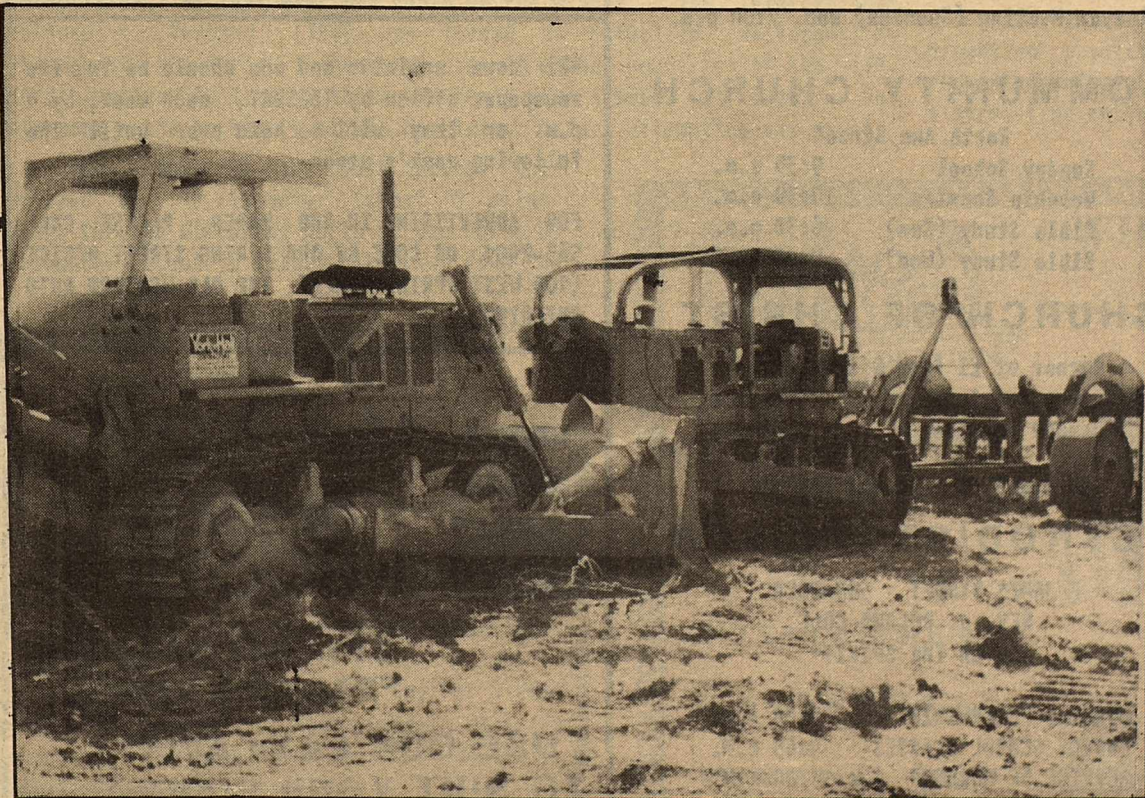


The machinery sitting on the side waiting to be used to level the ground at the site of the touch & go airstrip south of Spofford.

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON LAFB AUXILIARY FIELD

Gene Yancey, on-site Quality Control Supervisor, for King Construction Co. of Corpus Christi, said the project officially began May 2, 1989, when York and Hall started clearing the land. This is a 300 day project with the completion date set for Feb. 25th 1990. Yancey said that they are hoping to turn it over to the Air Force in November as an early Christmas present.

The construction will consist of the building of an 8,000 ft. asphalt runway, construction of a fire station, installation of drainage pipes, building of a fence around the field and numerous other things. The estimated cost of the project is 3.4 million dollars.

At this time they are in the process of moving in heavy equipment, in order to start leveling the strip.

Yancey said, "According to the engineers, there is 224,000 cubic yards of dirt to be moved around." He said, "Once completed, the field will be used by the Air Force for touch and go landings."

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VOLKSMARCHERS ARRIVE

Selma Pathfinder Volksmarch organizers arrived at Fort Clark Springs in Brackettville on Wednesday, July 5 to begin marking trails for the "Super Six" hiking, biking and swimming events this weekend, July 8 and 9. Up to 30 additional Selma Pathfinder club members will arrive before starting time at 7 a.m. on Saturday to help run the American Volkssport Association sanctioned events. Participants can earn medals and credit for hiking, biking and swimming by registering at the Fort Clark Springs Activity on Scales Road from 7 a.m. until noon on both Saturday, July 8 and Sunday, July 9. In addition to the three events each day, a special "Night Walk" will begin from 4 to 6 p.m. on Saturday.




Volksmarch participants are encouraged to take each event at their own pace. These are noncompetitive events, not tests of speed or endurance. Those who register, and complete the required distances, are declared winners and will receive a beautiful red, white and blue medal. Registration for the first event is \$5.00 and \$2.50 for each additional event.

The Selma "Super Six" marks the first time Volkssport events have offered at Fort Clark Springs. "We've passed by Fort Clark on our way to West Texas Walks, and we always wondered what it would be like to walk here," Selma Pathfinder Club President Jay Spradling said. "We thought it was a nice area, but we have to credit our former president, Bill Lackey, who always said it would be a great place for multiple events," Spradling added. Bill, and his wife, Kathryn, are longtime Fort Clark Springs members. Bill is currently the president of the Texas Volkssport Association, and the regional director for the Southwest Region of the American Volkssport Association.

Volkssporting evolved from running races in Germany. When these events became too competitive, the clubs changed the events to be non-competitive, so that everyone could be the winner. The International Volkssport Verband (IVV) was formed to establish volkssporting throughout the world. There are over 16 member countries of the IVV. Participation is free to those who don't wish a medal or credit, but everyone needs to sign a simple disclaimer before attempting any event.

The events at Fort Clark Springs this weekend are 10 kilometer (about 6 miles) walks through different parts of the Fort, 25 kilometer (about 15 miles) bike ride down the

Spofford Highway, and 300 meter swims in the pool. Bike rides will be offered on both Saturday and Sunday.

The Brackettville Volunteer Fire Department will provide food and drinks on both days. The Fort Clark Springs Association will sell coffee and donuts in the Activity Center both mornings. Selma Pathfinder club members will offer free refreshments along the trails during the events.

Join the Selma Pathfinders and other AVA members in their goal of promoting physical fitness and good health by encouraging all people, regardless of age, race, color, creed or economic status, to exercise in a stress-free environment this weekend at Fort Clark Springs.

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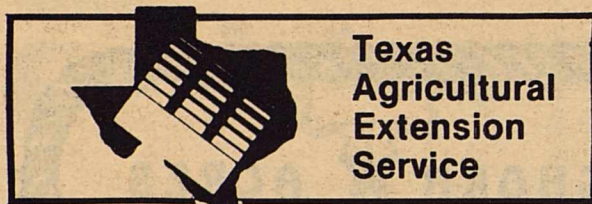
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Texas Agricultural Extension Service

Do you have trouble looking for a place to throw your weekly grass clippings? Well, there is an alternative to dumping or sacking the clippings to be hauled away. Try saving clippings and put them to use in a compost pile.

Besides being a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material and reduce the amount of land-fill space needed.

The compost pile should be 4 to 6 feet wide and any length depending on material and space available. Simple composting method is to alternate 4 to 6 inches of good garden soil. Add manure to the soil layer of plant material to speed up the decomposition. You will need to use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet. The compost pile's top layer should be soil and should form a basin to hold water. Also water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer. Water the pile thoroughly when you have finished building the pile. Add water as needed to keep the material moist, but not soggy because the leaves will decompose slowly if too dry.

Be sure and turn the compost every three to four months to aerate the material and speed up the decomposition process. Within six months to a year, you will have good compost that will enrich your flower beds and add needed nutrients back to the soil. You will also have a place to go with all your grass clippings and leaves around the house.

Area livestock producers need to be careful about grazing animals on the sorghum-type fields. Plant tests have been showing high nitrate levels and also prussic acid. Sorghum plants exhibit nitrate toxicity when stressed from a freeze or lack of moisture. Death from nitrate poisoning and prussic acid is very quick often in a couple of minutes. There are several factors that can help minimize losses. Cattle are particularly susceptible but hungry cattle that have not had quality forage for a while, will be hit harder. It is a good idea to feed some grain once a day when you turn cattle into a sorghum field to reduce the amount they consume in a day's time. The poisoning occurs when hungry cattle eat a large amount of stressed sorghum in a relatively short period of time. For more information feel free to contact my office.

THE ACCIDENTAL TOURIST

Where can you find your favorite fast-food hamburger in Paris? How many packets of laundry soap do you need for a trip to Atlanta? Ask Macon Leary. He's the Accidental Tourist, whose guidebooks are revered by home-loving business travelers who prefer the carpet path between the microwave and VCR over the flight path between New York and London.

And what do you do when your lovely, estranged wife comes back into your life while an irresistibly ditzy dog trainer named Muriel also tugs at your heart? Don't ask Macon. He doesn't have a clue. Not yet at

least.

The Accidental Tourist, based on 1989 Pulitzer Prize winner Anne Tyler's best-seller, is cause to whoop for joy. Both hilarious and heart-warming, it reteams filmmaker Lawrence Kasdan (The Big Chill, Silverado) with Academy Award winner William Hurt (as Macon) and Kathleen Turner (as Macon's wife) for the first time since their incendiary Body Heat. Joining them is Geena Davis, who gives a luminous, Academy Award-winning performance as bubbly, confident and gawkishly tacky Muriel. She's Macon's opposite. And she unexpectedly broadens his narrow, orderly world.

"This odd woman helped me," Macon says. Which is a funny statement. Because odd defines Macon's own screwball kin (Amy Wright, David Ogden Stiers and Ed Begley Jr.). Holed up in their Victorian home, the Learys let the phone ring till doomsday instead of answering it (It may be bad news.). And the pantry is organized alphabetically (Elbow macaroni is "E", not "M" please.).

Using the Leary system, The Accidental Tourist is "T" for terrific. The New York Film Critics Award as 1988's best film and four Academy Award nominations including Best Picture confirm it. Book passage and you will too.

KINJITE FORBIDDEN SUBJECTS

Powerhouse action superstar Charles Bronson ("Death Wish I-IV," "The Great Escape") tears into a vicious inner-city child prostitution ring in this gritty, explosive psychological action-thriller.

Crowe (Bronson) is a veteran L.A. vice cop who almost goes berserk when his young daughter is molested by an unidentified oriental man. Then he must fight his own racial prejudice when he's ordered to hunt down the brutal pimp who's kidnapped a Japanese businessman's little girl. Hindered by police force superiors, Crowe is pushed into a personal war of vengeance as he pits himself against a savage urban empire of drugs and depraved sexual slavery. 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MAMMOGRAM

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AMERICAN COLLEGE OF RADIOLOGY

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services Brackettville, Texas today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast Cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

- A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.
- A mammogram every one or two years

between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

CITY HALL NEWS

Mayor La Gioia went to a seminar last Thursday and Friday in Laredo presented by the Texas Department of Commerce on Economic Development. Thursday's class was on making applications and Friday's class was on grant planning processing, applications and the overall process.

Central Power and Light sent a letter to City Hall regarding a law (Sec. 8, Chapter 231, Acts of the 40th Legislative, Regular Session, Article 974a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes.) stating municipalities may not serve or connect any public utilities to unplatted property within their Extra Territorial Jurisdiction. It goes on to state that in 1989 the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURPA), was amended to include investor owned utilities. What CPL is asking for in writing is a determination from the City of Brackettville whether or not it is going to exercise its authority according to this law. This letter has been sent to Ralph Brown, the City Attorney.

Mayor La Gioia reported that the City of Brackettville will be hiring 5 people, 18 years and over, as contract labor for ten days. All interested persons are to come by and get an application from City Hall.

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BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS

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According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated

that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. The cost is only \$50.00.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Las Vegas, New Mexico is sixty miles or so across the Sangre de Cristo Mountains from Sante Fe. Las Vegas has always been in the right place at the right time and became one of the important cities in New Mexico.

It was a sleepy little village on the Sante Fe Trail before it became a convenient stopping place for travelers. By 1846 it had grown so much General Stephen W. Kearny thought it was the best place to announce the take over of the New Mexico and Arizona territories by the United States. For a few weeks it was the capitol of the Territories until it was moved on to Sante Fe. Naturally there were protests against the takeover, mostly from the Indians who had never believed that Spain or Mexico owned it either.

By 1864, it was becoming a great trading center, with more and more wagon trains coming and going on the Sante Fe Trail. The establishing of Ft. Union, a few miles away, cinched the rapid growth of the town.

The de Baca family owned 20,000 sheep, more than 100 cows and oxen and lived in a beautiful hacienda. The descendants of this family were among my friends when I lived in Las Vegas, and they showed me records dating back hundreds of years.

Six miles west of town the famous hot springs at Montezuma were located. This Spa was known all over the world. This hotel burned and was replaced with a new one in 1884.

William Allen White, a famous writer from Kansas, and known as the "Sage of Emporia" spent his honeymoon at the hotel in 1893. There was a quarter of a mile of porches, rates were \$10.00 for two. After 1900, the Montezuma was closed. Later, it became a Baptist College, then a seminary for Mexican priests. The World College occupied the resort when I lived in Las Vegas. One of five World Colleges, it was dedicated at it's opening by Prince Charles of England in an elaborate ceremony.

Las Vegas was the shops and yard for the Attichison, Topeka and the Sante Fe. There were three scouring mills in Las Vegas. The city was the largest wool-shipping point in the state.

Customers would haul fruit to market in the Mora area, trade it for wheat and bring it to be ground in Las Vegas. No money was involved, but everyone got what he wanted. One of the celebrated Harvey Houses was built here. Customers on the Sante Fe always stopped at the Harvey House for dinner.

On July 4th, 1912 the heavy weight boxing Championship bout between Jack Johnson and Jim, ("The Pueblo Fireman") Flynn was scheduled to be fought in Las Vegas. Sixteen days before the event New Mexican Governor, W.C. McDonald stopped proceedings. On June 25, he decided to let it go on. At the fight

Johnson played with Flynn until the fight was stopped in the ninth round, but everyone lost their shirts because only 5,000 people showed up, 13,000 had been counted on. Later Tom Mix came and started his career making many movies.

Teddy Roosevelt and his rough riders held their reunion in Las Vegas. Just one of the many celebrations in Las Vegas held in the town and the local Highland University.

Maybe you heard that danceable music drifting over the Fort Saturday night. Or maybe you attended the dance at the swimpark where the Eric Scott Band gave us all an enjoyable evening with music to dance to or just to set and listen and soak it up. Anyway the boys in the Band and their leader Eric Scott gave us an evening of music to remember. We appreciate the entertainment here at home and we didn't have to go to San Antonio to hear it.

FIRE DEPT. NEWS

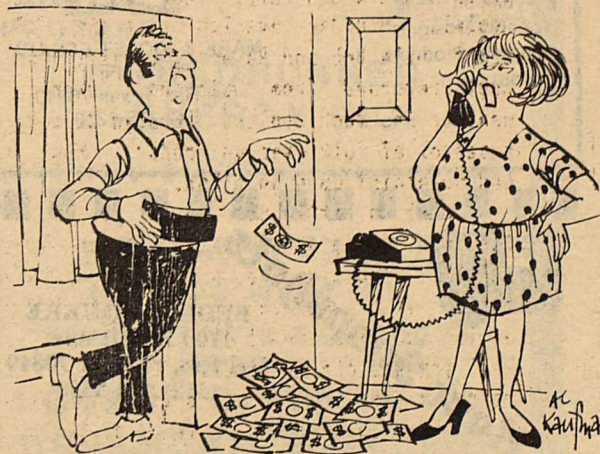

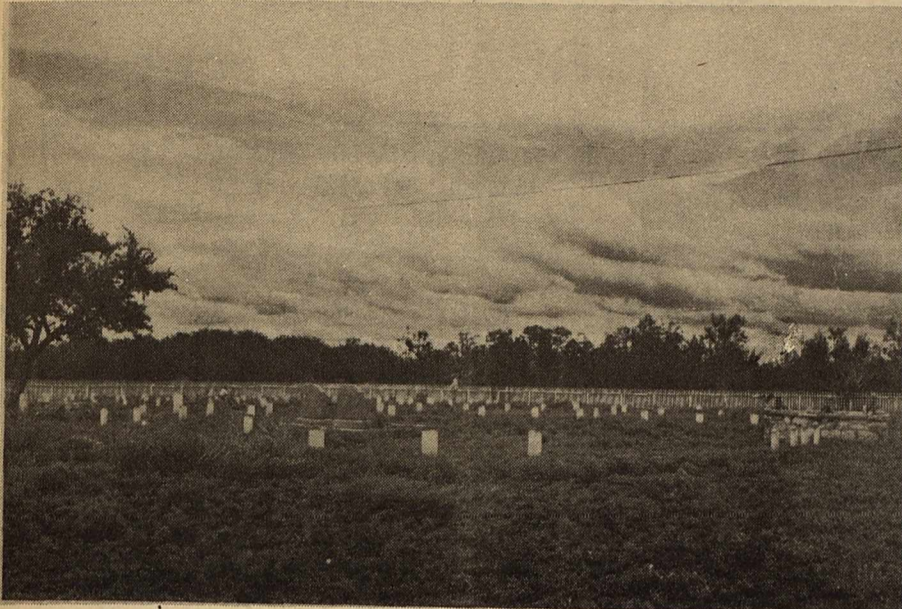

FORT CLARK ARMY DAYS

OLD POST CEMETERY

FORT CLARK, TEXAS

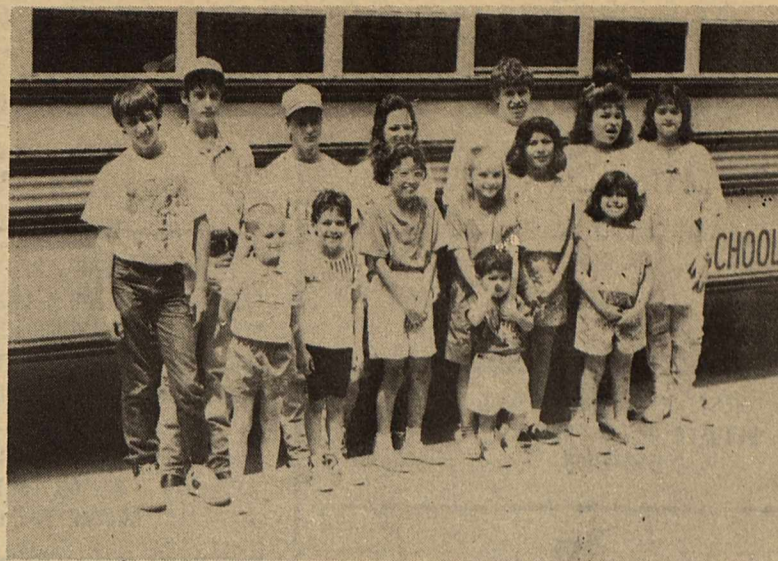
Post Cemetery -- This is an official U.S. War Department photo of the "New Post Cemetery", taken on 6th of August, 1944. It was located just off of Airport Road, East, at the curve in the road approximately halfway from Scales Road (now Fort Clark Road) to the Airport. It had an asphalt parking area and was enclosed with a white picket fence.

When the U.S. Government sold Fort Clark, all persons buried in both Post Cemeteries had to be reburied in another U.S. Government Cemetery, which was Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

In speaking with persons whom were in the Fort Clark area at the time that this happened, I was told that civilian crews were hired to move the buried persons. No head or footstones were moved to Fort Sam Houston. All persons were furnished new headstones when reburied. A lot of the original stones were buried at the location. I viewed evidence of this, when several years ago a new sewer line was installed through this former burial site.

As per the U.S. Army regulations of 1895, and probably earlier versions, under article LIII, paragraphs 494-499, it states that the commanding officer of every post situated on public lands of the United States will see that a suitable portion of such land is, when practicable, set apart and properly maintained for the burial of deceased officers and soldiers and their families and of Government employees. Post cemeteries will be suitably enclosed with a wall or fence of the best material available and will be maintained by the labor of the garrison. A record on interments will be kept by the quartermaster, which will be turned over by him, when relieved, to his successor or transmitted to the Quartermaster-General if the post be discontinued.

The reburial of persons buried at Fort Clark was not unique, as the same thing happened at other discontinued military posts. It is a very interesting experience to walk through the National Cemetery at fort Sam Houston and view the headstones of the personnel from Fort Clark and other old Army Posts.

Fort Clark Springs won out over other suggestions for a fun weekend for 4-H'ers from Bruni-Oilton. The 4-H'ers take a trip every year and this year decided to come to Fort Clark Springs.

There are twenty-two kids in the Bruni-Oilton 4-H Club, but only twenty made the trip with 11 adult sponsors. They arrived Friday night, June 23rd, with the Fort holding things open for them. Saturday, bright and early they took a tour of the Fort, read Historical signs and saw some of the Historical buildings and visited the Museum. Then they were left to enjoy themselves any way they wished, at the pool, on the trails or at the youth center. These kids are industrious enough to earn the money for these trips every year. They sell tickets to raffle off a calf, have bingos, have a booth at the Halloween Carnival and hold dances.

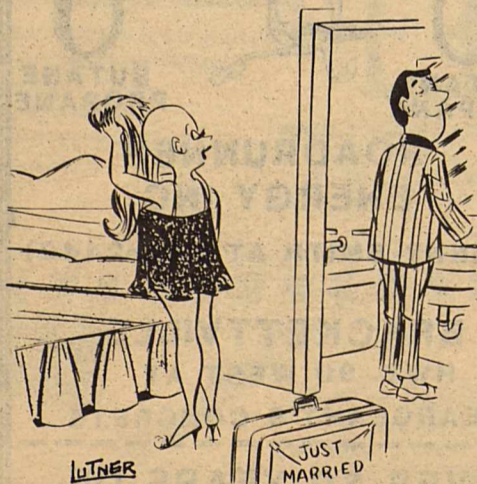

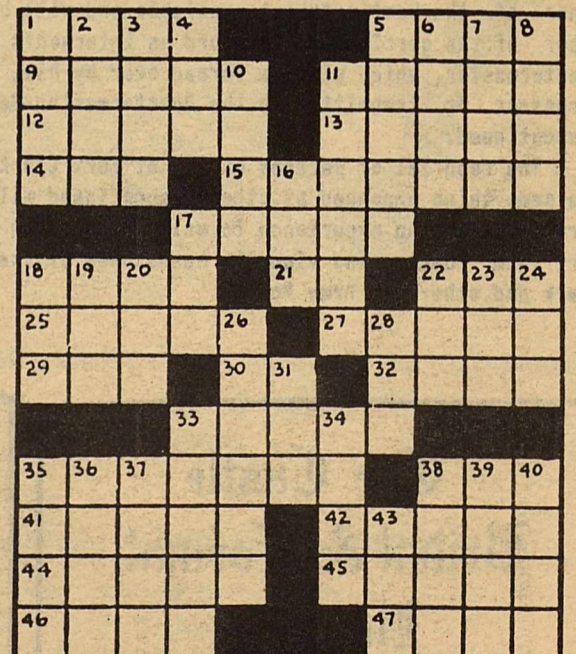
