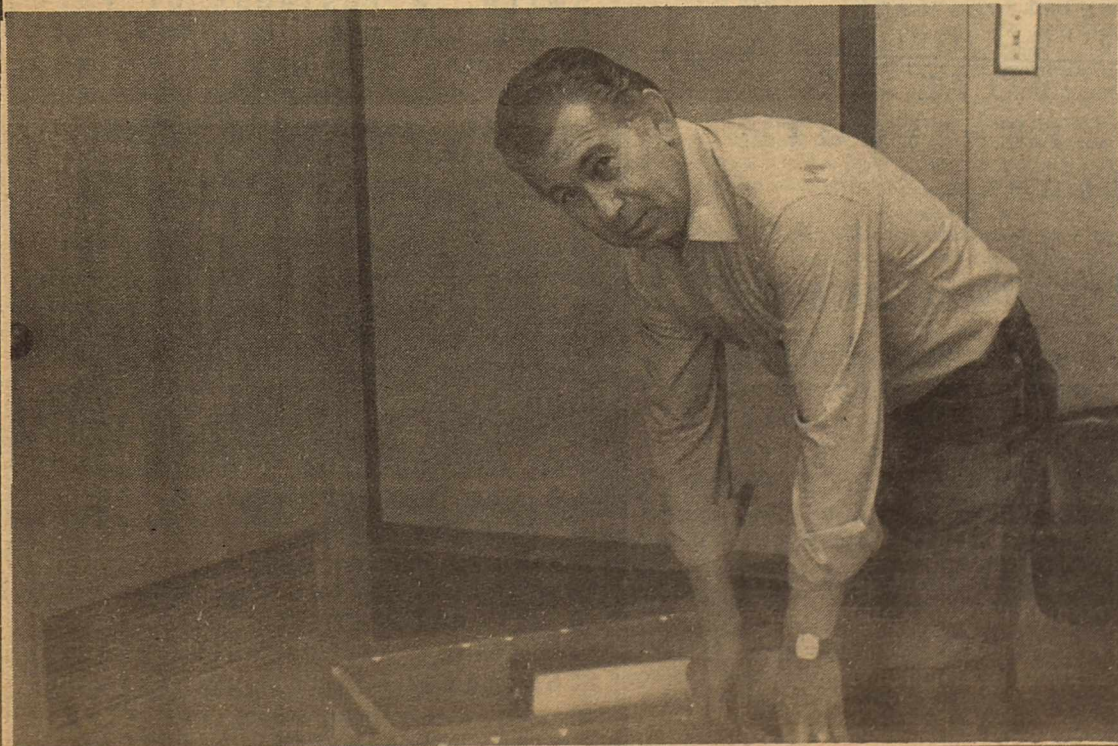

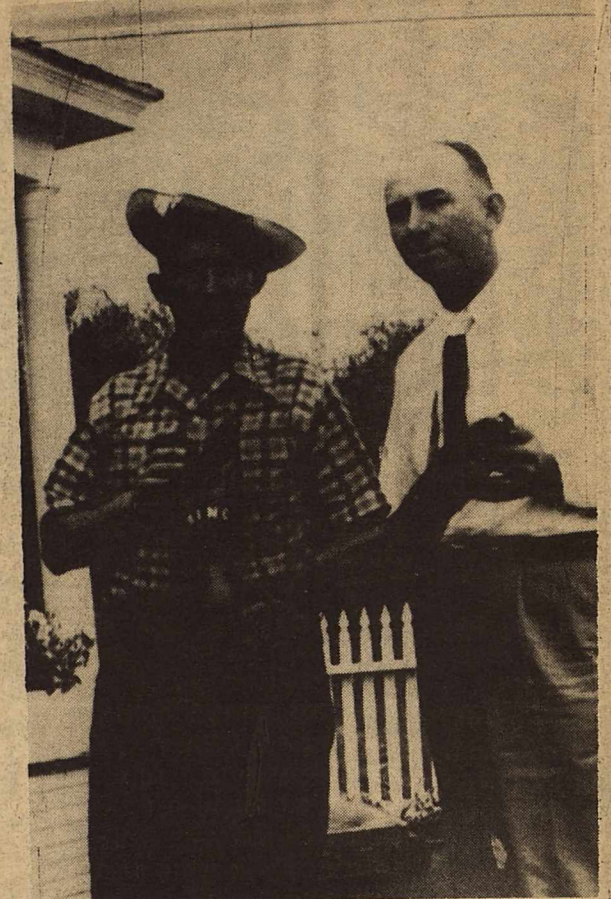

Called Nicorette® (nicotine resin complex), from Merrell Dow Pharmaceuticals Inc., it's a new prescription drug in chewing gum form. It is considered to be effective in helping smokers quit. Hints For Homeowners

Planting Trees and Shrubs

Is it true that you can add trees and shrubs to your landscape at any time of year? Yes, say the experts in the American Association of Nurserymen. Most living plants can be planted any time a hole can be dug.

This was not always the case. A generation or two ago the trees available at a nursery were "bare root," and could only be planted when they were in a dormant state—early spring or late fall.

To extend the planting period the nursery growers developed a system of digging the tree from the field with a ball of soil around the roots, then wrapping that ball in burlap. These "balled and burlapped" trees can be maintained for extended periods at the nursery and can be planted just about any time.

A more recent development is the "container grown" trees and other living plants, already accounting for 28 percent of total nursery production. Their roots are in soil in metal or



To extend the planting period, nursery growers have developed a system of digging the tree from the field with a ball of soil around the roots, then wrapping that ball in burlap, plastic cans where they can be kept in a healthy condition for an indefinite period. A great advantage is that they are transplanted into the yard along with the soil in which they have been growing, so suffer very little shock from being moved.

So, if you weren't able to plant in the yard earlier this season for any reason, get advice and assistance from your retail nursery and be assured you can plant now—or whenever you find convenient. Nature, and the "green survival" people at your nursery, have ways to make any season spring.

You can supply guests with insect repellent of course, but there are other ways to fight back. Here are some suggestions from the scientists at Johnson Wax, makers of RAID insecticides:

- Police the premises to remove debris that might serve as a hideout and an ideal breeding location for insects. Mosquitoes will breed in standing water... even a tin can filled with water can be a haven for them.

- Piles of branches or decaying leaves and animal waste will harbor pests, too, so make sure you clean and haul away organic material with the exception of compost and mulch areas.

- Mosquitoes are particularly active at dusk. A spray fogger that combines a repellent and an insecticide is handy to have around when the sun starts to go down.

- RAID Yard Guard can be used in outdoor areas to kill insects on contact, and after it has done its work, its repellent ingredient continues to keep biting pests away for several hours.

- Keep ants away from a picnic by using the fogger on picnic table and chair legs. (Be sure food is covered or removed when spraying.) Then, seek out ant hills and trails in the yard and treat these with RAID Ant and Roach Killer.

- When a wasp or hornet nest is found, it is best to destroy the insects and discard the nest before they have a chance to sting. When planting a flower garden, be sure to find out the mature height of the plants and place low-growing ones in front and tall varieties in the rear.



If you're looking for a quiet place to live, ask about the door construction. Solid or core-filled doors with gaskets or weather stripping are quieter.

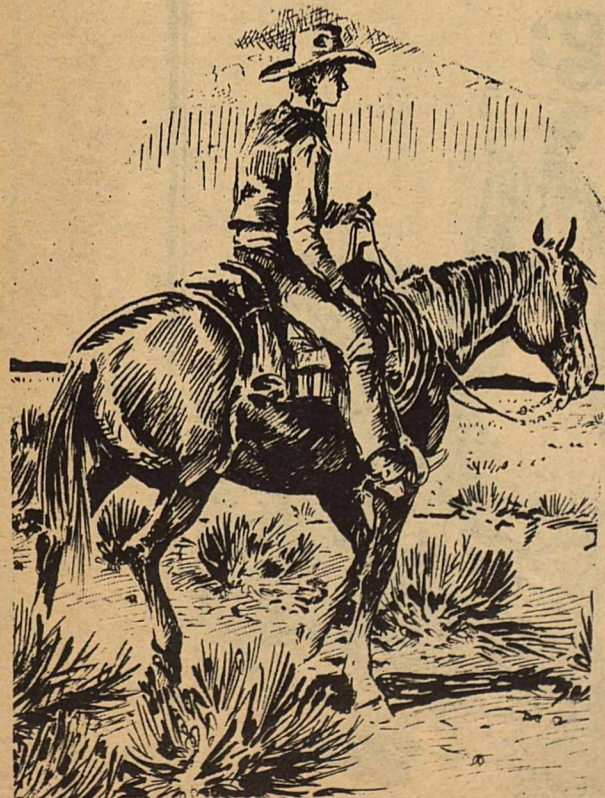

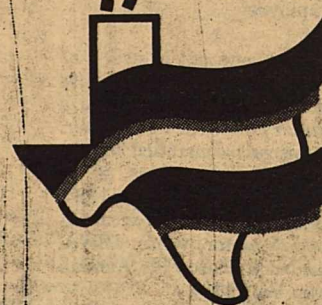

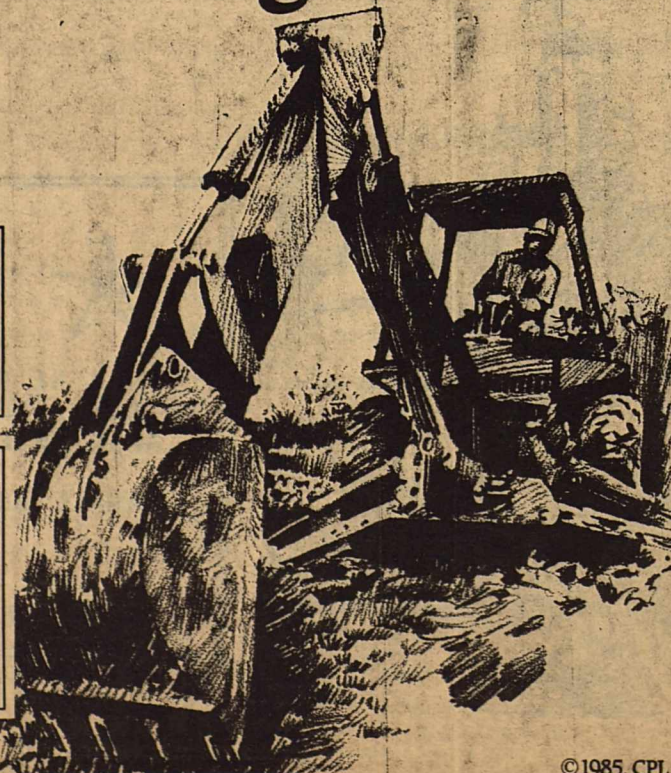
Take care before you dig: Power lines could be there

Before you start the project, call your Central Power and Light office for advice on where underground electrical facilities on or near your property may be located.

It's wise to show a lot of respect for power lines—both underground and overhead—anytime you're involved in work that could bring you near them.

A fallen power line, of course, creates an especially hazardous situation. If you see a line downed by a storm, accident or other mishap, call CPL immediately for professional help. Stay away from the wire and everything it touches—and keep others away, too.

GRAND MARSHALL OF FORT CLARK CAVALRY DAYS PARADE

APRIL 19, 1986 GEORGE B. WYRICK

George Wyrick was born June 11, 1911 in Gibsonville, North Carolina. In 1930 he joined the army and was immediately sent to Fort Clark where he found his niche in his life in the United States Cavalry. An all-around athlete, he was not only skilled in horsemanship but was tops in skating, boxing, motorcycle showmanship, swimming and drill squad events. His prowess with horses led him to Fort Riley, Kansas and a commission from the ranks.

While serving at Fort Clark George was a member of the famed "F" Troop 5th Cavalry "Mounted Monkey Squad" which was active from 1930 - 1939, performing in Rodeos and participating in the Texas Centennial Celebration in Dallas, Texas in 1936 where their skill and trick riding abilities were seen by untold thousands at daily performances in both open parade grounds and livestock arenas. They were in strong demand in many areas of the country.

After leaving Fort Clark in 1941 George spent three years in the South Pacific helping to clean out the Japanese

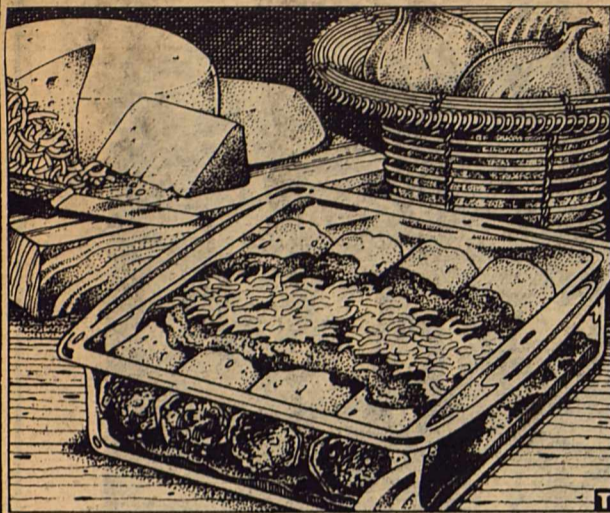
stronghold and their ultimate defeat. Upon returning from combat duty in the Pacific George was assigned duty in Fort Carson, Colorado where he continued to display his skills in horsemanship, winning numerous ribbons and trophies in jumping and other equestrian events..

In 1952 George retired from the military but still couldn't get the love of horses out of his system so he continued with owning and operating stables at the famous old resort, Broadmoore Hotel in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

While stationed at Fort Clark, George not only had an eye for horses, he also had a good eye for a beautiful young girl named Sybil Jones, resulting in marriage and a closer tie to Brackett and Fort Clark. Needless to say, upon retirement in 1958 George and Sybil moved back to Kinney County where his exploits continued, being named "MAN OF THE YEAR" by Brackettville Chamber of Commerce in 1979 and now our "GRAND MARSHALL OF FORT CLARK CAVALRY DAYS PARADE" in 1986. Who could better serve that capacity than our own George B. Wyrick ??

ITALIAN ENCHILADAS: EASY FAMILY FARE



No one wants to spend the precious days of summer locked away in the kitchen. Cooking seems more of a chore than a joy when your family is out-of-doors enjoying this sunny season without you.

In the summer, family meals should be quick and easy for the cook. Look for recipes which can be made, start to finish, in less than 60 minutes. This means that you can forego spending your summer weekends cooking large quantities of food to reheat for your family throughout the week.

Italian Enchiladas is an example of a 60-minute meal. Half its preparation time is spent in the oven, leaving you free to make other preparations. Toss a mixed green salad and heat tortillas to serve buttered and rolled instead of sliced bread or rolls.

This recipe will delight your family as well as meet your schedule. The Italian flavors in a Mexican tortilla are a fun and festive change from a standard enchilada. And Italian Enchiladas are high in protein, so you are feeding your family a hearty, filling meal.

So don't spend your summer inside, looking out at the long, beautiful days. Cook 60-minute meals such as Italian Enchiladas, and join your family in the great time is spent in the oven, outdoors.

ITALIAN ENCHILADAS (Makes 4 servings)

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/2 sliced (1/2 cup) medium onion
- 1/4 sliced (1/4 cup) medium green pepper
- 1 crushed garlic clove
- 2 cups (two 8-ounce cans) Contadina pizza sauce
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 cup (4 ounces) shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1 cup (4 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese
- Four 8-inch flour tortillas

Brown ground beef with onion, green pepper, and garlic in large skillet. Drain off excess fat. Stir in 1 can Contadina pizza sauce and Parmesan cheese. Boil gently, uncovered, 5 minutes. Pour 1/3 of remaining pizza sauce in bottom of 8x8x2-inch square baking dish; reserve remaining sauce. Spoon equal amount of meat mixture in center of each tortilla. Reserve 1/4 cup each mozzarella and Cheddar cheese. Divide remaining cheeses equally among tortillas. Roll up; place seam side down in dish. Pour remaining sauce over enchiladas. Sprinkle reserved cheeses over top. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 minutes.

Nutrition And You

Vitamin C: What We Need

One of the best-known legends in nutrition is how citrus fruits saved sailors from scurvy. It was a clear demonstration that certain diseases could be prevented or cured with adequate intake of essential nutrients. But while scurvy is the major disease identified with the deficiency of Vitamin C, it is the final event in a series of reactions to a lack of this important vitamin.

Scurvy has virtually disappeared from the American population, but it is being proved that other diseases and conditions can be helped in some instances by Vitamin C.



The government has determined that 60 mg. of Vitamin C is sufficient to maintain satisfactory health in average individuals.

But one researcher, Dr. James Scala, a noted authority on nutrition and vice president for Science Technology at Shaklee Corporation, questions whether the guidelines take important factors into consideration. For example, the Vitamin C requirement may be higher for women who take birth control pills, and for people who drink or smoke heavily. (Recent studies with human subjects show that smokers require 40% more Vitamin C to reach the same plasma level as non-smokers).

Needs can vary over a period of time. Both physical and emotional stress may create a demand for more Vitamin C, as does even minor illness.

People who work where temperatures exceed 100°F. need more Vitamin C than those working in a temperate zone. Interesting research is being done on the effect of environmental pollutants on Vitamin C requirements, and on the ability of Vitamin C to block the conversion of nitrates and nitrites in foods into carcinogenic substances.

A simple Tex Mex Dip for assorted fresh vegetables and crackers combines Blue cheese and avocados. Puree two medium-sized ripe, peeled, seeded avocados, 2 tablespoons chopped onion and 1 1/2 teaspoons of fresh lemon juice until smooth in a blender or food processor. Blend in 1 1/2 cups dairy sour cream, 1/4 cup crumbled Blue cheese and a little salt and pepper. Chill this dip an hour or two to allow the flavors to blend.

We have completed our investigation of the burglary of the Gonzales Store, which occurred April 1st, and have recovered almost all of the property that was taken during that crime. The suspects arrested remain in custody at the time of this writing. Celestino Martinez 26, of Brackettville, was arrested along with a 16 year old juvenile, also from Brackettville, the night of Saturday, April 5th in Del Rio. The older man was indicted by the Kinney County Grand Jury on Monday, April 7th, and his bond set at \$5,000.00. The juvenile was turned over to Texas Youth Council authorities and remains in their custody at the time of this writing.

We were fortunate that leads obtained early in the investigation led to a quick arrest of the suspects thus allowing us to be able to recover most of the stolen property. Although some of the stolen items were recovered in Brackettville, the bulk of the property was located and recovered in Del Rio. A trial date for the adult offender has not been set yet, but we anticipate it will be soon.

A fight at the high school last week left one youth suffering from injuries to one of his eyes and led to the arrest of Marcos Martinez, 18, of Brackettville, on charges of Assault. Due to the fact that bodily injuries occurred the case is a Class A Misdemeanor and will be tried in County Court at a later date. Martinez was released on a \$500.00 PR bond set by County Judge Bill Thurber who was acting as a magistrate.

We investigated a case of Criminal Mischief that occurred at the Burger & Shake on the night of Thursday, April 11th. The owner Val Finch, called in Friday morning to report that someone had thrown a rock through a window on the north side of the building. Evidence at the scene indicates that the offender attempted to gain entrance to the building through the broken window, but failed because of extra security precautions taken by Mr. Finch. There are no known

suspects at the time of this writing.

We attended the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet Saturday night, April 12th, and were pleased that the Citizen of the Year and Student of the Year Awards were received by Sterling "Smiley" Goodloe and Alta Gracia "Grace" Hernandez respectively. I cannot think of anyone who deserved the recognition and awards more than they. Both are outstanding individuals of our county and community.

Congressman Albert Bustamante was guest speaker at the banquet and spoke on a subject that should deeply concern all Americans and especially those of us who live along the Texas-Mexico border. The subject of his talk concerned the unstable conditions of not only Mexico, but Central America and the tremendous increase in the number of illegal aliens from those countries pouring into the U.S. and Texas. The outlook for the future is not good and no one seems to know what to do to control the "invasion". At first glance one might think that we could control this situation by placing military patrols along the border, and this would be one alternative, but how much force could they use to prevent the influx of illegal aliens. Incidents would occur that could and probably would make the situation more volatile than it is now. Everyone now recognizes the fact that we cannot continue to absorb the hundreds of thousands of illegal aliens from these countries and the increased felony crime rate directly linked to these people without serious problems being caused to our own economy. Something has to be done and soon. High ranking officials of the Immigration and Naturalization Service have admitted for several years that they can no longer control the border between Mexico and the U. S.. Increased manpower and highly increased operational costs have most certainly resulted in higher numbers of apprehensions, all to no avail. The illegal aliens continue pouring in. What is the answer. I certainly don't know, Congressman Albert Bustamante admits he doesn't know and that other members of Congress and high ranking

government officials don't have an answer. But folks, if you value the American way of life as we know it now, you better put pressure on our government representatives to find an answer, and soon, because we are literally being invaded by the thousands every day. Think about it!!

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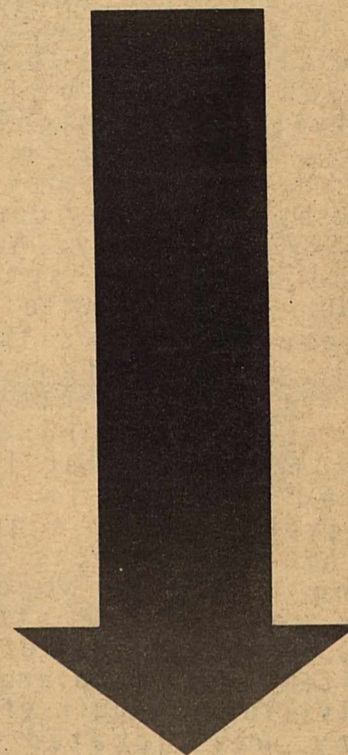
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
