


## HAPPY ST. PATRICK'S DAY!

Dear Parents,

We are considering initiating a program next school year aimed at helping children achieve school success. The purpose of this letter is to see how many of you would be interested in participating in such a program.

Since being able to read well is the key to being successful in school, we want our children to become good readers. We have learned that the experiences children have with language and reading before they ever begin school greatly influence the effectiveness with which they learn to read once they start school.

There are some very simple, very easy, strategies that parents can use with their preschool children that will help prepare them to be

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

My goodness, I hardly know where to begin. Well, Joe Townsend advised me to "Open your eyes and make your choice and so classify yourself." All right, Joe. I am a patriotic American citizen, and infantry veteran of World War II, with a medal for heroism and 5 battle stars earned in Europe, in Patton's 3rd Army, in 1944 and 1945. 





An old legend of a tale of gold has been circulating along the Sante Fe Trail for many years. A cache of 2 1/2 million dollars in gold bullion is supposed to be buried northwest of Boise City near two landmarks called Flag Spring and Sugar Loaf Peak.

Near the turn of the 19th Century a party of French soldiers of fortune left New Orleans bound for Matamoros Mexico. They drifted to the north robbing as they went and their major victims were gold miners. It was much easier to steal the gold the miners had already dug up than to dig for it themselves.

When they reached Sante Fe they hired a Spaniard named Jose Lopat to cast their stolen gold into five-hundred ingots weighing seven and a quarter pounds each and then hired him to guide them back to New Orleans.

They camped at Flag Spring where they met four mountain men bound for Taos. The mountain men told them New Orleans no longer belonged to France, that the United States had purchased Louisiana.

Knowing the United States wouldn't let them leave with stolen gold they had to change their

plans. The robbers escorted the Spaniard Lopat back to New Mexico. The remaining Frenchman was to bury the gold, and mark the location so it could be found again. They were then sent back to New Orleans and arranged for an escape ship to meet them secretly on the Gulf Coast.

Months afterward one of the robbers turned up in Sante Fe. He was the last living villian of the original gang. There he ran into the Spaniard Jose Lopat. Lopat knew the remaining gang member was looking for the gold, but the remaining robber had tuberculosis and died before he could return to the Panhandle. When he died in Sante Fe the whereabouts of the loot died too.

Lopat went to Flag Spring camp and began to search for the gold, but he failed to find it. Since that time the descendants of Jose Lopat and others have kept searching for the gold. Huge roman numerals left by the Frenchman were found. They are I, V, IV, and XI. They are laid out in a square, north and south by compass. This square contains thirty-six square miles.

Somewhere in that square or close by is the Frenchman's gold. Whoever can solve the mystery of the roman numerals may be able to walk directly to the spot where the gold is buried.

According to the Lopat family Bible, Jose Lopat was born in Madrid, Spain on October 17, 1769. He died in Sante Fe on June 4, 1856. His granddaughter Angelina knew her grandfather and heard the story of the Frenchman's gold at Lopats knee. Her descendants are still in Colorado. The story of the lost gold is written in the Lopat family Bible.

Many tales of lost mines gold are told in the southwest.


butterflies, and bees, blossoms say that Spring is here. We now begin the busiest time in the yard and garden, as now is the most popular time to plant. As Fall gardens come to an end, Spring gardens are started.

Prepare to fertilize the yard for the first time in the next two The most recommended weeks. fertilizer is the 19-5-9 slow release with iron & sulfa. As we begin to water the lawns and they start greening, a good application of fertilizer plus compost will give the lawn a great start. you are worried about the fleas and ticks in the grass add application of Dursban or Diazinon granules. (These must be watered in thoroughly before children or pets are allowed back into the yard). If you don't want poisons added to the lawn you can use a heavy application of granulated sulphur or diatomaceous

When the plum and peach trees are in full bloom you can spray for protection against stem canker and leaf curl. But don't spray with an insecticide while there are any blooms on them or you will kill the benificial insects. Fertilize the trees with tree & shrub fertilizers or use the tree stakes.

Now is also the time to fertilize shrubs, berries and grapes.

Tomatoes and peppers can be bought now, put into 1 gallon containers to allow to grow over the next two weeks before planting into the garden. Add a fertilizer tab to the hole when you plant the tomatoes to give it extra nutrition. Or you can do what I do and place a 1 gal. milk container over each plant and have a small greenhouse effect.



# **HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS**



# CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

**Exemptions are** available to all homeowners to lower their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available there.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1987, you won't need to apply again for 1988 unless your chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you became 65 or disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1988.

The deadline for applications is May 2, 1988. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

# LIBRARY NEWS BY FRANCES HERNANDEZ

San Antonio Area Library System, a very common name to all associated with the library. What exactly is and what exactly does San Antonio Area Library System do for the patrons and staff of Kinney County Public Library?

San Antonio Area Library System was established by the Texas State Library to administer state and federal funds to develop the small public library in this district, District 10.

The system is composed of a Coordinator, Collection Development Consultant, Interlibrary Loan Consultant, A-V/Automation Consultant, and other staff.

Each of the above consultants make an annual personal visit to the library and are available for consultation by phone. Other consulting services include a library science professional collection, collection evaluations

and presentations to library boards and or library governing bodies.

Another service provided by SAALS is Interlibrary Loan referred to as ILL. Any Kinney County Public Library registered borrower may request books or magazine articles through ILL if the book or subject matter may not be supplied locally.

SAALS also provides us with Audio Material (A-V) videocassettes, and filmstrips. A wide variety of titles is received in the 16 mm film circuit each month. These films may be borrowed overnight for the use of home or public viewing. 16 mm films may also be ordered directly from San referred Antonio, to as booking. 29 titles videocassette format are available for check out to any registered borrower 18 years of age or more. The videocassettes may also be requested through spot booking, which offer home viewing and public viewing also. Filmstrips may also be requested through spot booking.

Audio Visual equipment is also provided through SAALS. Presently KCPL has a 16 mm film projector (stand & screen) a slide projector

### 'HILL COUNTY CAUCUS' MEETS

For about a year, the County Judges of four neighboring counties have been working together on projects of mutual and area interest.

The four judges met on Tuesday, March 1 at the Real County Courthouse. The judges, who call themselves the "Hill Country Caucus," are Judge Jim Sanderlin of Real County, Judge Neville Smart of Edwards County, Judge Tommy Seargeant of Kinney County and Judge Bill Mitchell of Uvalde County. Judge Mitchell is the grandson of the late Ross Powers, former County Attorney and County Clerk of Real County.

The four judges announced together that District Engineer, Richard Lockhart, has committed his district to build a proposed bridge at a site known as Arnold Crossing which is on Highway 55 in Uvalde County, about 5 miles south of Campwood. Construction will not be scheduled until the completion of another new bridge on the Nueces River on Highway 55, which is commonly referred to as 19 Mile Crossing. Bid letting for the 19 Mile Crossing bridge is scheduled for the spring of 1988.

It was also announced that engineering is complete for

improvement of the Little Dry Frio crossing near Rio Frio. The Little Dry Frio project is in the advanced planning stage.

Other area highway improvements include recent installation of school warning lights at the Nucces Canyon Elementary School at Campwood.

The area judges also voiced approval of a request for a grant from the U.S. Department of Interior through the State Historical Commission for the study of improvements for the San Lorenzo Mission at Campwood. The grant request has received strong support from Senator Bill Sims of San Angelo.

The group of judges wish to greatfully acknowledge the assistance of District Engineer Richard Lockhart from San Antonio and District Engineer Ben Bohuslav of San Angelo for their support of projects planned and in progress for the area.

The judges also wish to adknowledge the cooperative support of other local city, county and school officials, for these projects, as well as support from the local Chamber of Commerce.





This column did not appear last week because we were just too involved with other activities to get the copy out in time. I apologize to those of you who enjoy the column and for those of you who do not well you got a weeks rest

do not, well, you got a weeks rest. U.S. Border Patrol The apprehended two illegal aliens on March 9th who had various documents in their possession belonging to a juvenile female out of Arlington, Texas. This caused some concern to us as there was an entry document with the papers showing that the girl had entered Mexico in April, 1987 enroute to the interior of Mexico. We took custody of two aliens until illegal investigation could be completed to determine the whereabouts and safety of the young girl. I was able to track down and locate the girl's mother on March 10th and determined that the girl had been a runaway last year and had indeed gone to Mexico with her boyfriend. She has since returned and has married and is safe. After the investigation was completed the two illegal aliens were returned to the Border Patrol for deportation.

A major drug bust occured the night of March 9th with the arrest of a 38 year old Pecos, Texas man. Local U.S. Border Patrol agents had received information that a large load of Marijuana would be coming through Kinney County and the agents set up patrols along the major roadways in the county looking for the vehicle. The vehicle was sighted approximately 8:50 p.m. the night of Wednesday, March 9th, and when stopped several large bundles of what was believed to be Marijuana was found in the back of pickup. The local drug sniffing dog "Michael" was brought to the scene and indicated that material was indeed Marijuana. A total of 522 pounds of the illegal substance was seized along with the pickup. The street value of the Marijuana is estimated to be in excess of \$417,000.00. This is the third major bust of dope smugglers in Kinney County in the past few weeks. Thus far a total of 760 pounds of Marijuana has been seized in Kinney County since January 1, 1988 with an estimated street value

of \$608,000.00.

As many of you may be aware of by now, Kinney County has been plagued with brush fires over the past few weeks, many of them large destructive fires that have destructive destroyed many acres of grassland. Some of these fires have started out as "controlled burns" being monitored by landowners and getting out of control. Such was the case in a large fire that got out of control west of Brackettville on Thursday, March 10th. This fire burned to Highway 90 and jumped the highway and started a large fire north of Highway 90 near Pinto This resulted in the highway being closed off and on all afternoon because of heavy smoke. The fire was finally brought under control late Wednesday afternoon with the assistance of fire department units from Kinney, Val Verde, and Maverick counties. "Hot restarted throughout the night but by early Friday morning everything was under control. At the same time Wednesday afternoon another big fire was burning east of Brackettville on the Harrison It was brought under control by fire department units from Kinney and Uvalde counties by 9:30 p.m. The conditions for brush fires are just right this time of the year because of dry weather, high winds, and low humidity. Caution should be used by all of us in burning trash and activities involving fires.


Another destructive grass and brush fire broke out on Hwy. 131 approximately 5 miles south of Spofford Friday afternoon, March 11th. This fire soon developed into a hugh wildfire racing across the dry grasslands like a runaway Volunteer firemen from train. Brackettville and Eagle Pass first started fighting the fire on the Los Venados Ranch but the fire was traveling at such high speed that is soon crossed over to the Brown Ranch and it was necessary to go around Ranch Road 1908 in an attempt to get in front of it. The firemen worked long and hard in an attempt to gain control of the fire, being assisted with heavy equipment by local rancher Jimmy Bader and later by Mother Nature in the way of a norther that reversed the direction of the fire causing it to burn back on itself in many The weary firemen were areas. finally able to gain control of the blaze in the early morning hours of Saturday, March 12th.

Another series of grassfires started along Hwy. 1572 east of Spofford Saturday night and it is believed that these fires were started by two Uvalde County men riding a motorcycle. The two men were apprehended just east of Spofford by Deputy David Luna shortly after the first reports were received. They were transported to the Sheriff's Office and questioned at length by yours truly, Chief Deputy David Luna, and Chief of Police Johnny Fritter. We finally had to release them because of a lack of evidence.

The people of Kinney County, in particular those living on ranches and in the rural areas, should take their hats off and extend their heartfelt gratitude to the Kinney County Volunteer Firemen for their extensive efforts in firefighting. They are volunteers. Unpaid, civic minded men who give freely many hours of their time under dangerous conditions to protect the citizens and property in Kinney County from fires. They save thousands upon thousands of dollars worth of valuable property each year through their efforts. I know I speak for the big majority of the citizens of Kinney County when I say "THANKS FOR A JOB WELL DONE!"
