This years King and Queen are Yvonne Luna and Mitch Frerich.

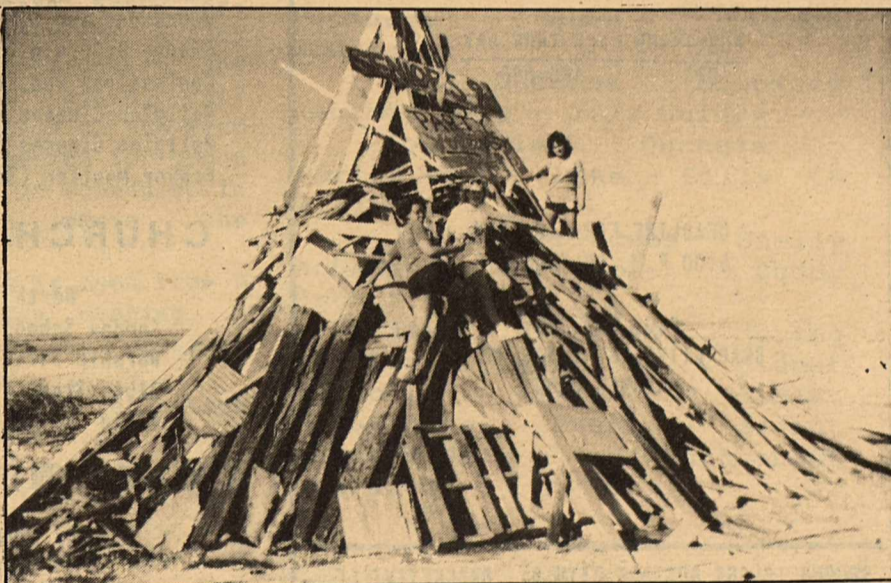

C/C SPOTLIGHT REVIEW:

FORT CLARK SPRINGS

When focusing attention on Fort Clark Springs as a local economic reality it is hard to put aside the interesting historic details that surrounds the facility. This report is designed to help our citizenry appreciate fully the commercial and recreational values of the Fort even when one is not a member.

Just how much FCS contributes to the local economy is hard to say, but we know it has the largest number of local employees of any employer in Kinney County. We also know that the residents on the Fort spend a considerable portion of their monthly budget in Brackettville.

FCS is called a membership resort community although it has a large contingent of retired folks. Another segment of the population on the Fort is made up of folks who become tenants of rental property.

Here we see a unique land development project that converted a National Historic Site to private use. The membership, through the FCS Association, a General Manager, and a Board of Directors elected by the members, operates and maintains all facilities and improvements on the 2,700 acres, except the Golf & Tennis Country Club, which is operated by North American Towns of Texas, Inc. of San Antonio, Tx. While use of most areas is restricted to eligible members, specified facilities are available to the general public, as stated below.

Members may become property owners of the original stone homes once used by the military, or choose from traditional custom-built homes, townhouses, modular or mobile units, or in separate areas, have a permanent RV home. They enjoy over 1600 acres of association controlled space which includes the giant spring-fed swimming pool picnic, park areas, art center, adult health spa, youth center, horse stables, target range, air-port, motel, RV Park, wilderness campground, restaurant, and several meeting places known as the town hall, the NCO Club, and the Member's Lounge. (Cavalry Room).

Non-members are limited to patronage of six facilities, including the RV Park, the 18-hole golf course and tennis courts, the Las Moras Restaurant, the Las Moras Lounge (bar), and the Guardhouse Cavalry Museum. Non-Members, may also use the two Motel units on a space available basis.

Bullis & Patton Hall Motel units have nice spacious rooms with kitchenette facilities, air-condit-

ioning, and TV's. They should be reserved by calling Member Services (of the FCS Assn. Office) at 563-2493, during normal office hours of 7 a.m. - 10 p.m. on Mon-Thurs, 7 a.m. - 1 p.m. Friday; and 8 a.m. - 6 p.m. on Sat & Sun.

Non-members who use the Motel and RV Park may use the below designated facilities without restriction except that they must travel directly to them without entering areas where membership is required. Special vehicle identification passes are used by FCS Security to control such traffic.

As for hours of operation, the following is in effect at this time:

Guardhouse Cavalry Museum, open Saturday and Sunday, from 1 - 4 p.m., is packed with artifacts, photographs, diaramas, and old official documents which weave the story of enchanting drama and history behind the creation of Fort Clark Springs as we know it today.

Fort Clark Springs Country Club (golf-tennis-food) is open Tuesday through Sunday, closed Mondays. The pro-shop for golf is open from 8 a.m. till dark, year-around, and the snack bar dining area is open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Call 563-9204, for information on use of the facilities, golfing events, and use of the dining area for parties or groups.

Las Moras Restaurant, open daily, from 7-10:30 a.m. for breakfast, 11 a.m. - 2 p.m. for lunch, and 5-9 p.m. for dinner, except on Friday - Saturday, extended to 10 p.m. Full breakfast every day, gourmet's delight buffet for Sunday noon meal. Prices are reasonable, and the food is delicious, Again, call 563-2290 for information on the menu and on special arrangements for group dining. Banquets may be scheduled in the Members Lounge above the restaurant.

Las Moras Lounge is open from 5 p.m. to midnight every evening. A full selection of mixed and straight drinks are offered.

The RV Park has full utilities with free cable TV connection, clean showers with hot/cold water, picnic areas, and a TV/Card day-room. Space may be reserved by calling the Security Gate at 563-2002 anytime.

All non-members wishing to use Fort Clark Facilities are required to register with FCS Security at the gate when entering. A prior telephone call will facilitate entry with minimum delay; just call the gate before coming to let them know your plans. They will give prompt and efficient service!!

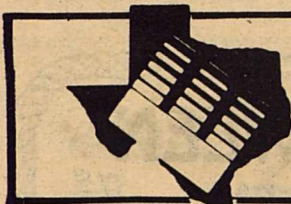

Cashmere Industry

Over the past year there has been a growing interest in the cashmere industry. In Texas Spanish goat producers are realizing an \$8 - \$40 increase per head in the production of Spanish goats when intense selection for the cashmere fiber is done. At present, there are numerous options for a rancher to take in order to produce cashmere.

A cashmere goat conference is scheduled for October 26 - 29 in San Angelo, Texas. The purpose of the conference will be to discuss cashmere production in Texas, the potential it may have, and some management and selection ideas to better acquaint persons who are considering it as a diversification to their current operation. Browsing Deer

In many areas, ours included, browsing deer can be a major problem to fruit tree and other growers. This is especially true with dwarf trees and young trees. Over the years, many different products have been used to repel deer and most work to some extent while none have been totally effective. In recent years, the use of lifebouy soap has been suggested as a repellent for deer. Last fall a trial was set up in Virginia where soap was compared to barbed wire wrapped around the main stem of young apple trees. The soap was suspended from the main fork of the tree. After three weeks, none of the trees with the soap had been browsed, 30% of those with barbed wire were fed on and 43% of the controls (those with nothing)

had been damaged. Now, from this data, it appears that lifebouy soap (and possibly other brands) make a rather effective deer repellent in some cases and certainly rates a trial of your own if you are having problems.

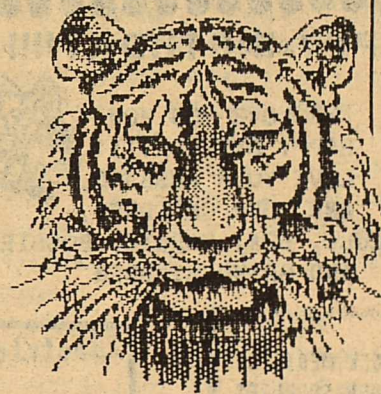

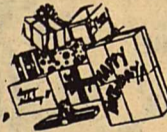

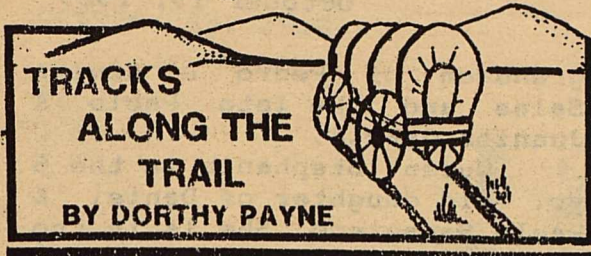

In the spring of 1871, a band of young Kiowas rode from Fort Sill and wiped out a wagon train in Texas. The raid became known as the Warren Wagon Train Raid. A few miles away from the scene of the raid, General Sherman was passing on his way to Fort Sill. After the raid the war party returned to Fort Sill. There they met on Commander Grierson's porch and tempers were high. Three Kiowas were arrested; Satanta, Satank, and Addo-Eta. The three Kiowas were locked up in a cellar beneath the parade ground barracks, where they were to be kept until taken to Texas to stand trial for murder. Satank was killed when he pulled a knife and attempted to escape. Satana died in the Texas prison, it is not known whether he was killed in an escape attempt or committed suicide. They are both buried in the cemetery at Fort Sill. Oklahoma.

Addo-Eta was much younger than the others and after a prison term he became active in helping others. He was dedicated "Indian leader". For many years he taught Sunday School.

Today the house where the meeting took place still stands, in the center of officers row along the old Fort Sill parade grounds.

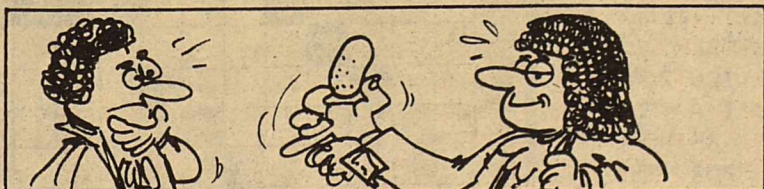


OLD ARMY DAYS

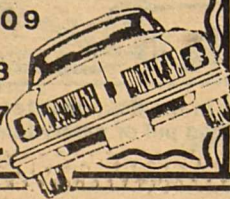
