After high school graduation, Kasey plans to attend a smaller

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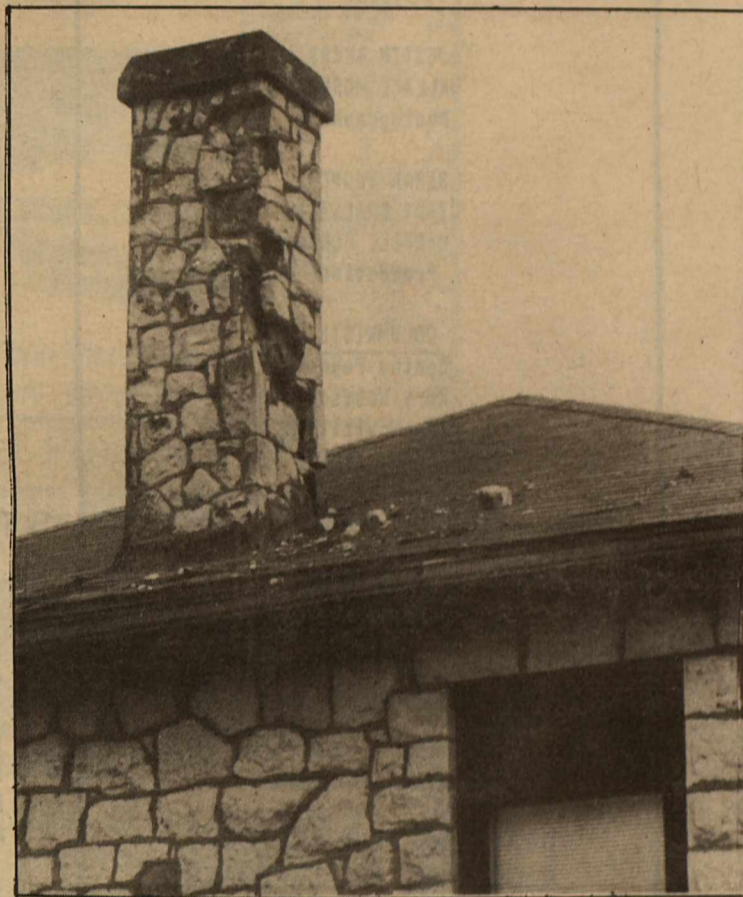
Lightning Strikes Patton Hall!

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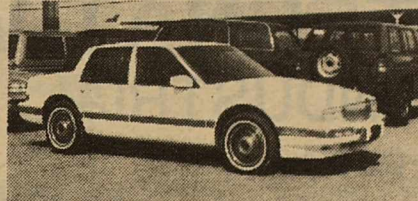

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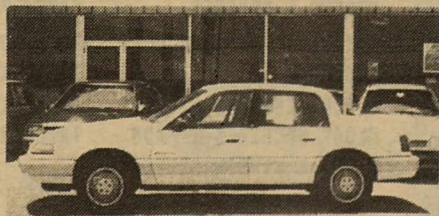
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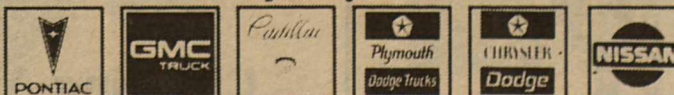


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Reflections

Patrick Dugan, a probation and parole officer of the Federal

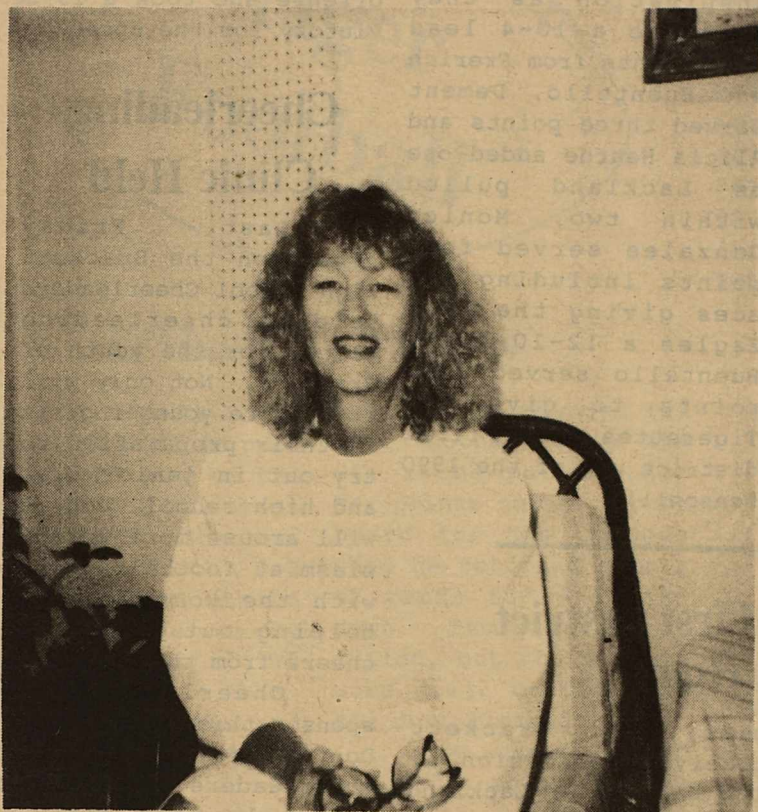

No Raise in County Tax Rate

Commissioners Court Special Meeting

A special Meeting of the Commissioners Court was held Monday, September 17, 1990. All Commissioners and Judge were present.

Bids for Medical Insurance for employees and County Official has been turned in or presented to Commissioners Court last meeting. It was decided unanimously by the Court to stay with Blue Cross and Blue Shield Insurance Co. for another year. Due to the excessive use of the Insurance this last year the insurance will cost the County an additional \$24,000.00.

The Constable and Sheriff fees were set.

A line item adjustment from the County Attorney's budget to the County Clerk's budget for a shredder was approved.

Since Mr. Graves the architect could not be reached, the final plans on the Courthouse annex had to be tabled til next meeting.

Ramon Garcia was hired as building and grounds caretaker.

The proposed budget for 1990 - 1991 was approved with a change of the addition of \$24,000.00 for County Medical Insurance.

It was voted unanimously to leave the Kinney County Tax rate the same as last year.

The census report was reported by the Judge as having discrepancies. The report was rejected by Commissioners Court.

Executive session was held and returning to regular session with no actions taken.

It was certainly a very pleasant surprise to see Commissioner Garza who is recovering from illness, in Court. Welcome back, Commissioner Garza and God bless you!

Joe Garza, Jr. ask for the floor to praise the Ambulance attendants for a very wonderful job that they are doing. He said that he honestly felt that their prompt attention help save his father life. The appreciation that Mr. Garza, Jr. expressed was well received by the Commissioners Court.

Realignment in the NFL

The National Football League recently announced that it will expand by two teams in 1993 and begin realignment in 1992. Complete realignment would take place in 1994. I am in favor of these moves, but I think more must be done by the powers that be in the NFL to hold teams in place once the realignment has occurred.

Realignment — a reorganization of the divisions and conferences — would be done along geographical boundaries and hopefully would have several benefits. First, it would solve the dilemma of teams like the Phoenix Cardinals who play in the NFC East Division, despite the fact that they are three time zones away from most of the division, and the Atlanta Falcons who are in the NFC West, clear across the country from their time zone. That makes for some hard road trips.

Realignment also would, ideally, create some natural rivalries that should exist now and don't because of current alignment. It would be great to see teams like the Houston Oilers and the Dallas Cowboys in the same division. Right now they aren't even in the same conference and rarely play a regular season game. Their annual preseason games are always great, with the winner promised "the bragging rights to Texas." Regular division play between these two teams could create one of the hottest rivalries in football. The same situation exists with the Miami Dolphins and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers who rarely see each other during the regular season.

But a true rivalry is built on more than geographical location; it is built on great players playing against each other year after year. One of the great rivalries of all time is the Green Bay Packers and the Chicago Bears. I was lucky to be playing for Chicago and feel what that rivalry was like during its heyday. Players like Dick Butkus, Bart Starr, Ray Nitzchke and Paul Hornung lived for football and great competition. Fans want to hang their hats on players, and it's tough these days with everyone jumping from team to team. Great football traditions are built on guys like Walter Payton. I couldn't imagine Payton pulling the business that some players do, always looking for a better deal somewhere else.

Some team owners are even worse. Guys like Cardinals owner Bill Bidwell, who pulled out of St. Louis for Phoenix, and Robert Irsay, who left Baltimore for Indianapolis, will cause problems for realignment if they are allowed to pull up stakes at any time. Again, rivalries are not built on greed, but love for the game, and a city and a team that stick together. The NFL must, when studying realignment, find a way to better control an owner's right to move a team. There has to be a commitment to NFL cities. Without a lasting commitment, the game will be in trouble, and realignment will have been for nothing. **ll**

Tigerettes Play First District Game At Home

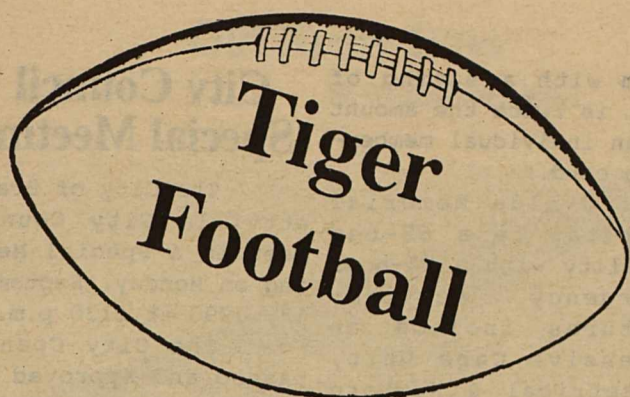

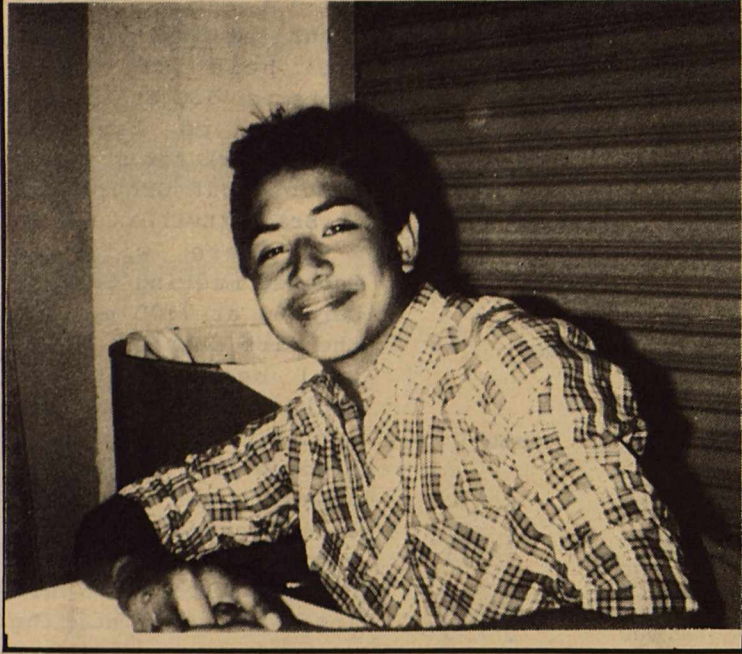

The UvalCare care entitles members discounts of 10 to 40% on routine diagnostic tests such as X-ray, EKG and mammography. A discount of over 50% will be given to cardmembers needing screenings such as blood sugar, cholesterol or triglycerides. Other benefits include a quick check in and check out of the hospital, a 15% discount on the member's hospital bill if paid within 30 days of statement, physician referral service, insurance filing assistance,

quarterly healthwise seminars, quarterly wellness newsletter, and a free phone and TV while in the hospital. The card provides also for discounts on home medical equipment and cafeteria meals.

Hospital Board Chairman Deborah McDonald praised the new program as yet another way Uvalde Memorial Hospital is striving towards its goal of providing better care and service to area residents. "We have a quality facility with more than 20 physician specialists practicing here, so there's no need for Uvalde citizens to drive all the way to San Antonio when they can receive quality health care right here at home," McDonald pointed out. "And, now with the UvalCare Card Membership discounts on diagnostic tests and screenings make staying at home even more attractive than ever," she added.

Cost of the UvalCare Card is \$15 a year for individuals and \$25 for a family with two to four members. Additional

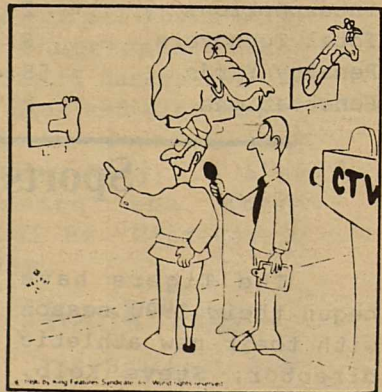
After the clean up was done we all went to the NCO Club where we were served a delicious breakfast that our food

As chairmen and coordinators with the highway department Walt & Dot Fithian want to thank each and every one of you for coming out and doing your part in this community project.



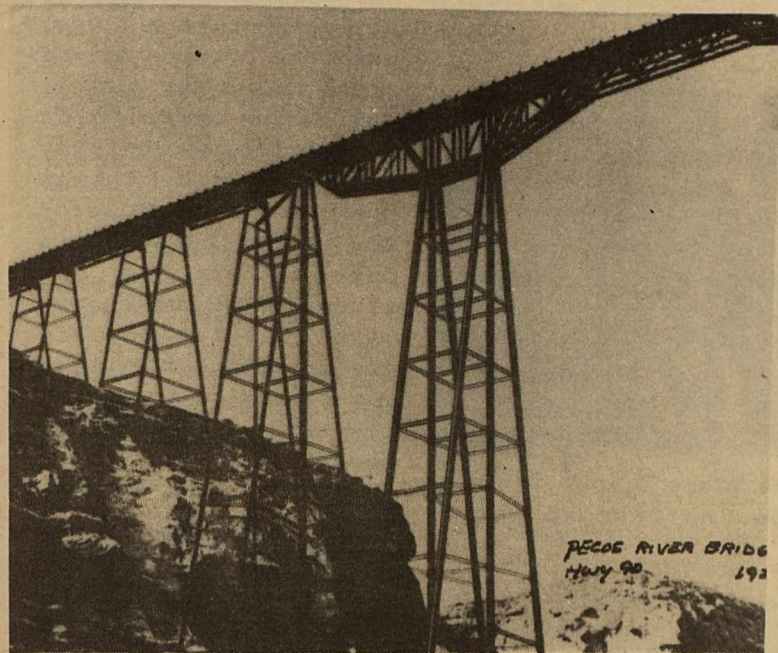

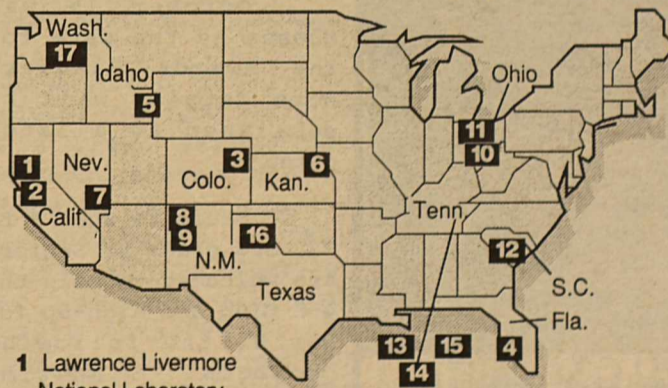
Little League Sponsor Award

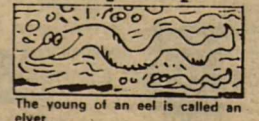

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

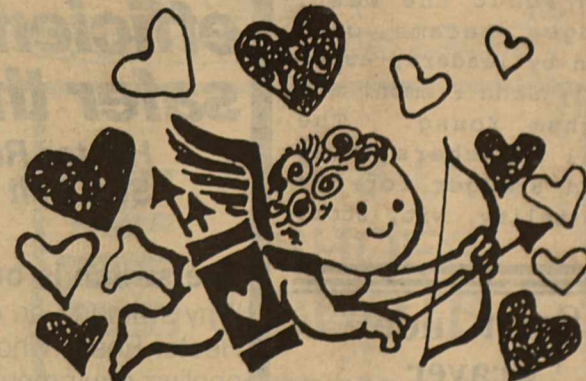
Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

Tracks along the trail

James Bridger born in 1804 was a legend in his own time. He was born in Richmond Virginia on March 17, 1804. He became an orphan at thirteen years of age. In 1822 he read a newspaper ad for trappers along the Missouri and answered it. He became a mountain man and for the next twenty years trapped and roamed all over the west.

In 1824 he discovered the great Salt Lake and explored the Yellowstone region. His stories about the wonders of Yellowstone was not always believed because its wonders were so unusual.

When fashions changed and fur hats were out of style, Bridger established Fort Bridger in Wyoming. It was in reality a way station on the trail.

Because he knew so much about the west, Bridger became well known by leaders, especially John Fremont and Brigham Young. The local ranchers also liked Bridger for his hospitality, wit, story

telling and knowledge of the mountains.

After being driven from his place by the Mormons in 1857, he became a guide and since he fished and hunted that area he was much sought after. He retired for a time but soon returned as a government scout. Bridger was guiding many hunting parties.

He guided Johnston's expedition against the Mormons in 1857-1858. At his retirement he managed to acquire three Indian wives and four children. Bridger died near Kansas City in 1881.

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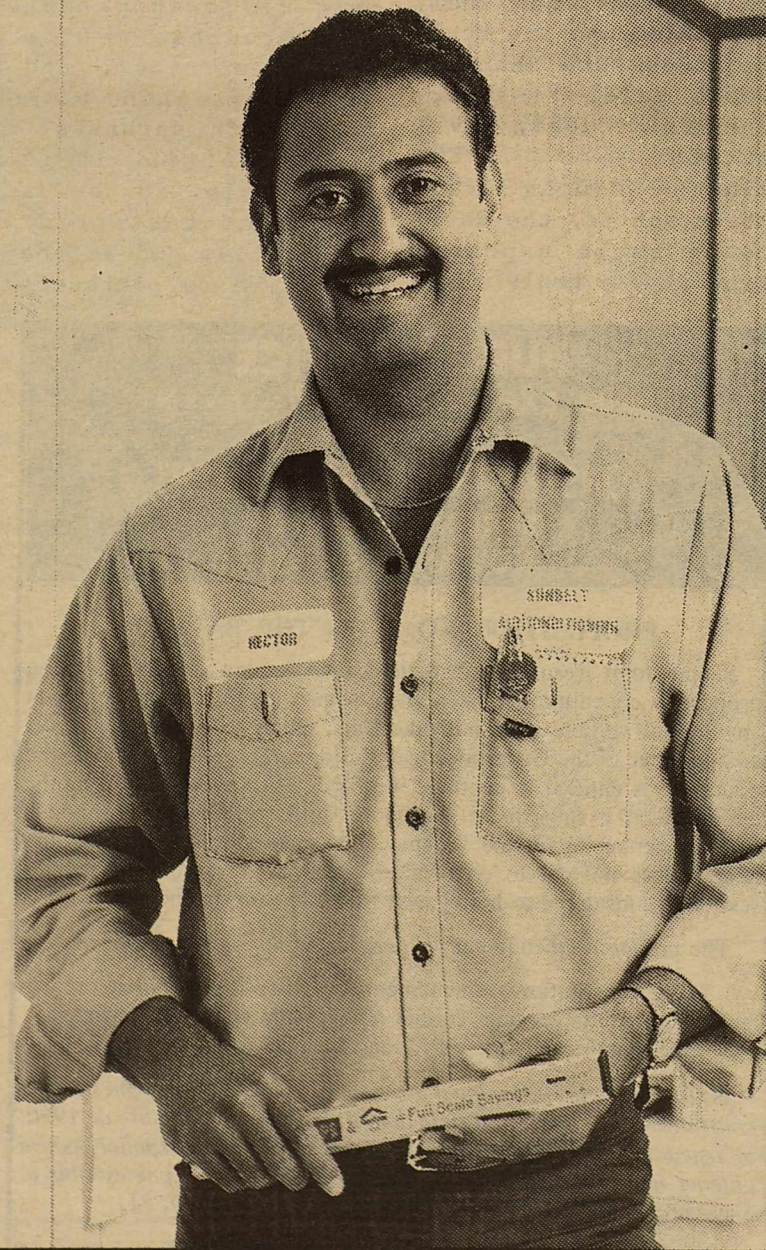

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
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
