STUDENT HONOR

John B. Benacci of Brackettville is among the state's brightest high school juniors who are getting a glimpse this summer of the best that Texas A & M University has to offer high-achieving students.

Benacci and other high schoolers, who are prospective academic scholarship candidates, visited the campus for a series of two-day visits to acquaint them with facilities such as the Cyclotron Institute and Sterling C. Evans Library and to meet the deans of the academic colleges and other university officials.

"We wanted to give them incentive to use their talents to the fullest if they chose to come here," said Larry Cress, director of Texas A & M's Honors Program.

The project, conducted for the first time this summer, is an effort by university officials to get the word out to Texas' scholastic super stars that Texas A & M offers significant opportunities through its academic scholarship and honors programs.

The high schoolers, whom university officials hope to recruit next year for enrollment in the fall of 1987, are potential National Merit scholars, earmarked by high scores on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test taken during the junior year of high school.

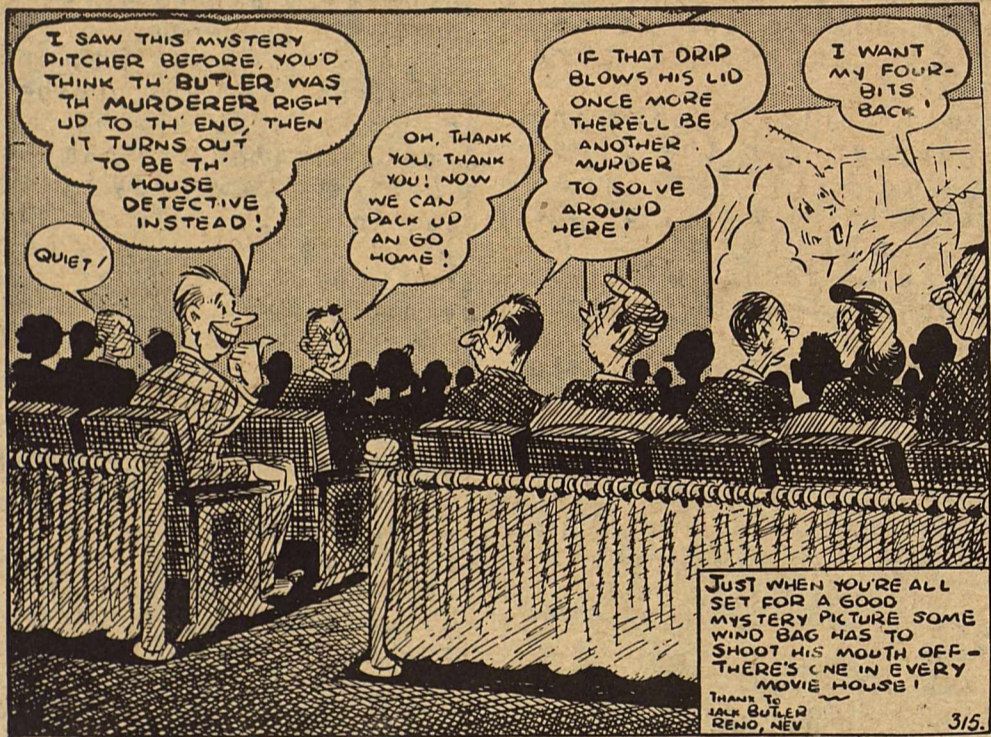

SHERIFF'S CORNER**NORMAN HOOTEN****SHERIFF**

The investigation into the case of Aggravated Sexual Abuse (Rape) of a 28 year old Campwood woman continued all last week with several possible suspects being brought in and questioned in Brackettville, Del Rio, Campwood and Uvalde. At least three cars fitting the description of the suspect vehicle have been checked out and dismissed after clearby investigators.

All possible leads have been checked and double checked and a photo lineup of two possible suspects from Del Rio was presented to the victim with negative results. So far, no new leads have been developed in the case but the investigation continues.

As stated before, the incident occurred in Uvalde County on Highway 334 approx. 8 miles from the Kinney County line. I was called in to assist the investigation by Texas Ranger Joaquin Jackson and Uvalde County Sheriff Kenneth Kelley. The investigative team now includes Chief Deputy Sheriff of Uvalde County, L.B. Gamble and Deputy Beau Watkins with assistance from experts of various law enforcement agencies. As all available leads have been thoroughly investigated with few results we must now settle down into reviewing known facts of the case and reevaluate all the information we have and hope that a break will come in the case. A violent crime such as this should not be allowed to go unpunished. We are calling on the public as well as other law enforcement agencies to assist us by contacting any of the officers involved in the

investigation should any reasonable suspicion or other information related to the case become available. Composite drawings of the suspects have been done by a police artist and these drawings have been posted in the county jail and the courthouse. Anyone who has reason to believe that he or she knows the whereabouts of anyone fitting the description

of either of the two men is asked to contact me as soon as possible. We will check out all leads of this sort. An added incentive for assistance is to consider how you would feel if the victim was your mother, wife, or daughter and consider the fact that unless these men are located, arrested, tried, convicted, and punished by losing their freedom, your mother, wife, or daughter could very well be their next victim.

R.J. Reid of Ft. Clark Springs was returned to the Texas Department of Corrections (TDC) in Huntsville by me on Friday, August 1st. Reid, who was on parole from TDC for a prior felony conviction, was arrested in July and charged with Assault after a complaint was received from his wife. The Board of Pardons and Paroles immediately started proceedings to revoke his parole and an agreement was worked out whereby prosecution on the Assault charges was declined after Reid signed a waiver and agreed to voluntarily be returned to TDC to serve the time remaining on his prior conviction. It is anticipated that he will remain in TDC for only 90 days or so.

A vandalism case in Ft. Clark was investigated over

the weekend of August 2nd & 3rd after a report was received from a resident that a group of young men had broken a statue on his front yard. Further investigation and questioning of two teenage male suspects by this officer on Monday led to a confession of guilt by one of the suspects. The owner of the damaged property agreed to decline prosecution if the vandals would reimburse him for damages to the statue in the amount of \$20.00.

We have several other cases under investigation at this time including one of livestock theft that will be time consuming at technical due to the long period of time that the thefts have been taking place and fact that several victims are involved. We do have two suspects in the case at this time and believe that our investigation will eventually lead to the arrests and hopefully convictions of those involved. We have asked

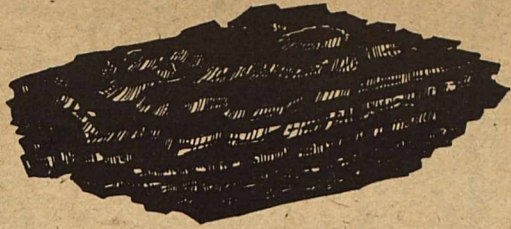
