



Quick action by neighbors helped avoid disaster by placing a sprinkler between the trailer and the propane tank behind it keeping it cool from the intense heat coming from the burning home. They also turned off the electricity and the gas, the Fire Department appreciates that cool headed, quick thinking and I'm sure the Burrow's well. A preliminary as

investigation indicated that the fire originated in the wall between the kitchen and the bedroom however we wer'ent positive so we asked the Del Rio Fire Marshal and Fire investigator to take a look, they determined that the fire ignited in two places, both because of faulty wiring in the same circuit, shorting at one place caused ignition and overloaded the circuit causing wires to burn at another outlet box, this trailer was wired with aluminum wire which has been proven inadequate and since outlawed for use in new mobil homes. The Burrow's home is a total loss, 75% being fire damage and the rest being smoke and water damage. We are glad that Mr. & Mrs. Burrow were able to escape unharmed and we are sorry for the loss of thier

FIRE PREVENTION TIP

For those of you living in an older mobil home, it might be a good idea to have your wiring checked by a qualified electrician to see if your wiring is copper or aluminum. Aluminum wire is inadequate because it expands and contracts much more than copper, therefore causing connections to loosen with use. Over a period of time these loose connections begin to arc, and this eventuality may cause a fire.

Commercial Rabbit Growers Assn. and Exchange Story by: Brad Whitten

While the American public is decreasing their consumption of beef and poultry, palates across the land are turning to rabbit as the meat of choice.

However, the ability of rabbit growers to meet the public's demand is waining. According to Alan Josselyn, President of the newly formed Commercial Rabbit Growers Association (CRGA), there is enough demand for another 22 million pounds of rabbit in the Texas area alone.

With beef intake decreasing because of its high cholesterol level, and poultry production slacking off with increasing reports of disease transmission, people are discovering that rabbit meat is lowest in calories and cholesterol, highest in protein and very resistant to disease.

Restaurants which serve rabbit exclusively have taken hold in many parts of the United States. The Rapid Rabbit is a restaurant now being franchised in Austin and San

Based in Burnet, Texas, the CRCA was formed to organize the industry. We are trying to bring everyone together, growers and processors, and stabilize the market, Josselyn said.

He said the rabbit industry has never been organized and in many cases has been manipulated and controlled by a few processors. We also want to be an information service for new rabbit producers coming into the market.

By paying 25 to join the Association, Josselyn said members will receive market reports on supply, demand, and volumes, obtain business plans to help secure agriculture loans, and get all the information needed to start in the business, including a library full of information. They also furnish information on buying used equipment.

Mike Buck, owner of Hill Country Wild Game Inc., in Burnet, said there is a definite rabbit shortage and a need for more rabbit growers in the state. He complained that the quality of rabbits imported from China to fill the demand here is much lower than that of American raised rabbits.

Rabbit is good for you, Buck said. The only thing I have seen listed above it is buffalo. They grade chicken just below rabbit but they grade chicken with the skin on and hardly anybody takes the skin off before eating it.



Perhaps one of the most dangerous events is bull-riding. rodeo brahma cattle are sometimes just plain savage, especially when they are crossbred. Bull riding was first introduced sometime around They are fast and powerful 1921. and most of them weigh over 1,500 pounds. These loose-hided bulls will often try to trample a fallen rider. They are dangerous in the chute and they could break your bones just by leaning on you.

A flat braided piece of manila rope is fashioned around the bull behind his shoulders. A weighted bell is attached to the bull which allows it to fall free when the ride is over. The rider wears spurs and a riding glove and sometimes shotgun type chaps.

The rules don't require the rider to spur the bull but he receives more points if he does.

The only things the rider can be disqualified for is hitting the ground before eight seconds. failing to have the bell attached and for touching the bull with the free hand.

Some expert cowboys say a brahma bull can buck off any cowboy anytime he uses his full power, one thing for sure, a brahma has more spine rattling action than any other breed of cattle. To stay on one requires good balance and a good riding arm. Once a rider slips back off the rope and the bulls rib cage, the rider is a "goner" and usually gets thrown the next jump.

When a rider draws a spinning bull there is more danger of getting trampled or butted if the rider falls to the inside of the spinning circle.

"Pick up" men are not used to rescue the fallen rider because a bull will fight a man on horseback. Instead, the cowboy has to depend on the rodeo clown to distract the bull while the fallen cowboy gets away.

The rodeo clowns do an amazing job at great risk and danger. One of the most famous rodeo clowns of years past was called "Booger Red". He could make your heart stand still with his "bull fighting". He had a skit where he was knocked out by a bull and was carted onto an ambulance but at the arena gate the ambulance doors flew open and he hit the ground after a back flip.

Of course no one was mad at his trick because we were relieved to see he wasn't hurt at all.

He made all the championship rodeos of the 1920's and 1930's which were thrilling rodeos at which the cowgirls rode the bucking broncos and did fancy roping and trick riding. Rodeos of today seem pretty tame after seeing the first Championship rodeos. National Except they haven't found a way to slow down to brahma bulls yet.

FMHA TO ELECT NEW COUNTY COMMITTEE **MEMBERS**

The Farmers Home Administration will begin accepting (FmHA) nominations April 5 for election to the newly formed county committee covering all of Edwards, Kinney, Real, Uvalde, and Val Verde Counties. Members will be elected under the new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Ed Persyn said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens

the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Persyn said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Persyn said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan, Persyn said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 1022 Garner Field Uvalde, TX 78801, Persyn. said.



STEP BY STEP PROCEDURE FOR OBTAINING A LEADER DOG



INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING APPLICATION: Applicant should complete first and last page — attach a recent photograph, and list six references. A medical doctor must completely fill out the second and third pages. Mail completed form to LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND, 1039 SOUTH ROCHESTER ROAD, ROCHESTER HILLS, MI 48063. Classes are scheduled at least three months in advance — assignment cannot be made until completed application and references are received.

ASSIGNMENT: Upon receipt of the completed application and references, a tentative assignment will be made and applicant will be notified immediately. An Admissions Committee will evaluate the application, and upon final acceptance, applicant will be notified of definite assignment.

TRAVEL TO LEADER DOG SCHOOL: Travel plans and expenses are the responsibility of the applicant. As soon as the applicant knows his method of travel and arrival time, he should notify the school. An instructor will meet the applicant at the arrival point. No provisions are made for persons accompanying a student — students should travel alone. Transportation will be furnished from the time the student is met until he has completed the course of training, and is taken to his point of departure. The applicant may be driven to the school which is approximately 25 miles north of Detroit on M-150; one mile south of Rochester on the corner of Avon & Rochester roads.

LIFE AT LEADER DOG SCHOOL: Classes always begin on Sunday and last for 4 weeks. Applicant will live in a comfortable dormitory. Instructors are on duty at all times. Board and room, bed linens, towels, wash cloths, etc., are furnished by the Leader Dog School. Applicant may attend the church of his choice. Training is done outdoors several hours each day therefore clothing should be suitable for Michigan seasons. Life during training is most enjoyable in a home-like atmosphere.

COST OF LEADER DOG TO APPLICANT: No charge — applicant needs only pocket money for personal purchases.

COST OF LEADER DOG TO LEADER DOG SCHOOL: Approximately \$7,500 — Leader Dogs for the Blind is supported by Lions Clubs, various public supported agencies and individuals who recognize the value of the training program.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR A LEADER DOG? Any person who cannot see well enough to travel safely, in good health, over 16 years of age, emotionally stable, of good moral character, and physically able to walk several miles each day at a fairly brisk page.

HOW WILL A LEADER DOG HELP? It will minimize the handicap of blindness and permit an individual to go where he wants to go — when he wants to go — without having to wait for a relative or friend. It will permit travel freedom, provide constant companionship, and widen the scope for job opportunity. A Leader Dog protects against everyday travel hazards, and provides safety under trying conditions. Hundreds of Leader Dogs have been trained to lead the blind and in each case the individual has been restored to a normal place in the community.



At long last we obtained authorization from the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville, Texas to transport two convicted felons to that facility to begin serving their sentences. In reality they have been serving their time while in our jail as they will be given credit for every day they have been in jail since arrested for their respective crimes.

The two men, Juan R. Martinez, 32, of Brackettville, and W.C. Jackson, 69, a prior Brackettville resident now claiming residence in California, were transported to TDC Monday, March 28th by Chief Deputy David Luna and Jailer Vic Bonner. Martinez was arrested in June 1987 for Auto Theft. He was later indicted, tried, and convicted for the crime and received a 4 year sentence. Jackson on the other hand was a fugitive from justice until his arrest in Bisbee, Arizona in August, 1987 after a routine traffic stop resulted in a check being run on him by the arresting officer who received a "hit" on Jackson from the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) indicating he was wanted by our department on felony theft charges. Jackson fought extradition claiming among other things that he was not the man we wanted and had been falsely accused and arrested. We had to go to great lengths to prove that he was indeed the man we wanted. He was finally released to us on the strenght of a Governor's Warrant issued by Governor Bill Clements. He was subsequently convicted on the felong theft charges after a plea bargain agreemeny of Nola Contrende received a 2 year sentence.

Jackson has an extensive criminal record dating back to 1941 and has been a constant source of pain in my backside since he has been in jail here. He has made multiple allegations against me to the feds claiming I was holding him illegally and causing him undue mental anguish by using cruel and harsh punishment by illegally holding him against his will. All the charges and complaints he made against me were investigated by the F.B.I. and I was cleared of any wrongdoing with the official

wording being that his charges were "false and frivilous". Jackson has caused other problems in the jail by refusing to bathe, shave, or have his haircut. We had to forcibly bathe him on several occasions, and once even started shaving him but after a few moments of that he finally agreed to do it himself. Whew! No one will be more pleased than I to have him out of this jail. Ironically he will most likely be swiftly processed and released by TDC officials after his arrival there. We had to track him down, spend thousands of dollars in expenses on him, put up with his B.S. and finally transport him to TDC where he will be quickly released after serving only a fraction of his time. Justice???

The numbers of illegal aliens crossing the border and passing through our county has caused an increase in the rural crime rate with break-ins and thefts being the most common crime reported. Over the past few weeks we have apprehended several illegal aliens inside the city limits with reports from several citizens of the aliens coming to their doors asking for food and/or directions. Some have been reported prowling around on private property right here in town in the early morning hours (2-4 a.m.). For the most part these illegal aliens are harmless, but I would advise local residents to use caution dealing with these people, you just never know, and there have been several incidents of violence associated with illegal aliens over the past few years. Should you hear or see a prowler or should an unknown person come to your door who fits the profile of an illegal alien call the Sheriff's Department immediately and we will respond as quickly as possible. At no time allow these people inside your home, the results could be fatal. Call us at 563-2788 for 24 hour a day service and protection.

Remember the RUN-OFF ELECTION is to be held on April 12, 1988. Take the time to exercise your right to vote for the candidate of your choice for the respective offices. Remember if you don't vote, don't gripe later if things don't go the way you want them to.

A one car accident occurred on Ft. Clark a little after midnight the night of March 25th (actually the early morning of March 26th). The accident occurred on Crockett Street when a pickup driven by a 15 year old youth struck a trailer parked in front of a residence. Extensive damage was done to the pickup though no dollar estimate was available at the time of this writing. Fortunately there were no

injuries. No charges were filed as state traffic laws do not apply on Ft. Clark as it is considered private property. There has been an increase in traffic accidents on Ft. Clark in recent years, one of them a tragic accident in which a teenager lost his life. majority of traffic acc The of traffic accidents occuring on Ft. Clark have involved young, unlicensed drivers and the trend will undoubtedly continue until parents of unlicensed drivers start cooperating with concerned officials and residents and stop letting their children drive until they have received the proper training and instruction and have passed a driver's test and received their license. They are simply inexperienced and not capable of handling emergency driving situations that can occur in a split second and require experienced reactions in order to avoid an accident. experienced driver's sometimes are unable to handle these situations. Like it or not, Ft. Clark is, in effect, a small town with the same traffic, intersections, pedestrians, etc. The difference being that there is a false sense of security on Ft. Clark because it is considered private property, thus minor, unlicensed drivers with no adult supervision, accidents. We don't want another tragic accident occurring with loss life as has happened before. Accidents will happen and do happen involving licensed and unlicensed driver's, but the point I am trying to make is that they are more likely to occur when an inexperienced, unlicensed minor is at the wheel of a powerful, 4,000 pound vehicle.

Another serious traffic accident occurred the night of March 29th at the intersection of Hwy. 90 West and Loop 166. The accident when a Cadillac being pursued by City Police Chief Johnny Fritter crossed over the center stripe into the path of a Brackettville bound Chevrolet. The cars struck almost head-on and serious injuries were sustained by the female passenger of the Cadillac. The driver of the Chevrolet also received minor bruises and injuries. The driver of the Cadillac was cited for several violations. I want to thank the U.S. Border Patrol Agents who assisted us in traffic control at the scene. There was a major traffic problem for nearly an hour with one lane of Hwy. 90 being closed. The able assistance provided by the Border Patrol Agents was greatly appreciated by all local law enforcement officers at the scene.

With Mr. Frerich is buried a vast library of information on all phases of agriculture, the history of Kinney County, and how to be a good neighbor and friend. He will be greatly missed by all.

A number of years ago he lost, in death, the mother of his children. He leaves his widow, Avilee Cummins Frerich, two sons at the ranch, Edwin and Raymond, and a daughter Jean, whom you know as the R.N. with Dr. Luz at the clinic. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Cecilia Bayers, a brother, Orville and other brothers. We, in this fellowship, share in the

He said prices for rabbits are now rising and at the current price of 85 cents a pound live weight in Texas, a rabbitry with 500 does could make \$24,000 a year.

He added that selling the rabbit manure and the worms that grow in it can almost double that income when marketed correctly.

Most people have never considered raising rabbits as a viable agricultural business, Josselyn said. I want to change that.
