AFRICAN HUNTERS

Two big game hunters from Southwest Africa were special visitors at Happy Shahan's Alamo Village and Ft. Clark Springs last week. Heinz Nunemann (left) and Wolfgang Egerer (right) of Namibia spent 44 hours on airline flights coming to Brackettville to hunt at Dr. W.A. Belcher's Exotic Corazon Ranch under the guidance of Mike Simpson. The pair took a total of about 15 head of the Black Bucks, Corcin Rams, Red Stag deer, White Tail deer, Antelope and Wild Turkeys that roam the ranch. They heard about Dr. Belcher's ranch North of Brackettville from a Californian who was visiting and hunting with the pair in Southwest Africa.

"They have taken about every big game animal in the World, and hopefully they will be back next year with some friends," Simpson said. "They want to get a Buffalo.

Native born Germans who moved to Southwest Africa after WWII, Nunemann imports and exports curios and novelty items, and Egerer is a major construction contractor.

The pair were impressed with the size and variety of American cars, and the number of houses built of wood. It's illegal to build houses of the ever-scarce wood in Namibia, they said, so structures are made of blocks, metal and native brick.

INDIAN LIFE EXHIBIT TO BE HELD AT PLAZA DEL SOL

An exhibition on "Rock Art & Lifeways Along the Lower Pecos, Rio Grande, and Devils Rivers," depicting Indian Life in this area more than 8,000 years ago will be on display in Plaza Del Sol Mall in Del Rio beginning Saturday, November 21, for about three months. The exhibit will feature photographs by San Antonio photographer, Jim Zintgraff, during the past 25 years. Many of the photographs are of Indian pictographs located at Seminole Canyon, Rattlesnake Canyon, and the Bonfire Shelter near Hwy. 90.

The book, "Ancient Texans," written by Dr. Harry J. Shafer, Anthropologist, Texas A&M University, with

photographs by Jim Zintgraff will be displayed during the exhibition. Mr. Zintgraff will be present on the afternoon of Saturday, November 21.

This exhibition has been shown at San Antonio's Witte Museum for the past several months as part of the Lower Pecos River Research Project. Del Rio is the first city on an exhibition tour which will go to Sul Ross University in Alpine and to Houston early next year.

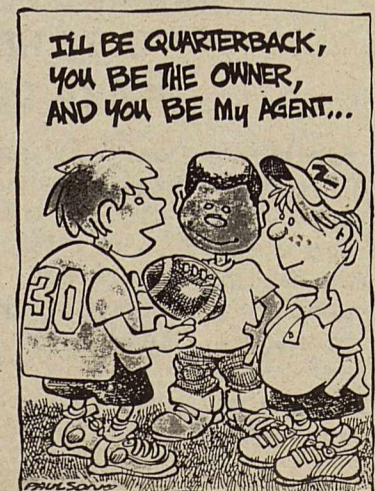

How wonderful it would be if every person, bureaucrat, politician, could remember that every other person is truly somebody and worth one-hundred cents on the dollar.


I have a sign on my desk that stares at me when I sit down at it. It says "You Ain't So Smart - Really". Every person should occasionally remind himself of this fact.




FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED that this dedication be placed in the minutes of the City of Brackettville and the same be presented to the family of Roland Williams.



(Makes one 9-inch pie)

- 1 (9-inch) unbaked pastry shell
- 3 eggs

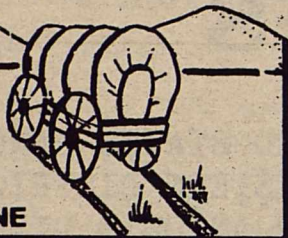

**TRACKS
ALONG THE
TRAIL**

In 1621 the Pilgrims invited their Indian friends to a great feast on Thanksgiving Day. In the Choctaw tribe the tradition is switched around and they invite their white friends to join them in a Thanksgiving celebration.

The meal consists of entirely Indian dishes, tanchi and takkon walakshi are only a few of the Choctaw dishes that are prepared.

There are also speech making, singing and games at the celebration. The meeting hall is where the celebration is held. The chairs are pushed against the wall to make way for the games and singing.

The Choctaws as one of the five civilized tribes have always been interested in tribal affairs and active in local and national government. In all their assemblies time is given for speaking.

Then comes the time for the telling of tall tales. The Choctaws are famous for their sense of humor and stories.

For example, at a formal tribal dinner which President Andrew Jackson attended in honor of Chief Pushmataha, the President asked the chief where he came from. The Chief solemnly rose to his feet and with great dignity replied with the information that he was born "full grown from a mighty oak at the stroke of a bolt of lightning".

One famous Choctaw humorist named

John Hayes tells the following story. With a twinkle in his eye and a great show of broken English he describes his stolen horse.

"I tell the Sheriff, sometime horse he got white, sometime he got black, sometime he got go right, sometime he got go left, and one eye him no got out."

The Choctaw have been Christians for a long time and hymns are always sung at Thanksgiving. The Choctaws are deeply religious, existing on a modest income, he knows and what it means to trust in a power higher than himself.

Then the feast begins of mostly traditional dishes.

The recipes for tanchi laboni and walakshi are given below.

Tanchi Laboni

Soak corn until hulls are loosened, beat until the hull slips away leaving the whole grain. Fan and toss in a basket to separate the hull from the grain. Cook in large kettle over an open fire with lots of water, salt, and pieces of fresh pork. Boil slowly for many hours until done. Tanchi laboni is a very nourishing food.

Walakshi

This dish is served only on special occasions. Peaches or wild grape may be used. In either case, only the juice of the fruit is needed. Dumplings are made of corn flour, dropped into the hot juice, and cooked until done. Some of the juice is absorbed into the dumpling. The rest is thickened.

According to ancient tribal custom, Walakshi was always furnished at weddings. The bridegrooms relatives always furnished the venison for the rest of the feast.

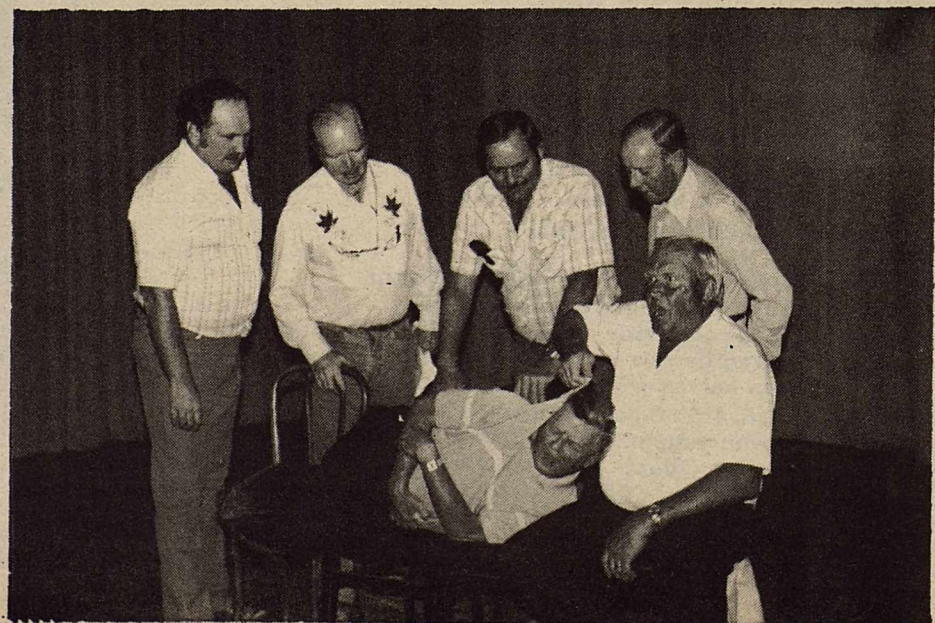

SHERIFF'S CORNER

Department of Public Safety

I recently received a summarized report on crime in Texas that covers the first six months of 1987. This report was compiled from data submitted to the Texas Department of Public Safety Uniform Crime Reporting Program by 804 Texas Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police, whose jurisdictions represent 99.9% of the states population. The information contained in this report might be of interest to some of you so I have passed it on in this weeks column.

The figures shown above indicate a decrease in crimes of violence since the same time period last year of 8.05%, but an increase in property crimes of approximately 7.7%. The next set of figures shown are estimated from combined urban and rural crime reports representing 99.9% of the state's population and show the total offenses committed and the percentage cleared statewide in each crime category.

As you can see from the crime statistics reported statewide we are way above the state average in percentages of cases solved in every category that applies. Of this record I am extremely proud.

The main reasons for this effective record are that we have Jailer/Dispatchers on duty 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to take calls from the public which gives us quick response time to emergency calls, I have a very able assistant in Chief Deputy David Luna who works closely with me on criminal investigations, and last but not least, we have a good working relationship with other law enforcement agencies both local and statewide.

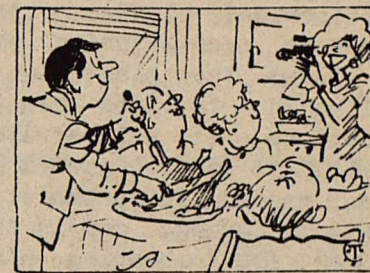

Holidays are always a good time to make history by starting a video family tree—that's when all the branches of the family are around.

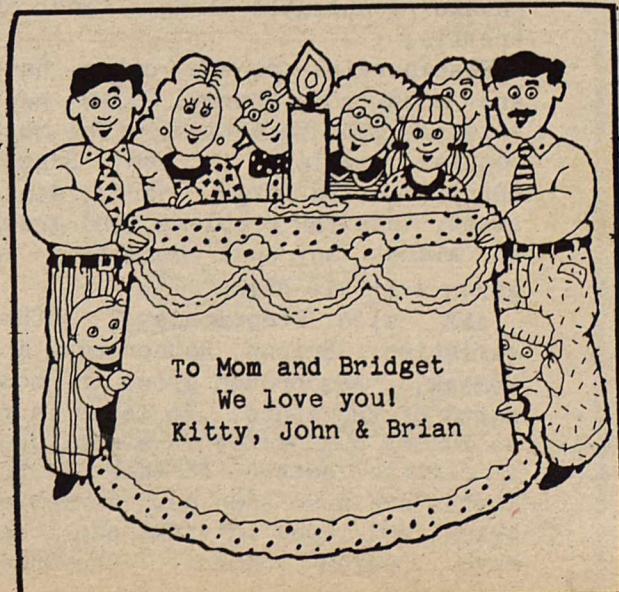


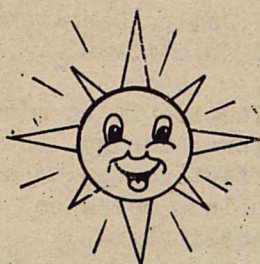
Holiday time is the perfect time to start a video family tree.

GREEN TIPS

BY KATHY BADER

Fall is for planting! If you have done any nursery shopping lately or you receive any nursery publications, you will have seen the advertising campaigns that are being done to promote fall plantings. And when you think about it, it makes much more sense. Planting in fall gives containerized plants a tremendous advantage over a spring planting. It allows the plant to become acclimated to its new living conditions, it allows slow root growth, it can be watered and fed when needed to promote healthy growth in Spring, and in the case of a fruit bearing plant it eliminates waiting a season to harvest the fruit. After all, these same plants will have to wait all winter at the nursery, the wholesalers, or the growers in those same containers.

Two very good examples of plants that benefit from a fall planting are the Blackberry and the Raspberry, and we have several good varieties of both that do well here. (I had red raspberries with breakfast this morning).

First the raspberries. There are two main varieties that are recommended for here. One is the Bababerry, the other is the Oregon 1030. Most other types of raspberries just cannot survive our Texas summers. But if you can keep a bush going by the second spring you should have plenty of new canes producing berries. Raspberries need lots of water, and should be mulched heavily. They should be fertilized regularly, and because they are trailing varieties, they should be planted along a fence or trellis.

Blackberries on the other hand are much more hardy. We have several good varieties. The most popular variety is the Brazos Berry. It is large, hardy, semi-sweet, has few problems, and grows in almost any soil condition if given a little help.

A&M also recommends 3 other varieties: Brison, Rosborough, and Womack. Rosborough grows in most parts of the state. It is as large as Brazos but sweeter. Womack does a little better further North. There are also some new varieties being developed in Arkansas that have Indian names: Cheyenne,

Comanche, Cherokee, and Shawnee. Many people are trying these and are finding them very productive especially the Shawnee.

Blackberries have few serious problems. The biggest problem is iron chlorosis, but everything here has the same problem. Adding sulfur to the soil yearly and chelated iron weekly when needed, usually takes care of the yellowing. Berries should be watered regularly, fertilized regularly, mulched, and trimmed. Insects are easy to control with a

regular program of removing decayed branches and leaves, and an application of Sevin or B+ when needed.

Because blackberries and raspberries produce fruit on the second years growth, planting containerized plants with the first years growth already on them eliminates the wait. By the second year, then, your plants are in full production.

So here is one example of how a fall planting gets you ahead in baking the first Blackberry pie!

PUBLIC NOTICE

PERMIT ON ANIMALS REQUIRED BY CITY

Ordinance #226

PROHIBITING ANIMALS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE IN THE CITY LIMITS; PROVIDING FOR ANNUAL VACCINATIONS; IMPOUNDING, EUTHANIZING, REDEMPTION AND SALE OF ANIMALS; PRESCRIBING A NUISANCE AND OTHER CONTROLS OF ANIMALS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS; PRESCRIBING A PENALTY OF A FINE OF NOT LESS THAN \$1.00 NOR MORE THAN \$1,000.00; AND REPEALING ALL PARTS OF ORDINANCE IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

The City of Brackettville is asking the Citizens of Brackettville (In City limits only) to comply with Ordinance #226. All sections of ordinance will be enforced. Section I, part G is stated as following; PERMIT: A permit shall mean the permission of this City to allow City residents to own and maintain domesticated and wild animals within the City limits. Permits are revocable on an individual basis for cause without further legal action if the owner violates provisions of this Ordinance or is convicted of willful cruelty to animals. Permissions will be revoked by letter to the owners address of record informing owner that the animal must be removed from the City limits within three (3) days following receipt of said letter.

Permits will be issued at City Hall and all owners of animals, wild and domesticated must obtain a permit for their animals before January 1, 1988. Before a citizen will be issued a permit thru City Hall, owner must provide vaccination slip showing animals have been vaccinated within year of permit. Permit will ask for owners name, address and phone number, type of animal, color and marking and breed of animal, vaccination tag number and vaccination date. Permit fee will be \$1.00 per animal permit (one animals per permit) CITY WILL START ISSUING ANIMAL PERMITS STARTING DECEMBER 1, 1987. A copy of Ordinance #226 is available at City Hall

THE 1987 HUNTING SEASON - ONE OF THE BEST

This hunting season is shaping up as one of the best in several years for hunters, especially for those who enjoy wingshooting gamebirds.

More than just an ample supply of birds is necessary to ensure meat for the frying pan, however, according to Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Good wingshooting skills coupled with the right gun and load are sure to help hunters improve their chances, Rollins said.

For the popular bobwhite quail, a 12 or 20-gauge shotgun with improved cylinder choke is a good selection under most shooting conditions.

If hunters are after blue

(scaled) quail, pheasant or prairie chicken, then a modified choke will be helpful for the longer ranges at which these birds are generally encountered, he said.

For turkey, a modified or full choke in 12 gauge is preferred, Rollins added.

The "best" shot load is always open for debate among hunters, but generally the smaller shot and denser patterns are preferred, he explained.

For quail, this means shot sizes of No. 7 1/2 or 8, he said. For pheasant and prairie chicken, No. 6 shot is a good all-around choice, but 4's or 7 1/2's work well in some instances.

Likewise, for turkey, a load of 6's gives the most dense shot pattern, but 4's and 2's are recommended for longer range shots, Rollins explained.

Many turkey hunters use No. 6 shot for their first round, then back that up with 4's or 2's, he said.

HERE'S TO YOUR HEALTH

HOW IS HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE TREATED?

Mild hypertension may be controlled with regular exercise and diet modification. It is necessary to monitor blood pressure regularly to determine whether progress is being made. The main goal for treatment is to lower the diastolic pressure to between 60-80 and maintain it there.

Drug therapy will be necessary if diet modification and exercise are not sufficient to control your high blood pressure. It is absolutely essential that you take your blood pressure medicine everyday the way it is prescribed. If you have questions about your medications ask your doctor, pharmacist or a nurse for help. The more you understand about your medicines, the better. If you experience difficulties with your medications, inform your doctor so that modifications can be made. One of the goals of therapy is to keep you feeling well.

Do not stop taking your medicine when your blood pressure comes down. It will only go up again. Treating high blood pressure is a lifelong responsibility.

Prevention

What if you do not yet have high blood pressure? Here are some steps you can take to keep your blood pressure normal--hopefully for life.

1) Do not overeat and become overweight. If you are overweight, follow a low salt, nutritionally complete diet that will meet your needs for energy, but not exceed them. Very few people who are overweight avoid becoming hypertensive.

2) Participate in some form of regular exercise. We all enjoy different activities. Swimming is one of the best overall activities for your body, and puts less stress on your joints than other sports might. Other forms of exercise can be aerobics, jogging, team sports, brisk 30 minute walks, stair climbing, and many others.

3) Do not add salt to your food. Season foods with lemon, onion, garlic and herbs.

4) Avoid eating foods made with lard. Vegetable oil with no cholesterol and low in saturated

fat is best for your health.

5) Avoid highly processed, salty, prepared foods. Convenience foods are often the main contributions to a poor diet, and they are usually more expensive than fresh foods.

6) Do not drink much, if any alcohol. If you are consuming more than 1 or 2 ounces per day, preferably in the form of beer or wine, you are drinking too much for your health.

There are beneficial side effects to following these guidelines. A nutritionally complete, low salt, low fat diet plan, regular exercise, and a lifestyle that does not include excessive alcohol will improve the overall health of your entire body. You will experience more energy, less illness, a better functioning cardiovascular system, fewer problems with constipation and less depression.

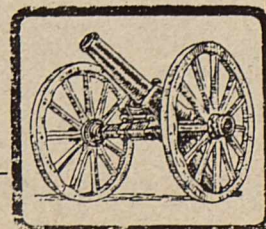
