this time if the incident is connected with the other two.

The above cases are under investigation at this time and it appears that unidentified burglars and thieves are taking advantage of the fact that hunters and week-end ranchers are leaving valuable property unattended at the various hunting camps and small ranches in Kinney County. Cases of this sort are difficult because of the time lapse often involved between the time the crime is committed and the time of discovery. These types of crimes increase throughout the state every year about this time as hunting season approaches because persons who commit these crimes know that the hunters bring expensive equipment and property to their camps and quite often leave it unattended for days at a time. Increased patrols of the rural areas will be

conducted by me in an attempt to decrease these criminal incidents but the fact that I work alone and have no deputies to use on patrol spreads me a little thin in trying to cover all of Kinney County, but we will do the best we can with what we have.

Anyone who sees suspicious activity along our roadways or in our rural areas are asked to contact the Sheriff's Department as soon as possible.



The effective tax rate for the City of Brackettville for the City of Brackettville 1984/85 Annual budget be set at \$.60 per \$100 valuation of market value.



depth detail of the vast audience appeal of Texas newspapers. This portion of the data emphasized:

(A) 72.6 percent of local newspaper readers who responded to the survey are Grand Marnier, however, it is married;

(B) Over 50 percent of the families subscribing to local newspapers comprise three or

more people;
(C) Husbands and wives in 43.3 percent of the Texas newspaper reading families both have jobs with combined incomes totaling more than be made with wines and li-\$20,000;

Lyndell Williams, Executive Vice-President of the Texas Press Association (TPA) in Austin, after receiving the huge study report said this week:

This survey not only confirms what major advertising retailers already know, but also provides undeniable proof of newspaper strength in all other areas as well.

He cited the high readership interest in local news as an example of "newspaper wallop for a better informed community and state." Williams pointed out the 31/2 Lbs. Plums following additional facts that were revealed by the survey data:

* 82.8 percent of Texans read all local news in their newspapers;

Williams also cited local merchant ads as the most thoroughly read advertising matter. Those figures read:

* 89 percent of Texas newspaper readers usually or at least sometimes read all local merchant advertising;

* 85.4 percent usually or sometimes read all grocery ads.

The survey also outlined the strengths and weaknesses of direct mail along with radio and television.

Direct mail advertising in Texas, much of it conducted by out-of-state firms, is usually read by 43.7 percent of the addresses, with only 31 percent of that number reading

all of a single mailing. Radio and Television while being listened to by as much as 73 percent of Texas consumers and seen by at least that many people, nevertheless, must divide those numers by dozens of stations and channels. And the most watched cable television channels of all don't even accept advertising.
