KINNEY COUNTY PROJECT SHOW The Kinney County Project Show will be held January 17, 1986 during the Kinney County Livestock Show. The Project Show is open to all youth ages 6-19, residing in Kinney County, attending Brackettville Schools. Any adult over 19 years of age, residing in Kinney County is eligible to enter the project show. The 1985 show was the first held in many eyars and over 100 exibits were entered. Those interested in participating would want to begin planning their entries. The project show rules will be

KINNEY COUNTY PROJECT SHOW RULES

as follows:

1. Any youth between the ages of 6 and 19, residing in Kinney County, attending Brackettville Schools are eligible to enter the Kinney County Project Show in the Youth Division. The ages are divided in the following manner:

> Pee-wee -- 6,7 Preteen -- 8,9,10 Junior -- 11,12, 13 Senior -- 14 - 19

2. Any adult over 19 years of age, residing in Kinney Count is eligible to enter the project show.

3. Exhibitors in the youth division must be under thedirect supervision of the vocational agricultural teacher, vocational home economics teacher, county extension agent, or classroom teacher. The exhibitors' entry form must be signed by the respective supervisor. CON.T PG. 3

4. Exhibitors in the adult division will submit an entry form signed only by the exhibitor.

5. Entries in writing must be submitted to the county extension agent, vocational agricultural teacher, or vaocational home economics teacher on or before January 10, 1986.

6. Exhibitors are limited to one entry in each class. There will be a limit of 4 entries for each Junior and Preteen exhibitor and 5 entries for each Senior and Adult exhibitor. Projects from the previous year will NOT be eligible as an entry for this year's (1986) show.

7. Each exhibitor will receive either a blue, red, or white ribbon, based on judges opinion.

8. The show will be at the Kinney Count Civic Center on January 17, 1986, with entries due between 8 and 9 o'clock with judging to begin at 9:30 a.m. Exhibits will remain on display under supervision on the 17th. Exhibits must be removed from the building between the hours of 4 and 5 p.m. on the 17th.



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
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SHERIFF'S CORNER BY NORMAN H. HOOTEN, SHERIFF

We received a call from a Spofford resident Wednesday morning, Sept. 11th, who reported that an illegal was at his residence seeking assistance for his companion who had been bitten by a rattlesnake.

When I arrived at the residence and spoke with the man it was determined that he and his companion were Mexican Nationals and, after crossing the Rio Grande, were walking through the brush to the interior of Texas, seeking work. He stated that while stopping for water near a dirt tank on a ranch north of Spofford, his companion, who was wearing tennis shoes, was bitten on the left ankle by the snake. He estimated that this had happened about an hour before he reached a phone.

I had contacted Senior Border Patrol Agent Roy Dyer prior to my arrival in Spofford and he soon arrived. We contacted Marcelino Valdez, foreman of the Hobbs Ranch where the incident had taken place, and decied to let him guide us to the location with the assistance of the illegal alien. We soon located the man and he was in extreme pain from the bite, the puccture marks from the fangs were over an inch apart, which indicated that he had been bitten by a fairly large snake. The man's foot was swollen and discolored, and the swelling has progressed almost to the knee. After we got back to the highway we loaded the man into my patrol car and made arrangements for the Kinney County Ambulance crew to meet me at the Ft. Clark gate. He

received preliminary first aid and treatment at the Kinney County Clinic and was then transported to Val Verde Memorial Hospital for further treatment.

There were some other incidents involving illegal aliens in Spofford and southwest Kinney County over the week-end of Sept. 14th &

15th, and Monday the 16th. We received several calls about men believed to be illegal aliens prowling about the Spofford area and at least two reports of illegal aliens breaking into houses in Spofford. One such incident involved an illegal alien who broke into the Resendez residence Sunday night and took a .22 caliber pistol. A search of the area failed to produce the suspect. About an hour later we received another call that an illegal alien was trying to break into the Andrews residence in Spofford. (The owner was not at home at the time). A thorough search by myself and Border Patrol officers failed to turn up anything and no aliens were sighted by us. The thick brush in and around Spofford and the many old and abandonded buildings always makes

searches difficult.

Monday morning I received a call from the Lawerence Ranch east of Spofford that reported the theft of a motorcycle from the ranch headquarters. The theft was believed to have benn committed by illegals because of tracks in the area. The vehicle was tracked away from the ranch headquarters by Louis Flores, a ranch employee, and the motorcycle was located approx. 1/2 mile away. It was recovered and returned to the headquarters with minor damage to the ignition where the thieves had tried to start it with a screwdriver. As I have reported before, crime in our rural areas is increasing because of the hundreds of illegal aliens passing through our county on their way into the interior. A whopping 95% of rural crimes reported in Kinney County this year so far is believed to be directly linked to illegal aliens.

The U.S. Border Patrol in our area and all along the Texas-Mexico border is doing an outstanding job, but the sheer numbers of aliens coming across into our country has them over-powered. Local Border Patrol officials have told me that they are catching twice as many aliens this year that they have been apprehending 30 to 40% more each year than the year before for the past 3 years. how long can we absorb these numbers? Ask your Congressman!

Law enforcement agencies of

those counties along the Texas-Mexico border are not equipped nor do we have the manpower to effectively combat crime increases in rural areas by illegal aliens. The Border Patrol are doing the best they can. The numbers are guranteed to continue to rise. Continued unrest and warfare in Central America is sending illegal aliens from countries other tha Mexico into our state and country in ever increasing numbers. We who live along the border are affected now, it will get worse, of that we are certain. Somewhere along the line our government has to pull the blinders off and take a hard look at our options. I believe they are very few.

On a lighter note, we took in the Miss Kinney County beauty paegent and say, how about thos pretty, talented Kinney County girls! The annual paegent was held Saturday night, Sept. 14th, and was, in my opinion, a huge success. I would not have wanted to be a judge in that one. All the girls demonstrated beauty, poise and talent. But as with most contests, there can only be one winner, and the new Miss Kinney County is Tia Ralston, 14. Bouncy Tammy Frerich was 1st runner-up with Sheri White as 2nd runner-up. We congratulate all the girls for who and what they are. Kinney County is fortunate to have this caliber of young people in our community and they only prove, once again, that our county and community, is full of good folks, for these young people are a reflection of their parents and environment.

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

1985-86 SCHOOL YEAR UNDERWAY

The 1985-86 school year got underway on Tuesday, September 3. Enrollment is expected to be up slightly over 1984-85. House Bill 72 is still with us and there are many parts of this law that are of particular concern to students, parents, teachers and administrators. Some of the more important aspects of H.B. 72 and State Board of Education rules are listed below:

1. ATTENDANCE- Students who have more that five (5) days of unexcused absences will not receive credit regardless of their course grade. Reasons for excused absences include personal sickness, illness or death in the family, quarantine, weather or road conditions that make travel hazardous, or observance of religious holidays. Doctor's and Dental appointments may be excused, but these should be scheduled after 10:00 a.m. each day whenever possible.

2. PROMOTION- Social Promotion has been eliminated. A child who fai Is will not be promoted to the next grade. To be promoted, an elementary child must have a grade averaging 70 from their science, language arts, math and social studies work. However, their grades in math and language arts must be at least a 70.

An elementary child cannot repeat a grade more than once and cannot be made to repeat more that two different grades.

Middle school students must earn an overall grade of 70 and a grade of 70 in three of the following subjects:

Language Arts, math, science, or social studies.

High School students will be classified as freshman, sophomore, junior or senior solely on the number of credits earned. Brackett students must earn 23 credits to graduate after 1985-86. This year's seniors must earn 21 credits. Freshman are classified as having less that 6 credits. Sophomores have at least 6 credits and not more than 12 credits. Juniors have at least 12 credits. Seniors must have 18 credits beginning their 12th year. All students in grades 9-12 must be enrolled in at least five courses. Required courses must

be mastered before electives are chosen.

TEAMS Te sting: The Texas Education Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) will be administered at each odd numbered grade. Grades one, three, five, seven and nine will take the test in February. This years juniors (11th graders) who miss the test or fail to master it will retake the test on May first and second. A student who still fai ls to master the test will have two other opportunities to master the exam in 1986-87. THIS YEARS JUNIORS MUST PASS THE EXIT LEVEL TEAMS TEST BEFORE THEY CAN GRADUATE FROM BRACKETT HIGH SCHOOL.

GRADING- The minimum passing grade at any grade 1-12 is 70. Certain grades in K-2 will be coded Excellent (E), Satisfactory (U), or Needs Improvement (I). All other grade levels will be numberical on a scale of 0-100 with the follwoing breakdown:

90 - 100 = A 80 - 89 = B 75 - 79 = C 70 - 74 = D

69- Below = F A grade below 70 indicates failure.

Jr. High and High School tutorials for students who need help will begin after the third week of school. These classes will be held from 3:45-4:30 on Mondays and Wednesdays. Teachers will be available in Socail Studies, Math, English and Science. Students should consult their teachers for room numbers.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES: A student who fails to achieve at least a 70 in any subject will be ineligible to practice or participate in any extracurricular actifity for a six weeks period. A student may miss not more than 9 class periods per semester for any extracurricular activity in an yearl long class nor more than 5 class periods in a semester for a semester long class.

The State Board of Education is continuing to clarify these rules and to establish others. As more rules effecting the education of the children of Kinney County become available, we will do our best to keep the public advised.

The following suggestions are made to parents for monitoring the progress of their children in the classroon:

1. If a child is not doing satisfactory work, is not working up to potential, or having behavior problems, the parentes can expect to receive a notice of concern from the school druing the third week of each six weeks.

2. If a parent receives a notice of concern he/she should:

- a. Contact the teacher to talk about the child's progress.
- b. Identify the child's weak points.
- c. Look for undiagnosed physical inpairment (poor vision or hearing).
- d. Request that the teacher send the child's graded assignments for your signature and review the papers with your child.
- e. Have the child attend tutorials offered by the school.

3. Do not wait for the child to bring home a failing grade at the end of a six weeks period. It is too late at that point to help the child that six weeks.

The administrators and staff of Brackett Independent School District are anxious to work with parents and members of the community to assure that the children of the district have the opportunity to reveive a quality education.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 5, 1985

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political sub-divisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will

not be affected by such expiration. The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to. issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

propriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT


Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislatue to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment.

The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until other wise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

PROPOSTION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Trea-surer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to

provide for:

(1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County;

(2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."
