

LOCAL FATALITY & BURGLARY



NORMAN H. HOOTEN

Santos Pena, 49, a farm laborer employed by Amistad Farms in southwest Kinney County lost his life in an accident on the farm on May 5th. According to witnesses at the scene, Mr. Pena had gone to check some irrigation water lines and was operating an all-terrain 4-wheel vehicle. The vehicle reportedly turned over on Mr. Pena, pinning him underneath. He was pronounced "dead on arrival" at Val Verde Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Tom Gilmore of Geroge West reported the burglary of his trailerhouse on Ft. Clark Springs. It is believed that the burglars obtained entry to the trailer by breaking through a rear window. A 12" blk/wht T.V. was taken by the unidentified intruders. The case is currently under

investigation.

This latest burglary brings the total number of reported burglaries to 10 so far this year. This is county wide with the largest numbers of burglaries now occuring in the rural areas of our county. Increased patrol activity and the arrest of several burglars in and around Brackettville has evidently caused the criminal element to move out into the less populated areas of our county to commit their misdeeds. They have the advantage in the rural areas, where lack of manpower hinders

good patrol procedures. I have asked the Commissioners Court to approve my request for a full-time Deputy Sheriff to assist me in my efforts to provide good law enforcement protection for our citizens. Hopefully they will realize that the population of our, county is growing, particularly in Ft. Clark, and the fact that outside interest have purchased many of the ranches in Kinney County, and have imported much valuable property to these ranches, left mostly unattended, invites thieves and burglars to be on the prowl. These facts plus the ever increasing number of crimes committed by illegal aliens passing through Kinney County demonstrates a definite need for a Deputy Sheriff to assist me. I don't mind putting in the long hours, but it is hard for one man to cover the entire county alone and provide the service and protection both in town and out in the county that the taxpayers deserve.

County Judge Albert Postell continues his crackdown on DWI offenders and some of those who have been granted probation are finding themselves back in court for violation of that probation. This tough enforcement of drunk driving laws is needed to curb the increase of drunk drivers on our city streets and public roadways. I think the Judge is trying to tell them something- IF YOU DRINK, DON'T DRIVE! And I think some of them are getting the message.

A disturbance at a residence on First Street Monday night

has led to assault charges being filed against six members of one family.

Margaret Hernandez and her sister Patty reported that the six family members attacked them in the street in front of the residence after the two Hernandez sisters had inquired as to the whereabouts of the husband of Margaret Hernandez. No arrests have been made at the time of this writing, but they will be served as soon as they can be located.

Growing Tomatoes By Carl Totemier Member, The American Horticultural Society

Most Americans are ripe for the luscious flavor of vineripened tomatoes. That's why tomatoes are the most popular of all home-grown vegetables. Other reasons: they're an excellent source of vitamins A and C and they're low in calories. They're so easy and rewarding to grow. All you need are a few plants tucked into a corner of the yard or grown in tubs on the patio and you'll have enough for an entire family.

Trying for a bountiful crop? Limit the number of stems by pruning away all but one or two. Tomatoes may fail to set fruit unless grown where they



will receive at least six hours of direct sunlight. They'll do best in a deep, well-drained soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.0 that contains a good mixture of peat, compost or manure. Make sure the plants receive at least an inch of water each


