Vehicle Accident Claims Life of Local Resident

Eloy Hernandez Garcia, 51, of Brackettville was killed in a one vehicle rollover at 12:00 noon on October 16, 1990. The accident happened 29 1/2 miles North of Comstock on RR 1024 in Val Verde County, Texas. Ronald Mata, also of Brackettville sustained minor injuries. The accident happened when the vehi-

cle ran off the rightside then swerved across the roadway sliding sideways. The vehicle overturned two times in the ditch and pasture throwing Eloy out.

Eloy was killed instantly and was pronounced dead at the scene by J.P. Fred Brockwell, Precinct 4, Val Verde County.

Rattlers are Still Moving

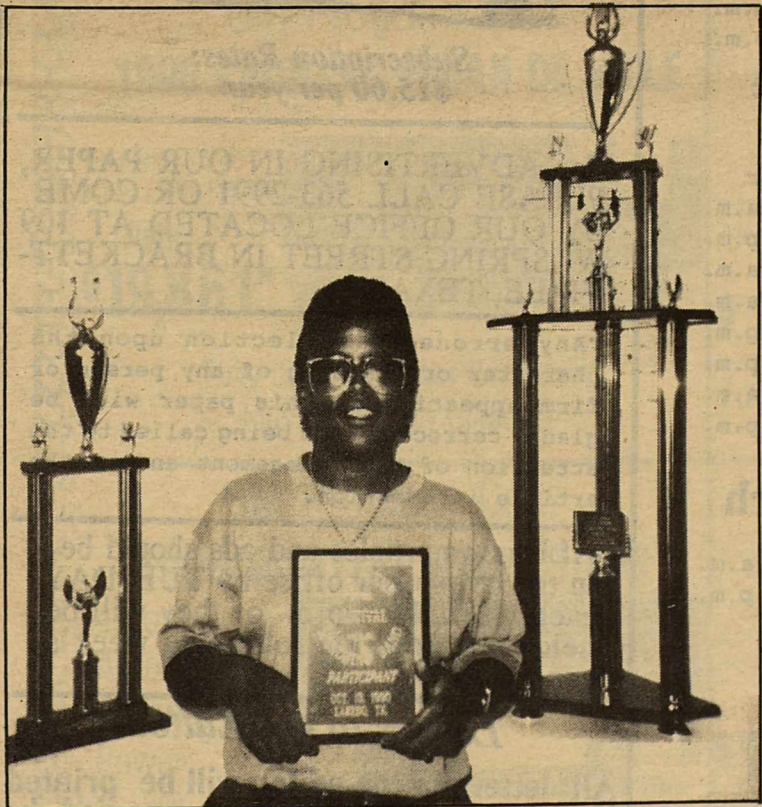

Band Receives Honors in Contest

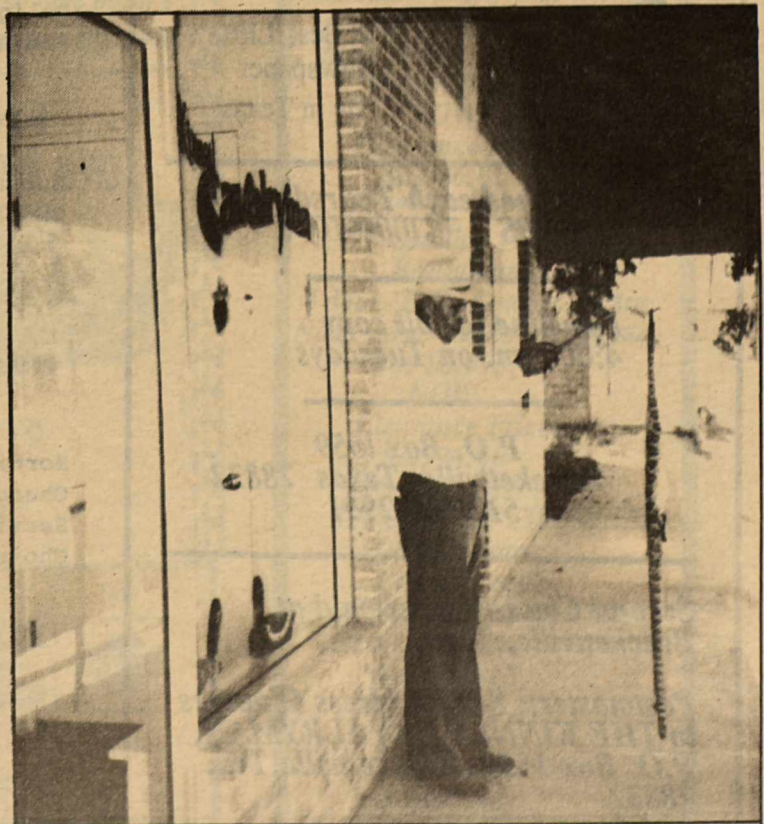

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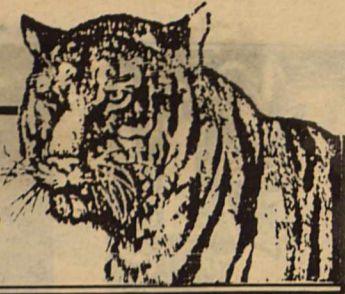

Tigers Surprise Lytle

LYTLE - The Fightin' Tigers evened up their season record to 3-3 as they defeated the Lytle Pirates 18-6 last Friday evening in their district opener. The Tigers are 1-0 in district, while Lytle fell to 0-1 in district and 1-5 on the year.

Neither Lytle or Brackett could get things going on their first possessions as both teams were forced to punt.

Lytle began their second possession on their own 19 yard line at the 8:34 mark in the opening period. It took over six minutes and 15 plays for Lytle to travel the length of the field. Whitney scored a two yard touchdown run with 2:15 remaining in the stanza. The extra point kick failed as Lytle led 6-0.

The Pirates kicked off to the Tigers as Brackett took possession of the ball on their 36 yardline. Quarterback Clay Hunt took control and let runningback's Steve Clementz and Michael Flores take control of the game. The two backs faught hard against the Lytle

defenders for the necessary yardage to move the ball down the field. In nine plays, Brackett traveled to the Pirate elevenyardline. On a first and ten situation, Hunt handed off to Flores, but he was stopped on the line of scrimmage. On second down, he gave the ball to Clementz, but he to was stopped by the powerful Pirate defense before he was able to gain any yardage. Finally on third and ten, the Tigers tied up the score, when Hunt connected with Tevin Senne for a 10 yard TD pass. Brackett took an 8-6 lead with 8:50 left in the first half as Clementz ran in the two point conversion.

Brackett upped their lead to 11-6 with 3:12 remaining before half-time, as Georgie Garcia booted a field goal from the 22 yardsout.

Clementz secured the victory with a one-yard run in the third period. Garcia's PAT attempt was successful making the final score 18-6 in the Tigers favor.

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Tracks along the trail

The Chirichua Apache Chief Cochise was a byword of terror in the Southwest. Cochise was born about 1812 in southeastern New Mexico. He raided only the Mexicans, the Apache's oldest enemies.

The chief was falsely accused of a kidnapping in 1860, and was arrested by American authorities while under truce. Cochise managed to escape into the mountains to live a life of vengeance against all American settlers.

In the mountains he teamed up with his father-in-law, Mangas Coloradas. Together they became the scourge of whites in Arizona, swooping down to murder, rape and kidnap the settlers in raid after raid.

In one battle, Cochise and Mangas Coloradas, along with 500

braves stood off 3,000 California volunteers for an entire day before they were finally driven away by artillery. Cochise usually used the hit and run tactics of Indian guerrilla warfare. The whiteman was almost powerless for this type of fighting.

Then the Indian fighter, General George was sent to settle the situation. His troops consisted of mostly Indians, including Apaches experienced of the war-pate.

In 1871 Crook and his Apaches ran Cochise into the ground. Following the defeat and a series of broken promises by the United States government, the Apaches were gradually evicted from their land.

Cochise lived in peace until 1876 when he died on an Arizona reservation.

Word Studies

"...If You are the Son of God, command that these stones become bread," Matt. 4:3. In the English language the word "if", as used in this verse, introduces a clause that is always conditional, i.e., "maybe you are the Son of God (and maybe you are not)." This imprecision in the English could cause someone attempting to interpret this verse to wonder if Satan was questioning the deity of Christ. But in the koine Greek language from which our New Testament was translated, this uncertainty does not exist, because there are four class conditions to a Greek "if" conditional clause. The first class condition is something determined as fulfilled. An example of this is found in the verse above, where what Satan actually said was, "if You are the Son of God (and You are), command that these stones become bread."

The second class condition is something determined as unfulfilled. An example of this is found in Matt. 4:9, where what Satan is recorded in the Greek to have said to Christ was, "...All these things will I give You, if You fall down and worship me (but You won't)."

The third class condition is something undetermined, but with prospect of determination. An example of this is found in I John 1:9, "If we confess our sins (maybe we will and maybe we

won't, but if we do), He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

The fourth class condition is something with a remote prospect of determination, and is found very rarely in the Greek. An example is found in I Peter 3:14, "But even if you should suffer for the sake of righteousness (I wish you were, but you are blessed)."

It is not necessary for us to know the class condition of every conditional clause we read in our

Bibles to be able to understand the important meanings. But if some verses in the New Testament do cause you concern, there are excellent and inexpensive expanded translations of the Greek New Testament available in Bible Bookstores, such as the one by Kenneth S. Wuest.

Art Exhibit

Los Angeles -- UCLA's Wight Art Gallery has received a \$50,000 grant from Anheuser-Busch Companies, Inc., to support the educational curriculum complementing the major exhibition "Chicano Art: Resistance and Affirmation, 1965-1985" or (CARA), announced Dr. Edith A. Tonelli, director, Wight Art Gallery. The exhibition, on view at the Wight Gallery from Sept. 9 - Dec. 9, 1990, is the most comprehensive national exhibition ever presented on the history of Chicano art.

Organized by the Wight Art Gallery in conjunction with a distinguished national advisory committee comprised of 50 Chicano scholars, artists and community arts organizers, "CARA" will feature over 150 works of art by more than 90 Chicano artists from throughout the United States. The interpretive, multimedia exhibition identifies and explores the character of the Chicano art movement and its relation to "El Movimiento," the Chicano civil rights movement which occurred from the mid-1960's to the late 1970's in the United States, and acknowledges Chicano art as a distinct and influential movement in American art.

As part of the "CARA" exhibition education outreach, the grant will be used to fund an education outreach, the grant will be used to fund an educational curriculum for use by kindergarten through secondary level educators in public and private school systems. The curriculum will consist of teacher training sessions and educational packets which discuss the themes and issues directly related to the "CARA" exhibition. The packets will help instructors address multicultural and minority education issues within the context of Chicano art, culture and history and will be available both in English and Spanish.

"Anheuser-Busch is proud to underwrite the educational component of a multidimensional art exhibition that contributes immensely to the appreciation and understanding of Chicano culture in this country. Chicanos as a group can be proud of their contribution to the struggle for civil rights -- this exhibit is a tribute to those who participated in it," said Jesse Aguirre, vice

"Chicano Art: Resistance and Affirmation, 1965-1985" has been organized by the Wight Art Gallery and a national advisory committee. Funding has been provided by the Los Angeles Festival, the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Rockefeller Foundation, the

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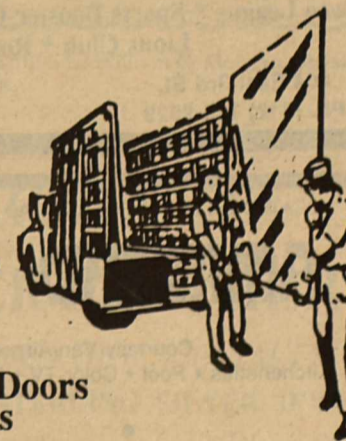
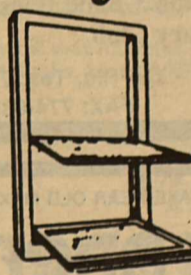

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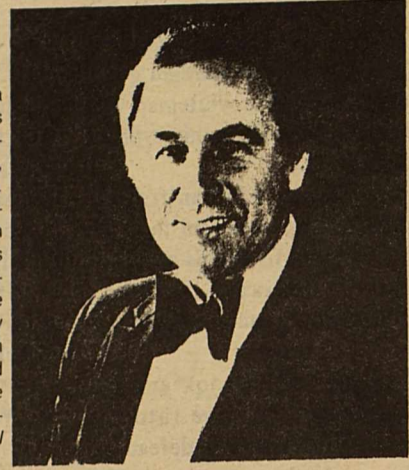

Your Child: Allergy Prone?

A child taking certain allergy medications may not be able to stay alert in school.

One of the first ways to tell if your child has developed an allergy is if he or she sneezes a lot, often in rapid succession. Other indications are runny or congested nose, itching of the eyes, and plugged ears and sinus headaches. If your child has any of these symptoms, see your doctor.

Not only can doctors quickly detect an allergy, they can prescribe a

medication that will relieve the bothersome symptoms yet not make a child drowsy. Many over-the-counter antihistamines cause drowsiness. A child's sneezing may stop, but because he or she is drowsy, school performance may suffer. Some medications also cause excitability in children, making it difficult for them to concentrate.

It was approved to advertise for bids on the construction of the Senior Citizens Center.

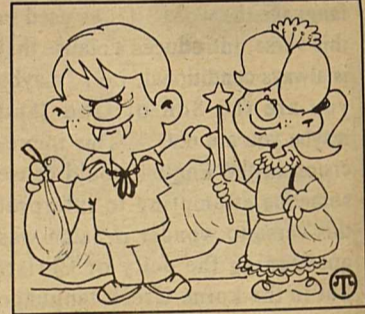
The building plans for the addition to the Annex building that were drawn up by Mr. Graves from Uvalde were approved.

Do you believe in life beyond the grave? Talk about an unending future is more than a playground for psychologists, scientist, and philosophers. A person's life after death involves faith. In fact, a well-balanced idea of life beyond the grave is centered in the Bible and God. Our concept of immortality is imperfect and cannot be totally understood by man. And yet,

where is the person who doesn't long for a better life and a better world?

One evidence of immortality or a non-ending life is our ability to think. (And some of us don't think enough!) However, we keep believing that we always will be. We feel deeply that the lamp of life will always keep burning. Even when death takes a friend or

family member, we reason that such a person is alive and can't be reduced to non-existence, even when the physical life ends.

Another strong reason for believing in a continuing life is the worth of human personality. An automobile may cost \$15,000. A rancher may sell his ranch for \$3000,00. How much will a person spend to stay alive another year or another day? How much money would it take to buy your child? All of us say that life is worth more than gold, oil, houses, or cattle.

Another reason for believing in an unending life is that man is superior to all other creatures. Man is different and unique because he is made in the image of God.

Do ants journey around the world and publish accounts about their discoveries for future generations of ants? Do dolphins build airplanes with pressurized cabins, and have pretty dolphin stewardesses serving them on their global trips? Do beavers or badgers invent typewriters and telephones? 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Care

Recently, Public Television presented a special report by Bill Moyer, that candidly stated that our world is becoming a Global Dumping Ground, for the disposal of toxic and radioactive waste produced by the United States and other industrial nations. He pointed the finger at greedy opportunistic profiteers who deal in waste disposal without concern for the common good of humanity, and in almost total disregard for regulatory authorities where they exist. The bottom line behind this growing problem is the future cost in lives and resources to clean up the mess.

Mankind is generating 500 million tons of waste per year, much of it being toxic or radioactive. Two unscrupulous brothers, the Colberts, became wealthy on \$180 million in sales over a 10-15 year period before EPA regulations were enforced against them. They had shipped thousands of barrels of U.S. toxic waste overseas, to third-world nations, as well as to industrially progressive nations such as Taiwan, where natural resources are scarce. The waste was sold as suitable for reprocessing or reclamation, and often identified as pure chemicals by phony labeling.

The waste was purchased at salvage cost, or payment was received to dispose of it for those

who produced it by didn't want to pay the high cost of proper disposal. Sometimes it was shipped back to the U. S. as unsuitable and unacceptable for the purpose intended. Much of this waste wound up in warehouses that had been rented on a short-term basis, and then abandoned by the waste dealers when they could find no new takers.

Most appalling in the documentary, was the revelation that our U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) exercised very loose control in many situations and none whatsoever in others. EPA officials claimed that they lacked sufficient experienced personnel to know the truly dangerous nature-or to oversee the tremendous volume-of waste in the distribution pipeline. They did admit to documented cases where workers in waste processing plants, as well as nearby residents, including children in schools in the proximity of waste storage facilities, were found to have dangerous levels of toxic-city of various kinds, that could cause future health deterioration.

In Taiwan, where waste residue is commonly burned as part of their disposal system, air pollution has become so great that experts predict that Taiwan will become inhabitable by the year

2000. Mexico was cited as another part of the world where toxic waste disposal is becoming a problem with dire consequences. This is particularly true along the borders with the states of California and Texas, where increased industrial activity is generating new waste material. Much of the water south of the border is now unsuitable for human consumption because of careless and indiscriminate disposal practices.

Federal and state laws are inadequate for proper regulation of the problem. It is tragic that citizens are left to fight on the local

level without much help from government oversight agencies. It does seem that citizens of Kinney County have ample reason for alarm over the proposed waste dump at Spofford. No guarantees of long-term safety to health or assurances of sound economic benefit have been presented in a creditable fashion, that a majority can accept as a reasonable risk.

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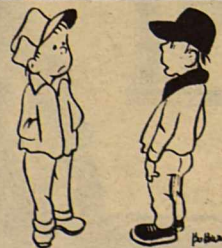
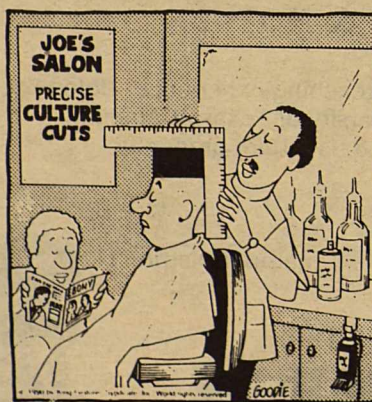
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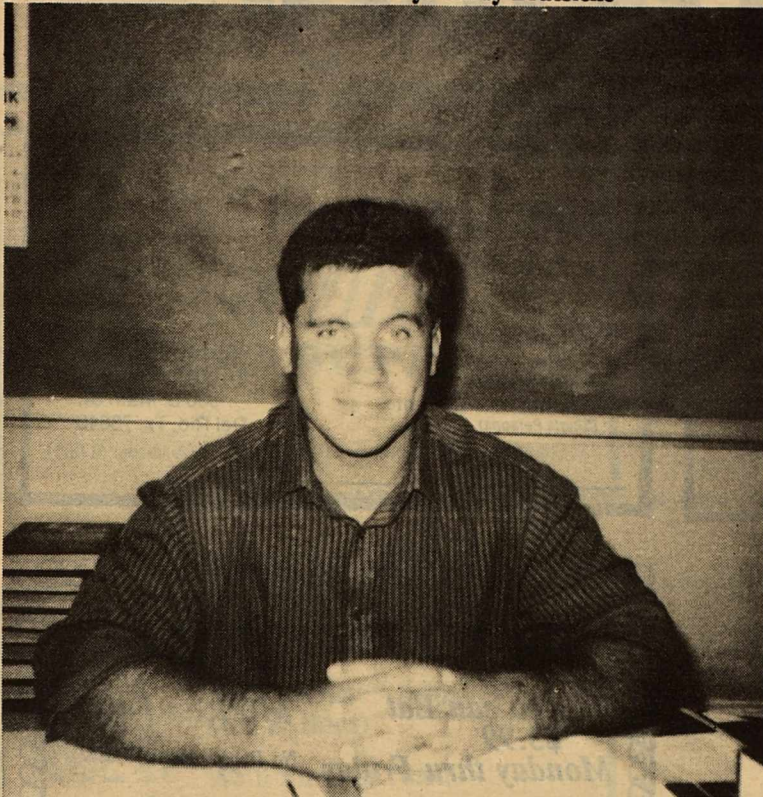
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Meet the New Teachers

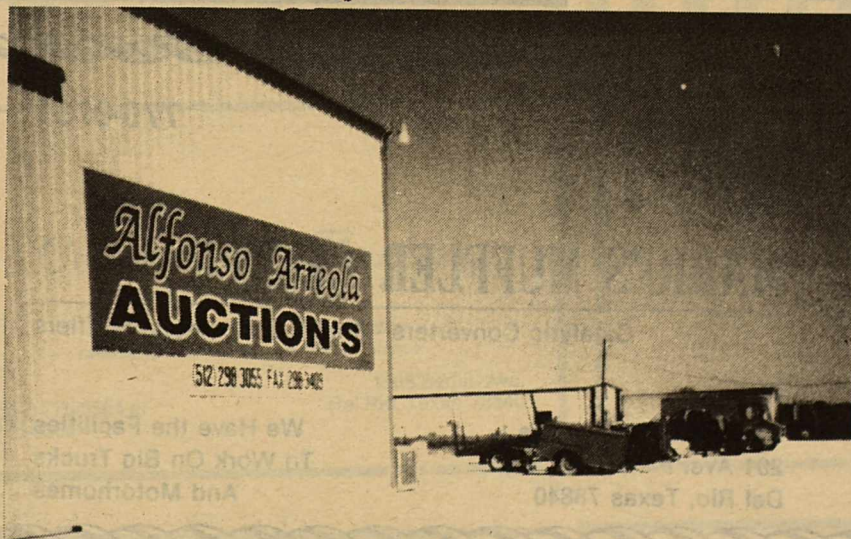
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
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
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Signs of the Times In Christ Service, By Robert White

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

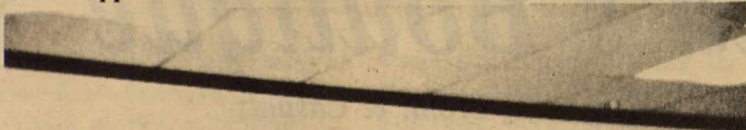

summary of what legal steps would be taken after hiring attorney Jim Sanders of San Antonio.

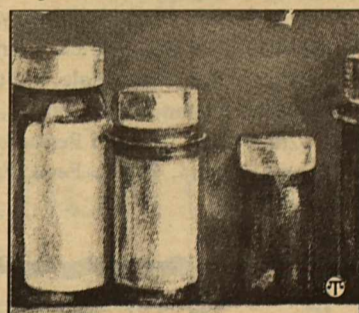
Madge Belcher said the next possible step would be to file suite against the State Health Dept., "Spofford will have to go to court."

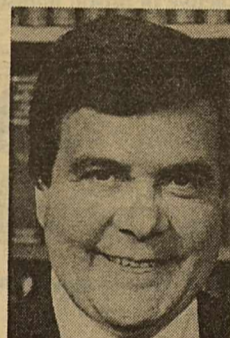

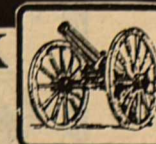

To Lucille Schooler and Jean Kohler, I give my lasting love and tribute. Thanks for being there.

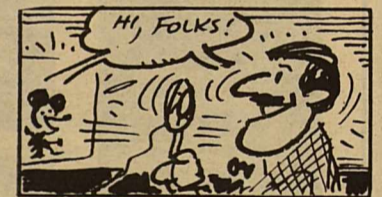
Their heroic act brings to mind that perhaps the Spring needs a fence to guard small animals from the water. I will gladly pay for the installation of a fence.

Mr. Fred Rose, Moor-Man mineral and feed dealer from Del Rio, supplied the eating utensils and cups and David Seargeant assisted with the slicing and preparing of the meat. Brisket donors included Kinney County Wool & Mohair, Alamo Village, Tully & Darlene Shahan and Hadley & Tulisha Wardlaw. Thanks to all those who helped and supported the 4-H Club through their time and donations.

Jenifer Shahan served as Mistress of Ceremonies and was assisted by club officers Michelle Brandt, Kasey Hall and Wil Shahan. The Kinney County 4-H Club annual progress report was given with current enrollment being 90 members. This is a 13% increase over last year's enrollment. There are 50 members enrolled in the sheep and goat project, 40 in the foods and nutrition project, 33 signed up for the rifle project, 18 in the swine project and 10 members in the rabbit project group. Other activities and projects awaiting start-up include wool and mohair judging, clothing, method demonstrations and public speaking.

Project awards were given to 4-Hers completing a 4-H project record forms in the areas of sheep and goats, beef, rabbits, food and nutrition and clothing. New 4-H members were recognized as well as adult volunteer leaders who assisted with project

work. The 1989-90 "Outstanding Friend of 4-H" award was presented to Tony & Nancy Frerich for their countless hours of support and help to the 4-H Club.

The highest award that a 4-H member can receive is the county 4-H Gold Star Award. The award is selected based on a member's project work, activities, leadership skills and community service. Jenifer Shahan is the 1990 recipient. Jenifer has been involved with the sheep, steer, rabbit, foods and nutrition, clothing and rifle projects. She had the Overall Grand Champion lamb at the San Antonio Stock Show and received 1st place at the county and district 4-H food show. After the closing 4-H prayer by Jo Lee Jones, the banquet concluded with cleanup of the building. County 4-H members are reminded about the sheep and goat project meeting on Monday night, October 22 at the County Courthouse at 7:00 p.m. Dr. Frank Craddock, extension sheep and goat specialist, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be giving a presentation of club lamb management. Project officers will be planned.

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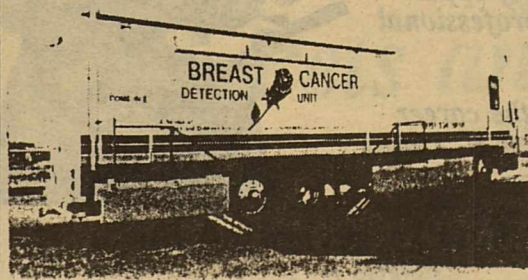

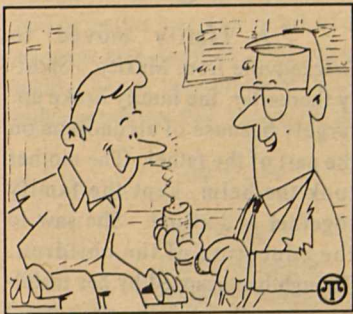

•Some 800 previously untreated PD patients are taking part in a study called Datatop, now in progress at 28 centers in the U.S. and Canada.

•Some of the centers are conducting smaller studies. Researchers in Pennsylvania, for example, have shown that the sense of smell deteriorates early in the course of PD.

•This decline was seen in patients taking anti-Parkinson medications and in those who had not started anti-PD drugs. It did not correlate with the duration of the disease or with the severity of symptoms.

•Over three-quarters of the patients were unaware of this decline before they were tested.

•Some researchers have suggested that some forms of PD may be caused by airborne agents which gain entry into the central nervous system via the primary olfactory pathways.

Las Moras Lodge Dedication Ceremonies

It was a great day for the members of the Las Moras Lodge No. 444, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons as their building was designated as a Historical Site by the Texas Historical Commission. The dedication ceremonies were held Saturday, October 13, at 10:00 a.m. in front of the masonic Lodge Building.

This 111 year old building was completed in 1879 and was the Kinney County Courthouse, and served in that capacity until the present day Courthouse was built in 1911. The Las Moras Lodge leased the building from the County in 1911, later buying it from them in 1914.

The Right Worshipful Graham H. Childress, Past Grand Master

of the Grand Lodge of Texas was the principal speaker. The other speaker was one of our Brackettville Residents and the Chairman of the County Historical Committee, Mr. Charlie Ward. Mr. Ward presented Certificates of Appreciation Graham Childress, James Harber, Richard Mountain, Richard Schafer, Bruce Clements, and then received one for himself, all for their contributions toward receiving the marker.

Representative Dudley Harrison had been invited to speak, but as he was going to be out of the State on October 13, he sent us a Texas Flag that had flown over the State Capitol during the ceremonies.

James Harber spent many tireless days researching records to obtain the history of this building. It was through his efforts that the building received the Plaque. He was assisted in his efforts by Mr.

Charlie Ward.

The Worshipful Master, Richard Schafer recognized some special guests, one being Mrs. Agnes Fritter Vondy, who was carrying a saber that her Grand Father, F. S. Fritter, used to tile the lodge with during the years 1882, 1883 and 1885, of which he was the Worshipful Master of the Lodge. Brother F. S. Fritter was a charter member of Las Moras Lodge, having served as its first Senior Deacon. The Lodge was Chartered in 1876, making it the oldest Fraternal Organization in Kinney County. It has been very active in Local and Civic Affairs ever since.

Other Lodges represented and participating in the dedication are: Sanderson Lodge, Sanderson; South Plains Daylight Lodge, Lubbock; Val Verde Lodge, Del Rio; Eagle Pass Lodge, Eagle Pass; Dimmit Lodge, Carrizo Springs; and Zalvala Lodge, Crystal City. Following the dedication a Luncheon was served at the las Moras Inn.

Tips To Help You

Sizzling Meal Time Fun—Fresh Turkey On The Grill

Why not make your next cookout a sizzling success with tempting turkey kabobs, bacon-wrapped turkey burgers, barbecued turkey breast slices or marinated turkey roast? You and your guests can create a delicious meal at the grill quickly and easily with fresh, boneless Turkey Store turkey cuts, a variety of tantalizing marinades and your favorite summer vegetables. 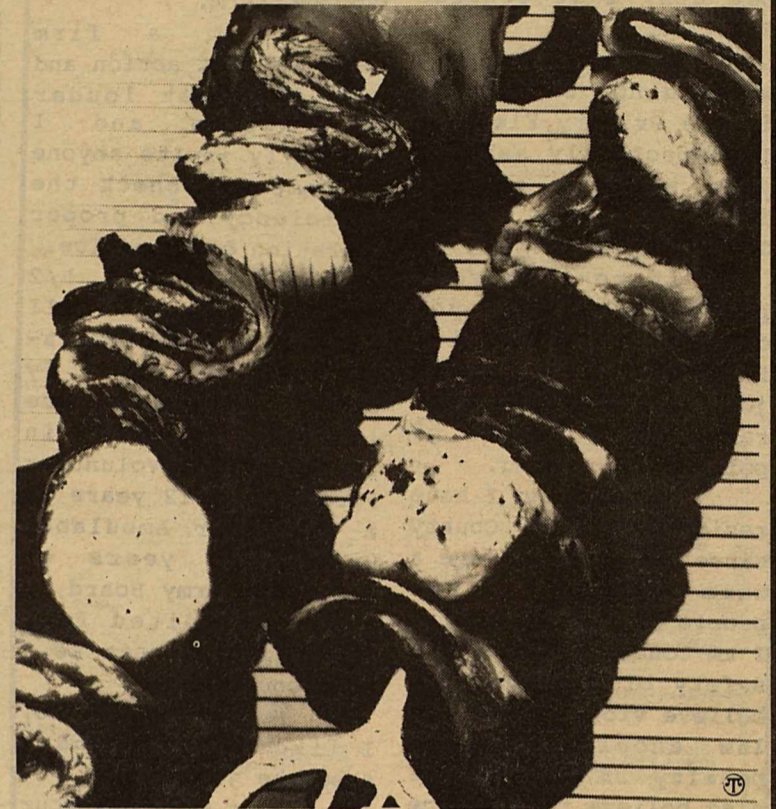

1/2 cup dry sherry
1/4 cup soy sauce

- 1 pkg. (about 1 1/4 lb.) Fresh Turkey Store Breast Slices
- 2 small zucchini, cut into 1" slices
- Two 1/2" slices pineapple, cut into fourths
- 2 small onions, cut into fourths

Mix sugar, sherry and soy sauce in saucepan. Cook over medium-high heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved; cool. Cut each turkey breast slice lengthwise into 4 pieces; place in large shallow dish. Pour marinade over turkey. Cover and refrigerate, turning occasionally, at least 3 hours.

Drain turkey, reserving marinade. Alternate turkey, zucchini, pineapple and onions on 4 metal skewers, folding turkey



crosswise; brush with marinade. Grill about 6 inches from hot coals, or broil with tops about 6 inches from heat, turning and brushing with marinade occasionally, until turkey is no longer pink, about 10 minutes. Salt and pepper to taste. 4 servings.

Turkey, Vegetable and Bacon Kabobs

- 1 pkg. (about 1 1/4 lb.) Fresh Turkey Store Breast Tenderloins
- 1/2 cup white wine
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1 tbsp. sugar
- 2 tbsp. cooking oil
- 1/2 tsp. dried chervil leaves
- 1/4 tsp. dried marjoram leaves
- 8 slices bacon
- 1 can (16 oz.), drained

whole potatoes
8 whole fresh mushrooms
1 large zucchini, cut into 1/2" slices

Cut turkey into 1 1/2-inch pieces. Mix wine, soy sauce, sugar, oil, chervil and marjoram in large shallow dish; stir in turkey. Cover and refrigerate, turning occasionally, at least 3 hours.

Fry bacon until limp; drain. Drain turkey, reserving marinade. Alternate bacon, turkey and vegetables on 4 metal skewers; brush with marinade. Grill about 6 inches from hot coals, or broil with tops about 6 inches from heat, turning and brushing with marinade occasionally, until turkey is no longer pink, about 10 minutes. Salt and pepper to taste. 4 servings.
