CP & L REFUND

Customers of Central Power and Light Co. may receive a credit on their electric bills in October. Central Power and Light Co. today (Friday) requested permission from the Public Utility Commission to refund \$20.5 million in fuel overcollections. The amount includes \$19.5 million in fuel savings and \$1 million in interest collected since April 1989.

If the refund is granted, a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of

electricty would receive a credit of approximately \$15.96 on their October bill. The amount of the refund will vary depending on the customer's actual electric use in September.

Overcollections occur when CPL is able to purchase fuel at prices below the set fuel factor approved by the PUC. Several things can affect the price CPL pays for fuel, including contract changes, competition among the spot fuel markets, or the addition of an electric generating unit that uses a lowercost fuel. Unit 2 of the South Texas Project began commercial operation in March 1989.

Since the first unit of the South Texas Project began generating electricity in April 1988, nuclear fuel has saved CPL customers approximately \$30-million dollars through July 1989. At today's prices, it costs about \$.50 cents to produce a million BTU (British Thermal Units) of heat using nuclear fuel, compared to an average of more than \$2.00 to produce the same amount of energy using coal or gas.

Fuel costs and the cost of providing electric service (base rates) are figured separately on customers' bills. CPL's request for a base rate increase in its electric rates is currently being reviewed by the PUC.

As part of an earlier interim rate agreement, a new, lower fuel factor will take effect August 28. This lower factor is a \$32 million decrease over CPL's previous fuel factor.





The Whitetail Institute of North America is a for profit corporation that serves as a central clearinghouse of information, research, and other general matters of topical interest devoted exclusiely to the whitetail deer.

The Whitetail Institute was founded in 1988 by Ray Scott, the nationally acclaimed outdoorsman/conservationist who singlehandedly formed the Bass Anglers Sportsman Society two decades earlier. The stated goal of the Institute is to communicate, in lay language, key findings from the academic and scientific communities that lend pragmatic applicatins to contemporary situations. Once determined, the nutritional values of the consumed vegetation to deer are calculated. Plantings include ryegrass, wheat, oats, certain legumes, and a host of clovers.

GENETIC COMPARABILITY - On Institute property, fawns from Montana and Alberta, Canada are being maintained and monitored separately from a similar number of Alabama fawns. The two general groups are fed and raised under the same conditions to determine what, if any, genetic differences might be evident after several generations of free breeding within each group.

PINTLALA, ALA. -- While some people may argue their taste preferences for certain brands of burgers and colas, whitetail deer have settled on their favorite choice of browse. the Whitetail Institute, shares Scott's enthusiasm for the new clover product. Said Rogers, "in addition to the extended growing season, this new clover product has an exceptionally HIGH PROTEIN CONTENT. Over the period of a year, protein levels in this clover were tested to be over twenty percent, EVERY MONTH OF THE YEAR. The consistantly high year round protein level is a crucial factor in the nutritional development of whitetails, particularly in antler development."

As most experienced deer hunters know, spring and summer are the important seasons in the development of deer. It's during these peak months that unborn fawns receive the foundations that will determine future growth patterns for the rest of their lives. Also, these are the seasons of the year when bucks are growing their antlers. The odds are excellent that a big buck sporting a trophy rack in the hunting season enjoyed a steady and nutritious diet not only in the spring and summer months, but also in the fall and winter.

"We've field tested this clover all over the country," Scott said. "It's performed well, particularly during the hunting seasons, in attracting deer in the states of Alabama, Kentucky, Mississippi, Texas, and other states in between. As far as we can determine, theis clover should do well anywhere in the country except in areas with

This is a busy week with the onset of school and all the activities associated with it. The District Extension Horticulturalist, Dr. Loy Shreve, and I worked on grafting some Chinese varieties of English walnuts the other day. These varieties are just recently introducd in this country and are growing on the Sterling Evans Ranch, north of Brackettville. They are part of a result demonstration plot I have going with Mr. Evans. I would like to have a horticulture tour for homeowners this spring and this will be an ideal spot to see the work taking place.

FALL GARDENING

Gardening is another popular past time in our county. Did you know that a fall garden often produces better quality and higher yielding vegetables than a springsummer garden? Cooler weather means a longer harvest period for many vegetables. You can count on lettuce, collards, spinach, broccoli, cauliflower and brussel sprouts to be a part of your Thanksgiving meal and lettuce and other leafy greens will be sweeter and more tender.

Timing is essential when planning a fall garden. Vegetables adapted to fall gardens can be divided into four groups by their tolerance of freezing temperatures.

Warm season vegetables adapt to fall gardens but they are killed by frost. These include snap beans, southern peas, summer squash, winter squash, cucumbers, sweet corn and early maturing pepper and tomato varieties.

Cool season crops usually damaged by light frost when mature include lettuce, cauliflower, kohlrabi, celery, cabbage and broccoli.

A third group of vegetable are those moderately tolerant of repeated light frosts and they are: carrots, parsnips, beets,, brussel sprouts, leaf lettuce, radishes, ruta bagas and turnips.

The last group are those tolerating night after night of freezing and they include: bulb onions, green onions, chives, garlic, shallots, spinach, parsley, collards and Buttercrunch and Romaine varieties of lettuce.

Seed of snapbeans, baby lima beans, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, and summer squash will all produce vegetables probably before the first killing frost if they are planted in mid-August.

You can go about establishing your fall garden in two ways. Sowing seed in the garden is one choice but will require repeated irrigation and careful attention to pest control. It's sometimes easier to start seedlings of tomatoes, peppers, cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, and parsley in boxes or pots of potting soil, grow them in protected areas, and transplant them to the garden when four to five weeks old. You can also buy transplants from nurseries. If you have any questions or need more information on fall gardening, there are several Extension Bulletins available in my office.

Dear Editor:


My congratulations to the commissioners that are at least trying to look out for the poor taxpayer.



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

droughty soils with low fertility, such as south Texas. Tests indicate that successful plantings may be expected as far north as southern Canada.

LABOR DAY OBSERVED

Each year, after surviving the dog days of summer, workers look forward to Labor Day. The holiday, which honors workers across the country, is recognized on the first Monday in September.

First believed to have been celebrated with a parade Tuesday, Sept. 5, 1882, in New York City, Labor Day has since evolved into a national holiday recognizing the nation's workforce. The original parade was thought to have been organized by Peter J. McGuire, secretary/treasurer of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiner of America.

By 1883, a resolution by this union declared "the first Monday in September of each year a Labor Day," and more than half of the states observed the holiday on one day or another. During 1883, a bill to establish Labor Day as a federal holiday was introduced in Congress.

It was not until June 28, 1894, however, that President Grover Cleveland signed into law an act making the first Monday in September a legal holiday for federal employees and the District of Columbia. Today, Labor Day is observed in the United States and Canada.

NEW LAW

A new law passed by the 71st Texas Legislature will change attendance rules in school districts throughout the state. Provision of the law require that a student be in attendance at least eighty (80) days each semester to receive credit. No distinction is made about excused or unexcused absences.

Parents of students will be notified when their children are about to exceed the limit and after the limit has been exceeded. Each district will establish and attendance committee to consider extenuating circumstances if absences in excess of the rule limit occurs. Decisions made by this committee can be appealed to the Board of Trustees in each district.


The Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees will be considering attendance rules to conform with the new state law on Monday, September 11, 1989.





Living along the Mexican border sooner or later you will probably go to a bullfight.

A special breed of bull is bred to fight in the ring called "Toros de Lidio", (bulls of combat). Originally these bulls were the wild cattle of Spain, where in ancient times men hunted them like deer.

In the middle ages Moors and Spanish horsemen killed bulls with lances for entertainment at court and at country festivals. Later the bulls were fought by men on foot a cape for defense and a sword instead of a lance for killing.

The fighting bull has been bred by man for four centuries and registered since 1790. It is the only bull suitable for the bullring and has no other use. It is born with the instinct to fight anything that moves.

At two years of age the bulls, raised on special ranches are tested for bravery, then turned on wild and spacious pastures until they are four years old and ready for the ring.

The bulls are then fed special feed for a few weeks and shipped to the bullring in trucks. They are four years old, weigh between nine and twelve hundred pounds, and are about forty-five to fifty-five inches high at the withers, but very light on their small feet. I once saw a bull leap to the top of the barrier surrounding the bullring and from there into the stands, scattering the spectators.

The bulls neck muscles must be strong enough to toss a horseman and his mount into the air. This blood line of bull is usually all black, sleek, fine haired, quick, powerful and must be approved by a veterinarian to be without defects before he can enter the ring.

The torero must be a special man who is possessed with fever to fight bulls, He must follow the three basic rules of the bullfight. He must stand still when the bull charges. He must have a good sense of timing, and he must dominate the bull.

Bullfighting is a ritual, symbolizing man face to face with life and how he deals with death.

NEEDS FOR HUMAN SERVICES

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Human Services is conducting a survey to help identify the health and human service needs of Texas residents.

The survey, known as the 1989 Special Texas Census, is being conducted by mail and involves more than 38,000 households, including more than 11,000 Spanish surname households. In addition to basic demographic data such as age, sex and race, the survey collects information on each respondent's income, health insurance coverage, employment status, child-care needs and disabilities. The results will be used to support the departments's budget and planning process and ensure more efficient use of tax dollars.

Households to be surveyed received letters from Gov. Bill Clements the week of August. 21, announcing the survey and requesting prompt return of questinnaires. Follow-up-efforts by the department's Budget and Data Analysis Division will also encourage households to complete and return questionnaires to ensure their representative sample. The sample is designed to provide valid data statewide, regionally and in selected metropolitan areas.

Data collection will continue through October. A toll-free number is provided for respondents to get further information or help with filling out their questionnaires.

The survey is similar to one conducted in 1985. The information gathered then was widely used for department. budget and planning purposes, including preparing a legislative appropriation request and supporting the need for health and human services. The data was also use by many other state agencies and legislative task forces.

DISABLED

Beginning September 1, service stations that offer full-service refueling must pump gasoline and diesel for disabled drivers, upon request, at the self-service price. Stations that have only self-service pumps are not affected by the new law, passed during this year's regular legislative session.

To receive refueling service at the

self-service price, a driver must display a personal insignia, validation sticker, identification card, or license plates issued by the highway department.

The new law allows Class C misdemenaor charges to be filed against a station manager who does not establish a policy providing refueling services for the disabled driver. Similar charges can be filed against an individual employee who is acting against station policy and refuses to provide this service when requested.




