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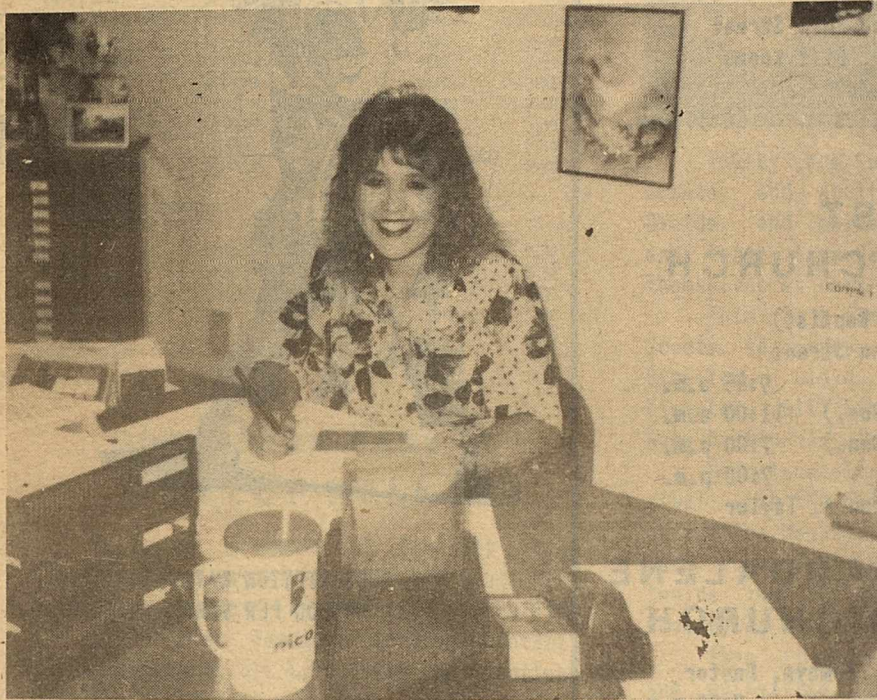

## JOLEE JONES PLAYS IDA RUCKER

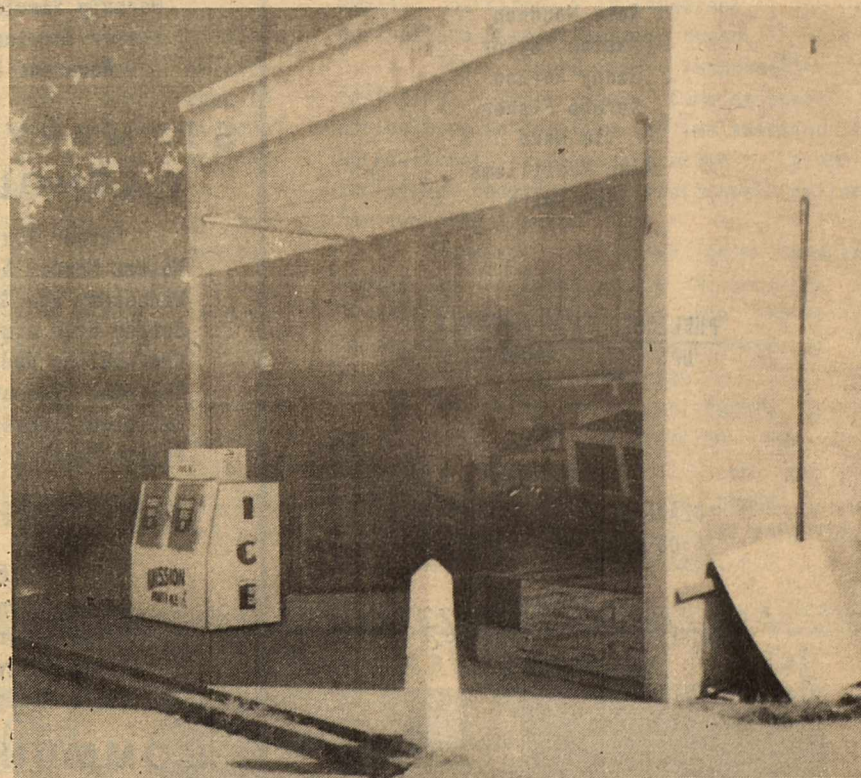

## KELLY HALL AWARDED SCHOLARSHIP

The Houston Endowment has awarded 20 grants to students who have participated in the UIL Academic State Meet Contests and who have compiled an outstanding record of academic and extracurricular achievement.

CRITICAL THINKING IN 4-H ANIMAL PROJECT

4-H projects offer youths opportunities for "critical thinking". Through planning and carrying out a project, youths learn to apply critical thinking skills to real-life problems.

For example, in a project involving raising any animal, a youngster must do the following:

- 1) Compare and contrast animals as the basis for deciding which to keep or to cull, to breed or to buy. Basic training of this nature is done in livestock judging.
- 2) Identify characteristics of individual animals qualify or disqualify as certain breeds or species.
- 3) Learn nutritional ration ingredients needed for health and growth and identify animal parts and their functions.
- 4) Use previous experience and subject matter learned to recognize health problems and courses of action needed.
- 5) Identify errors through recognizing and correcting mistakes. (Incorrectly identifying the breeding cycle or gestation period of an animal can cause a loss of productivity and money.)
- 6) Identify the main idea and generalize from the particular animal project to the entire food eco-system as the youth determines profit or loss at the market price.

A 4-H project can do much more than teach a child production agriculture. It can, in fact, teach critical thinking skills which can be generalized to every area of a young person's life.

4-H IS FOR PARENT'S, TOO

Did you know that 93 percent of American families fit patterns other than an employed father, homemaking mother, and two or more

children living at home.

The U.S. has changed a great deal from the days when the family farm was a way of life and the family was the source of strength and support for all its members. Today, many parents and children do not see each other all day because of job demands and activities of the children.

What does all this have to do with 4-H, an action program for youths aged 9 (third grade) to 19?

4-H offers many opportunities for the 4-H'er and his parents to join together in working toward a common goal. In 4-H, parents and youth can learn and grow together through a sharing of experiences, communication and work. That's why 4-H is an activity for parents, too.

Because of working together in 4-H, lines of communication are open between parents and youth.

4-H encompasses many different projects, and there is something for everyone's interest and lifestyle. Regardless of the project chosen, one of the most important benefits derived is that of strengthening the bond between parents and their children through communication, through experiences and through work.

4-H offers parents, as well as youth, an opportunity to grow, to develop and to learn. So, 4-H is for parents, too.

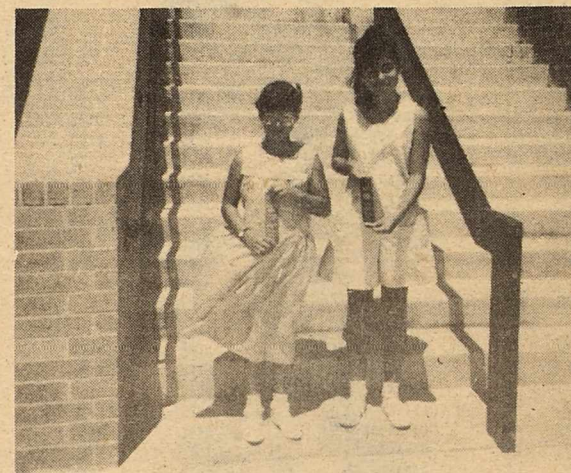
Some make wise investments. The big issue is not whether a person has three talents or a dozen opportunities. That which is important is that one "sink his teeth" into life and be and do something.

### 1989 Property Tax Rates in KINNEY County

This notice concerns 1989 property tax rates for KINNEY County. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

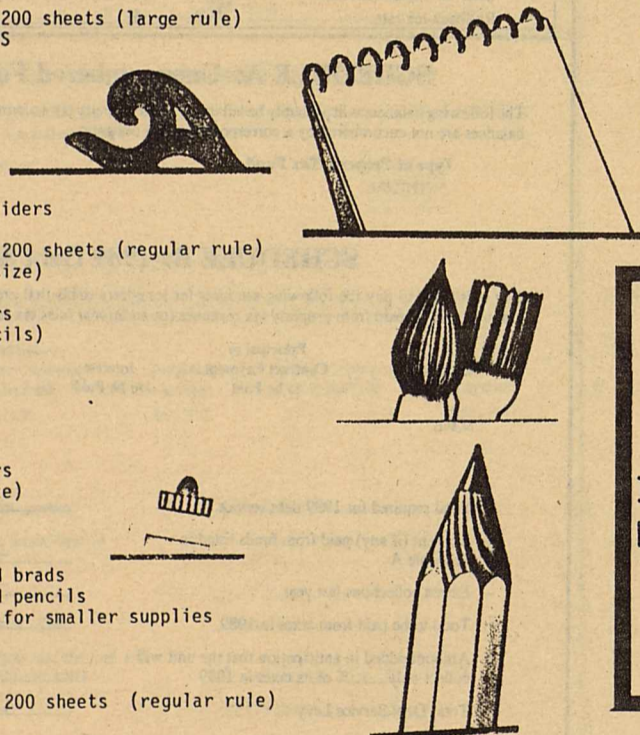

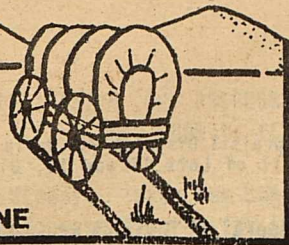

In the southwest "Curanderas" serve as the doctor in various mountain villages. Before modern medicine Curanderas delivered babies, and treated illness and injuries. They used herbs and other roots to treat their patients.

In those earlier days usually only women were Curanderas and their knowledge and methods were handed down through the years. Occasionally a person would prove a failure but they were few.

Curanderas traveled many miles to treat their customers. People in those days had little money and paid the "doctor" with produce from their fields. Some patients came for treatment and asked to pay later, which was always done.

The farming families helped each other as it was needed. Travel was by wagon, burros and horses. There were wood burning stoves in their kitchens and life was hard.

Some farmers stayed in towns in winter so their children could attend the village school.

I spent some time in the mountains in Northern New Mexico and became acquainted with the local Curanderas. She was older than I and more active, but she took me along to dig her supply of roots and herbs that she used to treat her people.

Of course there were too many herbs to remember all of them. But she used one to rub on our shoe tops to keep away snakes. It probably worked because we met no snakes. The pungent odor would keep away the most deadly snake.

She explained her profession by quoting to me the following old Spanish proverb.

"De Curanderas, poeta, y loco, todas tenemos un poco", which translated means,-- "We all have in us a little of the physician, the poet and the madman. In other words it is normal for people to be helpful, feel poetic, and do crazy things from time to time.

**BLAST SITE**



**DEFENSE NUCLEAR AGENCY**

City councilman Lee Weathersbee stated Friday afternoon, that the Defense Nuclear Agency is planning to conduct a high explosion underground blast consisting of 300 tons of high explosives placed 400 feet below the ground.

This blast will occur 30 miles north of Del Rio and about 1 3/4 miles east of the Devil's River between the river and U.S. Hwy 277, in Val Verde County.

The purpose of this blast is to determine the survivability of our underground missile silos and foreign missile silos and military facilities.

The city of Del Rio is opposed to the detonation, because of the environmental impact it may have on Del Rio and the surrounding counties.

Before the test can be conducted, however the Defense Department must prepare an environmental impact study in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act. If any adverse environmental effects are revealed during that assessment, the test won't proceed.

The test will be set off above tunnel test structures located 150-200 feet below the explosives. There is fear of damage of the surface within 2500 feet of the detonation area, and it is unknown what type of damage will be done underground, or how far it will extend. Even though the test is designed to have minimal environment impact

with no surface cratering.

Two of Del Rio's main concerns right now are Amistad Dam and San Felipe Springs. This type of explosion may collapse the springs, which is Del Rio's main water supply. And could possibly cause structure damage to the Amistad Dam, which holds over 67,000 acres of lake water.

The total cost of the project, including construction, hardware purchases and scientific studies, is expected to be \$11 million dollars.

Del Rio was chosen from among seven other sites across the nation after more than a year of studies. The reason being due to the soft porous limestone ground in this area.

Wednesday afternoon the government of Coah. Mexico, passed a resolution to protest the explosion. That will be sent through diplomatic channels to President Bush.

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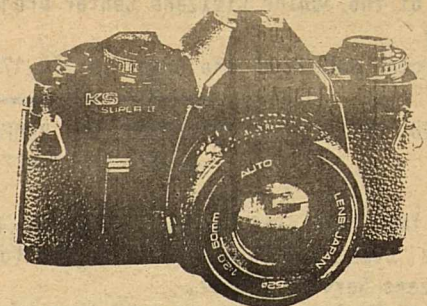
