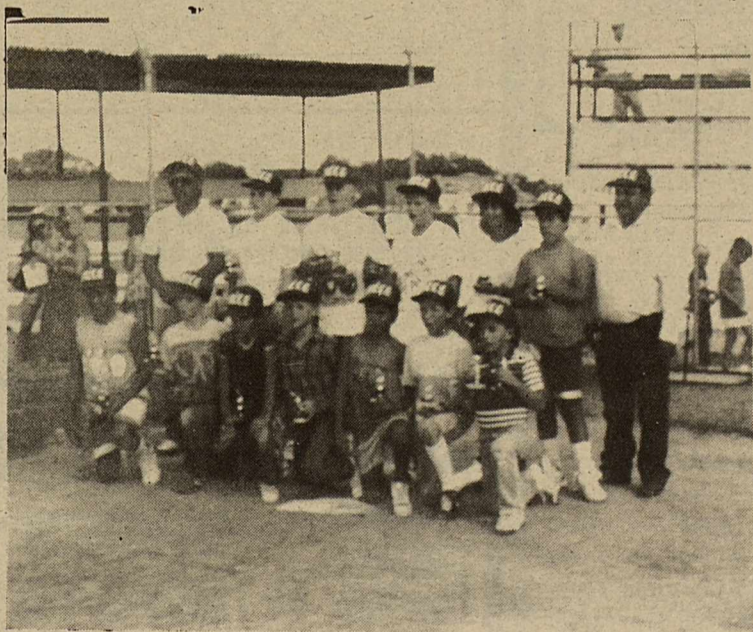

Turkey nests are usually made at the bottom of a tree. Most nests have a long narrow opening into the brush of the area. The nests are usually a third of a mile from water. The hens lead their babies into the area around the nests to find insects which they feed on for the first few months. These are called brood lanes.

About eighty percent of the hens attempt to nest and about thirty five percent of these actually end up with a clutch of eggs.

Turkeys will re-nest; about thirty percent of these succeed where they failed the first time. The average clutch is about nine eggs and about ninety percent of the eggs laid will be fertile.

Young turkeys, or poults, reach maturity in spite of predators, mainly owls and hawks; especially the first five months. Cool temperatures and rain are very devastating to the young turkey when they are twelve to fifteen days old.

Poults of this age can only fly short distances. If they fly into small roosts the hens can't protect them from the elements with her wings. When they grow older, feathers develop enough to protect them better from the elements.

Up to three weeks of age the poults are easy to keep track of; then other hens with their poults tend to form family groups which

protects them more against danger. These groups will stay together until the next mating season.

Usually the mating gobblers outnumber the receptive hens. In most locations hunting is open after the hens start incubating their eggs in late April, since the gobblers or "toms" do not share in nesting or rearing their offspring.

Because the hunting season must depend on the weather, the season can be either too early or too late. Turkeys are closely studied to determine when to set the hunting season and also to attempt to raise the turkey population.

The wild turkey, due to expert management, is found in the lower forty eight states. In some places it has never been before, it is now found in Europe and South America.

Benjamin Franklin once proposed the turkey as our native bird, but I don't know why the eagle was finally chosen.

The Pittman Robertson Act of 1937, using Federal funds for wildlife restoration and combined with the handing down of our ancestors' knowledge of wildlife restoration, the turkey population is the highest it has ever been.

Turkeys keep to areas where they can feed on nuts or acorns but are sometimes forced to feed on grass seeds and watercress from seeps.

Turkeys are imprinted from birth to remain in the same region.

The greatest loss comes from natural predators, mainly the bobcat and the coyote. But perhaps the greatest enemy is poacher - spelled MAN.

MUNOZ RECEIVES BACHELOR'S DEGREE

COLLEGE STATION -- Sandra L. Munoz of Brackettville received a bachelor's degree in health education at Texas A&M University's 1988 spring commencement exercises. She has also been named to the "Distinguished Students" list for the semester, which requires that a student be registered for 15 or more semester hours and earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio (out of a possible 4.0) during the most recent grading period.

A total of 3,103 degrees were awarded, including 2,566 bachelor's, 425 master's and 112 doctorates.

REFLECTIONS

Abraham Lincoln. What do you know of him? As the 16th President of this nation, we may remember him as a tall man (6 feet 4 inches), slender (never weighing more than 180 pounds), and awkwardly dressed (he never had enough money for good clothes). There's More!

Lincoln stands as a man of honesty - a rare commodity in any age. His nickname is inscribed indelibly in his character -- "Honest Abe." Lincoln absorbed the Bible early and late in life. He became acutely aware of God's appeal for integrity, soundness, and sincerity. He despised falsehood and delighted the truth.

Hard work shaped Lincoln's life. As a young man, he split rails to make fences. Those 12 hour work-days, swinging an axe, cutting down "saplings" and splitting and cutting them up in 10-12 foot lengths formed a work-pattern from which he never deviated. A curse settles upon any people who fail to carry out God's command to "earn his bread by the sweat of the brow."

Concern for others marks the life of that century-ago beloved American President. One day a visitor went to the White House to see Mr. Lincoln. He could not be found. His young son noted the plight of the visitor and said his father was at the railway station. When the visitor remarked that he didn't know the President, the young boy said: "Just look for a tall man who is helping someone. That's my Dad."

True greatness does not come in self-prescribed terms. It's couched in qualities that are demanding. Maybe that's why only a few "Lincoln's" dot community life appear on the pages of history.

applicant, seeks to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 23-2671, as amended pursuant to S11.122, Texas Water Code, and Texas Water Commission Rules 31 TAC SS295.1, et seq.

Certificate of Adjudication No. 23-2671, was issued to Maverick County W.C.I.D. No. 1 on August 15, 1983. The certificate, as amended, authorizes the diversion and use of a total of 2049 acre-feet of water per annum from the Rio Grande, Rio Grande Basin, for municipal and domestic purposes, livestock and industrial purposes and the diversion of an unspecified quantity of water for non-consumptive hydropower purposes in the generation of hydro-electric power at its power plant, approximately 9 1/2 miles northwest of Eagle Pass in the Poindexter and Burns Survey 58, Abstract No. 781, Maverick County, Texas. Waters authorized for irrigation and other uses Paragraph 2.B.(1) are to be diverted from the Rio Grande at a maximum rate of 600 cfs and at a maximum rate of 1500 cfs for hydro-electric power operations. This quantity includes the 600 cfs for irrigation and other uses (Paragraph 2.B. (2)).

The diversion point for the above water is about 20 1/2 miles southwest of Brackettville, in Kinney County, Texas. The water is conveyed through a canal from the diversion point to the power plant.

The applicant now seeks to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 23-2671, as amended, to authorize an increase in the rate of diversion for hydro-electric power purposes from 1500 cfs to 1700 cfs, which will include the 600 cfs for irrigation and other uses, and to quantify the maximum total of water authorized for non-consumptive hydropower purposes as being 1,085,966 acre-feet per annum, all being more fully set out in the application.

Application No. 23-2671B was received on May 2, 1988, and accepted for filing on May 27, 1988. The Executive Director has reviewed this application and declares it to be administratively complete.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person requests a public hearing. Any such request must be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and telephone number of the requester; (2) the application number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) a brief explanation of how the requester or persons represented by the requester would be adversely impacted by the granting of this application; and (4) a clear statement of the objections of the requester or represented persons.

This application will be presented to the Commission for final decision on September 6, 1988 at 9:00 a.m. in Room 118 of the Stephen F. Austin State Office Building, 1700 N. Congress Avenue, Austin, Texas unless a sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. If a hearing request is filed, and the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue relevant to the decision on the application, and/or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission will remand the application for public hearing. If this application is remanded for hearing, no further notice of the hearing or hearing date will be issued other than advising all interested persons of the time and place where the hearing is to convene. Therefore, all individuals who wish to be notified of the setting of a hearing must submit a written request for notification to the Texas Water Commission.

STUDENTS STUDY CHINESE CULTURE

The South Texas Project Unit 1 reached the 50 percent testing plateau on Monday (June 27), another milestone in its ascension to full power operation.

The amount of electricity produced at the plant has increased as the power level has increased. The unit is now supplying about 500,000 kilowatts to South Texas customers. CPL customers are receiving about one-fourth of that electricity.

"It is noteworthy that STP is now contributing considerable amounts of power

during the hot summer months, which typically is the period of highest electricity usage," said Tom Shockley, CPL President and Chief Executive Officer.

The plant has generated 184 million kilowatt-hours of electricity since it began operation for low-power tests in early April. The electricity is being distributed to customers of the project's partners, CPL, Houston Lighting & Power Co., and the cities of San Antonio and Austin. The amount of electricity produced thus far is the energy equivalent of more than 300,000 barrels of oil or 111,000 tons of coal.

A voluntary self-assessment of the first half of power ascension has been completed by the plant's operators and submitted for review to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission. The NRC is also conducting an assessment of operations up to the 50 percent level to evaluate the plant's progress and its readiness to proceed to 100 percent output. The next plateau is the 75 percent power level.

STP's two 1,250-megawatt units will generate the energy equivalent of 25 million barrels of oil annually when fully operational. CPL has asked the Public Utility Commission to begin a review of the Unit 1 start-up status in anticipation of completing the required start-up testing later this summer. The company, through a joint petition with HL&P, has asked the PUC to begin the process of certifying that the plant is in commercial operation.

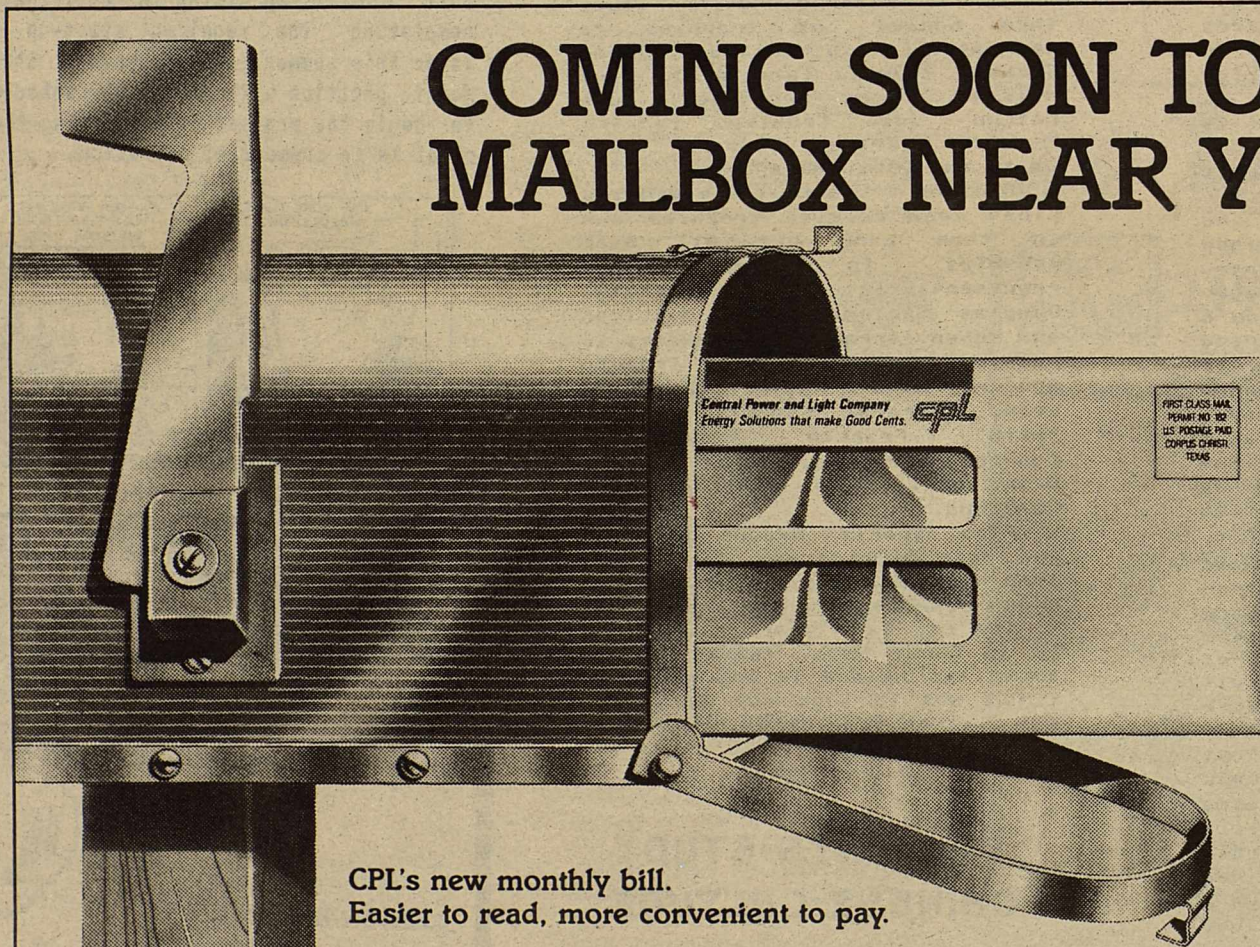

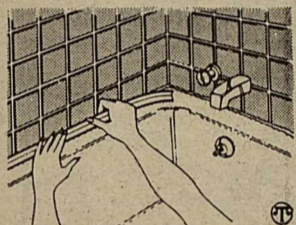

Lower phone rates set for elderly disabled Texans who are poor

AUSTIN—Reduced telephone rates go into effect July 1 for older disabled Texans who live in poverty, according to state officials who worked out the plan with telephone company representatives in response to recent legislation.

Under Tel-assistance Service, phone companies offer a 65 percent reduction in the basic monthly local charge. The reduced rate does not apply to installation, touch-tone, custom calling, long-distance or similar charges.

"The program was established by the Legislature, which required all 66 telephone companies that serve Texas consumers to participate," said Marlin W. Johnston, commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Services.

The Texas Public Utility Commission is responsible for rules governing participation by telephone companies. The human services department will take applications for the service and determine eligibility. The department will furnish telephone companies with a monthly list of eligible Texans.

To be eligible, a person must live in Texas, be the head of a household, be at least 65 years old, be disabled and have income at or below the federal poverty level. The 1988 poverty level for a one-person household is \$480.83 per month. The income limit for a two-person household is \$644.16; a three-person household, \$807.50; and a four-person household, \$970.83. For each additional person, add \$163.33 per month.

A person may have only one telephone line and may not have optional extended area service. People without telephone service must pay installation charges.

Johnston said application forms will be mailed to potentially eligible Texans in the department's files. Telephone companies will mail information about Tel-assistance service to all customers starting in September.

Application forms and information are available by calling a toll-free number, 1-800-343-8353.

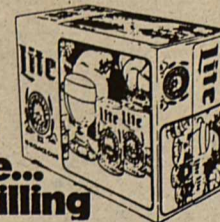

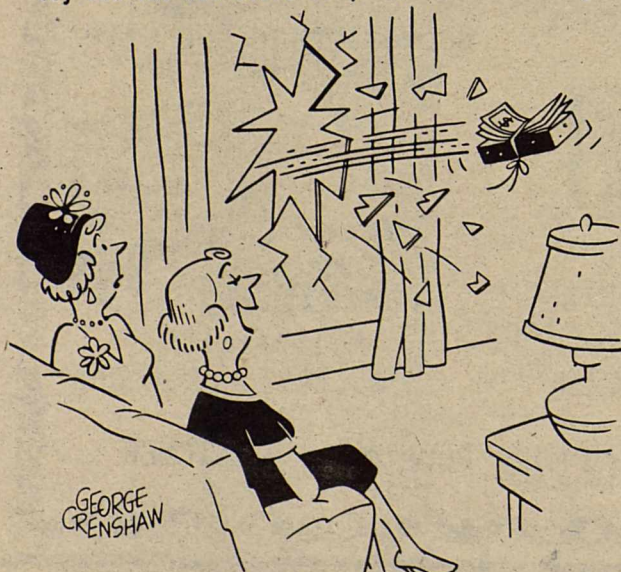

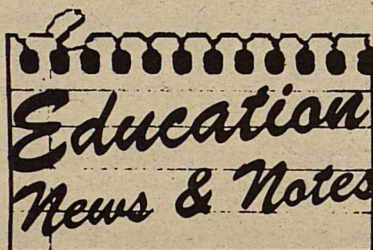
else. The only difference between us and a boy is the price of the toy.

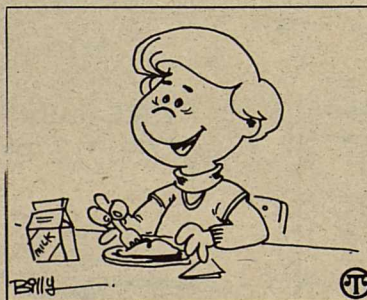

- Request that teachers educate students about eating disorders—especially what factors may contribute and how they are tied to society's pressures about how one is supposed to look.

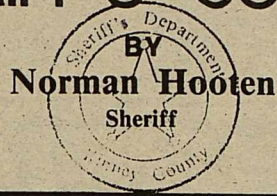

SHERIFF'S CORNER



An 18 year old Florida man was arrested for Public Intoxication Friday, July 1st at 3:00 a.m., and at the time of this writing he remains in jail under investigation for Auto Theft out of Florida. The man has been identified as Martin Conchola, an illegal alien from Mexico. Conchola was found passed out drunk in the vehicle, a 1975 Ford pickup, approximately 14 miles east of Brackettville on the wrong side of the road on Hwy 90 at 3:00 a.m. by Deputy Sheriff David Luna who responded to a call from the Border Patrol about the vehicle. After the man sobered up he was questioned about the vehicle and his citizenship status. His story just did not ring true, and further investigation during the day caused us to contact Riverview, Florida, authorities. This led to the discovery that the vehicle was stolen out of that city and had been entered wrong into the NCIC computer; therefore it did not show as stolen when the license plate number was run through the Crime Information Center. The registered owner of the vehicle has already come to Brackettville and picked up the vehicle and returned it to Florida. He related that the vehicle was stolen from an orange grove where he and the suspect were working. We are still waiting for confirmation from Florida authorities to determine if they intend to prosecute and obtain extradition of the suspect. The Border Patrol has a "hold" on the suspect, and he will be processed and deported if Florida declines prosecution.

Six local men were arrested Saturday night and charged with Disorderly Conduct for fighting at a dance being held at the Civic Center. Four of the men were jailed. One was transported to Val Verde Hospital for treatment of injuries, and the last was located and charged the following day. Disorderly Conduct by fighting with another in a public place is a Class C Misdemeanor. The arresting officers were Chief Deputy David Luna and Chief of Police Johnny Fritter. All six cases were filed in Municipal Court and tried by City Judge Bill Thurber.

Some of you may have noticed the ad which appeared in last week's Cavalryman directly below the Sheriff's Corner on page 7. This ad called for suggestions from local citizens as to how to make better use of the Civic Center. I personally think this is a great idea, and it brings to mind how the Civic Center was used in the town where I lived as a teenager. During the summer months it was used primarily as a daytime teen center with adult supervision and teenage assistants. Various items of entertainment for young people were provided, including a couple of trampolines, weight lifting equipment, games of various types, etc. Homemade sandwiches, cokes and candy were sold at a nominal fee providing nourishment for the kids using the center. Free dances ("sock

hops") were held each week-end with popular records of that era providing the entertainment, which was once again supervised by adult volunteers.

I am, by this item in this column, suggesting to the County Commissioners Court that they consider this idea for the Kinney County Civic Center. Our young people really do not have much here to entertain them, and surely such a program would be a good investment in our youth. The county would not have to invest much in equipment as many of the items of entertainment such as video games, soft drink and candy machines, and possibly even a trampoline or two might possibly be provided by vendors dealing in these items. Surely both the city and county could make this a cooperative project, and I am sure that we have local adults who could find time to volunteer their services as adult supervisors for both daytime activities and week-end dances. About the only expense involved would be the utilities, and even though we all know the price of electricity and water is high, I still feel we owe something to our young people; at least the chance to have a good time and the chance to gather together somewhere without the involvement of drugs, booze and sex.

This is just an idea I thought I would throw out there for consideration. Maybe some of you have better ideas. If so, let your County Commissioners hear about them. Let's all try and get involved and active in making Brackettville, Fort Clark and Kinney County a safer, happier, more productive community and county. This can only happen if we pull together, putting aside political differences and personal dislikes that after all do not contribute to the overall benefit of the citizens of this county. THINK ABOUT IT!
