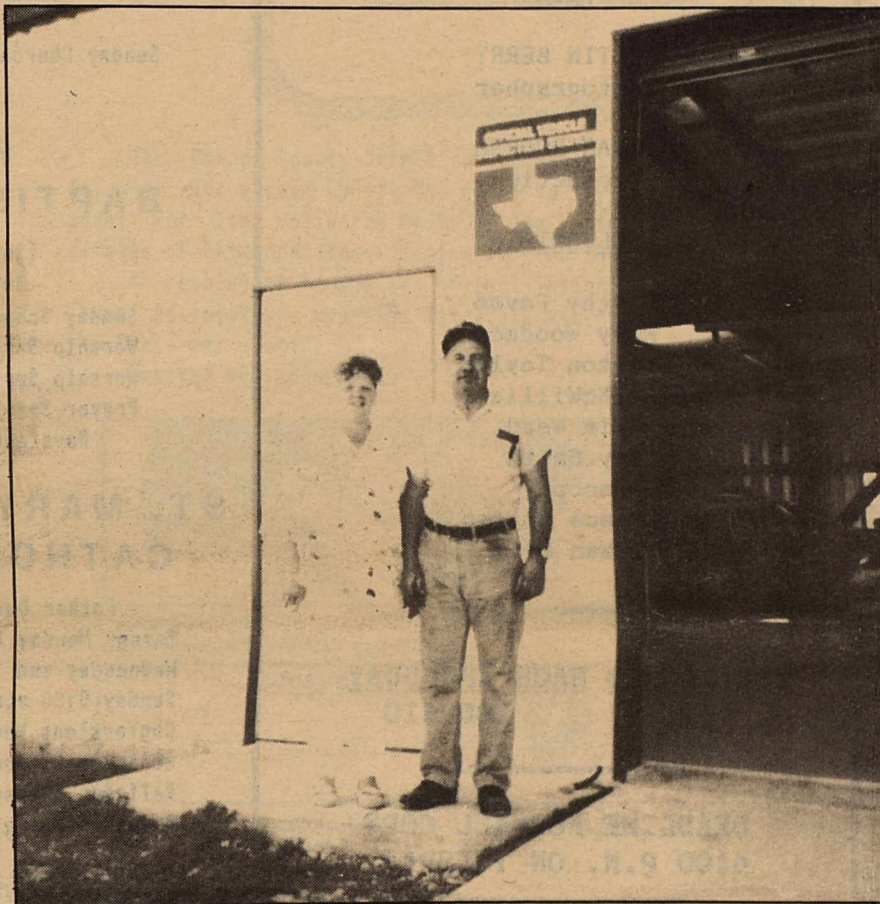


NEW BUSINESSES IN TOWN

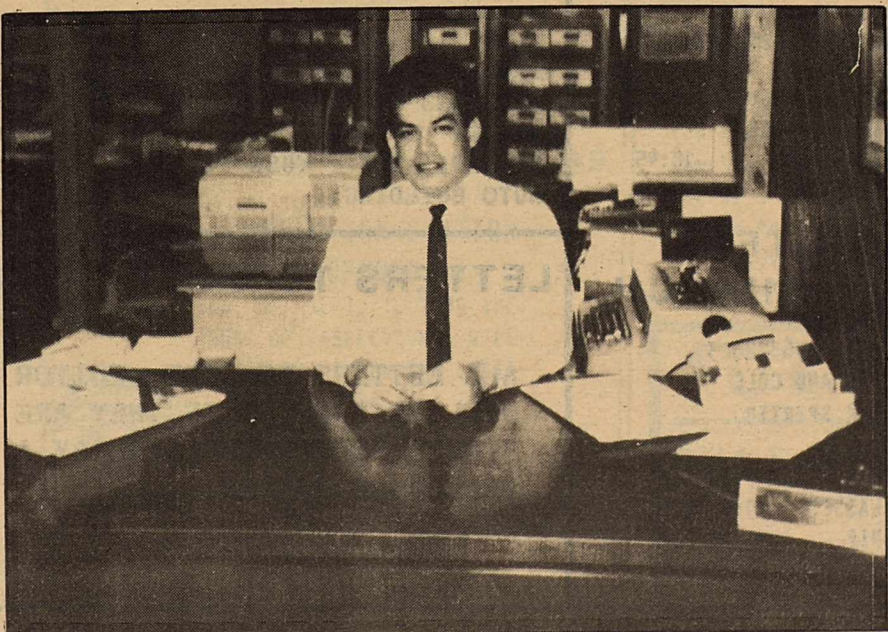

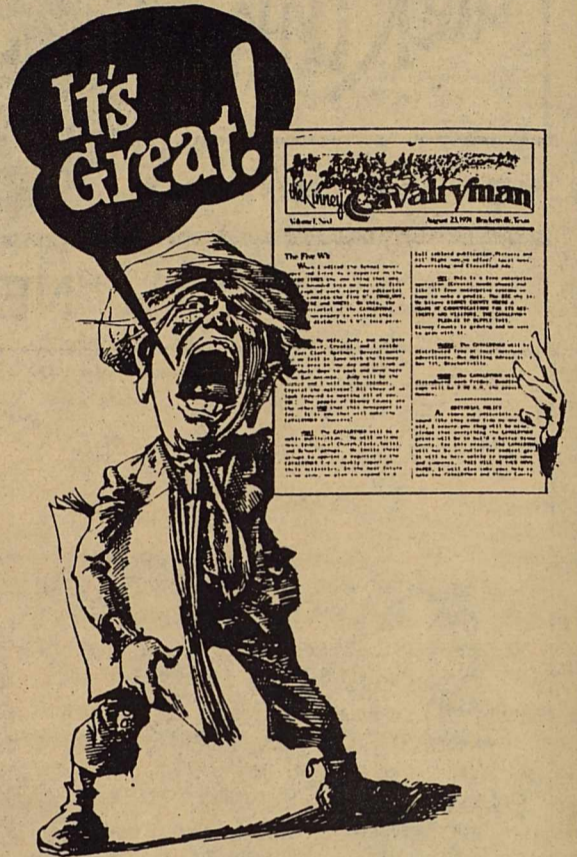

Hints to take the weight off housecleaning

How many times has it happened that, vacuum and dust cloth in hand, you prepare for a concerted "attack" on household dirt, only to find you're out of vacuum cleaner bags, furniture polish, or some other needed supply? 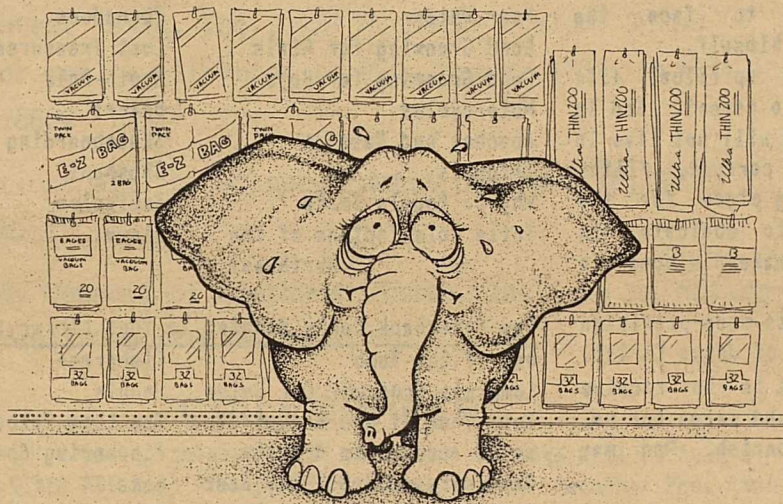

PREDATOR CONTROL WORKSHOP - Area ranchers will have an opportunity to attend a predator control workshop on December 7, 1989 beginning at 1:30 p.m. The workshop will demonstrate techniques on use of steel leg traps, snares, and M-44's. There will also be a calling demonstration by Dr. Dale Rollins, extension wildlife specialist, from San Angelo. This program will be timed with the approaching fur season and will be held in the shearing barn at the Hadley Wardlaw Ranch. If you need more information, please contact my office.

PRUNING DURING WINTER - We are probably very close to a freeze. Remember to set your house plants and succulents inside. I have had several calls with questions about pruning. I think the thing to keep in mind is do not wack away at your woody ornamentals in the yard unless they really need pruning.

Some of the right reasons for pruning include removing dead or winter-killed growth or balancing the top with the root system when setting out new plants. (Now, I said balancing the top on newly transplanted plants--not topping the entire tree itself.)

Exposing the structural form of plants such as crape myrtles, can be done by removing overly dense growth or small, twiggy limbs that cross one another. Also remove diseased or insect-injured wood as well as storm or accident-damaged limbs.

Shrubs can be rejuvenated by removing older branches at the base. Pruning also can help develop a desired shape or size as well as aid in producing better flowers and fruit.

If possible, avoid severe pruning. It is always better to prune lightly and more often to prevent sunscald to sensitive inner branches. Never leave stubs that invite insects and diseases to enter. Plants which bloom early in the spring with the appearance of new leaves, should be pruned after they flower. Those that bloom later in the spring or summer, should be pruned during the dormant season. Always use sharp pruning tools for an easier pruning operation.

Be sure and watch for a county pruning clinic to be held in February. The clinic will cover aspects of ornamental and fruit tree pruning. If you have any questions, or would like more information, we also have bulletins on landscape and fruit tree pruning in our office.

ALONG THE
TRAIL

There are many legends told of the mistletoe. If you walk under the mistletoe you are in danger of getting kissed, that is true. But, there is another legend about the Druid priests of ancient Celtic tribes.

They would rattle their ghostly bones if the mistletoe ever touched the ground. When it was harvested a long time ago in mid-winter young maidens would catch the branches in a cloth because if it touched the earth it would cause bad luck. The branches were cut with a special golden knife of the Druids.

Mistletoe in England was considered a special favorite of the gods. All of us living on earth will inherit the troubles of the world, but, because the mistletoe lives high above the crowd without visible roots it can't be contaminated and can protect us from any bad luck.

Mistletoe comes from the Anglo-Saxon word mistle-tan which means antidote. It would heal such things as epilepsy, barren cattle or horses, it would make warts disappear, protect you against your enemies, and reduce swelling.

The natives believed it was planted high up into the trees because only gods could reach that high to plant it.

Which brings us back to why we kiss anyone standing under the mistletoe. The Norse legend is about the young god Balder, who was the son of the great god Woden, and the goddess Freyus. The young god Balder was killed by a weapon made of cactus. Woden punished the world by turning it cold, and the poor mistletoe was forgotten.

The Queen of the Underworld announced that all living creatures should pray for the young god Balder. When Freyus (his mother) prayed her tears fell upon the mistletoe and the tear drops turned into little white berries all over the mistletoe. The Queen was so pleased with the berries on the mistletoe that she forgave the mistletoe and kissed all who walked beneath it. Therefore began the custom of being kissed under the mistletoe. So, to walk under the mistletoe can be good or bad luck depending on which legend you want to believe.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Parent:

Just imagine the following situation:

You have taught your son to play football—not just the rules and some tactics, but you practiced throwing and catching the ball so many times you felt he could do it while sleepwalking. And if you had been asked by any outsider whether he knew the game, you would be so sure you could have bet on it. Now, after four days of vacation, he comes to a game in his regular clothes, looks at the football and says "What is this? How do you throw this...?" You think he is joking, has only forgotten to bring his sports outfit and tell him to get going. But he insists on not knowing the game, where to start, or what to do in the first

place. You try to remind him about what you taught him, not just once, but over and over again. He tells you right in the face that you never: ..told him that at all, ..told him to remember that, ..wanted him to remember anything beyond a game,

and that he never understood it in the first place.

How would that make you feel?

Now it wouldn't be your son if he didn't tell you that he would change, if you gave him just one more chance. Tomorrow, yes, tomorrow he will start to learn. From the very beginning, of course. Even remember things if it made you happy. And as he knows how to con you, he will get by with it again, as he did so many times before. Be a model student, at least for a week, maybe even two. So you give him another chance...

Another chance at what? How would you feel having to review everything every other week with your son (and about half of the other students)? During this time, you could have taught him some new tactics instead of reteaching the basics over and over again.

But then, luckily, you are not the professional. I am and I do have some answers. You may not like them, but at least you are a caring parent (unlike most other parents) and you may give them some consideration:

1. According to psychological research, an average person needs to make at least three to six efforts to remember ordinary information permanently.

2. During this time, the person should be kept motivated enough to make these five efforts or else the original instructions were a waste of time! Besides, it would be much better if the person wanted to remember the info rather than being forced to learn.

3. The necessary minimum time interval between each effort ranges from one hour up to several weeks, depending on the individual and the subject.

4. If not enough motivation can be maintained from the first to the last effort, the information will not be passed on to the brain's "permanent storage area" and is simply lost.

5. It is especially important to maintain a positive learning environment between the first and second effort (or between two days of school) or the information could be lost right away.

Conclusion: Only with the active involvement of parents can there be a high rate of success for the average student. While some students need very little support, others require downright tutoring on the subject (10-30 minutes per day and subject!) to make that second effort successful. Checking their notes or asking them to summarize each lesson from memory will give you an idea of whether their very first effort was worth it. The teachers can only build on what is left from the previous day!

Let me add my impressions derived from 16 months of exposure to the American interpretation of education as seen from the parents' point of view:

As parents, it may seem easy to rid oneself of their part of the education

process, expecting the school to do the whole job. After all, you are paying the school to do it. To do what?

a. To reverse bad habits or "don't care" attitudes that originate mostly in the home environment?

b. To compete for attraction with all available types of entertainment which the students are freely exposed to at home? (Letting a child watch TV is much more convenient than devoting (wasting?) some time to him/her.)

c. To make up for lost opportunities of letting the students develop a sense and appreciation of ethical behaviour, moral codes and values? (Compare how long you see your child alone everyday with the 50 minutes a teacher has available to address not only your child, but ten to thirty other students also.)

d. I almost forgot: Physical education: (Be tough, get rough, get physical, whenever necessary),

Sportsmanship: (Learn how to play the game (or life) where a foul is only a foul when it was called).

Team Spirit: (Make your child realize that it doesn't count to be a member of a winning team, but only to stand out, be the star, get mentioned).

What may prove to be a new wave of technology to clean up oil spills was tested Thursday during a controlled oil spill experiment sponsored by Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro.

Naturally occurring microorganisms, which have been enhanced in their activity by Alpha Environmental of Austin, were applied to oil spills in saltwater tanks at the University of Texas Marine Science Institute. In a process known as bio-remediation, the microbes react with the oil to form an emulsion of fatty acids. This emulsion then sinks and is consumed by various marine life.

"Coping with spills requires a multiple approach in which all avenues must be explored," Mauro told scientists, business people, environmentalists and media representatives on hand for the demonstration.

Mauro advocates better communication, quicker reaction, more strategically located clean-up equipment and technological improvements. "Research into experimental technologies, such as bio-remediation, must go forward as rapidly as scientific rigor will allow," Mauro said.

The test Thursday served to demonstrate the process to the public and to allow for testing of the effects of the process on marine life. Ruska Laboratories of Houston is performing the scientific analysis and full results will be known in about 30 days.

"What we don't know is what happens to the toxic hydrocarbons in the original oil," Mauro said. "Ideally, the microorganisms render them completely harmless. It's possible, however, that emulsification into food for marine life injects the toxins into the environment far more rapidly than if we had let nature degrade the spilled oil at her own pace.

"That is what this experiment is all about," Mauro said.

U.S. Rep. Greg Laughlin, Dis. 14, praised the test on the floor of the House of Representatives last week, saying that development of such new technology would help avoid disasters like that near Valdez, Alaska.

"Immediate implementation of this technology would have saved the lives of thousands of eagles, otters, and sea birds, as well as the livelihoods of Alaskan fishermen," Laughlin said.

Laughlin was instrumental in urging the use of bio-remediation in Alaska after the Valdez spill.

DRUG DOGS VISIT SCHOOL

Drug dogs visited the campuses of Brackett Independent School District on Monday, November 27, 1989. The dogs found no evidence of drugs. This is the second visit for the dogs from Global, Inc. of San Antonio this year. An earlier visit in September also found no evidence of drugs. The dogs were led around campus by their handlers. The dogs were exposed to classrooms, hallways, lockers, and automobiles.

Superintendent Bob McCall said that he was very pleased that no drugs were found. This does not mean that drugs are not present in the community. It does indicate that students are not bringing drugs to school. The drug dogs first visited Brackett in May of 1989 on an experimental basis. At that time, the dogs marked a jacket in an unassigned locker, and a student's notebook. However, upon closer inspection of the jacket and notebook no identifiable evidence of drugs were found. All visits are unannounced. Even administrators are not aware of the specific day the dogs will visit.

Mr. McCall noted that the drug dogs are part of the district's on going drug education and drug prevention program. We want students and the community to know that drugs are dangerous and illegal and we definitely want to do as much as we can to keep drugs out of the hands of students and off the school grounds.

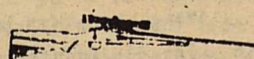

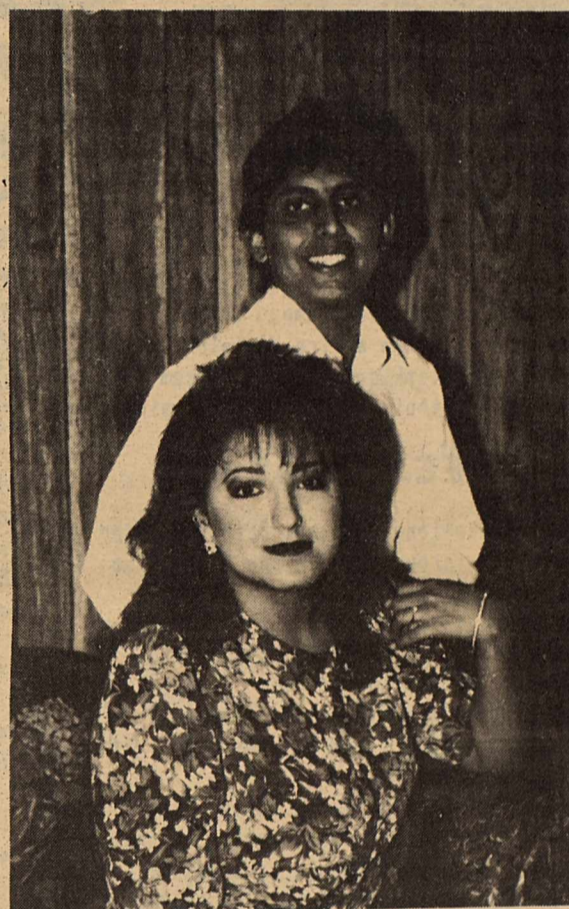

REWARD TO INFORMANTS

MATTOX DRUG BUSTER PLAN OFFERS 10-PERCENT REWARD TO INFORMANTS WHO TURN IN PUSHERS

Saying that a 10-percent reward will encourage citizens to be the "extra eyes and

ears" of the police, Democratic gubernatorial candidate Jim Mattox Tuesday unveiled the opening planks of his 16-point plan for a drug-free Texas.

"I'm going to provide a little more incentive for more people to get involved in the fight to reclaim our neighborhoods, our schools, our children and our future," Attorney General Mattox said at a press conference in a South Dallas neighborhood whose residents are organizing to fight drugs. "We want them to help Mr. Pusher meet 'the slammer.'"

"They're fed up with the dope pushers. They're fed up with the burglaries. They're fed up with the stolen cars. They're fed with the violence.

"We must work together to make the playgrounds once again safe for our children."

A former criminal prosecutor, Mattox is the only candidate in the race for Governor who has ever been to the front lines of the war against drugs and crime. He is the only candidate who has ever prosecuted a pusher, faced down a murderer or sent a rapist to prison.

Operating similar to the highly successful Crime Stoppers Program, Mattox Drug Busters Program would put a pusher out of business every 30 minutes. Confidential informants would receive at least 10 percent of all assets seized from pushers they help convict. Informants who test positive for drugs would be required to submit to treatment as a condition of their rewards.

"The community knows who the criminals are" Mattox said. They know who is dealing the drugs, committing the burglaries, threatening their loved ones. And when the drug pusher knows he is no longer welcome in our neighborhoods, that's when this war will be

won."

"The Internal Revenue Service has found that a 10-percent reward helps them catch tax cheaters all the time. We believe this program will greatly improve our chances of solving a much more serious crime."

Mattox said that as Governor, he would standardize the dispersal of seized assets to all law enforcement agencies involved in a case to ensure that the assets are reinvested in the war against drugs, into drug education and into treatment programs.

Mattox also called on Texans to make an extra effort to keep dangerous drugs away from school children. "Our schoolyards have turned into drug supermarkets in far too many parts of Texas today," he said.

"We must eliminate drugs from our public schools so that our children have the clear minds they need to learn. And we must create drug-free school zones to save our next generations from the ravages of drugs."

The Mattox plan calls for a 2,000-foot Drug-Free Safety Zone around all of our public schools. It includes:

- *Mandatory 100 hours of community service on top of any punishment imposed by the courts - for possession of illegal drugs within the safety zone;

- *Strict enforcement of new laws prohibiting use of telephone paging devices by student pushers; and

- *Immunity from civil liability for teachers and school employees who provide law officers with information on illegal drug activity in their schools.

The third plank Mattox unveiled Tuesday is aimed at the growing illegal drug processing industry in Texas. Precursors-legal chemicals used to manufacture cocaine and other illegal drugs-are the essential ingredients that keep foreign and domestic drug labs running.

"In a very real sense, we are providing our own poison to drug traffickers," Mattox said, as he called on Texas chemical companies to cocaine producing nations.

Although acetone, ethyl ether, solvent toluene, methylethyl ketone and sulphuric acid have many legitimate uses, the sale of these and other chemicals to cocaine producing countries has increased 125 percent in the past six years despite the economic crisis in that region.

"With our position on the border with Mexico - the trampoline to and from Latin America - Texas must have the toughest precursor laws in the nation," Mattox said.

"We will tighten state regulations on the sale of precursors and work with the industry to create fair, effective requirements for registration guidelines, background checks and waiting periods for those who buy these chemicals.

"The chemical industry is a key component of Texas' industrial base. We must be sensitive to the needs of their legitimate business. At the same time, they must be responsible corporate citizens."

Mattox will layout the remainder of his anti-drug platform over the coming weeks. "I'm going to be presenting a number of specific proposals to create a drug-free Texas," he said.

"Today is just the beginning."

NEW LAWS AIM TO DECREASE TRUANCY, DROPPING OUT

"The American home constitutes the strength, security, and integrity of our Government," President William McKinley said. "It is the foundation of a pure national life. The good home makes the good citizen ... good government necessarily follows."

While parents should strive to provide a secure family life for their children, that task has become increasingly difficult for many.

In a report released in October, 1989, the Joint Special Interim Committee on High School Dropouts reported that between 5 million and 15 million Texans are "latch-key children," returning from school in the afternoons to empty homes.

Most parents have no choice about working. While fathers traditionally have worked, the latest figures indicate that a majority of mothers of school-age children now work as well. In a 1985 survey, 48 percent of Texas mothers with children under age six reported working full-time. Among those with children aged six to 17, 63 percent reported working.

The Joint Committee concluded that "latch-key children" are at risk of becoming truants. Those whose parents fail to enforce school attendance laws are at risk of dropping out.

Parents who intentionally or negligently fail to ensure that children aged six through 17 (inclusive) are in school or are educated at home in accordance with TEA regulations may be prosecuted for allowing truancy. They may be penalized \$5-\$25 on first offense, \$10-\$50 on second offense and \$25-\$100 on subsequent offenses.

Too many parents, however, seem to be unaware of this responsibility.

The 71st Legislature addressed some of the problems related to school truancy and the concomitant parental responsibility.

Senate Bill 1668 by Zaffirini, for example, strengthened the enforcement of truancy laws by allowing school attendance officers to refer truants to county juvenile probation departments for action as "conduct indicating a need for supervision." Courts are directed to prioritize these cases.

House Bill 969 by Rep. Lucio (D-Brownsville), which I sponsored in the Senate, enables judges to order parents to attend classes designed to help them learn how to cope with their children's truancy.

Our bill authorizes school districts to offer such courses. Participating parents would explore the causes underlying student truancy and strategies for resolving those problems.

H.B. 969 also allows juvenile courts and school districts to work together in developing educational and counseling programs for parents of chronically truant youth, with the goal of providing the tools and the motivation for addressing the issue.

Concurrently, under directive S.B. 1112 by Sen. Bill Haley (D-Center) and Rep. Ernestine Glossbrenner (D-Alice), the Texas State Board of Education is changing school attendance

regulations.

School districts will be given more flexibility in determining whether to grant class credit to students with numerous unexcused absences. Each district will develop an attendance committee to hear such petitions and will be permitted to allow for "extenuating circumstances" in deciding whether or not to grant class credit.

The new rules are being developed because of fears by bill sponsors and educators that previous policies inadvertently may have increased dropout rates. Prior regulations were inflexible, allowing only five unexcused absences each semester before categorically denying class credit.

These measures are a strong message to our children that school attendance is so important that it is required by law. At the same time we are letting our children know that we will be reasonable in evaluating their best efforts to attend school.

Such messages must be reinforced by parents as well as educators, for children derive many values from both.

"We must believe the things we teach our children," Woodrow Wilson said. The converse also is true: We must teach our children our beliefs. We must show our children through our own commitment that we will accept nothing less than our children's best efforts.




