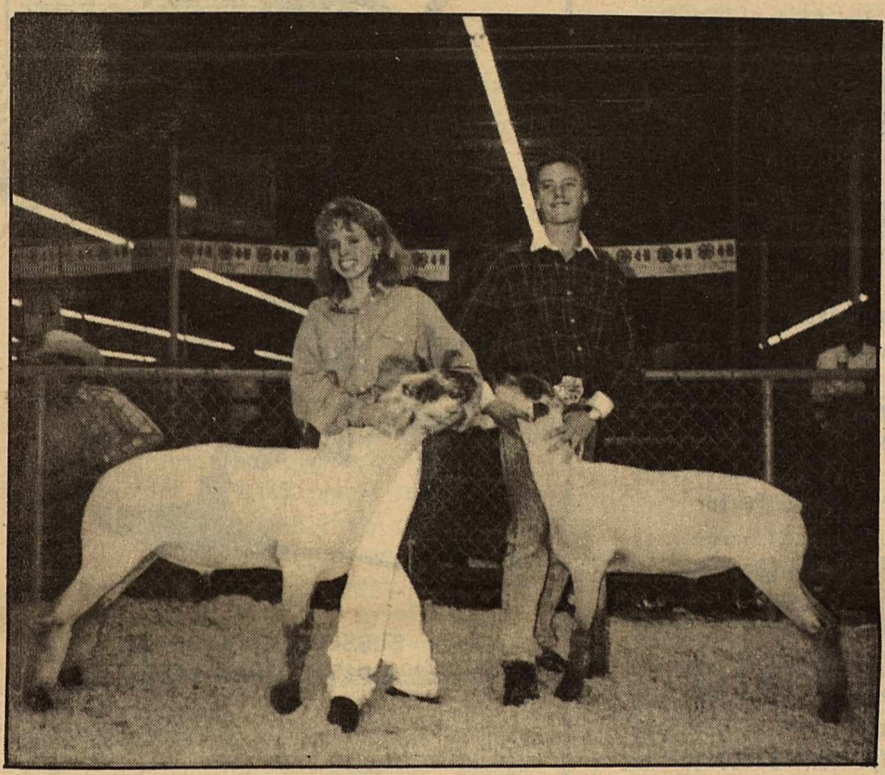

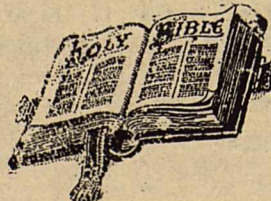

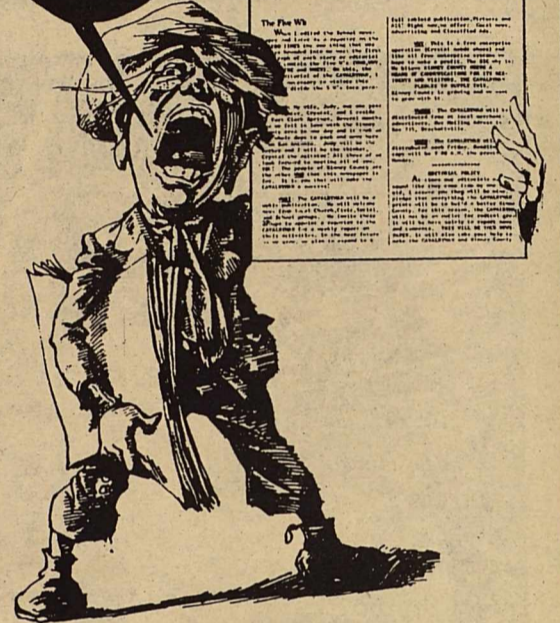

The Christian celebration of Easter comes at the same time of the Indian ceremonies that honor the coming of spring. Planting time and the gift of life are all celebrated with song and dance by the Indians of the southwest.

The Tarahumara village on the flanks of the Sierra Madre Occidental of Mexico have processions and dances. In the Yaqui communities of Arizona they celebrated the coming of spring with the deer and other dances during Holy Week.

Probably the largest number of Easter dances are in New Mexico's Rio Grande villages. There are Buffalo dances at Santa Clara; yellow corn maiden dances at San Juan; spring dances at San Ildifonso. Some of these dances continue for four days. There are many choices of where to go to see the dances and visitors are always welcome.

Sometimes only the children dance, as many as two hundred at the same time. There are times only adults dance, about five hundred adults for three days. No matter where the dances, the dancers always use a step called "antege," accenting and stomping the ground with the ground with the right foot.

The most colorful dances take place in the Tewa villages. Almost every year a different dance is introduced. They are well rehearsed and their costumes are perfect in detail.

No photography is permitted in most pueblos. They set their time for dances so as not to be at the same time as Mass on Easter Sunday.

Easter dances in the Pueblos in New Mexico are preparing for the planting season - a prayer for the gift of life - plant and human from generation to generation.

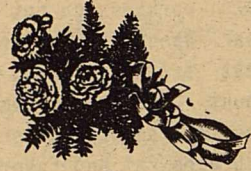

The public is invited to attend the third Sunday evening session (6:00 p.m., 109 W. St. James Street) on WHAT UNITED METHODISTS BELIEVE. After a short review of the previous two sessions (What UM Christians Have in Common with Other Denominations and The Distinctive Emphases of United Methodism) those present will consider the traditional United Methodist approach to ethical and Christian decision-making. This approach passed down from John Wesley, the founder, utilizes four criteria: Scripture (primary), Tradition, Experience and Reason. While it is not true that "Methodists can believe anything" (at least, not when true to the United Methodist heritage and identity), it is true that the church is not creedal in the historic sense and that there is room for many different kinds of "thinking in faith" or theologies. Thus United Methodism is known for tolerance, charity, and a balanced (as opposed to a narrow) approach to the larger issues of the faith. The February 18th session will also consider "Our Theological Task," reflecting upon the need to appropriate the witness and treasures of the past, "translate" for our contemporary situation, thereby making a relevant witness. All are welcome and encouraged to come at 5:30 p.m. for snacks and refreshments before the class begins.

Last Sunday, the class considered John Wesley's "Order of Salvation" and his emphasis on three aspects of God's grace (grace prevenient, justifying, and sanctifying). It reflected upon the balanced beliefs and practices of the "Methodists" have been known for. It explored the truth in the assertion of Pastor Cole: "When United Methodism is true to its roots and heritage, it is both Protestant and Catholic; Evangelical and Reformed; unites those two so long divided, knowledge and vital piety' (education and faith); is concerned both to Nurture the Body of Christ, the Church, corporately and individually, and be the Body of Christ in Mission in the world; is known for knowing and showing the importance of Faith and Good Works, Personal Assurance and Social Witness."

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor:

Once again the voter is faced with the task of electing officials for positions of responsibility in our county administration. This is not a simple matter if one is to make a selection of the best qualified. As a relative newcomer, with less than four years residency, we find it difficult to make our selection based on the printed word in our newspapers, or word-of-mouth representations from friends, old-timers or the candidates themselves. Some voice their appraisal with obvious prejudice, negative, because of some error or indiscretion of years ago, or positive, because of family relationship, or church, or club affiliation.

In our viewpoint, several major considerations must be evaluated about each candidate, if one is to properly select the best qualified;

a. What working knowledge and experience can they cite that would most likely contribute to effective and reliable performance?

b. Have they resided in the county at least five years whereby they have demonstrated by word and deed that their concern for economic and social matters is genuine and above their self-pride and satisfaction?

c. What pattern of success can be confirmed by noteworthy academic achievement,

business growth and prosperity, civic accomplishments, and respect for law and order? What have they contributed of lasting value?

d. What degree of servanthood (apart from self-serving aspirations) have they demonstrated by past public service? What real concern have they displayed for the socio-economic hopes and fears of the people, especially those who bear most of the burden for school and property taxes?

Undoubtedly, there are other personal attributes of which we should take note--if they are brought to light. This is especially important for the key positions of County Judge and County Commissioner, whose performance affects our tax load and economic development most of all.

Perhaps our newspapers should compile a list of questions on citizens' concerns - or prerequisites for these positions--and strive to obtain an honest and candid response from each candidate, for repeat publication. Here are some concerns that we and many others may have:

a. How can we reconcile a radio-active waste dump in Kinney County with sound and continuing economic development and protection of our clean air and water environment?

b. How can we overcome the detrimental effect such a waste dump would have on property values, attraction of new "clean" industry, and a stable economy dependent on ranching, hunting, tourism, small business, and the Fort Clark Springs recreation/retirement community?

c. What concrete proposals can be made for reduction or elimination of programs, property, or proposed projects that could soak up tax dollars without providing over-all county benefits?

d. What economic guidelines should be observed for future planning and development? What controls do they propose to avoid the crunch of increased taxation to satisfy personal pet projects of elected officials? What degree of public information will they provide?

If we could answer these questions to our satisfaction, along with our personal evaluation of the candidate, then we just may elect the best person for each top office. Our newspapers should assume responsibility for a full and unbiased disclosure of the candidates views and qualifications. Thus, the voter will make a better selection and hopefully be more satisfied with future performance on the part of those they helped put in office.

TEXAS HIGHWAY TRUNK SYSTEM

A public hearing will be held February 26, 1990, to receive public input on the criteria used in the selection of routes eligible for the Texas Highway Trunk System. The proposed rules are being published in the Texas Register and a condensed version appears below. This meeting will be held at 10:00 a.m., Monday, February 26th, in Room 101 in the Dewitt C. Greer Building at 11th and Brazos streets in Austin, Texas.

If you are unable to attend this public hearing, you can participate through written and phone-in comments addressed to Mr. Robert Cuellar, Transportation Planning Division, P.O. Box 5051, Austin, Texas 78763-5051, (512) 465-7466.

After this hearing, all comments will be analyzed, and the final version of the rules will be presented before the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission for adoption.

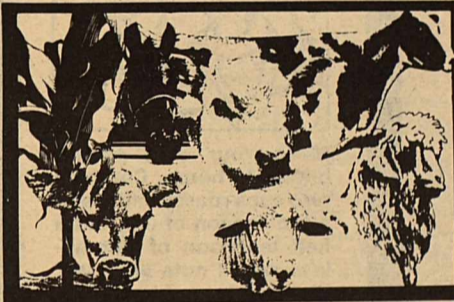
Based on the adopted rules and previous public input, a revised Texas Highway Trunk System will be prepared for commission approval later this year.

SUMMARY OF RULES

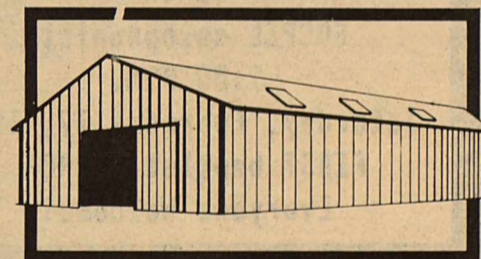
OBJECTIVE: To designate a rural network of four-lane or better divided roadways not to exceed 11,500 miles that will serve as a principal connector of all Texas cities with more than 20,000 population, major ports, and points of entry.

SELECTION CRITERIA: To be included in the Texas Highway Trunk System, the commission will give consideration to routes that

- 1-maximize four-lane divided roadways
- 2-minimize circuitous or indirect routing
- 3-connect with principal Mexican points of entry
- 4-connect with principal roadways from adjacent states
- 5-connect with principal deep water ports with channel depths of 40 feet or more
- 6-serve significant military installations
- 7-serve tourism or recreational areas
- 8-comprise major truck routes, or

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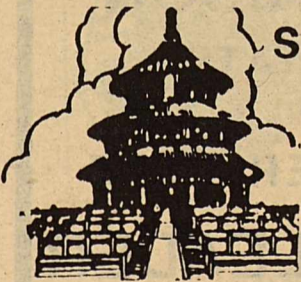
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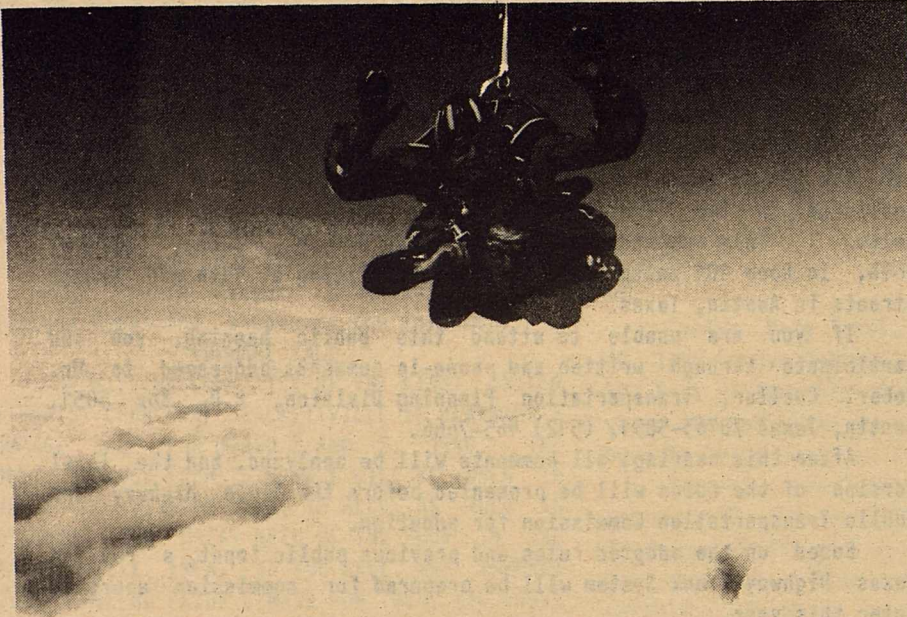
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**JAMES CRUMLEY,

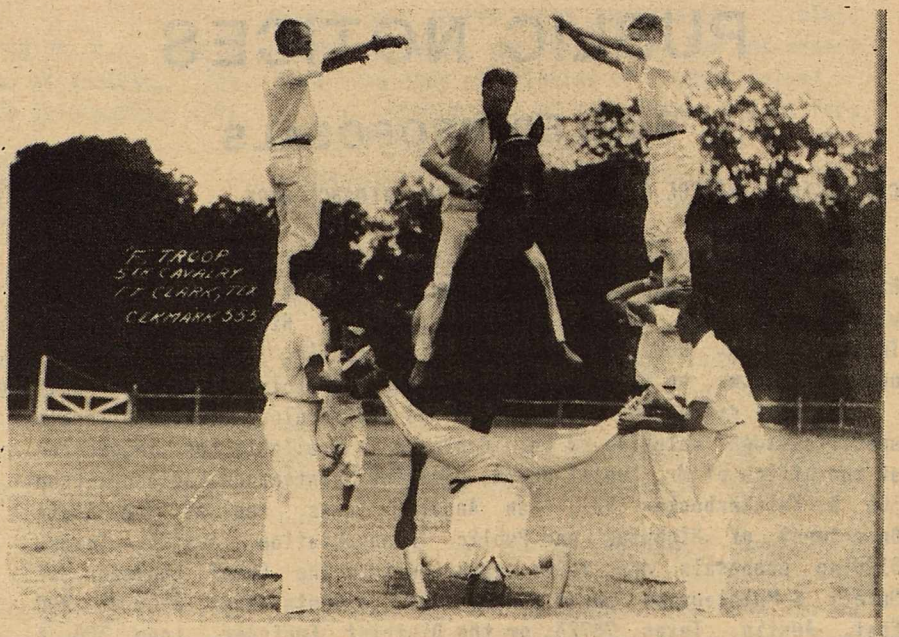

OLD ARMY DAYS



water crossing on the Tularosa Road and the replacement of the Pinto Bridge on Standart Lane.

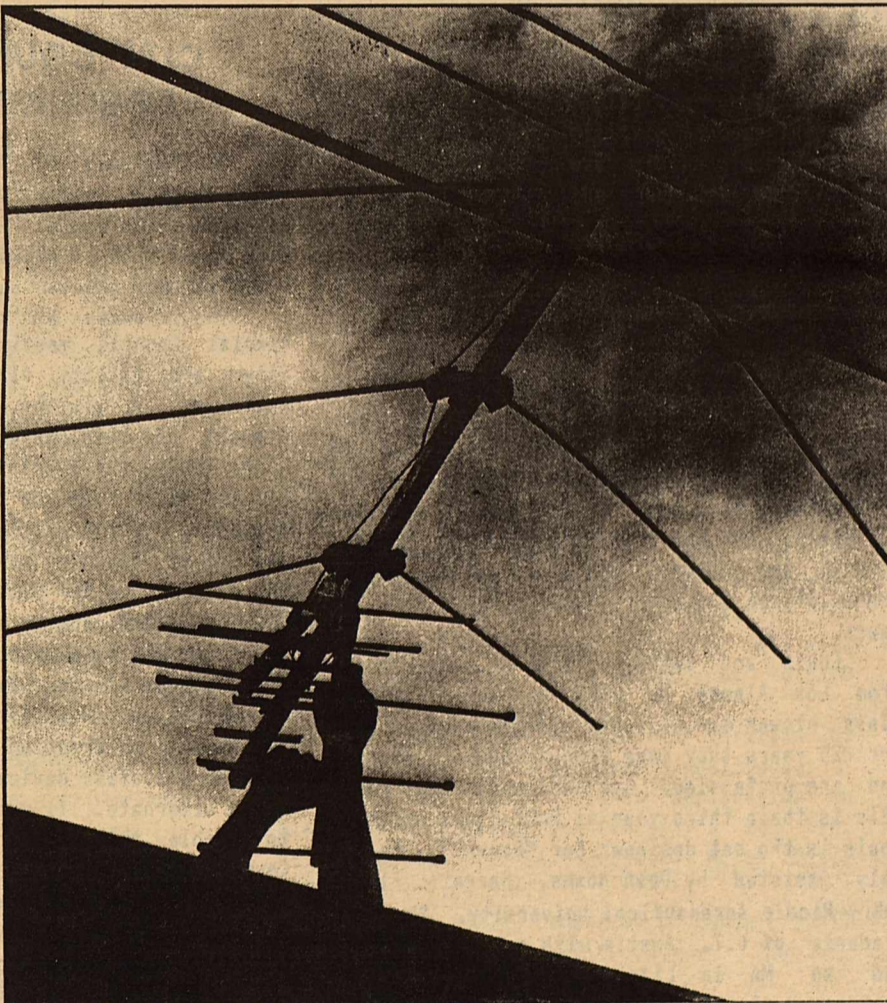

**CITY COUNCIL HOLDS
REGULAR MEETING**

On February 12, 1990 at 4:32 p.m., the City Council meeting was called to order by Mayor Vito La Gioia. Councilmembers present were Mayor Vito La Gioia, Manuel Fuentes, David Broderick and Agaptio Saenz.

The minutes of the past regular and special Council meeting were approved. The City and Utility financial reports were approved. A visitor, Cordelia Mendeke, was present and inquired who had paid to pave the alley beside the Baptist Church. She was told by the Mayor that the Baptist Church did. A discussion followed, between Ms. Mendeke and the Mayor regarding street paving practices, an easement to her business property entered the discussion, and Ms. Mendeke agreed to pave and maintain the easement.

Another visitor, Vernon Miers of Southwest Communications was there to answer questions and to give information regarding prices on two way communication devices and discuss beepers, as an alternate. It was decided by the Council to table this item on the agenda, and Councilman Broderick would meet with Mr. Miers later in the weeks for more discussion.

A question of amending the budget for street paving was brought up and at this time deem not necessary. It was decided by the Council to add some more funds to the Street repairs. Mayor La Gioia stated that the County would give some assistance with paving of Gove street.

The Mayor stated that the landfill lease with Mr. Joe York, Jr. would be up soon and a discussion with Mr. York was needed. The Mayor also stated that the sewer plant lease was be up in the near future. Mayor La Gioia stated the Landfill was still in violation and read off ten violations that must be corrected as soon as possible.

Mr. Joe Townsend, not present, requested the City close Rufus alley behind his trailer and behind R. L. Tartts' house. The City Council agreed to close Rufus alley from Mr. Townsends' resident to Sheedy street.

Mr. Joe York, Jr. entered the Councils' Chamber and he and the Mayor begin discussing the landfill lease and the violations. Mr. York said that he would rather not renew the lease due to the problems and complaints he had received on the landfill, but he would renew the landfill lease on a short term lease as long as the City will clear up all the problems and give to him an outline in writing as what will be done to keep from having the violations. Mr. York stated that some of his complaints were the smell, flies and paper blowing onto his ranch that endangered his livestock if they should eat it and the paper that was scattered along the highway to the landfill. Mr. York said the trash hauler should be made to cover the trash with some kind of a container and if they littered the highway then they should receive a citation. The new City Employee policy regarding drugs and alcohol was presented to the Council but was tabled until the Council had time to review it. The City Council went into executive session. After a brief session the Council opened the meeting to open session. The Mayors' travel expense will remain the same. CPL wants the Clerks to post all payments again and so the Council agreed to approach the CPL for a computer for posting and or more money. Meeting adjourned.

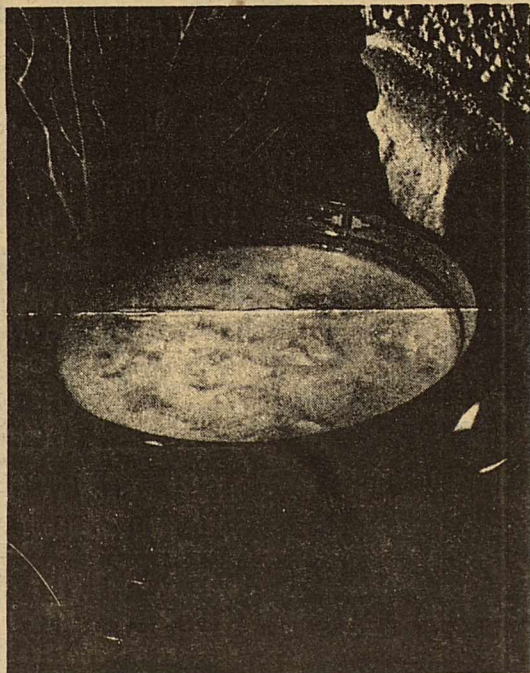

Homemade Soup Warms The Soul

(AUSTIN)--Soup may have been the original soul food. Served hot and

soothing from a communal pot, it drew families together at mealtime over bowls of its steaming nourishment. The word evolved from *sop*, Germanic for a slice of bread on which were poured the contents of the cooking pot. In France the bread was called *soupe*. In earlier times soup was usually the main meal, especially among families who could afford little meat and had to stretch food as far as it would go. It was popular fare, however, among all classes of society. In 1765 the first eating establishment to be called a restaurant opened in Paris, serving only soup to its clientele.

If soup seems a little bland these days, it is probably because so little of it is homemade. Lack of time in modern households has retired the soup pot to the kitchen's darkest corner. This is unfortunate because some soups don't take much time to cook. Dairy-based recipes in particular often do not require hours of simmering and can be fixed in under an hour.

Today as in the past, seasonal ingredients add fresh flavor to homemade soup. Texas cabbage, a major vegetable crop in the Rio Grande Valley, is in season now. It's a good addition to vegetable and certain cream soups.

Cabbage is one of those vegetables thought to offer protection against some forms of cancer. It contains substances called indoles, which prevent cancer-causing chemicals from damaging cells. People who eat a lot of cabbage have lower rates of cancer of the stomach and large intestine. Overcooking cabbage gives it a strong flavor and odor that many people object to. It will stay fresh and mild, providing it isn't cooked to death.

Supplies of cabbage were greatly reduced during the freeze that hit Texas in late December. Afterwards prices jumped to around 60 cents a pound, said Ann Vargas, Texas Department of Agriculture Market News reporter. Availability had improved enough by Feb. 1 to drop prices back to the 39-49 cent range. Retail cost was expected to return to around 29 cents a pound by late February or early March.

Creamy Cabbage Soup can be made in 45 minutes. It's dressy enough to serve on special occasions. Don't forget the bread--next to the bowl, not in it.

CREAMY CABBAGE SOUP

3 C. finely shredded cabbage
1 lg. yellow onion, sliced paper thin
4 sprigs fresh parsley
1/2 bay leaf

2 sprigs fresh thyme or 1/8 tsp. dried
Juice of 1/2 lg. lemon
2 T. cognac
4 T. sweet butter
3 T. all-purpose flour
3-4 C. light cream, heated but not boiling
2 C. rich chicken stock
Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
1/2 tsp. allspice
Finely minced parsley, for garnish
Caraway seeds, for garnish

Place cabbage and onion in large saucepan and cover with water. Bundle parsley, bay leaf and fresh thyme for bouquet garni. If using dried thyme, wrap and tie in cheesecloth before adding to bundle. Add bouquet garni to saucepan. Bring mixture to boil, lower heat and simmer 20-30 minutes or until cabbage is tender. Drain vegetables well, toss with lemon juice and cognac and reserve. In large soup pot melt butter over low heat. Add flour, stirring with whisk to make smooth paste. Add hot cream slowly, stirring to keep sauce smooth. Stir in stock. Liquid should be thin. Season with salt, pepper and allspice. Add cabbage and onion to sauce, tasting to adjust seasonings. Cook over very low heat 10-15 minutes. Pour into heated soup bowls. Garnish with parsley and a few caraway seeds. Makes 4 servings.

The candidates may file for position of Mayor or one of three Alderman's positions.

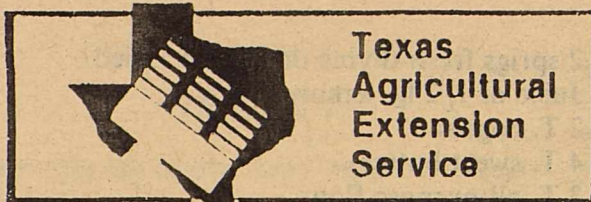
The last day to file an application to place name on ballot for the City's May 5th, 1990 election will be Wednesday, March 21st, 1990 before 5:00 p.m..

HAZARDOUS WASTE THRU DEL RIO

Letter to the Editor:

Many, many people have asked me "Why did you chose to come Del Rio?" My reply has always been "Clear Air, Good Water and Nice People." This answer was too simplistic, but it always created a smile. All people of Del Rio are proud of these important factors like Location, Climate, Established Chiropractic Professionals, Economic Growth.

Right off the bat, the DUGHEST Project was defeated by the people of Del Rio. My colleagues across the state were impressed with the Del Rioans banding together to stop the testing which could have potentially threatened the water supply.

At Christmas time, I witnessed an outpouring of goodness to help the Poor of our city. Everyone - every business did a part in collecting Food, Toys, Coats etc...

Del Rio is truly a responsible community.

We have a proven track record of community involvement in looking after our three basics: People, Water and Air.

Now to get to the point, on December 13th the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce, Najla Wills, past president, addressed the issue of the Hazardous Waste Disposal Site in Terrell County.

The City of Del Rio and Val Verde County officials are aware of the issue and have passed "Resolutions" opposing the site. The Del Rio Chamber of Commerce has also passed a resolution against it. The Middle Rio Grande Development Council, Crockett County and Kinney County Commissioners, the Devils River Soil and Water Conservation District, have all passed resolutions opposing it.

But the FACTS remain:

1. Del Rio/Ciudad Acuna, Eagle Pass/Piedras Negras, Laredo and Nuevo Laredo are downstream from the site (the Proposed site is only 13 miles from the Rio Grande).
2. The site is most probably a violation of a treaty between Mexico and the United States. I doubt the Mexican government will spend millions on a Resort at Lake Amistad if there is a reason to believe Pollution of the Lake is imminent.
3. The pristine waters of Lake Amistad will surely be contaminated. What will happen to the fishing, boating, camping, tourist industries? The citizens of Del Rio can ill-afford to lose this quality resource for our children's children.

Now the BIG ONE!

4. 800,000 tons of filth by truck load is projected to be hauled thru Del Rio. That is one (1) truck every 29 minutes day and night 365 days a year. Truck loads of this filth driven within 1/4 mile (440 yards) of our ONLY water supply.

One-quarter (1/4) mile from San Felipe Springs over the San Felipe Creek - 75 feet from where the children play all summer. Then the trucks will turn North on Avenue F passed our restaurants, shopping center, grocery stores, convention center and Mall - right thru the heart of our city - 800,000 tons per year. Then across the Bridges over the Lake itself on Hwy. 90 West.

Without a united persistent protest - the site will be approved.

What in heavens name are the Clean Air and Water folks in Austin thinking? If a site like this can be approved, we should all be outraged - this site could one day pollute the Rio Grande all the way to Brownsville!

We should demand our elected state officials do all they can do to stop this. What are the chances of an accident at any of these crucial locations? 1:800,000 = It only takes one to ruin a good thing.

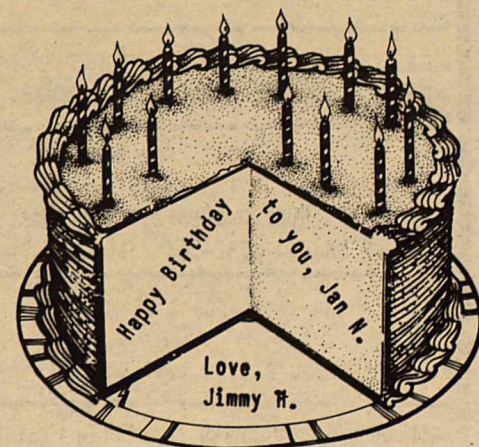
LIBRARY NEWS

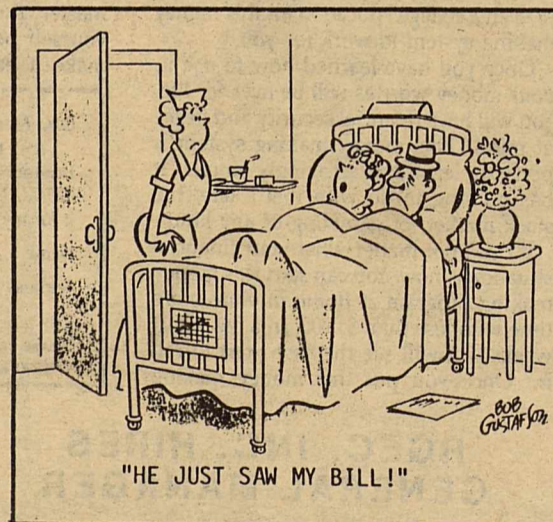
