## BRACKETT ISD BOARD CONSIDERS LOCAL POLICY REVISIONS AND SALARY STUDY

The Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees met on Monday, September 10, 1990, for the regular monthly meeting. During this meeting, Superintendent Bob McCall reviewed revisions on the following local policies: school attorney, taping of board meetings and executive sessions, student insurance, controversial teaching issues, employee standards of conduct, fire prevention, and conduct on school premises.

Mr. Quinton Etzel, school attorney, was present to inform the Board on the taping of open and closed sessions. Mr. McCall stated that the taping of executive sessions would be the most accurate way to document executive session items.

In other action, the Board approved a salary study to be done by the Texas Association of School Boards. This study is to help the district with some long range planning. Bob McCall stated that TASB would come in, appraise salaries as they are now, and give some guidelines as to where paraprofessional, nonprofessional, custodial, and even teaching salaries should be in five years. The Board also approved the elementary and secondary student handbooks for the 1990-91 school year.

## SCHOOL BOARD ADOPTS POLICY FOR CHARGING CAFETERIA MEALS

The Board of Trustees adopted a policy for students charging meals in the school cafeteria on Monday evening during the regular meeting. The policy allows a student to charge up to five meals and then a letter will be mailed to parents notifying them of the charges. If the student reaches ten charges without payment, the student will then begin to receive an alternate lunch until such time as the department is paid. For those students who graduate or move from Brackett ISD without paying for charged lunches, transcripts and transfer records will not be released until the department is paid in full.

## SABINAL SLIPS BY BRACKETT

SABINAL-The Fightin' Tigers opened their 1990 campaign on the road in Sabinal last Friday. The Tigers fought hard, but came up short as the Yellowjackets edged Brackett 16-14.

The Tigers struck first blood in the second quarter when Lesley Floyd scored from 4 yards out. Brackett quarterback Clay Hunt connected with tailback Steve Clementz for the two-point conversion.

Brackett built up a 14-0 lead when Arturo Falcon dashed 20 yards for another Tiger TD. The extra point attempt failed.

Sabinal scored their first points with three and a half minutes remaining in the first half when Jimmy Martinez threw a 45 yard touchdown pass to Ray Silvas. Brackett then led 14-6 going into the second half.

Juan Medina got Sabinal back on the scoreboard in the third quarter when he ran 11 yards for a TD. Martinez tied up the score 14-14 when he scored the conversion on a quarterback keeper.

With 9:29 left in the game, Sabinal scored the winning points on a safety when Brackett attempted a punt in their end zone.

Brackett had last minutes hopes when Lesley Floyd returned a punt 53 yards giving the Tigers possession of the ball deep in Yellowjack territory, but the Tigers couldn't convert.

Clementz led the Tigers in rushing with 61 yards, while Michael Flores had 49. Buddy Brandt was Brackett's leading tackler. He also grabbed an interception.

Brackett will face D'Hanis on the road this Saturday. Go out and support the Tigers as they lasso the Cowboys at 8:00 P.M.

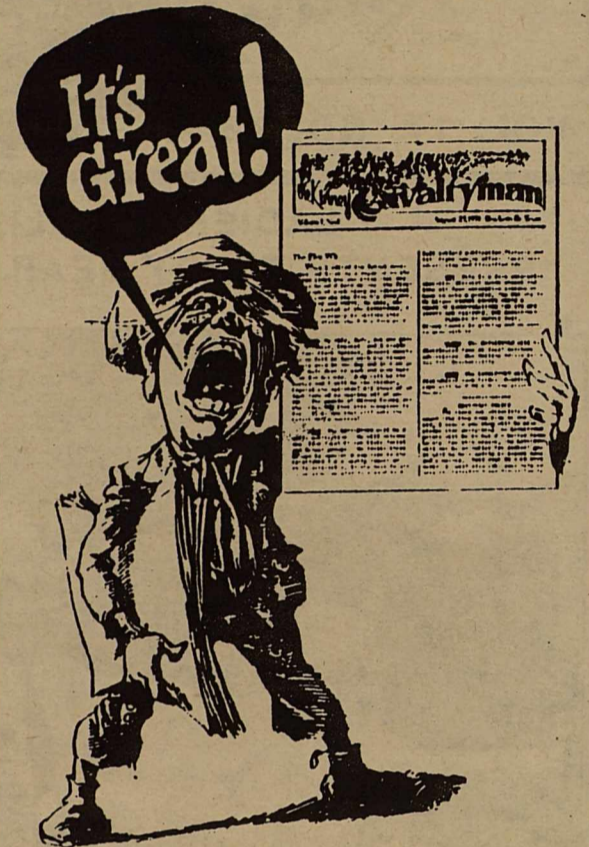

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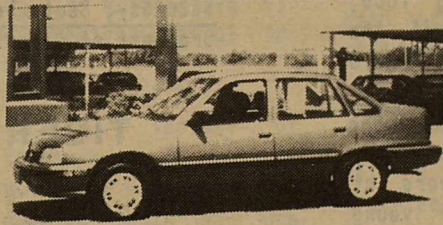
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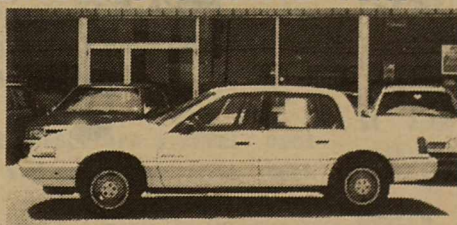

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**TIGERETTE VOLLEYBALL**

The Brackettville Tigerettes competed in the Utopia Invitational Volleyball tournament last Saturday. They made it to the consolation championship where they were defeated by Sabinal in three games.

Brackett faced Comfort in the opening round. Both teams started off slow as the first five servers couldn't put the ball into play. Rhonda Blaschke got things rolling for Comfort and didn't stop. She built up a twelve point lead with her serving abilities. When the Tigerettes were finally able to break Blaschke's, they responded with an ace from Tanya Frerich for Brackett's first point. Theresa Terrazas scored 3 more Tigerette points including an ace, but Comfort went on to win the first game 15-4.

Comfort once again took a quick lead with five points from Lydia Argona. Brackett faught back with three points from Valerie Talamantez and an ace from Wendy McDaniel, but Comfort rallied to build up yet another lead with an 11-4 score. Jennifer Shahan faught back for Brackett scoring six straight service points to pull the Tigerettes back within one point. Comfort didn't allow Brackett another chance as they won the second game 15-10.

The Tigeretts then faced the Trojanettes from Asherton. Brackett didn't waste any time as they were victorious 15-3, 15-2. Wendy McDaniel led Brackett with a total of nine points in the two games. Jennifer Shahan and Valerie Talamantez scored 6 apiece, while Tanya Frerich had 5, Lisa Wardsaw had 3, and Dorothy Ward scored one.

The Tigerettes then went head-to-head with rival Sabinal in the consolation finals. Brackett started the first game off with a 3-0 lead by the strong serving of Talamantez. Sabinal took their only lead in the first game when Korey Spence scored four points including an ace making the score 7-6. Brackett went on to win the first game 15-9.

Sabinal still held a seven point lead when they got to game point, as they led 14-7. 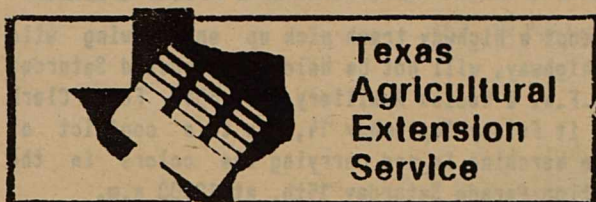

An alternative method for those gardeners who do not like the use of so many chemicals around the home is solarization of the soil. A non-chemical control for some soil-borne plant diseases may be as simple as using clear plastic sheeting to "pasteurize" the soil.

Soil solarization is an excellent method to reduce the incidence, in small areas, of some of the soil diseases that affect our gardens in this area. Before applying the plastic covering, you will need to till the soil and be sure the soil is moist. Moisture is important in conducting heat under the plastic.

Spread the plastic sheeting, using a minimum of 2 ml thickness, over the area and seal the edges. Leave the plastic in place for at least 30 days or more. The hotter the weather, the better this method will work.

Soil solarization works well between a spring garden and a fall garden planted on the same site. In addition to reducing the amount of disease-causing fungi, the process may help control some weeds. The system does not consistently reduce the number of root knot nematodes, which are a major pest in many garden soils.

In an area where a fall garden or an early spring garden will be planted, try giving solarization a chance. Although this method is not perfect, it is a definite alternative for those folks seeking a non-chemical control for some plant disease organisms.

The 4-H program offers a variety of learning experiences to young people with a desire to learn more about their world.

The program is open to youth who are enrolled in the third grade through 19 years old. Young people can get involved in project groups, special interest groups or service groups that appeal to their interests.

While 4-H meetings cover a variety of subjects and activities and are held periodically, project groups, work on one specific subject and last only until the project is completed. Project subjects may include gardening, raising and caring for animals, safety, clothing and shooting sports. These project groups are usually directed by a volunteer leader.

Special interest groups are a vital part of the 4-H program and may deal with such subjects as drugs, dating, etiquette and ecology. These group studies help youth learn more about the world in which they live and help them to better adapt to changing environments.

Service groups work to help improve the community and may engage in fund raising projects for the needy and disadvantaged or work on neighborhood beautification or with under privileged youth.

The 4-H program is a good way to get involved in today's world. For more information this action-oriented youth program, contact the Kinney County Extension Office.

There will be a short county 4-H meeting with an adult leader and parent meeting to follow at 7:00 p.m., September 17, 1990 at the County Courthouse. All interested youth and parents are welcomed to attend.

Educational programs conducted by the Kinney County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

## COMMISSIONERS' COURT

The Commissioners Court met on Monday, September 10, 1990.

The minutes were read and approved. All bills and reports were approved as submitted.

It was unanimously approved to advertised for bids on a new loader for the County road department.

The new deputy sheriff's bond was approved.

The Nutrition Centers budget was adjusted for \$3,200.00 to pay bills and operating expenses until the end of this fiscal year.

The County Clerks budget was adjusted by transferring \$106.96 from IBM Typewriter maintenance to seminars line item. The County Clerk stated that her deputies need to go to school for more computer training.

Medical Insurance bids were taken for the County employees. No decisions were made yet as to which insurance company the County will buy insurance from. This will be decided at the next meeting.

It was approved to hire the same outside Audit firm this year as the County had last year.

A request from a Representative from Middle Rio Grande Council was made to the Court to agree to go with the 911 emergency system. The completed system will not be in operation for possibly another year or two. This was approved.

It was approved to advertise the Indigent Care rules and regulations.

The County agent's budget was adjusted for \$1,000.00. Several line items in the agents budget were transferred. The \$1,000.00 was transferred from the Cemetery Budget line item. The Sheriff's budget was adjusted for \$9,171.76. This amount was transferred from the Drug Task Force line item. Several line items were transferred within the Sheriff's budget.

It was approved to add the Rose Crossing on the Tularosa Road to the list of new low water crossing to be constructed by the County on the Tularosa Road.

A gate has been severely damaged that is located between the White and Bitter ranch on the Old Nueces River Road. A request had been made to the County to replace this gate. The County attorney stated that the County was not responsible for replacing gates or cattleguards on county roads. The Commissioners decided to use an old gate in good repair to replace the gate. This would not cost the County any money.

The meeting was adjourned.

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## V.F.W. TRASH PICK UP RESCHEDULED

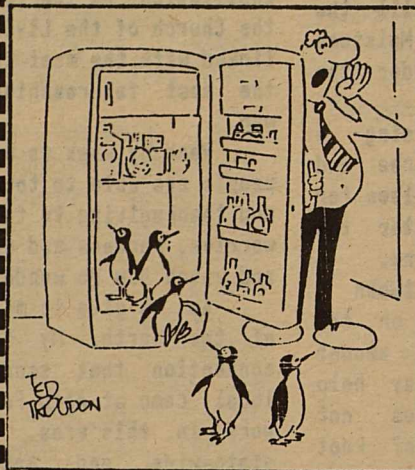

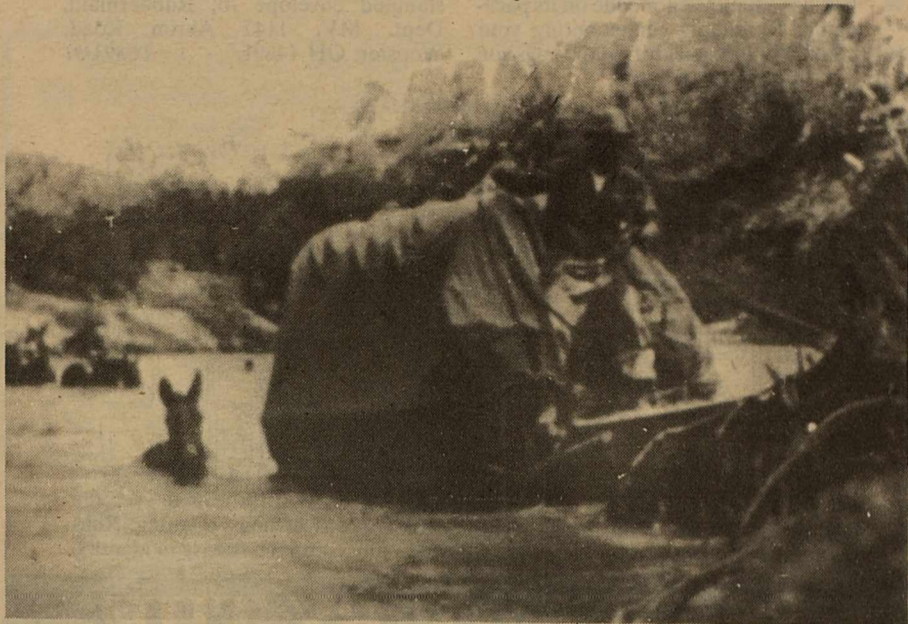

West Texas, 1920s. Fifth Cavalry wagon and team mules shown during a river crossing. When the cavalry went on a march, they did not necessarily keep to the roads. So when there were no bridges, there was only one way in which to cross the water.

The last stable area at Fort Clark for the Quartermaster mules and horses was located at the south east corner of Fort Clark Road and Scales Road. The area extended from Scales Road to approximately where the walking and golf cart path to and from Unit 14 is located and from Fort Clark Road to the east into about midway of Unit 14. Of course the large round concrete water tanks within this area were for the purpose of watering the animals.

Prior to the Quartermaster stable area and corrals being located in this area, they were located within the stone walls just north of where the Fort Clark Maintenance complex is now located. The open slots in the west side of these walls were there for the purpose of defense against attack. During the beginning years of Fort Clark, this old Quartermaster corral and wagon yard was the only real area of protection against attack that existed and when an attack occurred, all available military and civilians would assemble within these walls for protection and to repel the attackers. When the Quartermaster animals were moved to the new area this area was used for a motorpool.

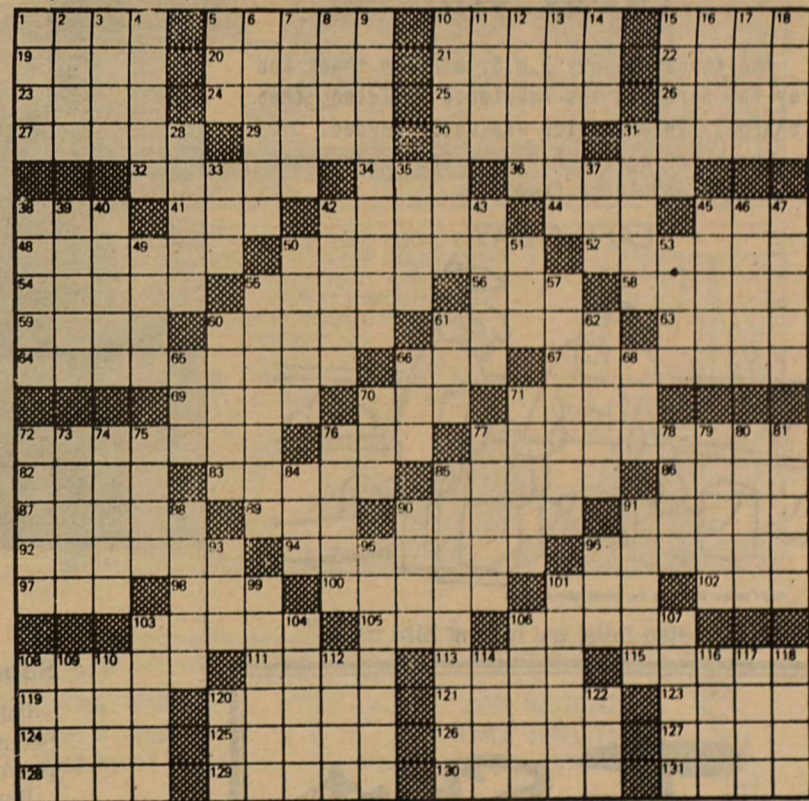

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

GENERAL ELECTION  
NOVEMBER 6, 1990

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

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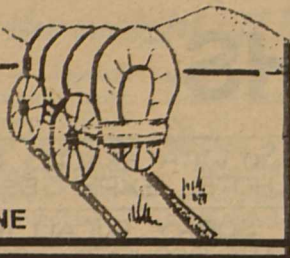
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## TRACKS ALONG THE TRAIL BY DORTHY PAYNE



The Alabama-Koasati Tribe left Texas in 1836, just before the battle of San Jacinto and went to Louisiana. After the war they returned to Texas. They roamed from one part of Texas to another before returning to their original home and were the only remaining tribe in Texas.

In 1875, the last of the Indian groups in Texas were removed out of the State to reservations in Indian Territory. Somehow the Alabama-Koasati Tribe managed to keep peace with their neighbors and all the various governments of Texas. And to top that off President Lamar of the Republic of Texas in 1840 backed a law which when passed gave this tribe two leagues of lands in East Texas.

In 1854 while white and red men were feuding along the Texas Frontier the tribe asked for 1280 additional acres of land and got it along with a deed from the State of Texas guaranteeing them title to this land forever. In 1928 the United States government further bought for them 3,071 more acres of land in Polk County next to their original grant, to be held in trust for them forever.

The Alabama-Koasati were on good terms with their neighbors, would not allow themselves to be drawn into war, got along with white politicians and stayed devoted to their own good and their own goodness. And they are still here in Texas, on their own reservation, on land they own, where they have been for more than one hundred years. They remain quite, unintruding, adaptable, agreeable and above all they are persistent.

## THE SIGNS OF THE TIMES BY BONNIE WHITE

"And it shall come to pass at that time, that I will search Jerusalem with candles, and punish the men that are settled on their lees: that say in their heart, The Lord will not do good, neither will he do evil." (Zeph 1:12)

Most American "Christians" do not really believe that God has the power nor the desire to do good, or to do evil; that somehow He just closed His eyes to sin, and never intends to stand behind His Word. Recently, the citizens of Texas were made acutely aware of the fact that evil is at work in the land as we heard of the kidnapping of Erica Botello and Heide Seeman, and as we learn more of the grizzly truth of their

deaths. Now that our children are back in school, we would be wise to remember the tragic events of August and review with our children the rules that will help protect them from individuals who do not have their best interest in mind. I suggest you discuss the following guidelines with your children.

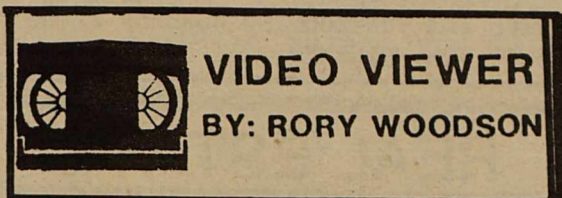
1. Give your child a healthy suspicion of strangers. A stranger is anyone the child does not know, even if the person acts like a friend or knows the child's name.
2. Children should never accept food or an automobile ride from a stranger.
3. Children should never play around a public restroom.
4. Your child should never open the door to a stranger and never enter a stranger's home. If your child is selling a product door-to-door, make sure he or she is accompanied by at least one friend.
5. If a stranger bothers your child, teach your child to remember the stranger's description, his clothing and the color and license number of his car. Call the police IMMEDIATELY.
6. Know the length of time it takes your child to walk to and from school. Immediately check any delay in your child's arrival at home.
7. Know the safest route to and from school and instruct your child to follow that route. If your children are to arrive home after dark, arrange to meet them.
8. Know your children's playmates and where they congregate. Visit the school and become acquainted with teachers and school officials.
9. Give the school instructions to release your child only to persons you have designated in writing.
10. Tell your children never to admit over the telephone or at the door that they are at home alone.
11. Be sure your babysitter is a responsible person and capable of acting in an emergency.
12. Children should be encouraged to talk with their parents any time they have a problem, whether the problem is with a stranger, friend or relative.
13. Do not give your children a large amount of money to carry to school.
14. If a stranger grabs your child, teach your child to scream; sit down or take action that will draw attention.

Our children deserve our care and protection. Please review these rules with your child to insure that he or she will enjoy a safe and productive school year.


