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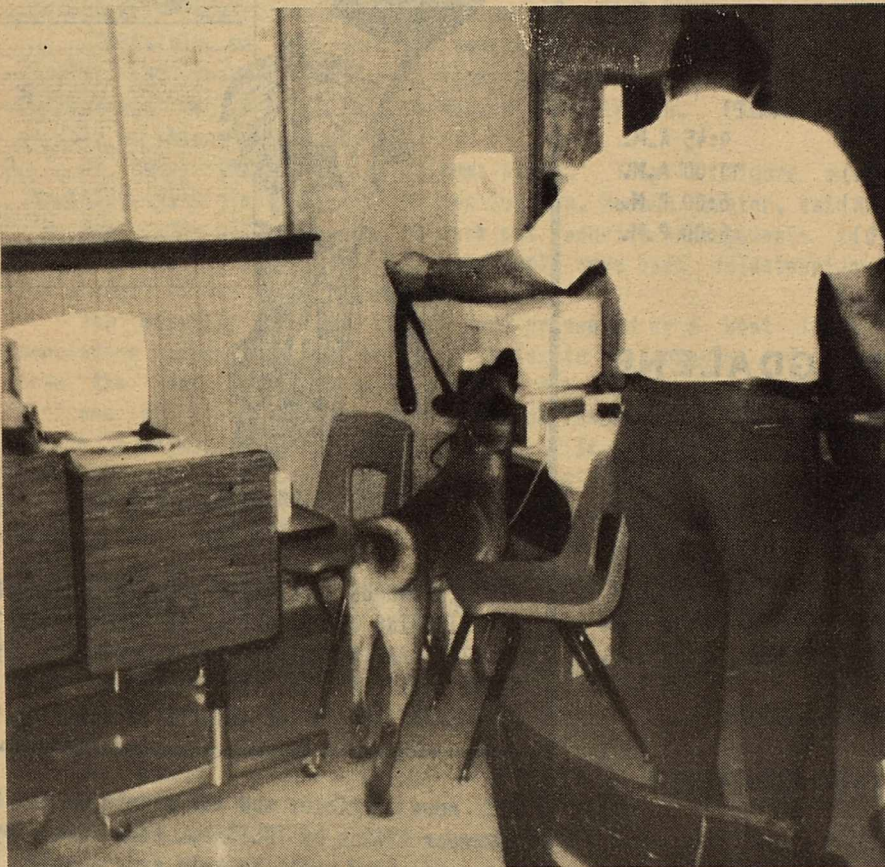

### SCHOOL CHECKED BY DRUG DOGS

Trainers with dogs went through Brackett Independent School District building by building, class by class Friday, March 3rd at 10 a.m. in an unannounced drug search.

Two year old Waldo and 7 year old Rex, 2 Belgian Malanois from Holland, can smell four different drugs; marijuana, cocaine, heroin and methamphetamines. The dogs will automatically sit when they smell one of the drugs. They are then rewarded with a rubber ball to play with.

This surprise inspection of school buildings and grounds had been planned for two weeks with only four people having knowledge of it: Mr. McCall, Superintendent; Mr. Schermerhorn, H.S. Principal; Mr. Mills, Elementary Principal and Mrs. Harrison, Guidance and Drug Counselor.

Cindy Parks and Bob Barnes, trainers, took the dogs through the buildings class by class, checking restrooms, lockers and the school parking lot. The dogs checked the metal pipes in the weightroom and the computers in the Computer Lab. There were no drugs found anywhere on Campus.

Bob McCall stated, "I just wanted the community to know that the kids are not using drugs on Campus. I have been listening to

## BULLIS BLADES WILL BE BACK

In a complete reversal of their original stance, the San Antonio Museum Association this week began negotiations with the Fort Clark Springs Association for a temporary display of the swords presented to famed fighter Lt. John Bullis in 1882 by the people of Western Texas and Kinney County. The Association requested the swords for display during the Ft. Clark Trooper's Reunion the weekend of April 21-23. The Museum People refused, as they had others seeking the swords at the Witte Museum.

"They're in a box somewhere," Nelson Allen, San Antonio Express-News Reporter said during a telephone interview on Mar. 7th. "They don't know exactly where they are... they've got 'em, they just don't know where, down in the basement somewhere."

The Wed. March 1, story Nelson wrote was picked up and carried by the Association Press News Service to other newspapers. The Museum people received some calls at their office. It doesn't incite people to give stuff to the museum if they think it 's going to sit in a box. Somewhere. They sent someone to start looking for the swords. They're coming back to Kinney County.

"Certainly we can work out something to put the swords on display, at your museum," said Rick Casagrande, Keeper of the Collections for the San Antonio Museum Association. "There's a variety of things we can do."

"I think they're going to come along. They'll figure out something, just give them time," Don Swanson, Museum Curator, said.

Some time will be needed to work out security arrangements to insure the safety of the swords, but people have been volunteering for a vigil if the swords make a short stay.

The minutely crafted sabers were presented by a West Texas population saddened to hear of his transfer to San Antonio, and away from the land where he brought peace. Not to be outdone, the Citizens of Kinney County, raised enough funds to buy Lt. John Bullis a bejeweled sword of like quality. It said: "Presented by the people of Kinney County as a token of their undying gratitude."

The gratitude didn't die. Those same families that kicked in some gold in 1882 are still here today. And the historians know. People like Charles G. Downing, J. Lee Ballantyne, Charlie Ward keep kicking until they make something happen. And we did. And we will.

## WAINWRIGHT'S SON FOUND

The Annual Fort Clark Trooper's Reunion will be held April 21, 22 and 23 at Fort Clark Springs in Brackettville. This popular event is a homecoming for cavalry troopers and their families who lived at Ft. Clark during its active military days. Troopers from across Texas and around the country, many from the 5th and 112th units, will return to Fort Clark Springs April 21-23 for the reunion weekend.

A special addition to the reunion this year will be the dedication of the Commanding Officer's Quarters, the "Wainwright House," with an official Texas Historic Building Marker.

"The house served the Fort's Commanding Officers, including Col. Ronald S. Mackenzie and Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright. Architectural features include a central entry, wood-frame porch, six-over-six windows, second-floor dormers, and four large chimneys with sculpted caps," the marker reads. The historical marker is the result of more than two years work by Peter Pohl, the residential manager, and Dr. James Moore of Baytown, owner of the home. John Wayne and his family also lived in the home during the filming of "THE ALAMO" in 1959.

The marker ceremony is scheduled for 2 p.m. on Sat. April 22, 1989, in front of the impressive home near the end of Colony Row. A home tour of select residences in the historic district will follow the dedication ceremony.

Gen. Wainwright's son, Capt. Jonathan M. Wainwright, was contacted to speak at the dedication ceremony. "Thank you for thinking of me," he said in a March 5 letter from his home in Keystone Heights, Fla. "I appreciate the honor, but regret I cannot accept the invitation due to my many commitments which I must try to curtail due to my "tender" years - 76.

rumors that it has been here four years now." He went on to say, "There are some that definitely come here under the influence, but they are not using here."

The drug dogs & trainers were from Global Training Academy Inc. in San Antonio. They've checked 15 school districts involving approximately 50 schools. Ms. Parks reported, "That the dogs are more apt to find more drugs in bigger districts." She went on to say, "We've had 100 demonstrations at assemblies with 6000 people attending."

The drug dogs that were purchased by the Border Patrol Station in Del Rio were trained at Global Training Academy, Inc. It takes 8 to 10 weeks for the initial training of dogs between the ages of 1 & 6.

Ms. Parks told how Rex has gone through a bag of chicken bones found in the garbage and discovered a bag of marijuana mixed in.

After the check in the parking lot, where everything was reported clean, Mr. McCall remarked, "This may be done on a quarterly basis."

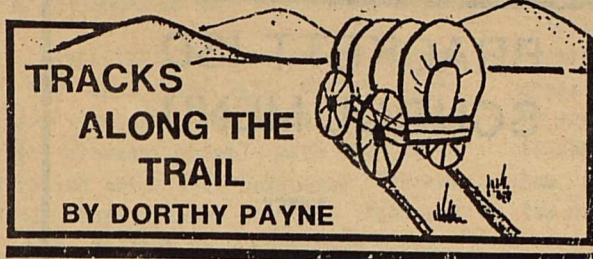

It might be hard to believe but the humble burro is one of the wildest animals in America. Nothing on our continent can whip him if he wants to fight. People say he is lazy, stubborn, flea bitten and contrary, but he doesn't mind because he is tough skinned and hardy.

He is not a native of this country, but was brought over here by the early Spanish settlers. Give him two generations of freedom and the little burro can become a wild beast with surprising intelligence and power. So don't ever get a burro mad at you.

Most people say the mountain lion is the fiercest of American wild animals. He kills horses, mules, cattle, deer and smaller animals, but he seldom kills a burro.

Men in the United States Forest Service have many stories to tell about the bravery of the burro. They are colored like their surroundings and are even hard to find by their masters when they stray.

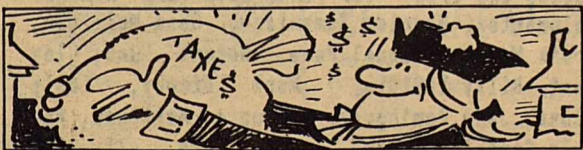
Mexican men, boys and Americans up and down the Rio Grande, know about burros and use them for pack horses.

In some Mexican markets along the Texas and Arizona borders, wares are brought to market by burro back. They are pets for the children being much cheaper than shetland ponies.

In the wild, usually a herd of twenty or more run together. One "jack" will be "head man." He protects the herd and whips any other male who contests him.

A colt is born to each Jenny about one a year. He is about the size of a dog and easy to tame. The number of the wild burro has been on the decrease. Cattlemen have killed a lot of burros because they are blamed for eating up the grass in their pastures. When the burros claim a spring or water hole they will let no other animals drink.

Sometimes burros are killed to make dogfood but they are remembered for being the gold prospectors partner. In fact, one famous gold mine in the 1880's was really found by a burro. His owner was trailing his straying burro. Finally, the prospector found his burro calmly browsing up a box canyon. Since it was getting dark the prospector camped there for the night. When daylight came he noticed some ore near the morning campfire which proved to be gold. The prospector staked a claim and became a rich man. Of course, the little burro lived "high on the hog" for the rest of his life.

**DOLORES RANEY ATTENDS SEMINAR**

COLLEGE STATION--County & District Clerk, Dolores Raney, of Kinney County joined about 550 other officials for the 17th Annual County and District Clerks' Seminar her Feb. 27, 28 and March 1.

As an enrollee in the continuing education seminar, Dolores Raney participated in the three-day training effort which focused on the theme, "Yearning to Learn...Learning to Serve."

Ms. Raney said, "The responsibilities of our office are quite extensive, and this was reflected in the seminar program. Some 35 sessions involving about 50 speakers or panel members made up the seminar."

Separate sessions were held for district clerks and county clerks in a number of instances, with joint sessions following.

Major discussion subjects included a preview of the 71st regular legislative session, tips on making an effective budget presentation, registry of court and fees of court, fundamentals of legal research, management of personnel and administration, and open records in the clerk's office.

The seminar for clerks is an annual education program of the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is conducted in cooperation with the County and District Clerk's Association of Texas.

Clerks who took part in all sessions of the seminar were awarded 1.2 continuing education units (CEUs) or 12 credit hours by the office of Continuing Education at Texas A&M. The clerks are required to earn 20 hours of continuing education every two years.

President of the County and District Clerks' Association is Raymond O. Dennis of Levelland, Hockley County Clerk; and John Dickson of Austin, district clerk in Travis County, is first vice president. Doris Lange of Fredericksburg, Gillespie County clerk, is second vice president, and Johnny Appleman of Beaumont, district clerk in Jefferson County, is secretary-treasurer.

Serving as the general chair for the seminar was John A. Gilmartin, while the program chair was Joe M. Rothe, Extension Service specialists with the V.G. Young Institute.

### CARE FOR THE FUTURE

EFFORT AIMS TO CONTROL URANIUM OPERATIONS

Austin(UPI)—A package of 11 bills was filed Friday in the Texas Senate to strengthen state regulation of controversial uranium mining operations in South Texas.

Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi, said the legislation is based on the recommendations of an 18 month long study of the problem by the Senate subcommittee on health services that he chaired.

"These bills will forever end the common practice of allowing mining companies to operate under expired permits indefinitely," he said. "We found this to be one of the most prevalent abuses affecting the citizens of South Texas."

Chevron USA, which has a uranium mining operation near Karnes County community of Panna Maria, has been operating under a state license that expired in 1980, and has been under fire from a citizens group.

Panna Maria Concerned Citizens has accused Chevron of operating illegally, contaminating groundwater through its 150-acre dump site and exposing residents and farmland to excessive radiation.

The group has filed a formal complaint against Chevron with the state Health Department and has threatened to sue the company.

Chevron officials have responded that the company is operating within state guidelines and has blamed the Health Department for failing to expedite a licensing hearing.

Truan said no major uranium mill tailings dump in Texas has had its license renewed since the Texas Radiation Control Act passed in 1981.

The Houston Police Department has prepared a set of Rules for Parents on How to Raise a Juvenile Delinquent.

I think these ideas are worth our consideration.

1) Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.

2) When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute. It will also encourage him to pick up "cuter" phrases that will blow off the top of your head later.

3) Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is 21 and then let him "decide for himself."

4) Avoid use of the word "wrong." It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he is being persecuted.

5) Pick up everything he leaves lying around—books, shoes and clothes. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all responsibility on others.

6) Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and drinking glasses are sterilized, but let his mind feast on garbage.

7) Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children. In this way they will not be too shocked when the home is broken up later.

8) Give a child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?

9) Satisfy every craving for food, drink and comfort. See that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.

10) Take his part against neighbors, teachers, policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.

11) When he gets into real trouble, apologize yourself by saying, "I never could do enough for him."

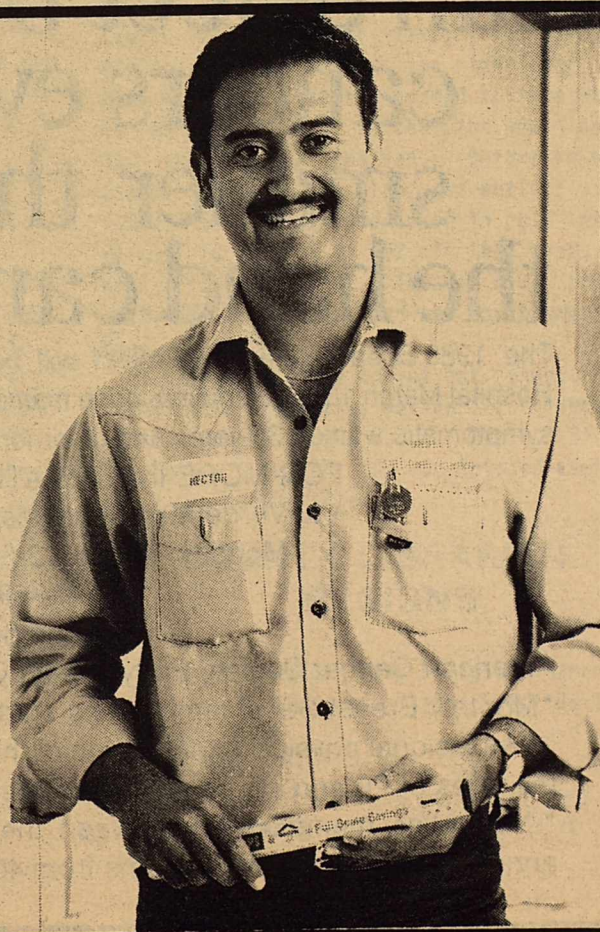
12) Prepare for a life of grief. You will likely have it!

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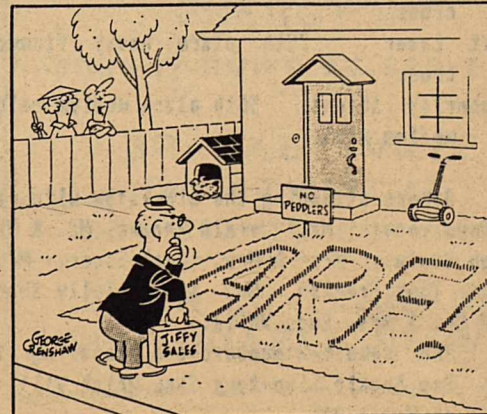

**THREE FILE FOR TRUSTEE ELECTION**

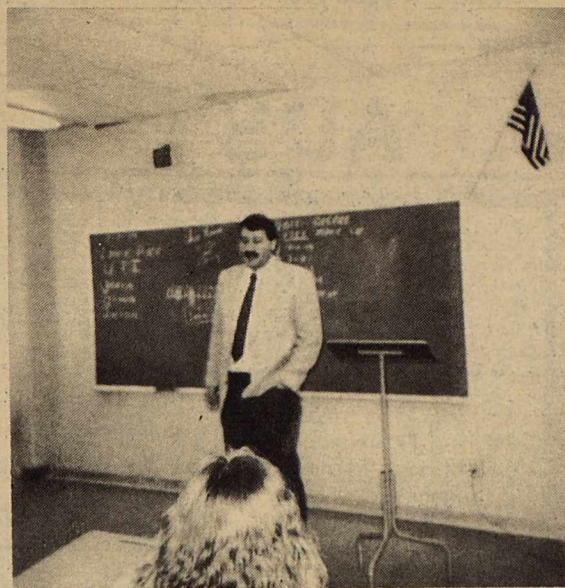
