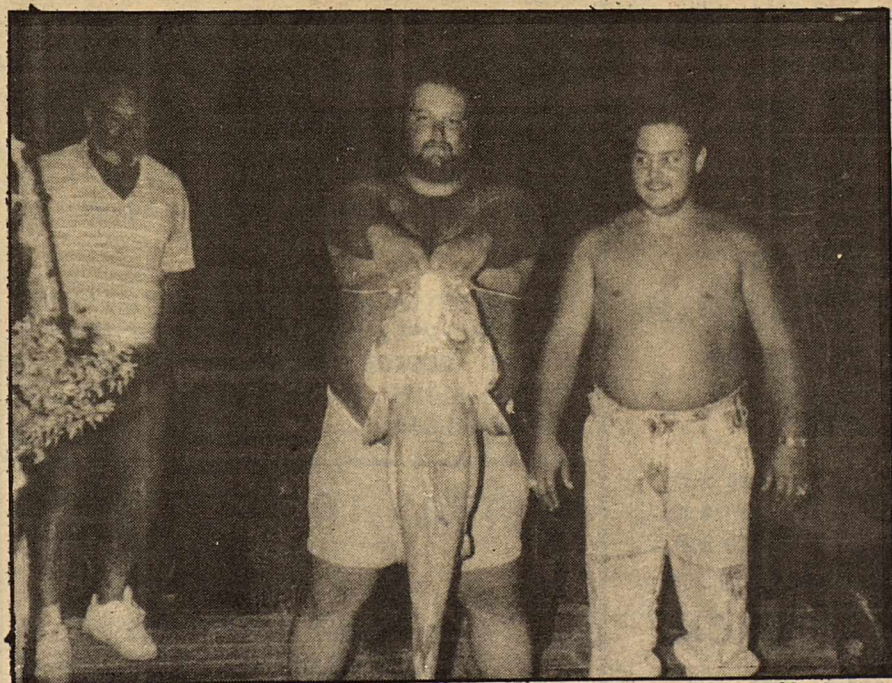

La Brasita means, "The little coal of fire." That is what the Mexicans call the vermilion fly catcher. This little fire ball sits and waits for an insect to pass by, then he pounces on it, catches it and waits for another. He is no bigger than a house sparrow. He is so colorful he can be seen for a long distance.

This little bird is a big show-off, flitting here and there, swooping high and then low. He is a dusky brown color on his wings and a ball of fire elsewhere. There are some arguments as to just how protective his coloring really is.

The nest of the vermilion fly catcher is a work of art, made up of twigs tied together with cobwebs and covered with lichens. It is usually built in the fork of a mesquite bush and is almost completely hidden from view. An alert birdwatcher can always locate the nest if he has the patience to watch the birds because they always nest in the same tree year after year.

Migration is a mysterious guideline system which is known by all species of birds. This is the system which brings a bird thousands of miles back to the same tree year after year under trying conditions.

Another remarkable ability birds have is the ability to build an elaborate nest the first time they try.

THE SIGNS OF THE TIME

In Christ's Service

The book of John records a story in the eighth chapter about a woman (brought to Jesus by the Pharisees) who had been caught in the very act of adultery. According to Mosaic Law, such a crime was punishable by death. Jesus, however, knowing the wickedness of the Pharisees' own hearts, stooped down and wrote something on the ground which some teachers of the Word guess to have been the names of those with whom the accusers had committed adultery. Then Jesus uttered those often repeated words, "He that is without sin among you, let him cast a stone at her." (John 8:7) As the story proceeds, all of the men who had accused the woman, being under conviction for their own sins, turned and left Jesus and the woman standing alone.

Now, most people who quote John 8:7 use it to excuse their own sin, as if everyone sins, so it must be OK! Jesus forgave this woman of her sins, this is true. However, there is a closing verse to this story that many people fail to recall. When Jesus looked about and saw all her accusers gone, he asked the woman, "...Where are those thine accusers? Hath no man condemned thee?" (John 8:10) Then, when the woman told him no, Jesus said to her, "...Neither do I condemn thee: GO AND SIN NO MORE." (John 8:11)

Make no mistake about it, friend, Jesus does forgive sin when one repents and turns from that sin, but the true Christian DOES NOT COMMIT SIN WILLFULLY! There are many today who call themselves Christians who continue, knowingly, in their sin. THEIR END WILL BE DESTRUCTION! (Rom 6:23)

The Apostle Paul must have been familiar with the false teaching we hear so much today that "everyone has to sin a little every day." In his letter to the Christians in Rome he says, "Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?" (Rom 6:1,2) The born-again Christian is NO LONGER TO LIVE IN SIN! Jesus said, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Whosoever committeth sin is the servant of sin....If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed." (John 8:34, 36) That was the purpose of the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ, to set people free from the bondage of sin, not to give them liberty to sin.

Every person born on earth is a sinner until his spirit becomes born again unto Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." (John 3:3) This "born-again creation" has a new spirit within him, a spirit which hates and abhors sin! The Bible says, "Therefore, if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away: behold, all things are become new." (II Cor 5:17)

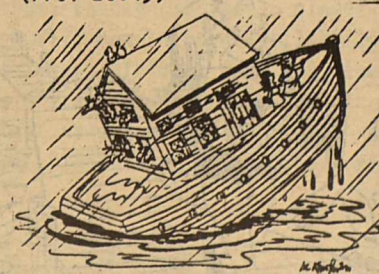
Friend, the truth is, "He that committeth sin is of the devil; for the devil sinneth from the beginning." (I John 3:8) It is a false teaching that permits people to sin over and over again and believe that they are excused simply by confessing it each time and repeating a meaningless prayer that comes from the lips, but not from the heart. God is no fool! He knows when we truly repent, and that is when we TURN FROM SIN.

Don't be fooled by a religious cloak on anyone! The Bible says, "In this the children of God are manifest, and the children of the devil: Whosoever doeth not righteousness is not of God, neither he that loveth not his brother." (I John 3:10) In other words, if they don't live right, they ain't right, no matter what they claim to be.

Yes, every born-again believer has the carnal man still wanting to rise up within him, and occasionally temptation or trial may cause him to err. When we do, we must quickly reconcile ourselves unto God. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (I John 1:9) But we must not take this promise as a license to willfully commit sin against God.

Let me close today with a story about a man Jesus met in Jerusalem beside the pool of Bethesda. This man had lived for thirty-eight years with an infirmity which had rendered him lame. Jesus healed this man, and he was able immediately to take up his bed and walk. Later, when Jesus found this man in the temple, he left him with these words: "...Behold, thou art made whole: sin no more, lest a worse thing come unto thee." (John 5:14) God cannot bless the life that is steeped in sin. Every day for the born-again believer is a soul-searching time with God, asking Him to reveal the areas of our lives which need to be cleansed. Only

then can we forsake the things that do not please God, and He is free to bless us with peace and happiness. Remember. "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have much." (Prov 28:13)

Marfa, Texas, circa 1920's. This 1st Cavalry Division review was photographed at the army field training area, located near the town of Marfa, Texas. The army term, "Division", designates all Regiments assigned to the First Cavalry Division, of which includes the 5th Cavalry Regiment, which during the 1920's was garrisoned at Fort Clark. Each Regiment was assigned a Regimental Band, and as shown in this photograph in the foreground, is a mounted band, in the correct position on the line of troops, which is located with the left of its front rank 16 yards from the flank of the regiment. The trumpeters (buglers) form with the band, and to the rear.

Military bands have long been considered very important as morale builders for the troops, as well as an important means of stimulating patriotism within military and civilians as well. During the Indian wars, it was not where the battle was to be fought. Lt. Col. George Custer's wife Elizabeth, wrote several books regarding their adventures during the Indian wars, and she mentioned that not only did the band follow the troops to battle, but on some occasions, the wives of the officers also went as far as the band did. How many modern day wives would follow suite, if the military allowed it?

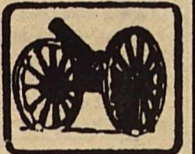

CONTROLLING RABIES

We are in the height of the season when families are frequently at parks, lakes and beaches. But, as you head for these out-of-the-way places, watch out for strange-acting wild animals. Bites by animals in the wild may cause rabies. We, as humans, are warm-blooded and, like all animals, are susceptible to rabies that is a viral disease of the central nervous system which, without treatment, is invariably fatal.

Rabies can be controlled if people understand the problem and know what to watch out for. These signs should alert you to a potentially dangerous situation:

- Bold, friendly or "apparently tame" wild animals.
- Night animals, such as skunks or foxes, that are seen during the day.
- Pets that have difficulty walking, eating or drinking.
- Signs of excitement of viciousness in normally quiet animals.

A veterinarian should be consulted immediately if any of these signs are noted.

If a person is bitten by an animal, treat the bite as if the animal were rabid and follow these steps:

- Identify the animal - by kind, size, color and location. Caution children to seek help of the local police or other adults.

- Have the animal caught, and immediately report the incident to the animal control officials or police. Keep the animal in sight until it is apprehended. Trying to catch the animal without professional help could increase the risks.

- Cleanse the wound immediately and thoroughly by washing with soap and water. Rinse well and disinfect with alcohol, iodine, or other disinfectants. This lessens the chance of contracting the rabies virus.

- See a doctor immediately after washing the wound. The physician will decide on the need for treatment to prevent rabies.

- If possible, have the biting dog or cat tested for rabies or placed under observation. If the animal is alive and normal after 10 days of observation, the animal was not infective at the time of the bite. A veterinarian should be consulted concerning all aspects of this confinement period. The 10-day observation period is not valid for animals other than dogs or cats. Wild animals, such as skunks, bats, foxes, and raccoons should be immediately submitted by a veterinarian for laboratory rabies examination.

Control of rabies can be a community effort in the form of:

- Annual immunization of all dogs and cats over three months of age.
- Registering and licensing all owned dogs and cats.
- If there is no animal control officer, appoint one and provide a pound or shelter facilities.

- Testing all biting dogs and cats or quarantining them for observation for a period of 10 days.

The treatment for rabies is not as severe as it once was, but remember, rabies is fatal in humans if left untreated, so take the right steps if you think you may have had contact with an infected animal.

FEW WEEKS LEFT



You can expect beef to be the center of attraction when an invitation comes for a Texas barbecue, for it is the staff of life in these parts. There may be some chicken or smoked sausage, but not necessarily. The barbecue sauce used by Texans may be more likely described as a basting sauce used in cooking to flavor and moisten the meat. It usually does not even taste good, so any favorite barbecue sauce can be served with the meat, if desired. However, purists prefer just the smoked flavor.

BARBECUE SAUCE

- 1 1/2 cups cooking oil
- 1 clove garlic minced
- Dash of pepper
- 1 lime thinly sliced
- 1/2 medium onion, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 cups vinegar
- 1/2 cup red wine

Combine all ingredients in a saucepan; bring to a boil. cook over medium heat 5 minutes. Use warm as a basting sauce.

BARBECUED BRISKET

- 1 (4-6 pound) boneless beef brisket
- 1/2 gallon vinegar
- 2 cups mesquite chips
- hot water
- Barbecue Sauce (see above)

Place meat in a large container, and pour vinegar over it. Cover; chill 4 to 6 hours.

Soak mesquite chips in water enough to cover; set aside.

Prepare charcoal fire in a smoker, and let burn 10 to 15 minutes. drain meat well. Place food rack in smoker. Place meat on rack; grill over medium coals 4 to 5 minutes on each side or until browned. Remove rack and meat from smoker.

Drain mesquite chips, and add to charcoal in smoker. Place water pan in smoker, and fill with water. Place rack and meat, fat side down, in smoker. Cover and cook over low coals about 5 hours.

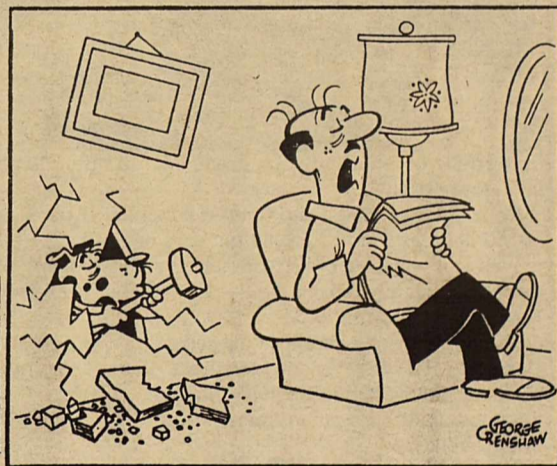

CHOCOLATETOWN SPECIAL CAKE

This recipe comes to us from the Hershey's chocolate people:

½ cup Hershey's Cocoa
 ½ cup boiling water
 ¾ cup shortening
 1¼ cups sugar
 1 tsp. vanilla
 2 eggs
 2¼ cups unsifted all-purpose flour
 1½ tps. baking soda
 ½ tsp. salt
 1½ cups buttermilk or sour milk

Stir together cocoa and boiling water in small bowl until smooth; set aside. Cream shortening, sugar and vanilla in large mixer bowl until light and fluffy. Add eggs; beat well. Combine flour, baking soda and salt; add alternately with



buttermilk or sour milk to creamed mixture. Blend in cocoa mixture.

Pour in two greased and floured 9-inch layer pans. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 35 to 40 minutes or until cake tester comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pans. Cool completely; frost with Chocolate Buttercream Frosting (recipe follows).

6 Tb. butter or margarine (softened)
 Hershey's Cocoa (½ cup for light flavor, ½ cup for medium flavor, ¾ cup for dark flavor)
 2¾ cups unsifted confectioners' sugar
 ½ cup milk
 1 tsp. vanilla

Cream butter or margarine in small mixer bowl. Add cocoa and confectioners' sugar alternately with milk; beat to spreading consistency (additional Tb. milk may be needed). Blend in vanilla.
