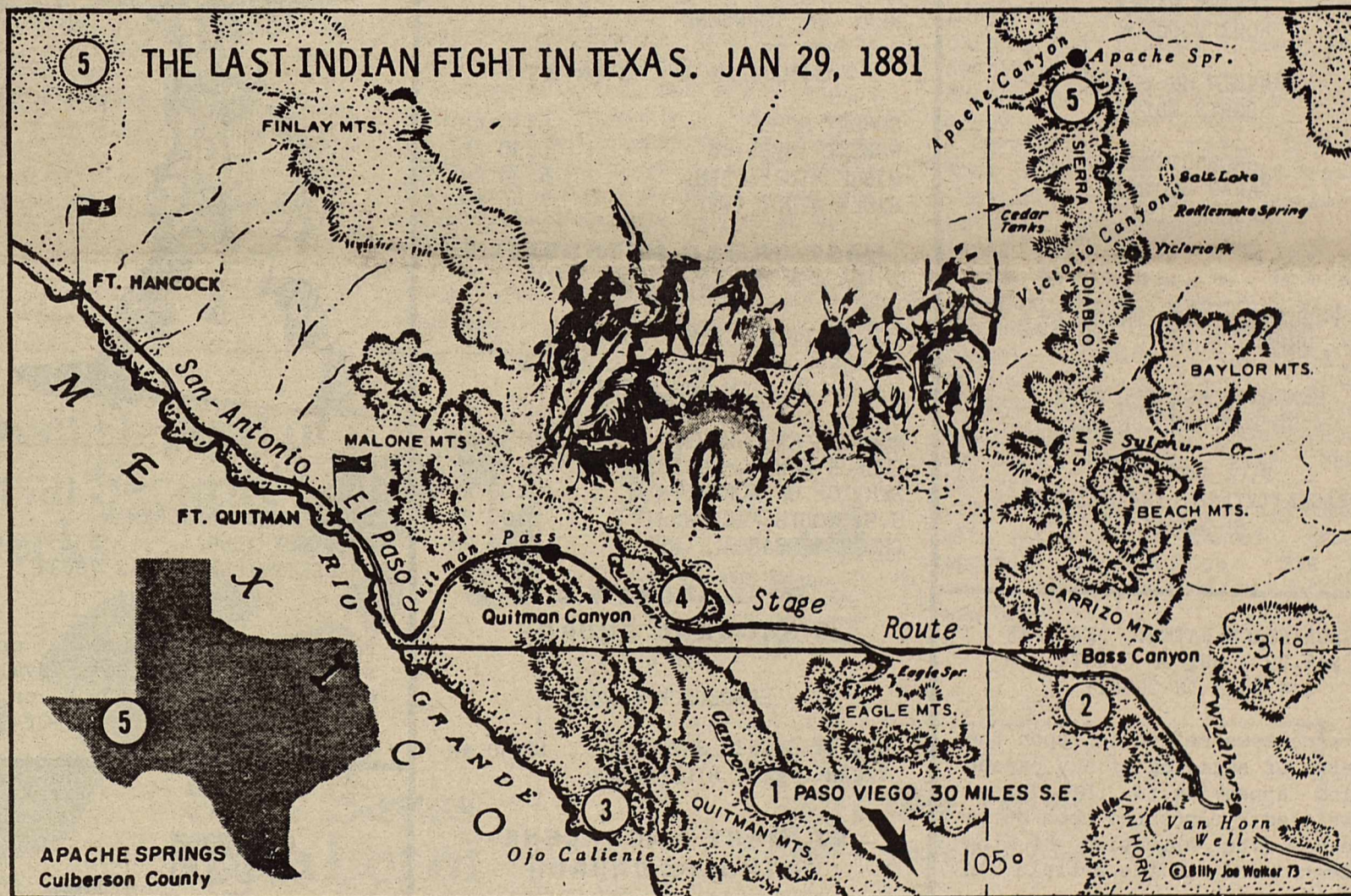

**THE LAST INDIAN FIGHT IN TEXAS. JAN 29, 1881.** When the Mexican General Terrasas exterminated Chief Victoria and his band of hostile Apaches in the battle of Tres Castillos, Oct. 14, 1880, 12 braves and 4 squaws escaped across the Rio Grande into Texas where in the short space of 3 months they left a bloody trail of death and destruction in their wake. At Paso Viego (1) they ambushed and killed a squad of the colored 10th Cavalry under Lt. Mills. At Bass Canyon (2) they waylaid an emigrant train capturing a wagon, killing 2 people and wounding another. At Ojo Caliente (3) they fought with and killed 7 troopers of the 10th Cavalry pinning their bodies to the ground with their own cavalry staking pins. In Quitman Canyon (4) they intercepted the San Antonio stage killing the driver and his one passenger. Captain Baylor and Lt. Nevill with Rangers of the famous Frontier Battalion relentlessly tracked the marauders from Ojo Caliente (3) to Apache Spring (5) in the Sierra Diablo mountains where they annihilated the hostiles in the fast battle to be fought with the Indians on Texas soil.

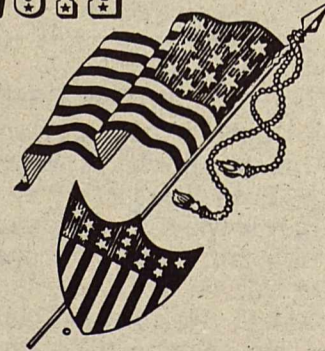

His students have won over 200 awards.

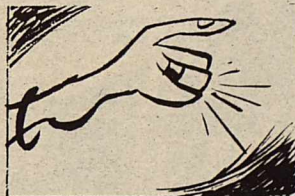

Dr. Wong's visit is coordinated with the third annual teacher appreciation reception. His talks are motivational for students and teachers.



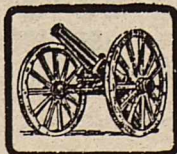

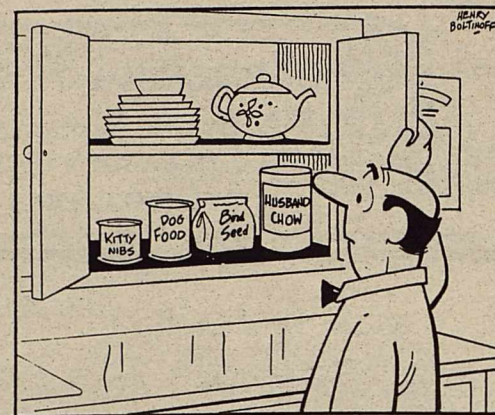

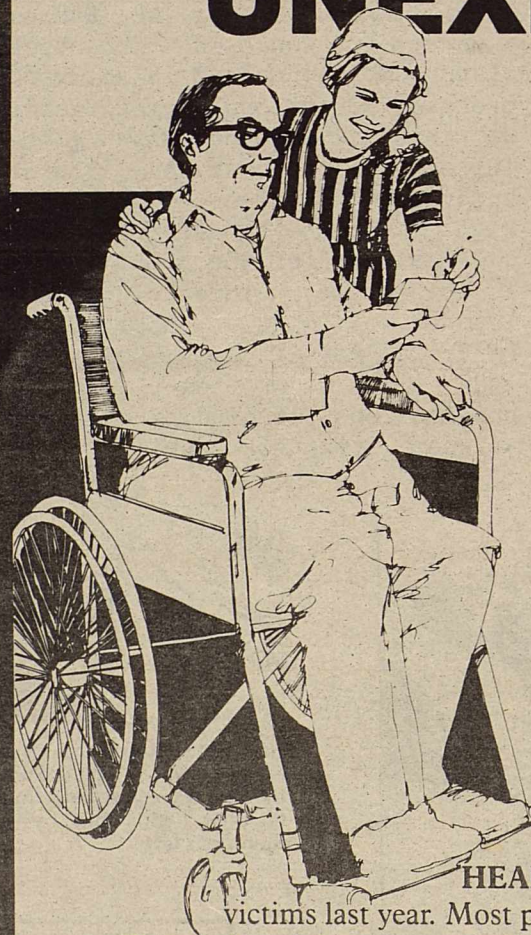
Is there another route open for man? Yes. We ought to live to please God. Jesus always did those

| 2 fresh tomatoes      | 1 - 2 tbsp. | olive oil      |
| 2 large cucumbers     |             | freshly ground |
| 2 fresh green peppers |             | black pepper.  |
| 1/2 small onion       |             |                |

Beef Stroganoff

When the occasion calls for something elegant, this modified beef stroganoff fits the bill.

|---------|----------------------|----------|----------------|
| 1 lb.   | lean beef round      | 2 cups   | beef broth*    |
|         | freshly ground black | 2 tbsp.  | tomato paste*  |
|         | pepper               | 1 tsp.   | dry mustard    |
| 1/2 lb. | mushrooms, sliced    | 1/4 tsp. | oregano        |
| 1       | onion, sliced        | 1/4 tsp. | dill weed      |
| 3 tbsp. | oil                  | 2 tbsp.  | sherry         |
| 3 tbsp. | flour                | 1/3 cup  | low-fat yogurt |

Remove all visible fat from the meat and cut into thin strips, about 2 inches long. Sprinkle with pepper and let stand in a cool place for 2 hours.

In a heavy skillet, sauté mushrooms in oil until tender. Remove from skillet, and sauté onions in the same oil until brown. Remove from skillet.

Brown meat quickly on all sides until rare. Remove and set aside.

Blend the flour into the oil in the skillet and gradually add the broth, stirring constantly until smooth and slightly thick. Add the tomato paste, dry mustard, oregano, dill weed and sherry. Blend well. Combine the sauce with the meat, mushrooms and onions in the top of a double boiler. Cook for 20 minutes. Beat yogurt (to prevent it from curdling). Blend in the beaten yogurt 5 minutes before serving.

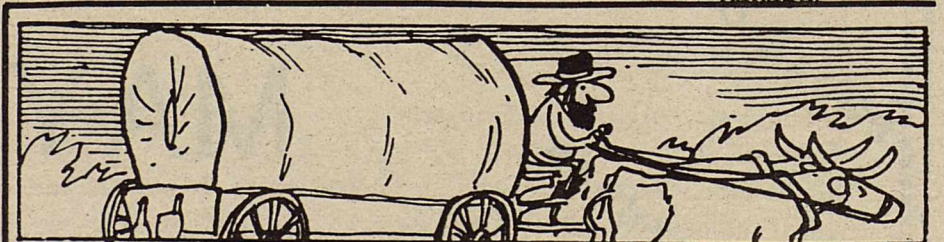

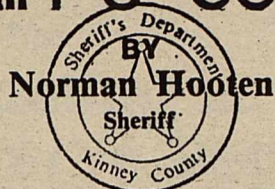

# SHERIFF'S CORNER



A 23 year old Wisconsin woman was terrorized, robbed at gunpoint, and had her vehicle stolen after stopping at a roadside park on Hwy. 90 6 miles east of Brackettville Sunday afternoon, April 3rd.

The young woman, who is in the Air Force and stationed at Laughlin Field, stated that she was approached by a young white male armed with an automatic pistol after she entered the women's restroom at the park. The man demanded her money, credit cards, and car keys. He continually threatened her life during the incident and at one time upon hearing voices approaching he ordered the frightened young woman into a stall and then sat in her lap with the pistol at her head until the people left the room. He then took her valuables and fled the scene in her vehicle in an undetermined direction.

The young woman attempted to obtain assistance from an elderly couple who stopped at the rest stop and they stated that they would try and contact someone on their C.B. radio. But after no one arrived to help her the woman then started walking towards Brackettville on Hwy. 90. She finally obtained a ride and by the time she was able to report the incident to the Sheriff's Department an hour and a half had passed.

The resulting search for the armed robber and the stolen vehicle eventually involved at least ten counties and law enforcement officers from several agencies. It has since been determined that the suspect had at least one accomplice in another vehicle. The suspect attempted to purchase gas in Loma Alta with a Gulf credit card and was denied as the station did not take Gulf cards, the pair later purchased fuel with the stolen card in Sonora. An alert gas station attendant requested identification and it was through this act that at least one of the suspects has been identified. This suspect is also wanted in South Carolina for at least two other felony crimes and the vehicle being used by the accomplice is also believed to be stolen as the license number to the vehicle does not match the description of the vehicle being

used. The two suspect vehicles were last seen at a roadside park west of Ozona on IH 10 at approx. 7:30 p.m. on the date of the incident. All available information concerning the incident has been entered into the TCIC/NCIC computer network. We have every confidence that the pair will eventually be apprehended and the stolen vehicle recovered. However the case will be time consuming and will require the combined assistance of many law enforcement officers and agencies. Texas Ranger Johnny Allen from Del Rio is assisting me in the primary investigation.

A 17 year old Brackettville youth was arrested by this writer, Sunday, April 3rd on Forgery charges. He was placed in jail and the loss involved was recovered. The forged check was first stolen by the suspect from a friend, then the friend's name forged and the worthless document used to purchase auto parts. Due to the fact that all losses were recovered and considering the age of the youth and that this was his first offense no formal charges were filed. However, a record of the offense, his fingerprints, mug shot, and jail booking card will be maintained in the records of the Sheriff's Department for reference should he commit violations in the future. He was considerably impressed with his overnight stay in the County Jail.

We have been kept fairly busy with minor local crimes in addition to the major armed robbery. The crimes range from family disputes, disturbances, burglary, and even a strayed bull.

Abuse of alcohol in our community is still a major concern and is directly related to a large majority of all cases handled involving locals. Seems that some folks just haven't learned the difference in having a few with your friends and over indulgence, the result is family disturbances, burglaries, fights, accidents, and criminal charges sometimes involving jail time and heavy fines.

Can a person contract AIDS if he has been bitten by someone who has the disease?

A recent report in the *Journal of the American Medical Association* reported that a woman bitten by an AIDS patient in March, 1985 is free of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) antibody and AIDS symptoms 18 months later. John A. Drummond, M.D. of Piedmont Hospital, Atlanta, says the 28-year-old woman was bitten on the finger when she helped a man suffering a seizure in the grocery store where she worked. The man had AIDS and died in November, 1985, although it wasn't known whether his saliva was HIV-positive at the time of the bite. Although HIV has been isolated from human saliva, Drummond says this case provides further evidence that saliva is not likely to transmit the infection.

# Boating Is More Fun When You're Better Prepared

Boating safety begins by being properly prepared. That means having all the required Coast Guard equipment on board such as approved personal flotation devices, fire extinguisher, paddle or oar, proper registration, etc. However, that's just the start according to Suzuki Outboards of Brea, California, who offer these ten items as necessities the next time you go boating.

- 1) At least 25 feet of line strong enough to function as a tow rope in case of emergency. Never count on a dock line should you need to get or give a tow. This extra line should have a permanent loop on one end to make attachment more simple.
- 2) Spare outboard oil. You can't always count on a marina having two-cycle oil in stock. It's also better if you know what brand and quality of oil your engine is using.
- 3) Basic tool kit. Two screwdrivers standard and hex head style, two adjustable crescent wrenches, two pairs of pliers, a small hammer, vise grips and

a knife or wire cutters should get most jobs done. A spark plug wrench is also handy.

- 4) A box of spare parts. Things like extra electrical fuses, hose clamps, assorted nuts and bolts, and wiring connectors are always useful.
- 5) A spare set of spark plugs. Don't take a chance. One fouled spark plug can spoil an entire day of boating if not replaced.
- 6) A spare drain plug, by far the most common item lost by boaters. Never launch until you've checked to make sure it's tight.
- 7) A roll of electrical tape. This has a thousand and one uses.
- 8) An anchor and at least 50 feet of line. You never know when this will come in handy. A must piece of equipment in an emergency situation.
- 9) An ice chest with beverages. Boating can be a very thirsty pastime.
- 10) An umbrella or convertible shade cover. Having the ability to get out of the hot summer sun is often a welcomed relief.

APRIL 1988 WEATHER FORECASTS FOR THE UNITED STATES

1-3: APRIL SHOWERS GALORE. Showers are spread far and wide as a storm from the Great Plains continues east to the New England region. Moderate cold air enters the Pacific coast to bring frosty nights after the rain showers. Temperatures begin to rise in the south.

4-7: COLD AIR AND SNOW DAYS. Watch for a northern storm to develop in the Ohio Valley and then move rapidly toward the east coast. A deep frost into Tennessee, west to the Pacific coast, is seasonal. The Rockies are mild with unsettled weather.

8-11: APRIL SHOWERS ARE GREAT! Rain and snow are beneficial to the farms and orchards from coast to coast. Local showers and thunderstorms are heavy in the southern plains. Tornado danger will increase now.

12-15: MORE OF THE SAME. Below normal temperatures occur over northern Rockies, east across the Great Lakes into New England, following each storm passage. Frost is dangerous north of Virginia, west across the Ohio Valley, into the central plains. Tornadoes occur.

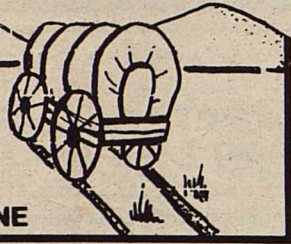
16-19: WEATHER CHANGES! Energetic low pressure movements bring rain storms, especially in the Great Lakes and Ohio Valley regions. Temperatures change rapidly over the Rockies into the plains states but are modified somewhat in the east. Tornadoes and heavy thunderstorms occur in the Ohio Valley.

20-23: EVERYTHING IN A RUSH! Pressure centers and weather changes are in a great rush. Clear cool days are followed by rain or snow. Heavy rain or snow covers the northern plains into New England, as a freeze follows from Kansas east to the coast. The south and far west weather is more normal but rather dry.

24-27: HOT AND COLD WEATHER NOW. Much needed rain occurs from north Pacific states east across the Great Plains. Cold air from Canada will keep the northern plains, the Great Lakes and New England rather cold. Temperatures will reach record high levels now in all southern states.

28-30: SOME RELIEF FROM DRYNESS. The Great Lakes and Ohio Valley and the deep south will be troubled by brief storm centers. By the 30th a large storm center situated over the Rockies will generate a large rain and storm pattern over the Great Plains.

James Bowie was a colorful figure who was killed in the Battle of the Alamo. But so was a blacksmith from Washington, Arkansas, named James Black. In the early 1800's a blacksmith was a very important man, especially a good one. The whole community depended on its blacksmith. He made the plows, hoes, wagons, and other farming equipment, and all the repair business in iron and steel. In fact, in the settlement of the West, the blacksmith was a key figure, both business and social wise. And then the blacksmith made guns and knives.

This particular blacksmith, after a short adventure further West, came back to Washington, Arkansas, married and opened up a shop.

His handmade knives began selling like hot-cakes, and his fame became far and wide.

He shaped his knives according to the wants of the customer. It was customary for the person ordering the knife to furnish a pattern of wood or paper of the exact shape and size of the knife wanted. Because Black had served as an apprentice for a silver platter he could plate his knives either in silver or gold. When Black made a knife he would test its sharpness before polishing it. If the knife didn't test out he would throw it away. The temper of all his knives were the same. Only the extra plating raised it in price. His knives sold for five to fifty dollars each.

About this time James Bowie came to Black and gave him a pattern for a knife, saying he would come back for the finished product in sixty to ninety days.

Black made the knife and since he had never made a knife of his own design, made a knife after his own pattern and when Bowie returned he showed both knives to him and offered Bowie either knife at the same price. Bowie picked the knife made after Black's design.

Soon customers requested knives "made like Bowies".

The "Bowie" knife made by Black was made of Damascus steel. It's success was all in the temper and was Black's secret which he took to his grave because his memory failed him in his old age before he could tell anyone.

We all know of Bowie's death at the Alamo where he defended his last breath with his knife.

Large amounts of money were offered to Black for his secret process, but he refused them all. He was continually watched and spied upon, but because of his great courage was able to protect his secret.

Other men made knives in those days and are still being made, but no one made the "Bowie" knife but James Black, and at Black's death his secret of tempering steel was lost forever.

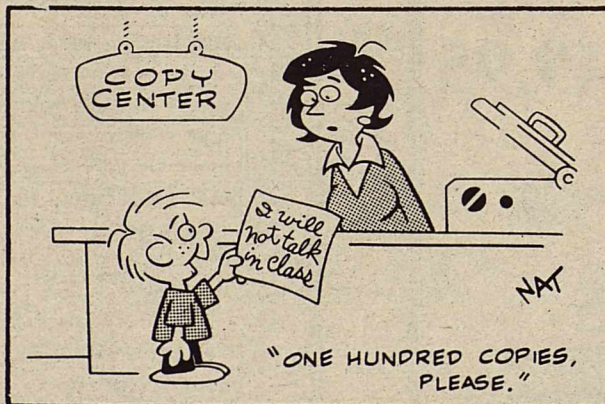

# ADDING LUSTER TO THOSE LATER YEARS

In addition to proteins, carbohydrates and fats, we must ensure an adequate intake of vitamins, minerals and trace elements. 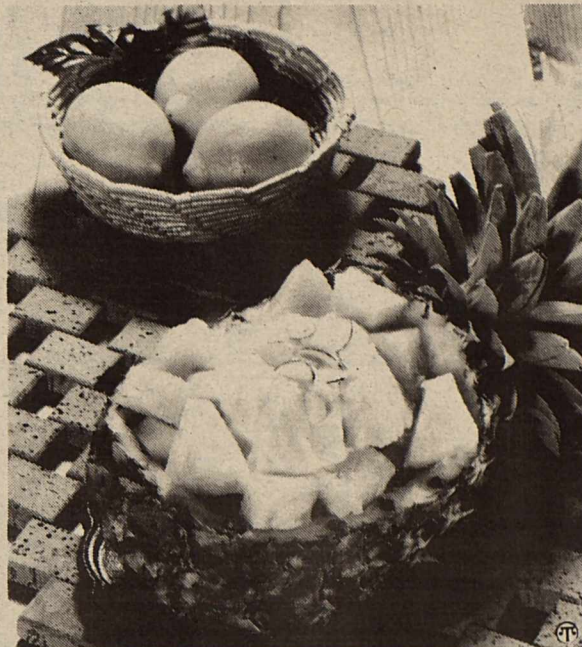

Foods that help satisfy the body's need for fiber include whole grains, oatmeal, green leafy vegetables and rice.

**Have your blood pressure checked regularly**—Hypertension, or high blood pressure, is responsible for more than 30,000 deaths in the U.S. each year. This serious condition may lead to stroke, heart attack or kidney failure. Fortunately, hypertension can be treated effectively if it's detected.

**Update vaccinations**—Older adults tend to neglect needed vaccinations. Pneumonia, influenza and even tetanus still kill tens of thousands of adults each year, and these infections can easily be prevented by a regular vaccination program. A pneumococcal vaccination is a once-in-a-lifetime inoculation recommended for all people over 50. Flu shots should be updated annually, and tetanus boosters updated every 10 years.

- 1 large Dole Fresh Pineapple
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon peel
- 1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds, toasted

Cut one-third off side of pineapple leaving crown. Remove fruit from both sections leaving shells intact. Core and dice fruit. Chill pineapple 1 hour. Spoon pineapple into large shell. Combine sugar and cornstarch in a small saucepan. Stir in 3/4 cup water. Cook, stirring, until mixture boils and thickens. Remove from heat. Stirring rapidly, beat in egg until blended. Stir in lemon juice and peel. Cool completely. Fold in whipped cream. Serve over chilled pineapple. Top with almonds. Serves 4 to 6.

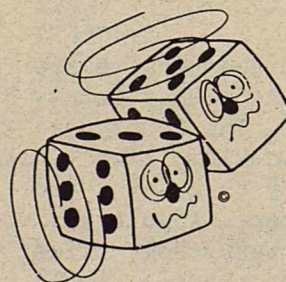
