## BATHROOM SAFETY GIFTS FOR

Bathroom accessories are excellent Christmas gifts for a ging parents and grandparents. Besides being

convenience presents, they are also safety investments advises Sylvia Baker, county Extension home economist.

Some bathroom changes may require professional installation, but many safety aids are inexpensive and readily available in hardware and variety stores. Here are some possibilities:

Soap attached to a string prevents grabbing for wet soap while bathing or showering.

Tub decals and rubber tub mats help prevent slipping in the bathtub or shower, a frequent cause of home accidents.

Indoor-outdoor carpet will make floors less slippery. It is available by the yard or squares that are easy to install.

Grab rails may be installed on the tub and in other locations to help maintain balance. Some are available in hardware and department stores, others may be ordered by catalog.

Changes and additions to plumbing equipment also add to safety and convenience. A hand held sprayer attached to the tub faucet makes bathing easier. A kitchen type spray attachment for the sink will

# Our neighbor gave us the good word about heat pumps.



Old George next door has done a lot of favors for us over the years. He took the kids to the circus, let us borrow his tools, even helped out when we repainted the house.

But the best thing he ever did for us was advise us to get an electric heat pump when we had to replace our central air conditioning unit. Now that was neighborly. Buying that heat pump was one of the smartest moves we ever made.

Until George told me better, I always assumed that a heat pump was just a heating system. Well, it's that, of course—but it's also an air conditioner that does a great job of cooling and dehumidifying our home every summer.


So what we have now is this neat all-in-one system that keeps the house comfortable all year round and does it efficiently, too, so that we

save money on utility bills. You see, a heat pump uses less energy because it doesn't have to make heat; it simply moves it. In the winter, it removes heat from the outside air and transfer's it inside. When the weather is warm, it collects heat and moisture from inside the house and moves it outside.

I'm convinced a heat pump is the best heating/cooling unit you can choose—especially in our part of the country, where the winters are mild. In South Texas, a properly installed heat pump produces at least 2½ units of heat for every unit of energy needed to run it.

The more I think about it, the more grateful I am to old George for being such a good neighbor. Maybe I ought to do something nice for him today. Like return his hedge clippers.

Lighting can usually be improved to make it brighter and more evenly diffused. The addition of fluorescent lighting may be helpful. The use of a small, soft night light is an economical way to prevent groping for the switch in the dark.

#### AVOID HOLIDAY COOKING RUSH

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Christmas cooking should be fun, but last minute preparation can be hectic. If you can spare a little freezer space, cook and bake now and freeze holiday foods, suggests county Extension home economist, sylvia Baker.

"Every hour family members spend cooking now will be an extra hour of free time to be with friends and relatives during the holidays," she

observes.

Most prepared foods will keep for a month in the freezer, so cook as your present time schedule allows, Baker says. If you have enough time today to make cookies, make them and pop

them into the freezer. If your time is more limited, whip up a dip or a sandwich spread.

During the next few weeks, prepare double recipes of main dishes. Eat one now and freeze the other to be reheated during the holidays.

Frozen sandwiches are a good choice for lunches and simple suppers. they will keep well for two weeks, Baker says. But don't use lettuce, tomatoes or cucumbers for frozen sandwiches. They will lose their texture and make the sandwich soggy. Salad dressing is a better choice than mayonnaise, pickles better than celery, and use egg yolk instead of egg white for best results freezing sandwiches.


Many candies and cookies will keep at room temperature for several weeks, she points out. Store crisp candies or cookies separately in tightly covered containers and they will keep for two or three weeks.


Try making a meatball mixture using three to five pounds of lean ground beef. Make the meatballs in a cocktail or main dish size. Bake at 375'F in a shallow pan

for 20 minutes.


Shake the pan several times to turn the meatballs. Remove them from the oven and cool. Package the meatballs in serving size containers and freeze them.

When you are ready to serve them, simply thaw and heat in any sauce and they will be ready for holiday entertaining, Baker says.







### From stately saint to jolly gent:

### How St. Nicholas became Santa Claus!

"Twas the night before Christmas with which to do so. and all through the house ... '

So begins one of the most famous poems in the English language, one that has influenced American tradition greatly. For it is because of Dr. Clement Clarke Moore's "The Visit of St. Nicholas" that we enjoy our concept of Santa today.

In his classic poem, Moore described St. Nicholas has having "a broad face, and a little round belly that shook when he laughed, like a bowl full of jelly. He was chubby and plump - a right jolly old elf.'

This picture of a jolly and plump fellow is a far cry from the stately St. Nicholas of Europe, where the tradition of a holiday gift-giving actually began.

Little is known about St. Nicholas other than that he was born in Asia Minor and eventually became a muchloved archbishop of Myra, where he died in the year 324.

After his death, numerous legends sprang up about his charitable deeds, especially in regard to children. He became the patron saint of boys and girls, and his feast day, December 6th, became the occasion for giving children small gifts of toys or gingerbread. The association of St. Nicholas with gifting probably came about through a legend that credited him with bestowing money upon a penniless nobleman who had three daughters to marry off, but no dowries

The Church, seeking a way to Christianize pagan customs, turned to St. Nicholas for assistance. For the giving of presents during the winter months is an ancient tradition. The Romans exchanged gifts during their Saturnalia festival in December, and the people of Northern Europe had the god Woden, who brought gifts to them in the middle of winter, as well as Berchta, the hearth goddess, who paid visits to homes in December.

Thus, St. Nicholas became the Christian replacement for both Woden and Berchta, although vestiges of the latter are still in evidence with the Italian Befana and the Russian Bobouschka.

Accordingly, a new ritual came into being; on the eve of his feast day, St. Nicholas was supposed to ride across the sky on a white or pale grey horse, just as Woden and Berchta had done in pre-Christian lore.

For the good child, the saint brought gifts; for the naughty youngster, there were rods and switches. Retaining aspects of Berchta, he was still associated with the hearth in various ways. Either the children's shoes or stockings would be placed there, or hay or grain would be left there for his horse. And, he was accompanied by a decidedly pagan-like creature. Sometimes this small, ugly elf or dwarf was given the task of sliding down the chimney, a feat too undignified for the good saint.

With the reformation, St. Nicholas began to be supplanted by the Christ Child as a gift-giver in Protestant Europe. And, with the demise of St. Nicholas' Day, gifts began to arrive on Christmas Eve.

There were many other substitutions for St. Nicholas, such as Pere Noel in France and Knech Ruprecht in Bavaria and Austria.

But, in Holland, St. Nicholas still retained his popularity, for which our modern-day Santa can be thankful. For it was the Dutch who brought St. Nicholas to the New World in 1624.

They called him Sinter Claes.

In 1809, Washington Irving vividly described St. Nicholas as the patron saint of the Dutch colony of New Amsterdam. He wrote of the saint's annual ride over the tree tops in a wagon filled with gifts.

We can only surmise that Dr. Moore had read Irving's popular history containing the account of St. Nicholas. For instead of describing the saint as tall and stately, Moore echoed Irving's description of him as a sturdy Dutchman who smoked a

Moore was also probably inspired by an illustration published in 1821, showing St. Nicholas in a sleigh pulled by one reindeer.

Moore's poem was published in 1823 and many years later, Thomas Nast, the well-known illustrator, gave

us his version of St. Nicholas, based on Moore's poem. However, he called the jolly gent Santa Claus.

Through the years, successive illustrators have added other dimensions to Santa's appearance until he has become totally unrecognizable from the tall and dignified St. Nicholas who preceded him.

Although their appearance may differ greatly, Santa Claus and St. Nicholas do have several traits in common; they both love children and they both love to give presents!
















breads.


After dinner, the youngsters would take their sleds to coast down snowy slopes; or, they might head for the


