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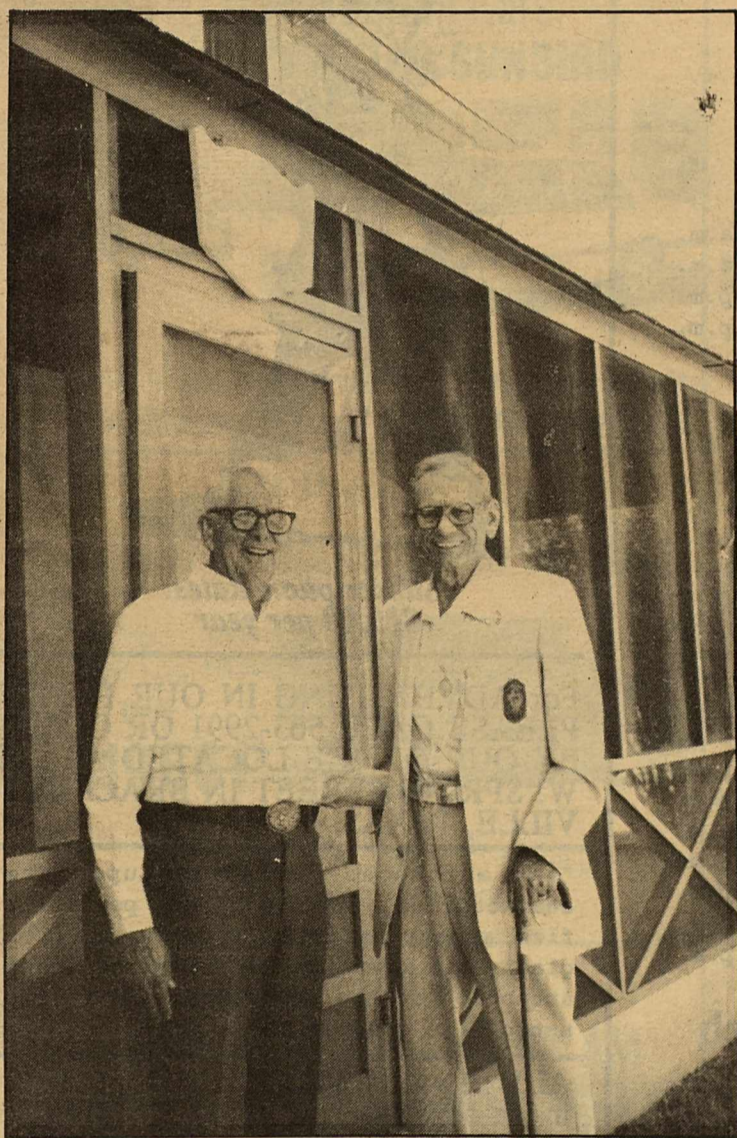

Wainwright's Son Visits Fort

Capt. (Navy) Jonathan Wainwright of Keystone Heights, FL and son of the famous General Jonathan Wainwright who once served at Fort Clark visited the original cavalry post Friday, October 19 to learn more about his father's military days.

Capt. Wainwright and his companion Lorraine Delcher toured the Old Guardhouse Museum and visited the Wainwright home where his father lived between the years of 1939-1940.

At the age of 77 and the only child of General Wainwright, Capt. Wainwright continues to learn more about his father's past.

Upon graduation of West Point in 1906, General Wainwright was in the 1st Regiment of the US Cavalry at Fort Clark. He returned in 1939 as Brigadier General and the commander of Fort Clark. In 1940 he went to the Philippines where he served as Commander of all the American Forces. *Cont. on Page 6*

Jailer Injured in an Attempted Jailbreak

According to Sheriff Hooten during an interview, Manuel Pena, Jr., Jailer/Dispatcher at the Kinney County Jail, was passing out shaving razors to the prisoners last Saturday at 5:30 a.m., when prisoner/trustee, Ruben Sanchez-Barrera jumped Manuel from the back and U.S.

Marshall's prisoner, Juan Rojas-Aguilar attacked Pena from the front. During the scuffle the door to the jail cell was closed and automatically locked. This trapped Pena in the cell with his two attackers. After a 15 minute battle, Pena secured his prisoners and used the intercom to call the front

and instructed inmate/trustee, Vecinte Hernandez to open the cell door. Pena took the two prisoners to the back, then called Sheriff Hooten.

Sheriff Hooten called the Border Patrol for assistance in handling the situation.

Tigers Tromp Trojans

BRACKETT - The Fightin' Tigers are now 2-0 in district and 4-3 on the season as they defeated the Asherton Trojans 31-13 last Friday evening in district 29-AA action. Asherton is now 2-3 on the season and 1-1 in district.

Steve Clementz led the Tigers with 252 yards rushing in 30 carries along with a pair of touchdowns.

Asherton won the toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. On their first offensive play Albert Villarreal threw a 36 yard pass to Roy Martinez. A couple plays later Albert Sosa fumbled and Lynn Floyd recovered for the Tigers giving them possession on their own 32 yard line.

They took over and rolled right over the Asherton defense with the powerful running game of the Tigers. The Tigers drove down the field with no real problems. Steve Clementz scored for the Tigers from 4 yards out at the 4:36 mark in the first period. Georgie Garcia booted the PAT for a 7-0 Brackett lead.

The Tigers increased their lead to 14 when Clay Hunt connected

with Frank Rodriguez on a 26 yard touchdown pass. Garcia added another extra point.

With three seconds remaining in the first half, Asherton scored their first points when Villarreal threw a 32 yard TD pass to Pablo Rangel. Villarreal kicked the PAT cutting Brackett's lead to 14-7 as the two teams went to the locker rooms at halftime.

With 9:46 left in the third Michael Flores scored for the Tigers on a 3 yard run, which was set up by a 50 yard pass from Hunt to Rodriguez. The pass on the two-point conversion was incomplete as Brackett went up 20-7.

In the fourth period, Garcia booted an 18 yard field goal making the score 23-7.

Asherton scored once more in the game, when Albert Sosa raced 30 yards for six points. A host of Tigers blocked the extra point kick.

Clementz scored his second TD with 3:49 remaining in the contest. he crossed the goal line from 18 yards out. He ran in the conversion making the final score 31-13.

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Tracks along the trail

Billy the Kid was a real charmer in the short life he lived as an outlaw. Born William Bonney in New York on November 23, 1859, he moved with his widowed Mother to Silver City, New Mexico in 1868.

By the time he was twelve years old he had already left school to roam around and gamble. he is said to have killed his first man in 1876. Billy and three friends robbed and murdered three Indians in Arizona and they from there to rob and put more notches on their guns.

In the New Mexico cattle war of 1878, he worked as a gunman for one of the factions and killed Sheriff Jim Brady. When the new governor Lew Wallace arrived, he offered amnesty to

Billy and others caught up in the cattle war, but Billy turned it down.

Billy and the others went on another rampage of cattle rustling and murder. Pat Garrett, an old friend of Billy's ran for sheriff and partly because he swore to get Billy, got the election.

In 1880, Garrett arrested Billy and put him in jail. At his trial he was sentenced to hang for the murder of Sheriff Brady.

Billy escaped in April, 1881, killing two deputies in the process. In July Garrett found Billy again and shot him dead.

Billy the Kid was well liked by his friends. No one knows whether the legend that he killed a man for every year of his life is true or not.

sack of groceries she still had in her hand. Cans spilled every place.

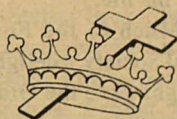

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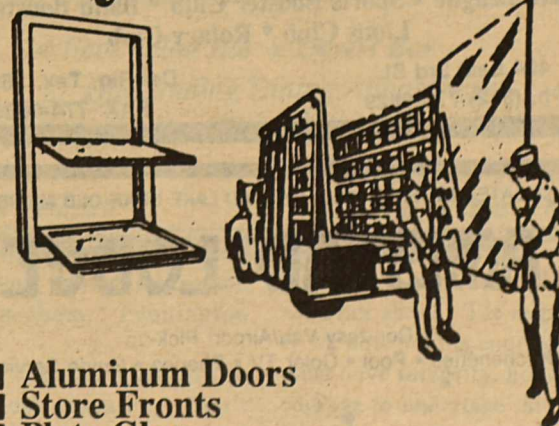
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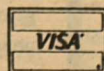
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Reflections

When the small snake warmed up, it slithered out of a pot and under a sofa. The man's wife screamed as she saw the snake run across the floor.

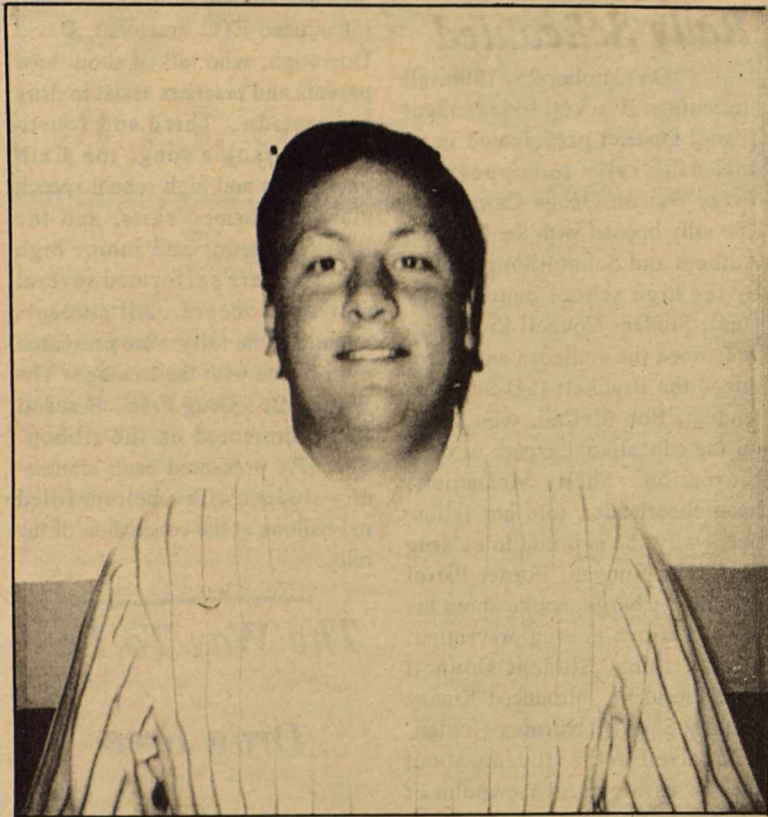
By this time the husband was taking a bath and he leaped out of the tub and ran to see why his wife had screamed.

Capt. Wainwright wished that a biography could be written about his father, "We have all his past diary's and other materials, but it is hard to get anything published today." Charles Downing of Fort Clark agreed, "There definitely needs to be a book written about his life."

Much to the Fort Clark Historical Society's delight, Capt. Wainwright gave the Old Guard-house Museum a ceremonial sabre which once belonged to his father. "This is a fantastic museum, I feel like this is the place for this sabre," said Capt. Wainwright.

Like father, like son, General Wainwright and Capt. Wainwright succeeded in his own area. Because the Wainwright family was from a long line of Army, most people expected that Capt. Wainwright would take that route. But, a cousin of his persuaded him differently. After he got a glimpse of life at sea, there was no turning back. "Dad always said do what makes you happy. In six years, I made Master in the Navy, so it must have been a good move," said Capt. Wainwright.

Another good move was that he decided to visit Fort Clark and learn more about his family's history. "This is great. The history and the people have made this trip one to always remember," said Capt. Wainwright.

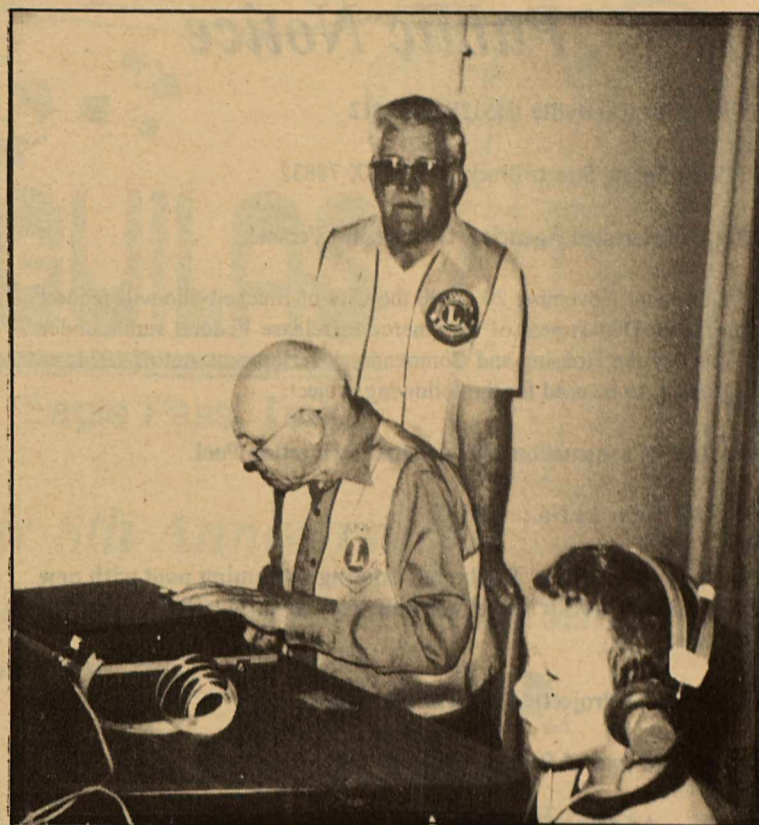

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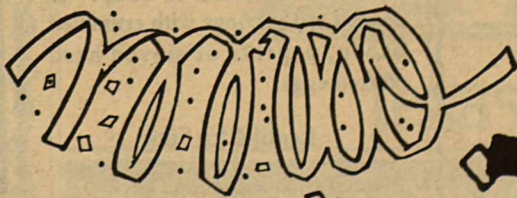

Word Studies

The translators of the Greek New Testament encountered a problem when they came to the Greek word "baptizo", as there was no English equivalent, and so they transliterated the word by changing the Greek letters to English letters, thus making the word "baptize". While the Greek root word "bapto" means "to dip", a writer of Greek literature used the word baptizo to describe how a sword maker would dip a finished sword into a vat of blood to "identify" the sword with blood, so that the bearer of the sword would be victorious in battle. Thus, a preferred translation of baptizo would be "identification".

There are seven different and distinct types of baptism recorded in the New Testament. First is the baptism of John (Matt. 3:6, Lk. 3:3, Jn. 1:15-34). John placed his converts into water to identify them with the Savior that was to come. The second type is the baptism of Jesus (Matt. 3:13-17, Mk. 1:9-11, Lk. 3:21-22).

Jesus went through the ritual of water baptism to identify Himself with the Father's plan (i.e., that He would go to the cross to die for the sins of the human race). A third type is the baptism of the Holy Spirit. I Cor. 12:13 explains what this baptism is, and Rom. 6:3-4, Gal. 3:26-28, & Col. 2:12 are some verses that explain the results. A fourth type is the water baptism of Christians, in which we publicly identify ourselves with Jesus Christ, "the Son of God," in His death, burial and resurrection (Acts 8:36-38, 16:30-34). A fifth type is that of fire (Matt. 3:11-12, Rev. 20:14-15). A person who rejects God's plan of salvation will be identified with fire (judgment). A sixth type is the baptism of the cross of sin (Matt. 20:22, Lk. 12:50). On the cross, Jesus was identified with the sins of the entire human race, thus God himself providing the perfect sacrifice to satisfy Rom. 6:23a, "the wages of sin is death". The seventh type is the baptism of Moses. This only occurs in I Cor. 10:2; the Israelites identified themselves with Moses in passing under the

cloud and through the parted waters of the Red Sea, and thus were saved from the pursuing Egyptians.

As you study your New Testament, a careful perusal of the context will help you determine which baptism the text is referring to.

Mom's Kitchen

Add a decorative touch to each serving with your choice of a garnish to make each dish especially tempting.

Ham Split Pea Soup

- 2 Cups (16oz) split peas
- 2 lbs. ham shank
- 1 medium onion chopped
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. sweet basil
- 6 peppercorns
- 8 cups water
- 3/4 cup sliced celery
- 1/2 cup diced carrot

In a large soup pot (5qt.), combine all ingredients except celery and carrots. Simmer, covered, 2 to 2 1/2 hours until peas are tender and soup thickens. Add celery and carrots. Continue simmering about thirty minutes until vegetables are tender. Remove peppercorns and ham shank; cut meat from bone in chunks and return to soup. If desired top servings with crumbled bacon, paprika or sieved hard cooked eggs.

Lentil-Rice Stew

- 3/4 cup chopped onion
- 3/4 cup chopped celery
- 2 Tbls. margarine
- 6 cups water
- 3/4 cup dried lentils

- 32 oz. canned tomatoes, undrained and chopped
- 3/4 cup brown rice
- 1 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- 1/2 tsp. dried basil
- 1/2 tsp. dried oregano
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup diced carrots

Saute onion and celery in butter in a heavy Dutch oven until tender; add water and lentils. Bring mixture to a boil; cover, reduce heat, and simmer 20 minutes.

Stir in next 6 ingredients. Cover and simmer 1 hour or until rice is done. Add carrots Cook an additional 15 minutes until carrots are tender.

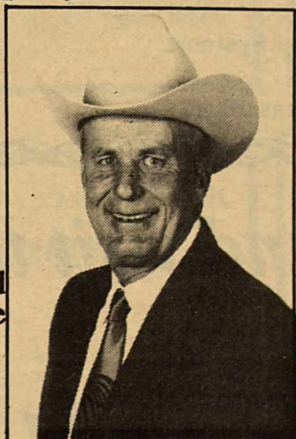


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Fall is for Flowers

We wish to extend our heartfelt condolences to one of our library volunteers, Ms. Thelma Adams,, on her recent loss of her Husband, Marvin.

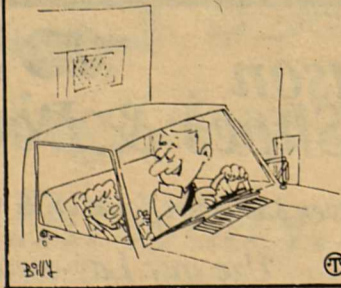

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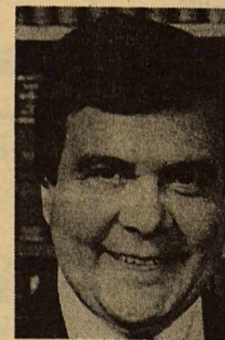
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continued. "But, in fact, this Harding has no base of support in either the Republican or Democratic Party."

As a candidate for Comptroller, Sharp has said he will audit the state's school system in order to cut bureaucratic waste, and spend that money in the classroom. 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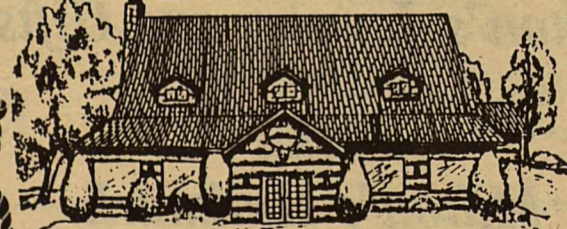
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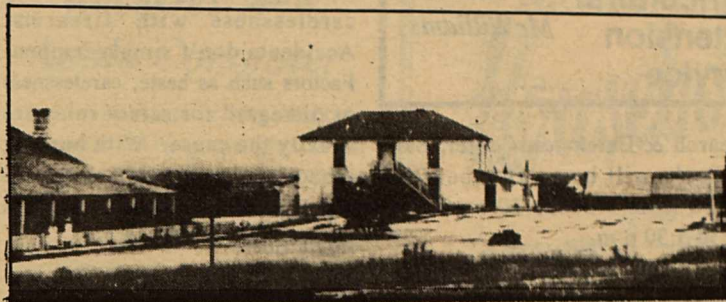
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Old Army Days

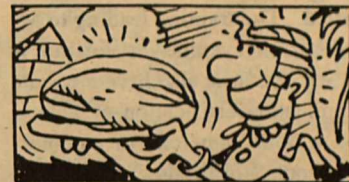

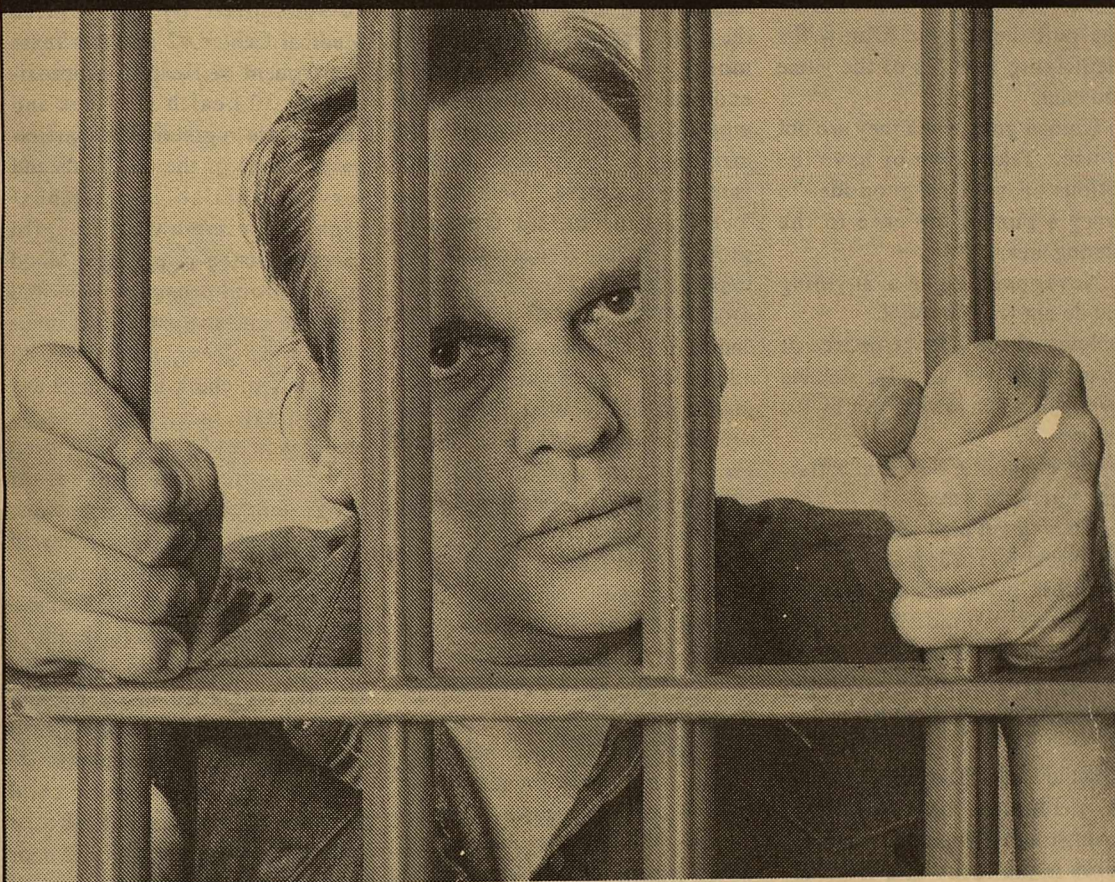

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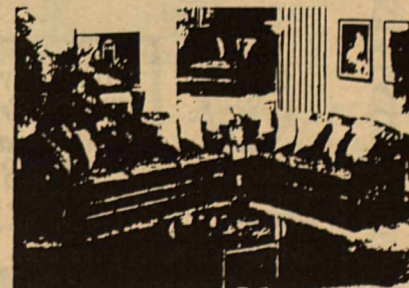
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Texas Agricultural Extension Service

The Texas Department of Agriculture has announced a Predator Management Training Program for Monday, November 12, 1990 at the Gillespie County Agricultural Building, 1906 North Llano Street, Fredericksburg. The sessions will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end by 5:00 p.m. The program will include instruction on proper identification of causes of predation, alternate methods of predation control, M-44 Sodium cyanide application certificate training and Livestock Protection Collar training and testing.

To continue use of M-44 sodium cyanide, all applicators certified before April 18, 1988 must take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free. You must also have a private applicator certification or license or, a noncommercial or commercial applicator license.

To obtain a license for Livestock Protection Collar use, a person must complete the training course, score 70 or above on the LPC test and apply for a license. There is a \$20 test fee and a \$50 fee for a noncommercial license required of persons applying collars on properly under their control. The commercial license fee is \$150 and proof of financial responsibility is required.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting the training sessions. If you already have a certification in the Livestock Protection Collar from 1988, you still must attend a 2 hour training before it will be renewed. There will be several locations to attend:

Texas Agricultural Re-

search & Extension Center, San Angelo will be on October 29, 1990 from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 1:30-3:30 p.m.

First National Bank Bldg., Sonora on October 31, 1990 at 9:30-11:30 a.m.

Texas Agricultural Research & Extension Center, Uvalde on December 4, 1990 at 9:30-11:30 a.m.

FRUIT TREE CARE DURING THE FALL

Sometimes fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected in the fall, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

By applying a copper fungicide now, can stop or help reduce three of the major diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker. The puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were the result of peach leaf curl fungus. The time to control this disease effectively is in the fall by the use of a copper-containing fungicide. Timing of the spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Unless applied correctly, copper, a methyl, may cause sever defoliation.

Spraying should be done when 70 percent of the leaves have fallen. Spraying too early will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

FIREARMS

Each year hundreds of accidents happen involving carelessness with firearms. Accidents don't simply happen. Factors such as haste, carelessness or disregard for safety rules are usually the cause. With hunting season at hand, hunters should keep in mind some basic firearm safety rules:

- 1) Treat every gun with the respect accorded to a loaded gun.
- 2) Watch that muzzle. Be able to control the direction of the muzzle even if you should stumble.
- 3) Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and that ammunition is of the proper size for the gun you are carrying.
- 4) Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger. Know the identifying features of the game you hunt.
- 5) Unload guns when they are not in use. Take down or have the actions open. It's a good idea to carry a gun in the case to the hunting area.
- 6) Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.
- 7) Never climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch with a loaded gun and never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 8) Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water.
- 9) When target practicing, be sure your backstop is adequate.
- 10) Store guns and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children or careless adults.
- 11) Avoid alcoholic beverages before and during shooting.

Mirando City - The strong interest in producing and marketing Spanish meat-type goats in South Texas is the focus of a field day and tour at the Vaquillas Ranch near Mirando City on Saturday, October 27, 1990. The tour will be hosted by Gene "Primo" Walker representing San Mateo

Select Natural Cabrito produced from goats on the ranch, in conjunction with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture's Diversification Program.

The field day and tour will begin at the goat pens on the ranch at 9:30 a.m. with registration and "camp coffee" beginning at 8:30 a.m. The ranch gate is located on the left side of FM 649 one mile south of the railroad tracks in Mirando City. Directions to the pens will be marked. There is a \$5.00 registration fee for the field day.

Walker, who markets kids from his breeding herd of over 2,000 nannies, said that he originally began "goating" to control the South Texas brush that covers most of the ranch more economically than the present methods would allow. "The marketing of the finished product is relatively simple," Walker says, "we stay in control from the ground to your freezer or to the local grocer." The cabritos are processed at 30 to 40 days of age and have a carcass weight of 10 to 18 pounds. The carcasses are state inspected and vacuum packed and are delivered frozen to retail grocery stores, restaurants and some homes, with less than 1% of sales in live goats.

The ranch tour will conclude at the Mirando City-Oilton-Bruni Civic Center in Mirando City with a Mexican cabrito stew and all the trimmings. After lunch, Mr. Oscar Garza, of Cabrito Markets, Inc., Mission, Texas, will speak on marketing and processing cabrito in South Texas. Garza's company, in partnership with his family, slaughters between 600 and 800 goats per week at the modern facility built in 1979. The company, started in 1973, employs 14 full-time workers and processes goats

from the West, Central and South Texas areas.

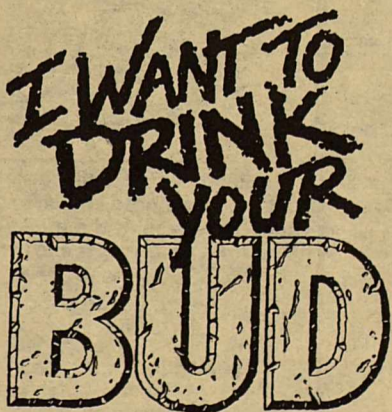

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


