

## CAVALRY RIDES AGAIN



### UNITED STATES CAVALRY

History will come alive on April 26, 27 and 28th when the 4th United States Memorial Cavalry Regiment will present a Cavalry Encampment at the 9th Annual Fort Clark Cavalry Days.

The Regiment, uniformed and equipped, will camp with their tents and horses in the manner of a cavalry unit of 100 years

Troopers will march in the parade, conduct drill exercises, firing and sabre demonstrations and re-enact a patrol and skirmish action as it might have happened in the vicinity of Fort Clark in the 1870s.

The 4th U.S. Memorial Cavalry Regiment was initially formed in 1971 and is incorporated and chartered by

the State of Texas as a nonprofit corporation. Its purpose is educational and includes the following aims and activities:

- 1. Organize and maintain a regiment of cavalry, uniformed and equipped, to commemorate the 4th U.S. Cavalry Regiment stationed in Texas and New Mexico during the period of the Indian wars (circa 1861-1890).
- 2. Enrich the heritage of the American Southwest by authentically recreating the role of the U.S. Army and the 4th U.S. Cavalry Regiment in particular, in dealing with the Indian problems during the pacification and settlement of the Southwest.

- 3. Unite congenially in fellowship and friendship those men accepted for membership and promote understanding, by such members, of the training, lifestyle and historical contributions of the U.S. Cavalry during the period 1861-1890.
- 4. Through public appearances, inform the general public of life and activities of U.S. Cavalry during this period.

This unit, consisting of approximately 20 members from the San Antonio area, has highlighted previous Ft. Clark Cavalry Days celebrations and is an experience not to be missed.







## RAMS AVERAGE AT \$710 SONORA PERFORMANCE TEST SALE

SONORA, Texas -- General rains across South West Texas and green weeds helped make Thursday's 37th Annual Ram Performance Test Sale at Texas A&M Experiment Station ranch near Sonora one of the best ever.

Forty-two rams sold for \$29,800, for an average of \$710 per head. George Ahlschwede, Extenision sheep and goat specialist from San Angelo and one of the organizers of the sale, said the green weeds and general rains created alot of buyer enthusiasm.

The rams really sold well.

The ranchers are in a much better frame of mind than I've seen them in a long time," Ahlschwede stated.

Pat Rose III of Brackettville consigned the highest selling ram to the sale. Buying that ram for \$1,550 was Rod Richardson of Iraan. Richardson also paid \$1,300 for another Rose ram.

Carl Esser of Brackettville had the high-indexing ram on the test. Out of the 311 rams on the test, Esser's ram had an index value of 130.6 and a daily gain of .947 pounds per day. That ram sold for \$650 to Guillermo Torres of San Luis Potosi, Mexico. Pat Rose consigned many of the high selling rams to the sale. J.R. Canning of Eden purchased

a Rose ram for \$1,200, and Angelo State University in San Angelo paid \$1,100 for another. Bill Austin bought a Rose ram for \$1,050, and Bill Morris of Roscoe purchased another for \$1,100.

Other volume buyers at the sale were Edwin Sawyer of Sonora, who purchased three head for \$2,450, and Wesley Sawyer of Sonora, who paid \$1,350 for two head. Hadley Wardlaw of Brackettville bought two head for \$1,000.4T Ranch of Ballinger purchased three head for \$2,600, and bought a ram consigned by Clinton Hodges of Sterling city for \$1,000.

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

## SHERIFF'S CORNER

The aggravated assault case which occured on the night of March 5th has been cleared with the arrest of two local juveniles.

Salvador Hernandez, 59, of Brackettville was attacked and severely beaten and cut with a knife by the two juveniles as he was walking home. He suffered four broken ribs, severe bruises nd lacerations, deep knife wounds on his right hand and a shoulder separation which required surgery at the Audie Murphy Hospital in San Antonio.

Both of the juveniles arrested in the case are on parole for prior offenses, one for burglary and the other for an assault case which also involved a knife. A review of their case will be held before District Judge George Thurmond within the next few days.

An escape plan at the County Jail was intercepted and the two men involved, one a federal prisoner being held on alien smuggling charges and the other a county prisoner being held on Auto Theft charges, have been isolated and secured under maximum security. The two had planned to overpower a jailer and make good their escape on the night of March 22nd.

Michael Schlacter and Phillip Benites, jailers at the county jail, attended a 40 hr. Jailer Certification Course held in Del rio this week. According to state law, every county jailer hired by the various sheriff's departments through out Texas must be certified within one year by attending and successfully completing a 40 hour Jailer Certification Course.

Of the eight jailers now employed at the county jail seven are certified with the remaing one to be certified at the next available jailers school at the Middle Rio Grande Law Enforcement Academy.

We have come a long way the last couple of years. In September 1982 there were four jailers working full time at the jail, only two of them

were legally certified. The county jail was in violation of state law on 14 counts and is now certified for the first time since it was built in 1974.

The jail operation was running in the red close to \$100,000.00 a year and is now not only paying it's way but showed an approximate \$40,000.00 profit for FY 83-84. At this time we are the estimated within cost/profit margin for FY 84-85. With no unexpected costs appearing or a sudden loss of income due to a decrease in federal prisoner population, we should be able to round out FY 84-85 in the black.

economist-management, will discuss computerized decision making on a ranch. Dr. Jim McGrann of College Station, Extension economist management, and Jose G. Pena of Uvalde, Extension economist management, will follow on the program with a discussion of range management decisions.

Following the afternoon break, McGrann and Pena will give an overview of livestock and deer management decision aids.

A panel of ranchers from Sonora will discuss their choice of systems, computer application, time requirements and software and hardware, beginning at 4 PM. Computers

will be available from 6 to 8 PM for participants interested in "hands on" experience

in "hands on" experience.

The next day's program will begin at 8:30 AM at the bank with Lippke giving an overview of ranch management record keeping. Asshley Lovell of stephenville, Extension economist management, will discuss ranch accounting requirements at 9:15 AM. Dr. Larry White of Uvalde, Extension range specialist, will follow on the program with a discussion of preparing a total ranch production plan.

Following the morning break, the group will meet in concurrent sessions. These will continue throughout the

day, allowing participants to attend up to four different sessions. Topics will include sheep and goat, cow/calf and forage enterprise analyses, as well as total ranch and deer management and financial statements.




Have respect for power lines—both those overhead and those underground—anytime you're doing a job that requires you to work near them.

- Keep away from overhead lines while you're launching your boat or transporting it over land.
   Metal sailboat masts, outriggers, power boat antennas—and other high-rising equipment—can be deadly conductors of electricity.
- Don't trim or cut down trees near power lines.
   This is work best left to experts.
- Check your clearance carefully when you're carrying a tall pole or pipe on a tractor, or driving a truck with a raised bed, or operating machinery such as cranes, booms, draglines, hay loaders and well drilling rigs.
- Fallen power lines also are extremely dangerous.
  If you see a line downed by a storm, high winds,
  car accident or other mishap, call Central Power
  and Light Company. Meanwhile, stay away from
  the wire and anything it touches—and keep
  others away, too.
- Make sure you know the location of underground power lines before you install irrigation systems or unclog drain or sewer lines. Even routine projects like digging post holes or planting trees can be dangerous if you get too close to power lines.

Stay alert—and stay clear of power lines!
