The first Thanksgiving was held December of 1621 over 360 years ago. Governor William Bradford of the Plymouth Colony had appointed a day of celebration. The Governor had sent four men out to shoot wild turkeys for a feast.

The custom was abandoned in 1622 after an Indian massacre. The celebration was then revived with a change of dates, March 22, by the Virginia General Assembly in 1623, as a day of gratitude for the settler's deliverance from the Indians.

In 1775 George Washington called on colonies to observe Thursday, November 23, as a day of Thanksgiving. This was soon after the start of the Revolutionary War. In 1781, after the defeat of Cornwallis, the Continental Congress proclaimed October 29 as a day of prayer and Thanksgiving.

In 1789 George Washington proclaimed November 26 as the first Thanksgiving Day for the United States of America. This day still stands as the official celebration of Thanksgiving, 196 years later.

It shouldn't matter whether you choose to celebrate Thanksgiving in a typical American fashion or with domestic and wild turkeys, just as long as the spirit remains in the holiday it will continue to be one of America's most favorite, eagerly awaited and enjoyed holidays.







Fort Lancaster was built in 1855 for the protection of the Overland Road in the extreme West. With Fort Bliss and Fort Stockton, Fort Lancaster remained Texas' western line of defense until the beginning of the Civil War.

Fort Lancaster was officially established and occupied in August 20, 1855. It was located halfway between Fort Clark and Fort Davis on the trail to El Paso with Fort Hudson seventy-five miles to the Southeast, on Live Oak Creek about one-half mile above the junction of the creek with the Pecos River.

Wood was found five or six miles up or down stream. Supplies were brought in from San Antonio.

The paymaster for Fort Lancaster and Fort Davis was stationed at Corpus Christi. The soldiers were paid every four months and were furnished an ambulance, four mules and a driver. He also had an escort of four to six men and a team of mules for the hauling of camp supplies.

Houses for officers and barracks were made of stone and adobe bricks with fireplaces in each end. Corrals, shops and feed houses stood in a line to the West of the parade ground.

One great need was iron bed steads but they never got them and there were never enough Sargeants to drill and train the men. The average number of men on duty was one-hundred and twenty a month with three or four officers or less.

Activity occupied by Federal troops from August 20, 1855 to March 19, 1861 when it was turned over to the Confederacy. In these five and a half years, there were eleven different officers at one time or another. Which included two doctors who served as post surgeons. Four musicians were also assigned to the Fort.

Between Feb. 18 and April 3, 1861, the eighteen Federal Posts in Texas were abandoned or surrendered. Some soldiers were allowed to leave and some were held prisoners and some joined the Army. Fort Lancaster was evacuated on March 19, 1861.

In the fall of 1861 the Ranger Company C of mounted volunteers who were sworn in at Marshall in April of 1861 moved into Fort Lancaster. They saw deer, bear, wild turkey,

squirrel, and mush hogs. They had bread, onions and dried apples to cook with the game they were able to kill. The soldiers also trapped coyotes which collected around the Fort by hundreds.

They played baseball and went hunting and Heartsill published a weekly newspaper called, "The Western Pioneer." General Sibly inspected the Fort from time to time. The Rangers stayed until April 2, 1862 before being transferred to another location. After the Rangers left, the Fort was abandoned.

After the Civil War the Federal government reoccupied Fort Stockton, Fort Davis, and Fort Bliss. Fort Lancaster was made a sub-fort. In 1871, the Fort was garrisoned by a Company of Infantrymen and a detachment of personnel who were changed monthly.

It was said probably more fights with the Indians took place near Fort Lancaster than any other Fort on the Texas Frontier. The Indians were mostly Mescalero, Apache and Comanche.

The final closing of the Fort was in 1873 to 1874, and by 1879 it was being called "Old Fort Lancaster".

East of the road near the Fort are three graves, ten feet apart. One is of J.T. Norris, a Ranger who died during the Civil War. The second grave is unidentified. And the third grave speaks for itself with the following epitaph:

Little Margaret
Died Oct. 13, 1858
"Children are a heritage of God



4. REPORT ANY SUSPICIOUS PERSON OR ACTIVITY TO THE SHERIFF'S DEPT. AS SOON AS POSSIBLE AFTER OBSERVING SAME.

Law enforcement officers and public school teachers at first glance might not seem to have a lot in common in their respective professions, but more and more

often these days it is becoming evident that we do indeed have one major thing in common, and that is the expectation and even demands of some parents that we, as public servants, assume the responsibility of the guidance and discipline of their children. The teachers have them during the day and the peace officers after school hours. Then when one of the sweet little darlings pushes his or her luck a tad too far and receives discipline from teacher or peace officer, the parent comes boiling up all redfaced and outraged that someone would dare to correct his or her child. They most often make accusations of abuse directed at the hardworking teacher or peace officer.

A case in point is the hue and cry being heard lately from some that local peace officers are not doing their jobs and are allowing unlicensed minors to drive and even some insinuations that we turn our heads at the use of alcohol and drugs by our young people. I wish the town criers could be present and witness the reactions of some parents towards peace officers when those parents are called to come to the county jail and take custody of their innocent, picked on, and even framed little darlings. And, I would safely estimate that 99.9% of the unlicensed minors driving in our community are operating vehicles furnished by and with the full knowledge and approval of their parents. The responsibility of guidance and discipline of minor children starts at home with concerned parents. School teachers and peace officers are there to help take up the slack, not to do the whole job that parents are eighter too lazy or too afraid to do, or both.

Taking all these things into consideration, Chief of Police Johnny Fritter and I have decided to crack down hard on unlicensed drivers, especially unlicensed minors. Parents of these violators would be well advised to take charge of their children and start law enforcement at home, where it should be started, for it is also a violation of the law to allow an unlicensed minor to operate a motor vehicle on a public road. The parents of unlicensed minors who are ticketed will also be charged if we have reason to believe that those parents have knowledge of the act. And, for good measure, tickets will be issued to many licensed drivers, young and old, who seem to have taken advantage of our patience and violate other traffic laws in our community.

Ordinance #226


PROHIBITING ANIMALS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE IN THE CITY LIMITS; PROVIDING FOR ANNUAL VACCINATIONS; IMPOUNDING, EUTHANIZING, REDEMPTION AND SALE OF ANIMALS; PRESCRIBING A NUISANCE AND OTHER CONTROLS OF ANIMALS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS; PRESCRIBING A PENALTY OF A FINE OF NOT LESS THAN \$1.00 NOR MORE THAN \$1,000.00; AND REPEALING ALL PARTS OF ORDINANCE IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.


The City of Brackettville is asking the Citizens of Brackettville (In City limits only) to comply with Ordinance #226. All sections of ordinance will be enforced. Section I, part G is stated as following; PERMIT: A permit shall mean the permission of this City to allow City residents to own and maintain domesticated and wild animals within the City limits. Permits are revocable on an individual basis for cause without further, legal action if the owner violates provisions of this Ordinance or is convicted of willful cruelty to animals. Permissions will be revoked by letter to the owners address of record informing owner that the animal must be removed from the City limits within three (3) days following receipt of said letter.

Permits will be issued at City Hall and all owners of animals, wild and domesticated must obtain a permit for their animals before January 1, 1988. Before a citizen will be issued a permit thru City Hall, owner must provide vaccination slip showing animals have been vaccinated within year of permit. Permit will ask for owners name, address and phone number, type of animal, color and marking and breed of animal, vaccination tag number and vaccination date. Permit fee will be \$1.00 per animal permit (one animals per permit) CITY WILL START ISSUING ANIMAL PERMITS STARTING DECEMBER 1, 1987. A copy of Ordinance #226 is available at City Hall

"Disease Problems"

Do you know when your plants are If there is a substance on the leaves and buds, mildew has taken over. disease is found on rose buds. Cool nights, warm days and high humidity causes this disease to flourish in the garden. Roses are subject to Blackspot, it is a fungus and usually can be seen after periods of rain. During a rainy period, spray each week with a good fungicide. To control this disease, pick off the infested leaves and burn them. A bacteria called Gall, enters the plant if there is a cut or other kind of wound. Prune away the affected part, and if it doesn't help, destroy the entire plant. should sterilize the shears after each time you cut the plant to prevent the disease from spreading to other plants. Always consult your nursery for various sprays.

## 4TH GENERATION STONE MASON IS PROUD OF HIS WORK

BRACKETTVILLE-Another significant historical preservation project was recently completed at Fort Clark Springs by fourth-generation San Antonio stone mason Ross Hunt. In addition to the exterior work on three-story impressive the Commissary Building at the frontier Cavalry Post that is now a resort community, Hunt's expertise also was called upon locally to reset the precious keystone in the Alamo chapel at Happy Shahan's Alamo Village after the blasts and jolts the life-sized movie set incurred during the filming of "Alamo...The Price of Freedom" this summer.

"So now I've worked on both of them," Hunt, 37, said of Shahan's movie set, and of the project led by his father in 1981 that let brothers Ross and Curtis add new mortar to the original battlescarred Mission/shrine in downtown San Antonio. In construction, and now restoration, the Hunt name goes back as far as some of San Antonio's oldest buildings. The skills of stone masonry have been generation from to passed generation, enabling grandsons to restore the buildings their Great-Grandfather, and Grandfather built.

Great-Grandfather Hunt was a builder in the days of original Commerce Street projects. Grandfather Curtis Hunt, Sr., had major projects such as the Public Library and Our Lady of the Lake University. Ross's father, Curtis Hunt, Jr., led the stonework restoration of the Alamo Compound, the San Fernando Cathedral and Homestead in the King Steve's William area. Ross's younger brother, Curtis Hunt III is currently working on the Sullivan Carriage House on Broadway in San Antonio.

Ross's projects have led him to far places to make similar discoveries. Upon completion of his last project, a National Parks Service preservation project on Ft. conroe in Virginia, Ross drove west of San Antonio to Fort Clark and cound the same kind of mortar oints as the buildings he left ome 2000 miles away.

"You don't see it a lot, but it's s if it was in the Army pecifications at the time," he aid. "These buildings were built ith a lot of architectural tetail." That dedication to detail ould have come from an earlier funt builder. It's undocumented family knowledge that Grandfather Hunt was in Brackettville to help build at Fort Clark, and chances are good that the Grandson has

walked where the Grandfather stood.
Work on the Fort Clark Springs
Commissary Building included a new
600-pound cornerstone placed with
the use of inclined planes, levers,
fulcrums, "and lots of manpower just like the Egyptians," Ross
said. Completion of the structural
work prepares the way for historic
preservationists the building that
has seen military greats such as
Ranald MacKenzie, George C.
Marshall, Jonathan M. Wainright and
George S. Patton pass in its
shadow.

"We're all really proud of the work we do," Ross said of his small crew of native San Antonians who spent the past four months working and enjoying the spring-fed paradise of Fort Clark. Standing beneath the majestic building that was once the hub of frontier life, Ross paused. "Many, many generations will come here and see firsthand the architecture of America," he said. "And how it's everlasting."





## B.I.S.D. BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEET






