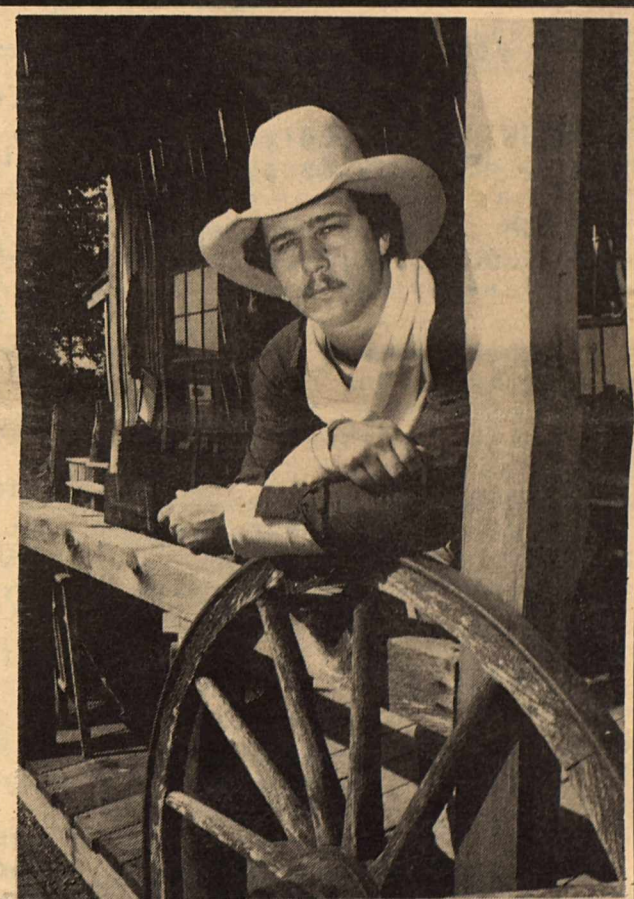

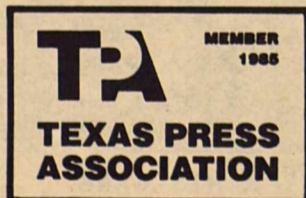

THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

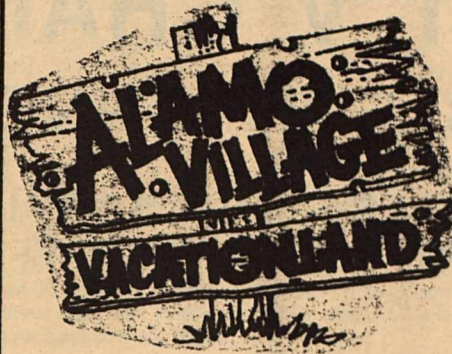
The Kinney County Grand Jury met on Thursday, June 13th, and heard six cases presented to them. The Grand Jury returned 5 felony indictments and reduced the 1 remaining case to a Class A Misdemeanor and suggested it be tried in County Court.

Eugenio Hidalgo-Munoz, 19, Pompeyo Hernandez-Hidalgo, 18, and Elidio Garcia-Hidalgo, 17, all of Vera Cruz, Mexico (and illegal aliens) were indicted on felony charges of Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle. Charges were filed against them after an incident on the Anacacho Ranch in south Kinney County on May 21st in which they took a 1972 Ford pickup. They were captured in the truck before leaving the ranch.

Henry R. Salmon, 18, of Spofford was indicted on a 1st Degree Felony charge of Burglary of A Habitation. Salmon was charged with the offense after a residence was burglarized in Spofford on May 5th. Bond in this case was set at \$7,500 and Salmon has been released after a Surety Bond in that amount was posted in his behalf.

The two remaining cases are narcotics cases and the names of the accused will not be released at this time as the respective cases are still under investigation. Both cases involve charges of possession of Marijuana with intent to distribute.

A 29 year old Houston man was arrested at approx. 1:30 a.m. Monday by Game Warden Bill Lindeman and myself after being stopped by Lindeman on East Hwy. 90 near the Highway Department. Lindeman noticed the vehicle near the B & S Grocery and observed what he believed to be "suspicious activity" on the part of the driver. He followed the car to the area near the Highway Dept. and made the stop. After running a check on the license plate number he was notified by the Dispatcher that a "hit" (stolen report) had been returned on the car. He then radioed the jail for assistance and I was notified. The suspect was "high" on

drugs at the time and was vague as to his identity and what he was doing in our area at that time of the morning.

It was thought for awhile that the driver had dropped off someone in the business area of town and that a burglary might be in progress. After transporting the unidentified black male to the County Jail, we made a through search of all the building in the downtown area. No evidence of a crime being committed was found and we ceased our search at 3:30 a.m.

At approx. 9:15 a.m. I talked to Houston Police Dept. officials and from the description of the suspect they advised that they thought we might have a man known as Kenneth Cy Harding in custody. Harding was believed to have committed at least 37 armed robberies in the Houston area and was known as the "Montrose Bandit". During questioning by me later on Monday, Harding admitted to being the "Montrose Bandit" and further stated that he had hijacked the car he was driving from a Houston woman at gunpoint on Saturday, June 8th.

Harding was taken before J.P. Louis Starzel and legally advised of his rights and the charges against him. Bond was set at \$40,000 as recommended by a Houston judge. Harding was picked up by Houston police officers on Tuesday morning and transported back to Houston to stand trial for his crimes. The Houston officers had a list of 37 robberies believed committed by

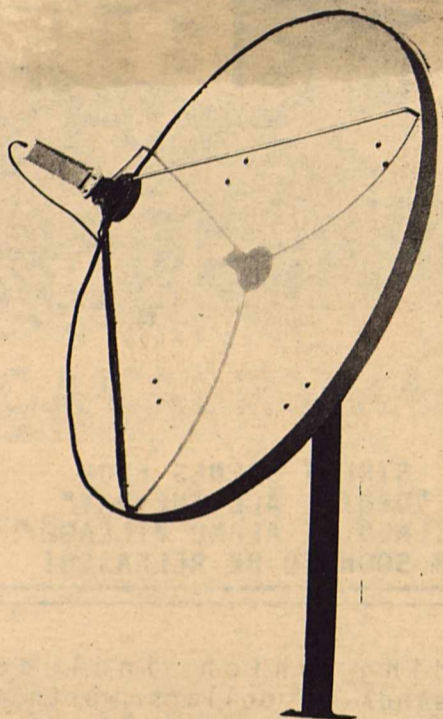
Harding which included thousands of dollars worth of jewelry, cash, and other personal property. Heads-up law enforcement by Game Warden Bill Lindeman led to the capture and arrest of this notorious armed robber from Houston.

The U.S. Border Patrol contacted me Sunday afternoon to report that Border Patrol Agents working on Hwy 277 in south Kinney County had accidentally located a "stash" of marijuana stored in 15 cardboard egg cases (the 30 dozen size). They further advised that they had contacted the Drug Enforcement Administration in Eagle Pass for further instructions. The D.E.A. showed no interest in staking out the area and advised the Border Patrol to transport the marijuana to the sector office in Del Rio for safekeeping. The marijuana weighed in at 188 pounds. It is unknown by me at this time why the D.E.A. chose not to stake out the area and attempt to arrest the smugglers involved.

Experts in the narcotics investigation field have predicted a heavy increase in dope smuggling and narcotics traffic along the Texas/Mexico border due to increased pressure on the dope trade in Florida by narcotics agents. Now it appears that not only will we be faced with increased criminal activity by illegal aliens, but also increased narcotics traffic along our border with Mexico.

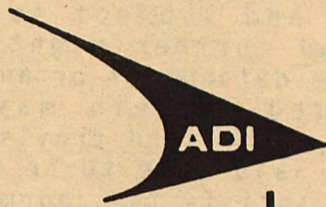

to discuss and receive comments on the proposed rules relating to the Rio Grande Watermaster Operation and all parts of the Rio Grande and its tributaries below Fort Quitman, excluding the Pecos and Devils Rivers Watersheds, including proposed amendments to 31 TAC 345. 1-345.2 (Rule 156.30.05.001-.007), the repeal of 345.11 through 349.14 (Rules 156.30.01.001, 156.30.10.001 to 156.32.10.004) and the adoption of new rules 345.11-345.17, 345.21-345.23, 345.31-345.34, 345.41-345.44, 345.51-345.55 and 345.61. Additionally, the Board is proposing two new rules: 303.9 which will define the limits on excess water permits on the Rio Grande below the Brownsville gage, and 303.94
