COMMUNITY NURSING BY Jovita Aguilar

What methods are used to treat cancer? Please describe:

RADIATION THERAPY- Radiation damages the genetic material within the nucleus of the cell thus reducing the capacity of the cell to divide. (Malignant cells divide more rapidly.) Side effects of radiation therapy vary depending what part of the body is being treated.

CHEMOTHERAPY- Chemotherapy like radiation is used to control or distroy cancerous cells by preventing their reproduction. Cancer cells divide and grow more rapid

making them susceptible to chemotherapy and radiation. Individuals receiving chemotherapy are affected with bone marrow depression, stomach, mouth and intestinal problems and the loss of hair. These effects are not long lasting because cells in these areas regenerate fast. Chemotherapy is given orally, intramuscularly, intravenously or intra-arterially. The method of drug administration depends on the type of cancer and the patient.

LASER SURGERY-With laser surgery a laser beam is aimed with intense heat, which destroys the tumor(s).

STP LAWSUIT SETTLEMENT REACHED

Central Power & Light Co. has agreed to a settlement of the lawsuit filed by CPL and the other owners of the Soth Texas Project nuclear power plant against the plant's former engineer and constructor, Brown & Root Inc., and its parent corporation, Halliburton Co.

The settlement provides that the four owners will receive a total of \$750 million from Brown & Root. The payments will be made in quarterly installments, beginning October 1, 1985, and continuing for seven years. Each owner's portion of the \$750 million is based on its

share of the plant.

CPL, which owns 25.2
percent of STP, will receive
\$189 million. Besides CPL,
Houston Lighting & Power Co.
and City Public Service of San
Antonio have said they will
agree to the settlement. HL&P,
which owns 30.8 percent, will
receive \$231 million. San

Antonio, with 28 percent, will get \$210 million.

The City of Austin, which owns 16 percent, is still considering whether to accept or reject the offer. It would receive \$120 million if it

The owners agreeing to the settlement will ask Judge G.P. Hardy of the 132nd State District Court in Bay City, Texas, where the case is filed, to properly dispose of the pending lawsuit. Judge Hardy consistently has urged the parties to settle the case outside of court to avoid a lengthy and expensive trial.

In addition, CPL and HL&P will submit the settlemtn to the Texas Public Utility Commission. The PUC has jurisdiction over the inclusion of any plant in the rate bases of investor-owned utilities operating in Texas. The settlement is conditioned upon the PUC issuing an

approppriate order.

CPL will apply benefits of the \$189 million it receives toward reducing its investment in the project. This reduction will save CPL's customers approximately \$600 million through decreased investment related expenses over the life of the project.



executive officer of Central Power & Light Co. "By reducing the cost of STP, the settlement will benefit CPL's customers by lowering the cost of electricity from the plant."

STP consist of two identical 1,250 megawatt nuclear power generating units, located 60 miles south of Houston near Bay City, Texas. Unit 1, which 80 percent complete, is scheduled to begin operation in June 1987. Unit 2, which is 53.4 percent complete, will go in service in June 1989.

The lawsuit against Brown & Root and Halliburton was filed in December 1981 by HL&P. CPL and San Antonio and Austin later joined in the suit alleging that Brown & Root had breached engineering and construction contractragreements.

Earlier in September 1981, Brown & Root was removed as STP project engineer because of dispute over design and construction delays. Brown & Root subsequently withdrew as the project constructor.

An issue that still must be resolved by the court is the disposition of the massive amount of records that have been gathered in the case. CPL and HL&P believe that many of the documents on file with the court are apropriate for regulatory review of the project by the Texas PUC, and Brown & Root ahs indicated that it will not object to the release of these documents, pending Judge Hardy's decision on the disposition of the records. aces I

STATEMENT BY GOV. MARK WHITE STNP Litigation Settlement

"After learning the details of the settlement of the STNP lawsuit, I am encouraged that the overall price reduction and resultin lower cost per kilowatt of the plant will render it a viable investment for the ratepayers of Texas."

I comment Brown & Root for ending the damaging and unproductive litigation phase and I comment the partners for pursuing the matter to the benefit of their ratepayers, who hve invested in the plant already.

Continuation of the lawsuit would have meant the spending of great sums on litigation with little likelihood of conclusion for years and no assuarnce of greater recovery.

Final disposition of this matter for the investor-owned utilities now rests with PUC. I have total confidence in the three commissioners and know their final decision will be in the best interests of Texas, its ratepayers and its corporate citizens. For the ratepayers of San Antonio and Austin, I know their city officials will make a good decision on their behalves.





THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

Considering all possibilities, the last week of May 1985 was quiet. reasonably potential for law enforcement problems was there because of the Memorial Day week-end, which usually brings in larger numbers of people to Ft. Clark and Kinney County, increased consumption of alcohol, and heavy traffice on Hwy. 90.

The alleged burglary was said to have, occured Saturday afternoon. The victim reported that a. watch, a shotgun, and \$300 in was taken by the intruder. There are no leads at the time of this writing, and no suspects at this time. The case is considered active and is under investigation.

rock throwing incident linked with vulgar language in a public place caused the arrest of two local youths. As I did not handle the case, I do not have any further details at this time. The incident allegedly occured on. Ft. Clark sometime Saturday

night.

The U.S. Border Patrol held their annual B-B-Q at Ft. Clark on Saturday afternoon and night. There was a large turnout of Border Patrol Agents, local law enforcement officers and other guests. A fine time was had by all. The annual event has grown to large proportions and is

expected to be even larger next year.

Prisoner care fees at the County Jail have totaled \$ 110,879.00 thus far for FY 1984-85. This averages out at \$12,319.89 per month which is a little below our predicted income, but still means that the county jail is paying it's way and then some. We hope to have higher monthly incomes for the balance of FY 84-85 which will allow us to operate in the black once again. You may remember that we showed a net profit over and above expenses last year of \$ 40,000.00.

EVERYONE NEEDS A WILL

SAN ANTONIO-- Do you need a will? Everyone does, according to an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A will insures that property is distributed to people selected by you rather that what is dictated by state law, said Wayne Hayenga of College Station.

State law will give 50 percent of community property to the children rather that the surviving spouse if there is no will, Hayenga told a group of about 80 women gathered for a three-day Farm and Ranch Business Management seminar for women landowners. The seminar drew a capacity crowd for the second year at the Holiday Inn North in San Antonio. Landowners came from Albuquerque, N.M.; Northboro, Mass.; and from all over the state of Texas. One participant lived in San Antonio but owned land in Indiana.

Another reason for drawing up a will, Hayenga said, is that even if property is classified as separate property, the surviving spouse would have the right to only 33-1/3 percent of the separate property.

A will also allows for the orderly and inexpensive

settlement of personal affairs of the deceased, the economist Without a special said. provision in will, or special attention by the executor, the transfer of an automobile to the surviving sopuse would be taxable income, he said.

A basic will also allows for the payment of debts and expenses, the disposition of tangible personal proerty such as an automobile or jewelry, or other property; the selection of an executor without bond, the nomination of a quardian for minor children, and the selection of a trustee. In addition, a will implements tax planning, Hayenga said.

The economist stressed that the guardian is only nominated by a will, not selected by the person writing

the will.

"Courts reserve the right to look over your shoulder and if the court doesn't like your decision, they can appoint someone else," Hayenga said.

"People change faster that legal documents change, he said, noting that the guardian who is nominated by the will may not be the best

Finally, a will may stop possible disputes between family members, the economist

Hayenga also discussed leases, mineral estates, buying, selling and trading land, the outlook for agricultural investments, income tax planning, and estate planning during the






