UP HILL ALL THE WAY

"Uphill All the Way," a feature-length movie which stars Mel Tillis and Roy Clark, began production this week at "Happy" Shahan's Alamo Village near Brackettville, TX. Also starring are Burl Ives and Glen Campbell. Trish Van Devere is also appearing.

Executive Producers are Tillis, Clark and Renee Valente, President of the Motion Picture Producers Guild of America. David L. Ford and Burr Smidt are producers and Bob Younts is Associate Producer.

The movie, written and directed by Frank Q. Dobbs, provides many laughs over the antics of Booger and Ben, two flim-flam men, played by Tillis and Clark. Based on a little known, but true story of the first time the U.S. Army attacked in a motorized vehicle, "Uphill All the Way," involves two calverymen and a mad-cap posse chasing Booger and Ben through small towns and mountainous areas of the Texas Big Bend Country, one of the most scenic areas of the state. Big skies and the dramatic mountains of West Texas provide a colossal background for this comedy set in 1916.

The location site moves from Brackettville to Lajitas in mid-November.

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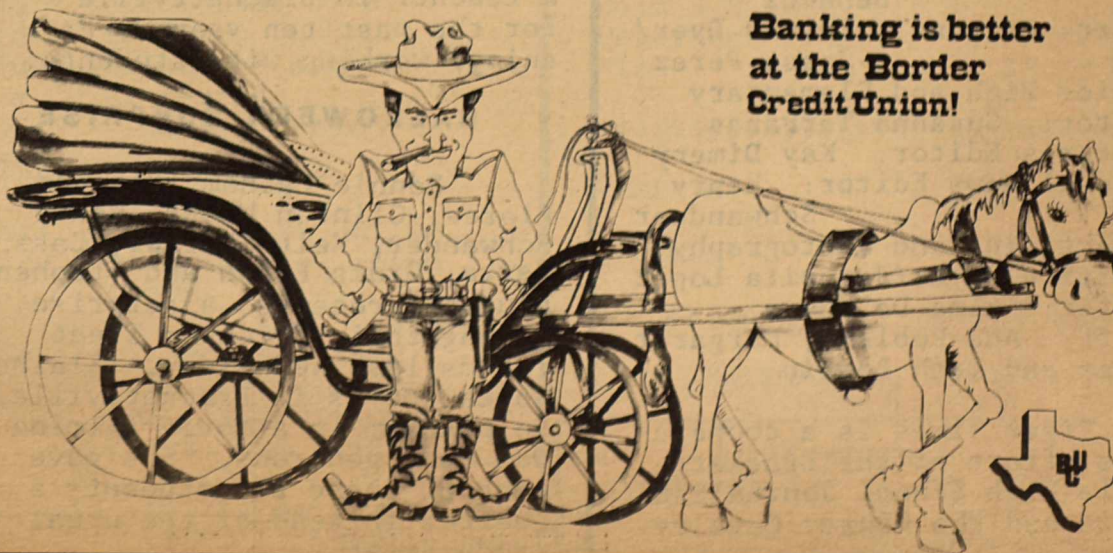

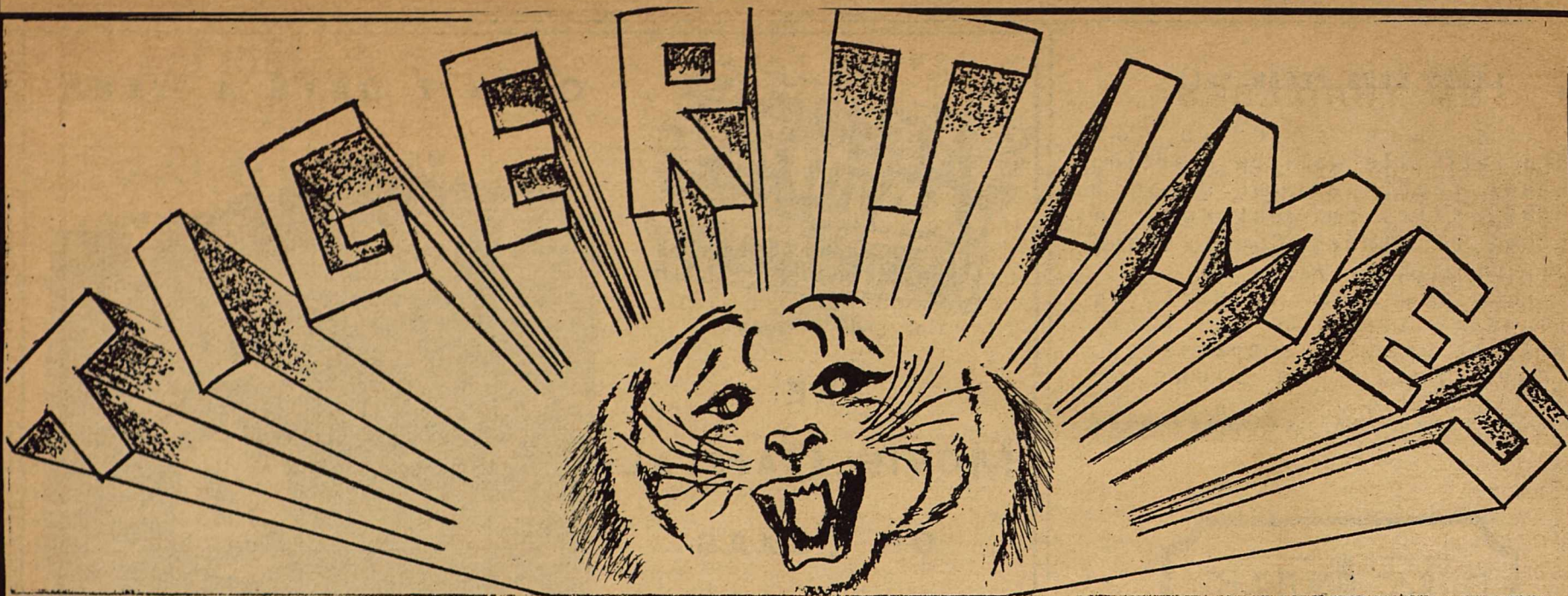

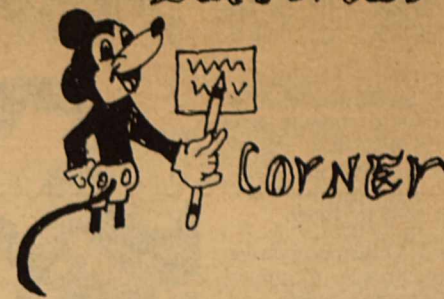

Mr. Julio V. Martinez passed away in a Del Rio Hospital Tuesday, Oct. 30. He was 77.


Rosary was recited at Hillcrest Funeral Home Tuesday evening Oct. 30.
