
Tate, son of Jim and Kay Bannowsky, is a member of the Kimble County 4-H.



Business picked up considerably over the week-end of March 7th and 8th with several criminal incidents keeping local law enforcement officers busy responding to call for assistance and conducting criminal investigations.

The Ken Phillips residence south of Brackettville was broken into by three illegal aliens Sunday afternoon, March 8th. Entry to the home was gained by breaking a window on the west side of the house. The burglars had prowled around outside and through a storage shed taking tools and other items before entering the house. They were attempting to break into a gun cabinet with an axe when they were surprised inside the house by a visitor to the Phillips residence. Luckily they fled the scene leaving the visitor unharmed.

Two of the suspects were apprehended later by Deputy Sheriff David Luna near the Seminole Cemetery on Las Moras Road west of the Phillips property. The 3rd suspect was trailed southward away from the house by our man-trailing Bloodhound "Dandy" who was brought to the scene by his handler, Uvalde Police Patrolman Carl Kuempel. We were assisted by members of the local U.S. Border Patrol, a Del Rio Highway Patrolman, and our local Game Warden.

The search was called off late Sunday evening because of the time element and the fact that we were running out of daylight. Residents in Spofford and the surrounding area ranchers were notified to be on the lookout for the suspect who remains at large at the time of this writing. It is not anticipated that he will be apprehended.

Shortly after returning to town we received a disturbance call from the Juan "Bear" Sandoval residence reporting that someone had been shot. Upon our arrival at the scene it was determined that though a shot had been fired in the

general direction of the group of men in the yard no one had been hit. The shooter was identified by witnesses and arrested a short time later at his home. Walter Wade Salmon, 35, of Brackettville was charged with making a Terroristic Threat, a Class B Misdemeanor. He

was disarmed by Deputy Luna and myself and transported to the county jail. He was then transported to the Val Verde Hospital Emergency Room for treatment of injuries he had received earlier in the day from Juan "Bear" Sandoval and Gilbert Martinez, both of Brackettville. Sandoval and Martinez were arrested Monday and charged with Assault Causing Bodily Injury. Salmon was released Monday morning on bond and Sandoval and Martinez were released after paying fines assessed by Justice of the Peace Alvin Hall. Salmon will be tried later in County Court.

Cecil Raymond Ferguson, Jr., 35, of Germantown, Tennessee was arrested and jailed in the early morning hours of Monday, March 9th by local Highway Patrol Troopers on charges of Possession of a Controlled Substance (Cocaine). Ferguson also had in his possession items necessary for a meth lab (methamphetamine of "speed"). He remains in jail at the time of this writing in lieu of \$25,000.00 bond set by Justice of the Peace Alvin Hall. Ironically Ferguson is currently on parole from TDC from a prior drug conviction for which he was sentenced to 15 years. He had served only 2 1/2 years of that sentence before being paroled in

The new immigration law is confusing to both U.S. officials, citizens and residents of Mexico as well. And it is at least partially responsible for the marked decrease in the smuggling of illegal aliens from Mexico over the past few months. No one really knows just exactly what is going to happen or how it will be applied. The decrease in smuggling cases has affected the income in prisoner care fees at the county jail which, of course, has both me and the Commissioners Court concerned.

I have always been eager to report the income we have received at the county jail over the past 5 years since I implemented the federal prisoner program. I find myself not quite so eager to report the drastic decrease in these funds caused by the lack of cases being prosecuted in federal court but I feel you need to be aware of the bitter along with the sweet.

Total prisoner care fees generated by the Sheriff's Department through the County Jail since October 1, 1986 through February 28, 1987 amounts to \$46,620.00. The funds generated from this program have shown a marked decrease over the past few months with \$14,532.00 being

collected for October 1986 and only \$2,072.00 being collected for February 1987. For the same time period of a year ago a total of \$76,580.00 had been collected. But consider this, the total funds generated for the county for FY 82-83 through February of FY 86-87 by prisoner care fees through the county jail total to \$729,839.00. almost 3/4 of a million dollars. These funds have greatly assisted the county in getting out of debt and have even helped provide a cash surplus at the end of the last two fiscal years.

have talked representatives of the U.S. Bureau of Prisons and the U.S. Marshal's Service and they seem to think that things will get back to normal within the next couple of months or Even at that we will be considerably behind our projected income from prisoner care fees for 1986-87. I met Commissioners Court Monday, March 9th and explained the situation to them and tried to impress on them





"CHOOSING SHRUBS"

When it comes to choosing shrubs and trees it is important to choose the right size, otherwise you are going to spend endless time pruning to keep the size down. Evergreen shrubs hold their leaves throughout the winter and never have bare One of the pleasant branches. things about shrubs is that they live on in the garden, giving very little trouble and needing very little care. All you have to do is plant them, see that they are thriving, and prune some of them from time to time.

If the garden is just planted in flowers, and no shrubs, your first year of gardening would probably be your last, for a garden with just flowers requires lots of time and energy to maintain. Choose your shrubs with a balance between desiduous and evergreen placing the evergreen where you want year round screening or privacy or a background to a more showy plant. Make sure the soil conditions are right for each plant.

Shrubs bought from the nursery usually have either burlap wrap around the roots and soil, called a balled plant, or in a container. It is important not to disturb roots and to get the balled plant into the ground as soon as possible. Keep your shrubs well watered, making sure that the water thoroughly soaks in and is not just a light sprinkle on the top of the soil. Also fertilize once a year with a good organic fertilizer. Generally speaking, shrubs do not get pests or disease, but they do. Use a good spray.

There are many types of shrubs, so visit your nursery for foliage, flowering or berry bearing shrubs.





TMA HEALTH TIPS

EARLY DETECTION HELPS PREVENT HEARING LOSS

Do you often ask, "Can you speak louder?" or "Will you repeat that?" If so, you may be missing out on a portion of life, due to hearing loss. Many people tend to ignore or are unaware of gradual hearing loss.

The Texas Medical Association notes that more than 15 million Americans suffer some form of hearing loss. But it often goes undiagnosed because an estimated 75 percent of the hearing-impaired population never has seen a doctor about these problems. As a result, these people may be wrongly labeled dumb, senile, or anti-social.

Hearing loss is one of the most widespread chronic health problems in the United States. It affects young and old alike, but is most common among the elderly. Hearing loss can result from the aging process, certain drugs, and spending too much time around loud noises like chainsaws, jackhammers, and loud music.

Sounds are made up of vibrations that enter the outer ear canal and beat against the eardrum. The eardrum's motion produces vibrations in the three middle-ear bones. These vibrations move through the middle ear to the inner ear, where fluid carries them to the cochlear nerves.

When stimulated by these fluid vibrations, the cochlear nerves generate electrical impulses that the auditory nerve transmits to the brain for interpretation into sound and meaning. Problems along this chain can result in hearing loss.

People with a hearing loss commonly will accuse those around

Anyone with these symptoms should seek medical attention immediately. Early detection and treatment increase the chances of preventing total hearing loss. Fortunately, most hearing impairments can be improved through surgery, hearing aids, or other listening devices. them of mumbling. They may listen to television louder than usual. In conversations, they frequently ask friends to repeat themselves or speak up. Or they may withdraw socially to avoid the embarrassment



ZAFFIRINI FILES BILLS

AUSTIN -- Adults convicted of selling drugs to minors would face mandatory prison sentences without qualifying for probation or for early release, if two bills filed by Sen. Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo) Tuesday pass the legislature.

"We must ensure that criminals who sell drugs to children go to jail and stay in jail," Zaffirini said. "There is nothing more obnoxious than an adult who preys on our children, ruining their future and our hopes for a better world."

Senate Bill 628 by Zaffirini would prohibit juries from granting probation to an adult convicted of selling drugs to minors. Senate bill 629 by Zaffirini would forbid good time credit for adults

convicted of the crime and would place the offense in the same category as capital murder, aggravated kidnapping, aggravated sexual assault and other heinous crimes for sentencing purposes. This category prescribes the stiffest sentence—save for execution—allowable be law.


"Teachers, parents and even students have expressed their disgust with the many lenient sentences handed down in cases involving the sale of drugs to minors," Zaffirini said.

"These two bills reflect my tough stance on drug abuse and often indicate most minors who use drugs get them from other minors, somewhere early in this illegal distribution system, those drugs were obtained from an adult.

"If we can ensure that those adults go to jail and stay there, we can decrease, and in some cases prevent, drug use among children by cutting off their supply source."

Zaffirini said the Texas Legislature is addressing the related problem of overcrowded prisons, and that legislators are committed to ensuring that perpetrators of heinous crimes do not qualify for early release programs.

SB 628 and SB 629 have been referred to the Senate Committee on Criminal Justice.





Will Rogers was born in 1879 in Oologah, Oklahoma in what was then Oklahoma Territory. Rogers was one quarter Cherokee. His early years were spent on his parents ranch where he worked as a ranch hand.


His mother wanted him to be a minister, but he always wanted to be an actor. His father on the other hand, wanted him to be a lawyer because it was a profession that paid more money.

Most of Wills early life was spent riding the range and always he was handling a rope in some way.

He had a hard time staying in school, he wanted to be on the prairie and in the hills. He finally stayed in school long enough to complete the fifth grade, then he was off to the outdoors, either working on the home ranch or some other ranch.

He soon joined a Wild West Show where he was so skillful at roping. There he was known as the Cherokee Kid.

In 1905 Rogers appeared on the vaudeville stage in New York and became a star on the Zeigfeld Follies. From there he went in radio and show business. Later he became a newspaper reporter and writer. And in 1928, Reinhold Neibeiht, the great theologian in his sermon as a faculty member of the Union Theological Seminary in



New York said, "Will Rogers speaks greater truth than more pretentious prophets dare to utter".

Rogers was the first to recognize the danger of the Communist revolution in Russia, because he didn't believe a system could stand the denial of Gods existence.

His humor was known all over the world. He was considered Americas "Ambassador of Good Will". Rogers was actively supported as the 1932 Democratic nominee at the National Convention.

He was a great friend of the artist Charles Russel, Charles Lindberg, and Billy Mitchell, among others. Will was the only humorist

whose statue stands in the hall of the rotunda in Washington.

He starred in seventy movies and was a success at the box office without the benefit of scenes of sex or violence. He was the voice for the Disney Corp. for its EPCOT exhibit in Florida.

He wrote six books, and many feature articles in magazines and newspapers, and was the most widely read columnist of his day and a popular after dinner speaker.

Will once said " you couldn't do anything about legislators except stand and watch 'em like animals in a zoo".


He also said "Streets that used to be lighted up at nights, and thousands of people are now used for robbing purposes only".

But my favorite quote Rogers said was, "Something ought to be done about "Primitive" people who live in various parts of the world and don't know a thing but to live off what nature provides. You would think they would get civilized and learn to live off each other like us civilized folks do."

On August 15, 1935 at 8:18 p.m., Will Rogers and Wiley Post crashed their plane in Alaska near Point Barrow, killing both.

Post had flown two flights around the world, was rated as one of the greatest pilots that ever lived. An airlock in the gasoline fuel line or freezing of the carburetor was supposed to be the cause of the wreck. They were buried at the same time, Rogers in California and Post in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, his home town.

In a speech made in Boston in 1930, Rogers said he wanted the following epitaph on his grave. "I joked about every prominent man of my time, but I never met a man I didn't like".





Everyone is Irish on St. Patrick's Day! There are parades in the Nation's largest cities—the biggest, most famous one in New York. Wherever you stand along the parade route, you're likely to catch a whiff of corned beef and cabbage—the traditional offering of the city's famous Irish pubs.

Why not celebrate with a Blarney feast around your own table on March 17? Add a round loaf of Irish soda bread. Be sure to pass zippy horseradish sauce and end the meal on a heavenly note with goblets of Irish coffee.

1 corned beef, 4-5 lbs.
1 lg. clove garlic slivered
1 lg. onion
6-8 med. round red potatoes
6-8 med. carrots peeled
6-8 med. white onions
1 med. green cabbage cut into 6-8 wedges
minced parsley (optional)

Rinse corned beef under cold running water; pat dry with paper towel. With knife cut small slits in beef inserting garlic sliver in each as you go. In large kettle, place corned beef; add large onion cover with water and bring to boil over high heat. Skim solid that rises to top; reduce heat. Cover and simmer about 3 hours, or until meat is almost tender when pierced with fork. Remove and discard large onion. Add potatoes, carrots, and white onions. Increase heat to medium; cover and cook 15 mins. Remove corned beef to large platter or cutting board; cover with foil; keep warm. Add cabbage to kettle of vegetables, cover and cook 10 to 15 mins. or until cabbage is crisp and tender and potatoes, carrots, and onions are tender. With slotted spoon, remove vegetables and arrange around corned beef. If desired, sprinkle with parsley. Slice corned beef in thin slices across grain.

**Horseradish sauce 8 oz. sour cream 1/3 C. white horseradish

combine and serve along side corned beef.

3 C. unbleached flour
3 T. sugar
1 T. baking powder
1 t. baking soda
1/2 t. salt
1/3 C. margarine softened

** Irish Soda Bread

1 1/2 C. buttermilk

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Lightly grease large cookie sheet, set aside. In large bowl, sift flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. With pastry blender or fork, cut in butter until mixutre is crumbly. Add buttermilk all at once. With fork mix lightly until thoroughly moistened. Turn dough on to floured surface; knead 1 minute. Shape into ball. Place on prepared cookie sheet; flatten to 9-inch round about 1 1/2 inches thick. Score center top of dough with floured knife, about 1/8 inch deep; repeat at right angle to divide loaf in quarters. Bake 45 mins. or until loaf sounds hollow when tapped with fingertips. | Serve warm with sweet butter.

6 t. light brown sugar
1/2 C. Irish whiskey
4 C. hot strong black coffee
1/4 C. heavy cream, whipped

Into four 6 or 8 oz. Irish Coffee goblets or mugs, place 1 1/2 t. brown sugar and 2 T. whiskey. Stir in just enough hot coffee to dissolve sugar, then fill each goblet with hot coffee to 1/2 inch of rim. Top with dollop of whipped cream. Do not stir. Serve at once.
