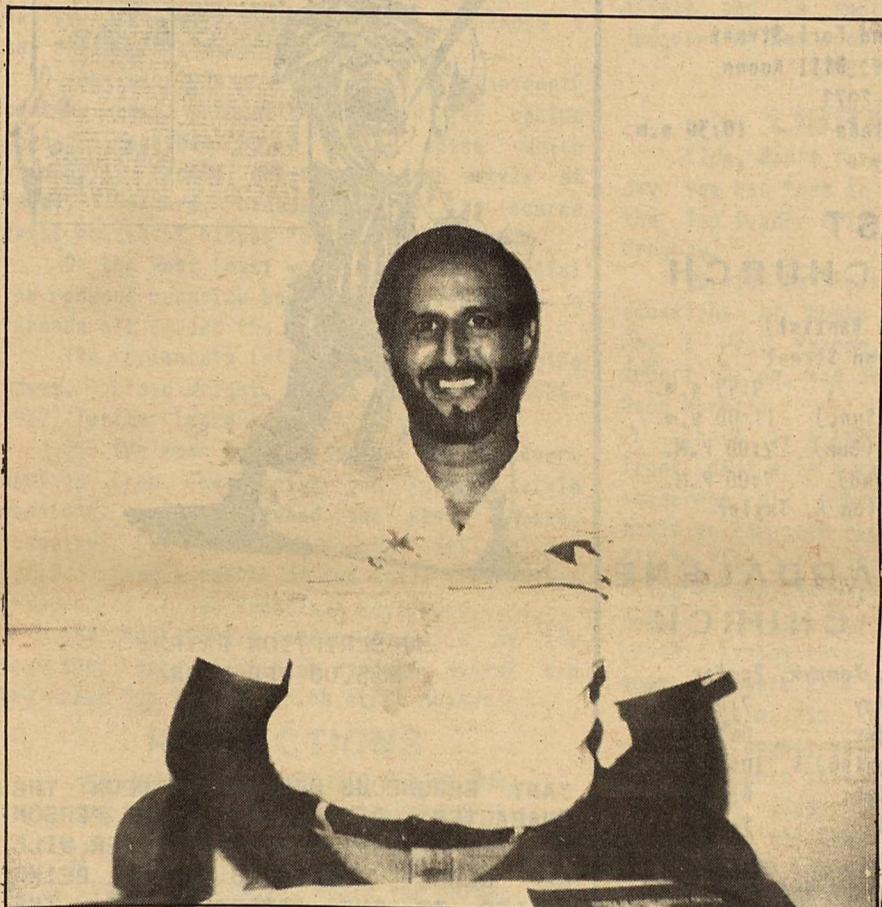

CITY HIRES CITY ADMINISTRATOR



David Esperza was hired as City Administrator Monday, August 20, 1990, by the City Council.

David was born and raised in Brackettville, Texas, graduated from Brackett High in 1968 and attended Community College in San Antonio where he completed a course in bookkeeping.

A total of 15 years of management and bookkeeping experience is credited to David in various position he has held in the past. He worked for Pena and Davis Hardware for many years and has been working recently for the Postal service here in Brackettville and some in Del Rio, Tx.

His concern for our community is shown in his work as board member of the Brackettville Housing Authority and his work with Little League. He also umpires and referees baseball and football games.

Although David's duties do not officially start until Monday, August 27th, he is already at City Hall enthusiastically "learning the ropes".

David is very concerned about our Community. Among his concerns are the maintenance of the streets and resolving the Land Fill Problem.

When asked what his expectations are, Esperza said, "I hope I can serve the people of this town and improve the City".

BORDER PATROL MOVE INTO NEW BUILDING

The Brackettville Border Patrol has moved into their new building as of August 18, 1990.

The building was constructed by local Border Patrol agents and

the United States International Guard. The International Guard members came from various locations in the United States. Several local contractors assisted with specialty items that needed to be done.

Since new furnishings will be received and when the inventory is completed and the regional offices gives their permission, they anticipate giving the old furnishings to local Governmental agencies.

There is still some minor work to be done. A permanent parking lot, landscaping, and some small modifications inside and out have to be done. When this is completed, the building will be up to Chief Runyans expectation of 110%.

It has taken approximately ten (10) months to complete this nice building. The old building was less than 1/2 the size of the new building. With the number of agents that are working here now, it was too crowded to perform daily job functions with ease. The new building allows them to be more efficient at their jobs as well as boosting the moral of the agents.

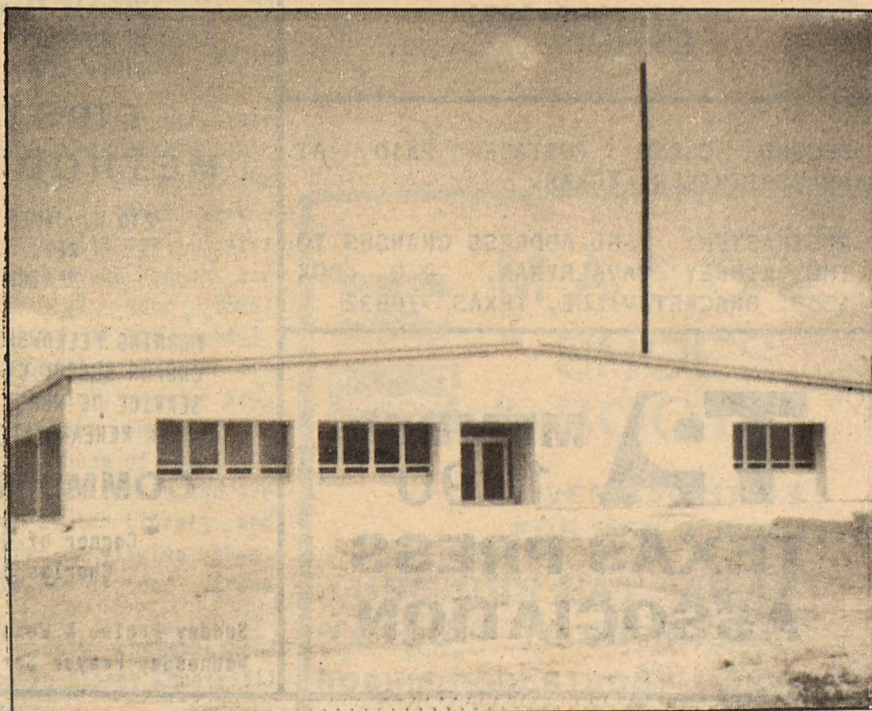
Mr. Runyan does not foresee any additions to the staff in the near future.

The settlers of colonial times built log cabins, frame houses, and dried brick in style of their homeland. As the frontier moved further west the materials were hard to get so the builders had to come up with new ideas and materials.

In the far West the Indians built pueblos, which the Spanish copied when they came. They were built on low lines and flat roofs to catch what little rain they might have. Wood and native stone were scarce so they developed a sun dried brick made from the earth.

The usual Texas house of the nineteenth century land and cattle boom was two cabins joined together by a roofed space which eventually became the ranch house style of today. Farmers, because wood was so scarce built houses of blocks roofed with thatch.

On the West Coast where wood was plentiful the redwood bungalow became the style, with a veranda all around the house.

The Orientals influenced the landscaping ideas. Lloyd Wright, famous architect (1869-1957) further improved on this type.

On the West Coast, Western architecture evolved from the Spanish and Moorish style mansions. In Hollywood the ranch house, bungalow, Chinese and Japanese styles were built. Even a castle or two until the glass skyscrapers of San Francisco developed.

The most famous castle was built by the newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst and was named San Simeon, which still stands.

Most Churches have activities on Sunday morning as well as evening services on Sunday and Wednesday.

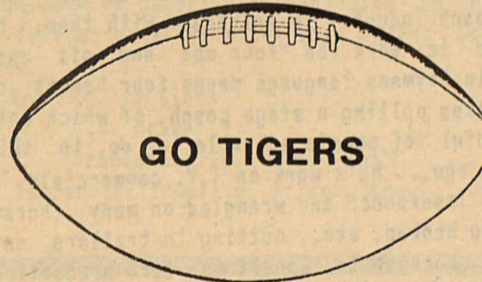
We want our members to participate in all the community activities possible, but we do need the members to support their local Churches in those activities which have continued at scheduled times for years.

COMSTOCK LAWYER HONORED

At the recent gathering of the State Bar of Texas in Dallas, the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association presented the President's Commendation of the association to Martin Underwood of Comstock. The award recognized Underwood's "outstanding service on behalf of the citizen accused that exemplifies the highest standards and goals of this association and promotes justice through law". During the public presentation of the award, the president of the association, James Bobo, recounted the case upon which the award was based, which involved an alleged murder in Jeff Davis County which was demonstrated to have been a suicide instead. Underwood was also selected to be a director of the TCDLA for a six-year term.

Underwood, who has practiced criminal law in West Texas for fifteen years, commented that this case was a good lesson for young lawyers and also for the public to realize that they should not be awed by the use of the news media by prosecutors to present "overwhelming expert evidence" which may disintegrate under the scrutiny of twelve ordinary citizens on a jury.

SCHOOL TAX TO INCREASE

The Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees has voted its intent to increase school property taxes from .8571 to 1.04 cents for 1990-91. There are two factors involved in the increase. These are Senate Bill 1 (SB1) and the recent air conditioning of the public schools.

The air conditioning project had a cost of about \$173,000. This lease purchase debt will be funded over a five year period at about \$40,000 per year. This amounts to a .06 cent increase in property tax. The estimated increased cost of utilities for the operation of the system and Central Power and Light fifty percent rate increase will cost the district an additional \$16,000. to \$18,000. per year, or

Superintendent Bob McCall noted, "The cost of running a school continues to rise like everything else. Our utilities go up, salary costs increase, teaching supplies and materials also continue escalating in price." He further stated, "Salaries continue to be the biggest expense to the District." The average teacher's salary has grown from about \$14,000. in 1982 to around \$25,000. today.

Since 1984 state mandated programs have increased costs for school districts. Among these mandates are:

1. PreKindergarten for disadvantaged four year olds.
2. Gifted and Talented programs K-12
3. 1:22 teacher:student ratio
4. Tutorials at all levels
5. Remedial classes at high school
6. Expanded course offerings
7. Computer literacy at junior high level
8. Computer Science at high school level

"These programs are beneficial," Superintendent McCall noted, "but they do cost money and the state did not send money to pay for the programs."

Senate Bill 1 (SB1) changed the structure of school finance. The crucial issue is the premise that all districts that receive state aid should be at \$1.18 effective rate by 1994-95. Districts do not have to raise their rates, but the penalty for not getting to \$1.18 is a substantial loss of state funding. The potential loss for Brackett Independent School District approaches 2.2 million in state money by 1995, if the district does not raise its rates.

Citizens can help school districts by lobbying the legislature for one major reform: The state government must fully fund any mandates on local districts. "Representative Dan Morales has pushed for this legislation for the past four years, but most legislators had rather let local property tax payers suffer than adopt a state tax increase," Superintendent McCall noted.

PUBLIC HEARING ON TAX INCREASE

Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees will hold a hearing at 6:30 p.m. in the high school library on Thursday, August 23, 1990 regarding the proposed property tax increase from .8571 to \$1.04. Citizens are urged to attend to ask questions and to express their views.

A formal vote on the tax increase is scheduled for Tuesday, August 28, 1990 in the Board Room at the School District Central Office.

As with everything that you undertake, to be successful, you need a plan. This is true with a successful landscape or garden. In lawn care, a plan for fertilizing, watering and mowing all contribute to a well cared-for lawn.

The rate of fertilizer application, the frequency of application, the ratio of nutrients in the fertilizer and the source of the nitrogen all have a great deal to do with how fast the lawn grows.

The following fertilizer plan is designed to allow the lawn to grow at a reasonable rate and still have good color.

FERTILIZER	APPLICATION RATE IN LBS./ 1000 SQ. FEET
12-4-8	8
15-5-10	7
21-7-17	5
16-4-8	6
20-5-10	5
19-5-9	5

These are just some examples of the rate of a given fertilizer depending on the amount of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium which are the three numbers in each formulation.

For slow, even growth, use a fertilizer containing sulfur-coated urea as a nitrogen source rather than the soluble forms for the spring and summer applications. The soluble forms such as urea or ammonium sulfate tend to produce very fast growth for short periods of time.

Turfgrasses vary in their need for water: tall fescue requires the most water, then in their order of requirement follows St. Augustine "Tif" bermuda, Zoysia, Common bermuda and Buffalograss (which requires the least of these of these listed).

During the driest period of the summer, our lawns require at least one inch of water every 5-6 days. Most hose sprinklers put one 1/4 to 1/3 of an inch of water per hour, so they would need to run approximately 4 hours in one spot. If the water runs off the lawn before the 1 inch is applied, turn the sprinkler off, let the water soak in for about an hour and then continue watering.

The best time to water is early morning, so less water is lost by evaporation. The worst time to water is in the evening because the lawn stays wet all night. This encourages disease development. Lawns watered too frequently tend to develop shallow root systems which may make them more susceptible to grub damage.

The rule of thumb for mowing lawns is not to remove more than one-third of the leaf surface at any one time. If you use the following schedule, you probably will not need to bag your grass clippings.

Grass clippings left on your lawn do not necessarily contribute to thatch, but will return valuable nutrients to the soil. They usually contain about 4 percent nitrogen, 0.5 percent phosphorus and about 2 percent potassium, as well as many other minor nutrients.

Grass clippings make excellent compost for gardens. Compost use is the best way to improve garden soil because it returns nutrients to the soil and improves the soil's physical characteristics.

Dates to keep in mind for application of fertilizer are April 1, July 15, and October 1. These dates apply to Common Bermuda, Tif Bermuda, St. Augustine and Zoysia. Buffalograss simply needs the April 1st application. Also remember you can use a slow release fertilizer in the spring and summer but use a fast release in the fall so you will not prolong grass growth into a freeze.

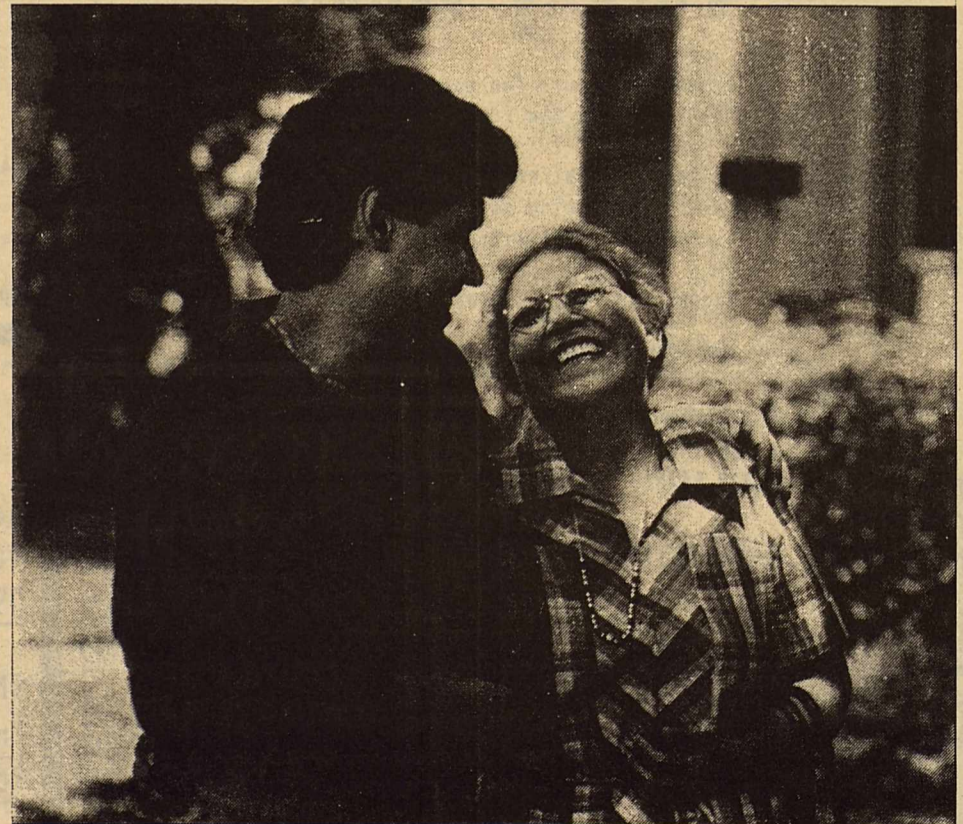

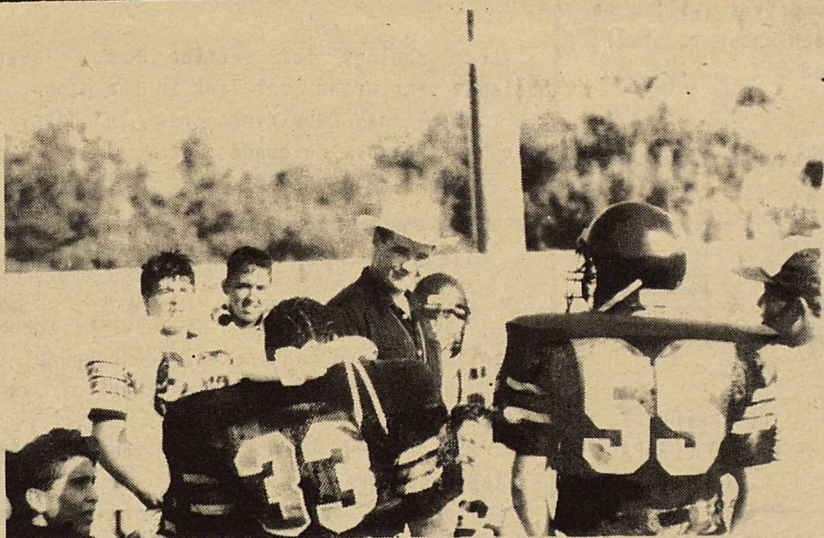
