

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



### CITY ORDINANCE #242

State of Texas County of Kinney City of Brackettville

#### Ordinance # 242

AUTHORIZING THE MUNICIPAL COURT TO COLLECT SPECIAL EXPENSES FOR SERVICES PERFORMED AND RAISING THE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF SPECIFIC ORDINANCES FROM \$1,000.00 TO \$2,000.00 AND ALL OTHER VIOLATIONS OF ORDINANCES TO \$500.00

whereas, the Governing Body of each incorporated City may by ordinance authorize the Municipal Court to collect a special expense for services performed, and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 920 as passed by the 70th Legislature Regular Session - 1987 and signed by the Governor states that the City Council shall have the power to pass, publish, amend or repeal all ordinances, rules, police regulations that govern fire safety, zoning, public health and sanitation, and no fine or penalty may exceed \$500.00 for all other violations and that the Cities may amend the penalty clause of such ordinances; Therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS THAT:

- I. The Governing Body authorizes the municipal court to collect a special expense not to exceed \$10.00 for services performed in cases in which the laws of the State require that the case be dismissed because of actions by or on behalf of the defendant. ie Defensive Driving Course to dismiss ticket: Failure to display drivers license; insurance ect.
- II. The Governing Body authorizes the Municipal Court to collect a special expense of \$25.00 for the issuance and service of a warrant of arrest and requisites of a personal bond with all special expenses to be paid into the City Treasury for the use and benefit of the City.
- III. That the Penalty clause of all City Ordinances for violations of all such rules, ordinances and police regulations that govern fire safety, zoning, public health and sanitation including dumping of refuse "...shall be fined in an amount of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$1,000.00".
- IV. That the Penalty Clause of all City Ordinances for violations of all such rules, ordinances and police regulations that do not govern fire safety, zoning, public health and sanitation shall read "...shall be fined in an amount of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$500.00...".
- V. Effective Date September 1, 1987.
- VI. PASSED and APPROVED this 11th day of August, 1987.

### NO SALES TAX ON SENIOR CITIZENS MEALS

AUSTIN, Tex.--State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said sales tax is no longer charged on meals served to residents of Texas retirement centers.

"The Legislature has recognized that Texas senior citizens in retirement centers are due a financial break," Bullock said.

Bullock said he expects little lost tax revenue from the new exemption on these meals.

"Guests eating at retirement centers will be required to pay sales tax on food served just like in a restaurant," Bullock said.

Texas has always exempted food served in nursing homes from the sales tax and the recent change in the law extends this exemption to qualified retirement centers.

"We're talking about giving a little tax break to senior citizens who have chosen to stay in Texas," Bullock said.

This tax exemption is effective immediately.

According to Manuel Flores, a horticulturist from San Antonio, the middle of August is the time to give roses a "pre-fall treatment". of a consists application of a rose fertilizer and a light pruning. They should not be pruned as drastically as in early spring but should be shaped up and corrected for any abnormal growth. You should remove all the leaves that have black spots, yellowing leaves, or brown leaves. These diseased leaves should be removed from the garden and destroyed.

The most important thing to remember about roses this time of the year is consistent watering. Roses should be watered regularly and allowed to dry out somewhat between waterings, keeping the soil moist, and do not allow the roots to sit too long in water. roses in the morning as opposed to evening so that there is no water on the leaves as evening comes. Watering in the evening promotes fungus and powdery mildew growth. A good type of fertilizer is a systemic Rose fertilizer that contains an insecticide.

Remember, fall gardens do very well here. It is time to put in tomatoe transplants. (seeds should have been planted the first week in July.) Also, squash, corn, shard, peppers, beets, black berries, and the broccoli and cauliflower seeds can be planted now.

Be thinking about bulbs and wildflowers planning for the next few weeks as September and October are the months we plant many of our Spring bloomers.

# SCHOOL BOARD TRUSTEES ADOPT 1987-88 BUDGET

The school trustees voted to accept administrative recommendations and adopted a budget of \$2,314,495 for 1987-88. The superintendent told the Board that he had not yet received the estimate of state funds for the coming year, but he was sure that these estimates would be available in time to set a tax rate at the August 25, 1987 called meeting.

Mr. McCall informed the Board that Brackett Independent School District could adopt a tax rate of or holding a hearing. He noted that a .901954 tax rate would be necessary to match the tax levy of 1986-87. This increase in the effective tax rate was brought about due to a loss of more than 8% of the taxable property values in 1986-87, and also the large number of county residents whose taxes are frozen due to their age (over 65).

Mr. McCall then told the Board that he hoped that the tax rate could be held considerably below those amounts. "People are in economic trouble all over the state, as well as in Kinney County, and I personally would hate to see a large property tax increase at this time." McCall stated.

However, the future for education funding does look gloomy. Mr. McCall pointed out that the state mandates an almost 6% salary increase for teachers each year, and has cut state funds to Brackett Independent School District in each of the last two years. Other state laws and State Board of Education rules also continue to increase the local district educational costs, and none is predicting any real growth in state money for public education for at least four years.

### MASKED BANDITS, RACCOONS OF TEXAS

A few years ago, I was a guest on a fishing trip. My host and I fileted about 30 panfish, and since his refrigerator was full and the night was chilly, he stored them to cool on his screened porch. The next morning, all that remained of the fish filets was an overturned platter. There was a new hole in the screen. I thought my host would be furious. Instead, he just laughed and said, "Those durn coons, I should have known better than to trust them with fish left out like that."

Few members of the animal kingdom are as well known, and enjoy the charitable good will of humans, as does the Raccoon, Procyon lotor. His "masked bandit" black facial configuration, lumbering, pigeontoed gait, and the ease with which he can be trained, tend to make him one of the more lovable and acceptable members of the animal kingdom found in Texas.

The raccoon is found throughout the lower provinces of Canada, all of the United States, and all of Mexico. Several races of palecolored, dwarf raccoons are found on the Florida keys.

"Coons," are grayish in color, with the famous black mask across the eyes and cheeks, and with five to eight black bands on the tail. They have long, buff colored guardhairs, tipped in black, and a creamy white underfur. Their fur is prized for coats, and the raccoon is hunted both for pelt and for sport.

A fully developed adult raccoon living in an area of ideal conditions, and with an abundance of food, can weigh as much as a medium sized dog, as much as 45 pounds, although less than 30 pounds is a more normal maximum male weight.

Most sightings of raccoons are made from dusk to dawn, since they usually forage for food during hours of darkness. For this reason, they are rarely spotted during daylight hours.

The den is usually a hollow log or hollow tree, when trees are abundant, and in rocky clefts and crevices in treeless areas.

They are expert climbers. They use their non-webbed, elongated, spindly toes with great dexterity when climbing and when examining objects. In captivity, when water is available, they have an unexplained habit of "washing" their food, even if they have just caught the item in that same water. In the wild, however, they seldom wash their food, usually swallowing their food with no particular preparation.


Raccoons are usually found living near water, since they eat many foods growing in or near water. They are omnivorous, and consume crawfish, fish, and snakes, as well as fruits such as grapes and persimmons, and they eat acorns, nuts and corn. They will also eat birds, insects, and larval adult wasps. They scavenge in rubbish and garbage pails, and many homeowners, investigating strange noises in the night, have surprised a family of raccoons gobbling up pet food left overnight.

Although raccoons do not reach adulthood until their second year, female raccoons are sexually mature at 9 to 10 months, and in their southern range, more than half conceive during their first year. Males reach sexual maturity after their second year.

The breeding season begins in February, with the young being born in April or May. A litter of from one to seven are born after a

### BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS



Nearly everyone has a tale or two to tell about the Pecos River and

there is always someone to listen. Southwest of McCamey, Texas is a location called the old Spanish Dam. there is some truth in the Dam because records show that Pecos County issued a permit to Bernardo, Cessario and Juan Torres and Felix Garcia to build a dam to boost irrigation and navigation along the river. The permit was issued in 1875 and they really did irrigate land along the Pecos River, also it is believed they sold their crop to the Army, who were stationed at Camp Melvin, thirty miles to the southeast and at Fort Stockton.

Now days, the remains of the dam is only some boulders in the stream bed. The larger ones have remained in place for one-hundred years. A ways from the dam some irrigation ditches can still be seen. The stones were quarried from nearby Mount Honofre'. There is a theory the Spanish built the dam but most people think the Torres Brothers were the builders. The marks of the blasting and drill bit are still visible.

But McComey old timers still prefer another theory. According to history records, Captain Juan Dominques de Mendosa and his expedition met with some Jumanos Indians on Mount Honofre' and planned several missions in the area. Whether this was the actual site of the meeting may never be known. But the top of this mountain holds an old grave, probably an Indian.

There are legends that Mendosa and his Indian friends built the dam so they could raise vegetables in the arid plains. This place and others are only one of many legends about the remote places in West Texas.

No one knows why or what caused the pioneers to come west, but most that came stayed and built up oasis' in the wilds, full of Indians, snakes, blue northerners. That's a storm that can come up quick and drop the temperature twenty or thirty degrees in a matter of moments. Or a sand storm can stop everything until it blows itself out.

Long before the white man came,

Indians inhabited this location and it is another mystery why they moved on.

There are legends remaining to be told, probably as many as Texas is big. I hope to tell many more, and everyone has a theory to which they are entitled.

# PREKINDER & KINDERGARTEN GUIDELINES

In its regular monthly meeting on Monday, August 10, 1987, the Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees reaffirmed a District Policy that allows entry into the Prekinder (four year old) and Kindergarten (five year old) programs, only if the child meets state guidelines.

For the Prekinder program a child must be four years old prior to September 1, 1987. The child must also be either disadvantaged (qualifies for free or reduced lunch), or have a deficiency in the English Language. The Prekinder program will be a half day program beginning at 12:30 p.m., parents must bring the child to school, and ending at 3:30 p.m. Qualified bus students may ride the bus home. Other prekinders must be picked up by parents. The prekindergarten curriculum will be concentrated on oral language skills.

The Kindergarten program qualifications are that the child live in the District, and be five years old prior to September 1, 1987. The kindergarten program is a full day program.

Superintendent Bob D. McCall stated that no parent is compelled to enroll their child in either program. However, he pointed out, once the child is enrolled, he/she is required to attend.

In further action, the Board established a tuition of \$3,600 per year for out-of-district transfer students. This fee is payable in two installments of \$1,800 at enrollment, and \$1,800 at the beginning of the second semester. Teachers who live outside the District will not be charged tuition.



gestation period of from 60 to 73 days, with an average of 63 days. They are small at birth, about 2.5 ounces, well furred, and with dark The eyes and ears are closed, with the eyes opening about the 18th day. The female cares of the young, with no help from the male.

After weaning, at about seven weeks, the young will follow the female around, seeking shelter in tangles of roots and vines, crevices, and under rocks. They begin following their parents around on hunting forays about a month later.

raccoon is The considered intelligent by many, although he is more ingenious and persistent than His manual dexterity enables him to perform feats which make him appear superior to other mammals in brain power.

Raccoons are often trained as pets. This is not a safe practice. As the raccoon reaches adulthood, insatiable curiosity and stubbornness make him destructive and untrustworthy. His temperament also changes, and pet raccoons are known to have caused serious biting and clawing injuries when formerly safe activities were repeated.

Although raccoons are sometimes said to hibernate, they do not. They do, in the colder parts of their range, hole up and sleep for long periods, living on stored body fat until about February. They do not display the physiological changes of hibernation; that of reduced temperature, reduced rate of respiration and heart-beat, and insensibility to pain, characterize true hibernation.


Raccoons are of the family Procyonidae (animals which come before dogs) which includes coatis, kinkajous, and pandas; the order Carnivorae (eaters of meat) and class Mammalia (mammal).

Although recent studies have indicated that the raccoon has been destroying nests of game birds and wild turkeys, this destruction has not been intense. He is, in many parts of Texas, considered a pest. Pest or not, this remarkable, adaptable creature, able to live in varied circumstances and habitats. seems destined to continue to prosper and to prevail in the face of urbanization and other modern adversity.



Effective August 1, 1987, Landfill user fees for Brackettville residents who have City Utility service accounts are as follows: 50c per month will be charged for all single family connections; \$1.00 per month for commercial accounts. Those who have both single family and commercial accounts, the fee will be \$1.50 per month.

These fees are now necessary due to the fact that until 1986 the City of Brackettville received Federal Revenue Sharing funds amounting to an average of \$13,500 each year. These funds were budgeted for the Landfill expenditures of \$16,000 to \$19,000 over the past 3 years.

Further, the Landfill Easement Agreement expired July 31 this year. For 10 years there has been no cost to the City for the use of the area designed as a landfill. And there has been no cost to the people of Kinney County for using this facility. The new agreement extends the use of this landfill area for 3 years, until August 1, 1990, and will cost the City of Brackettville a fee of \$2,400 a year for this extension.

County residents who are not City Utility Customers are asked to obtain a permit to use the Landfill. The fee for the permit: \$1.00 per month, \$12.00 for an annual permit.




