


Local Highway Department Employees recognized

These two men are employees of Maintenance Supervisor Daniel E. Kral.


R. Hernandez, 25 years.

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

Dilley Edges out Brackett for District

The Fightin' Tigers were edged by the Dilley Wolves last Friday evening 14-20 for the district 29-AA football championship.

The stands on both sides of the filed were filled with screaming fans, who remained on their feet for most of the game.

Dilley put the first points on the scoreboard at the 8:02 mark in the opening period as Manuel Rodriguez scored on a 1 yard run. Trini Santos booted the extra point to put the Wolves 7-0.

The Tigers took the Dilley kickoff and began their next series from their own 33 yard line. The injured Clay Hunt entered the game to call the signals for the Tigers. No one could tell their was anything wrong with his ankle as he completed four of four passes including an 8 yard TD pass to Tevin Senne. The extra point was unsuccessful as Brackett was behind 6-7.

The Wolves increased their lead as they scored on the first play of the second quarter when Oney Ramirez connected with Saul Obregon for a 15 yard pass. Santos added another PAT

increasing Dilley's lead to 14-6.

Dilley scored again in the third period, when Ramirez ran six yards into the end zone on a quarterback keeper. The PAT attempt failed making the score 20-6.

Quarterback Clay Hunt took several shots to the ankle during the coarse of the game and was finally sidelined. He was replaced by sophomore Lynn Floyd who performed great under all of the pressures. Floyd pulled the Tigers back in the game, when he raced 21 yards for touchdown. On the conversion, Floyd faked to a Tiger runningback and then ran the Dilley lead to 21-14.

The Tigers were making one last run for the money when they took possession of the ball with 1:08 left in the ballgame at their own 28 yardline. Floyd found Tevin Senne for a 29 yard pass which set a new light on the situation. The Tigers hopes ceased when Dilley intercepted a Brackett pass with :23 left. The Wolves then ran down the clock for the district crown.

New Area Code Number

At 12:01 a.m. on November 4, telephone customers in 200 Northeast Texas communities now served by area code 214 will begin being served by the nation's newest area code --

Customers in Dallas and in 33 Metroplex municipalities immediately surrounding the city will continue to use the 214 area

Throughout the past year -- and again this month -customers have received reminders in their monthly telephone bills concerning the change. News releases provided to local print and broadcast media have also helped announce the change, as have paid advertisements.

"Programming accommodate the new area code will be activated at 12:01 a.m. on November 4, 1990," said James A. Spriggs, vice president general manager, northern operating unit. "Hopefully, most -- if not all -- of our business and residential customers who need to make modifications in their telephone equipment or service to accommodate the 903 area code have already done so. These modifications are needed so that features like Speed Dialing, Call forwarding and Route Selection will continue to operate properly."

But the company has also taken precautionary steps to avoid call completion problems for customers who have not made these changes, Spriggs emphasized. "From November 4, 1990 to May 4, 1991, our switching equipment will still allow calls to the new 903 area code to be completed - whether the caller used the new, correct area code or the former 214 area code.

"This will allow customers additional time to make equipment and service changes, as well as to inform friends, relatives and business associates outside the new 903 area," Spriggs stressed. "After May 4, callers will not be able to complete calls to the new 903 area without dialing the correct area code. If they mistakenly use the former 214 area code, the will hear a recorded message instructing them to dial the new 903 area code.

Additionally, the GTE Everything Pages Directories printed prior to November carry a reminder about the area code change on the covers.

GTE Southwest and 10 other local telephone companies who provide service to Northeast Texas announced early last year the need to add another area code to the region served by the 214 area code. The additional area code is needed because continued residential and business growth in the 214 area led to a shortage of available telephone number combinations.

Through a cooperative effort between the Postal Service and local sponsoring agencies, you can arrange to have your carrier watch for

an accumulation of mail in your mailbox which could indicate a prob-

This is how the program works. When your name is given to the Post

Robinson Office by a local sponsoring agency, a decal is placed in your mailbox as a signal to the letter carrier serving your route. The carrier then will be alert to an accumulation of mail which might signify a sudden illness or accident. Through locally developed procedures, the accumulation will be reported to the social service agency for follow-up action.

Carrier Alert is a free service leveloped especially for elderly and homebound individuals who may



have difficulty calling for help in the event of an accident or sudden illness. The program is a natural extension of the care which individual letter carriers traditionally have exhibited for their customers-not just in the delivery of their mailbut in a genuine concern for their well-being.

If you or someone you know would like to participate in Carrier Alert, call your local postmaster.







Word Studies By Ken Curry

"...just as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before Him" (Eph. 1:4). "to those who have been sanctified in Christ Jesus, saints by calling..." (I Cor. 1:2).

What does it mean to be "holy", to be "sanctified:, and what is the difference between the two words? Actually, there is no difference since they both are used to translate the Hebrew word gadesh and the Greek word hagios. Qadesh and hagios have the same meaning, "to be separate, or set apart." The problem the translators have is in the English language itself. The Old English word "holy" and the Latin word "sanctify" do not lend themselves to all of the English parts of speech. For example, in the verb form, we may sanctify a building as a church (set the building apart for God's use), but to "holify" a building would be bad English. In the noun form, sanctified ones are

called saints, but to call a group of Christians the "holies" would be essay entitled: The U. S. Consti-

The same problem exists in translating the Hebrew and Greek words for "believe." In English, we are forced to flip-flop between using a form of believe and a form of the word "faith". We can "believe" something, but we never "faith" something. I have always disagreed with using "Believers" as a synonym for "Christians," because believe is a transitive verb and must have an object. To say, "I believe" signi-*fies nothing, since you haven't mentioned what you believe. The "faithful" is a better synonym for Christians, since it better describes people who have appropriated God's Grace by faith.

Senator Zaffirini Re-Elected in Landslide

ni, D-Laredo, was re-elected to a second term Tuesday (Nov. 6) with an overall 2-to-1 win, beating Republican Larry Vick in each of the 20 Counties of senatorial district 21.

Sen. Zaffirini said she looks forward to a second term. She intends to maintain her priority of protecting and championing the social and

economic security of the family.

In her victory speech at her Laredo headquarters Tuesday, Sen. Zaffirini paid tribute to the Lord for His inspiration and guidance and to her countless friends and supporters.

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
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Usually the conventional ferris wheel that is in a carnival or county fair is about fifty feet high and has twelve to sixteen passen-

But a ferris wheel that was created especially for the 1893 Worlds Columbian Exposition at Chicago was a real engineering

George Washington Gale Ferris, a thirty-three year old Pittsburgh bridge builder accepted a challenge from the engineers who had put up the 984 foot high Eiffel Tower at the Paris Exposition of 1889. These builders said America could not come up with something as unique and daring as Alexander Gustav Eiffel's Tower.

George Ferris submitted a design for a giant revolving wheel with passenger cars. The wheel was to be 250 feet in diameter, have 36 cars each with a capacity of sixty people. When it was filled it would hold 2,160 people at once. At first he was laughed at, but he kept promoting his idea. Times were bad, in fact, the country was in a depression, but Ferris finally raised enough money to finance the "Ferris Wheel Company."

Finally in mid-December,

1892, just four months before the opening of the Chicago Exposition, a contract was signed and construction began. Ferris was to keep the first \$300,000 and split the rest of the profits with the

Ferris had to farm out the parts which had to be perfect so they would fit when assembled on

In March, the 45ft long axle arrived in Chicago from Pittsburgh where it had been forged. The wheel was tested on June 9 with success. Then the 36 cars had to be hung, each having five large plate glass windows on each

Seven weeks after the Exposition opened on June 21, the wheel was ready. The customers flocked to give it a try. At night the wheel was lit by 3,000 of Thomas Edison's new incandescent lamps. There were six platforms for loading and unloading the passengers. On the first turn of the ride, six stops were made for loading. On the second turn there was a nine minute non stop ride in the sky. On clear days the passengers could see a beautiful view of Chicago and Lake Michi-

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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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Be Thankful for the Rancher & Farmer!

As we approach the Thanksgiving Holiday, many may reflect on what we, as Americans, and as Texans, in particular, should be thankful for...and that is an abundant and safe food supply. For this, we have the hard work and dedication of our nation's farmers and ranchers to thank.

Only two percent of the U.S. population lives on the farm or ranch, yet that 2 percent manages to feed the other 98 percent in this nation as well as other foreign countries. One American farmer produces enough food and fiber for 14 people, 92 here at home and 22 overseas.

In Texas, agriculture shares the stage with the oil and gas industry as the State's most dominant industries. We pride ourselves as being the biggest and the best. In agriculture, there is no other state that can brag quite like we can.

We rank first in sales of

cattle and calves. We feed 22 percent of the U.S. total, and represent 14 percent of the total U.S. cattle herd.

We rank first in sales of sheep and wool, goats and mohair. Receipts estimated from sheep totaled \$65 million, and from goats \$34 million. Wool and mohair---about \$30 million a piece.

We rank first in sales of cotton. Cotton and cottonseed marketing have risen to \$1.35 billion.

We rank first in the value of farm real estate, number of farms and ranches with 156,000, and in the amount of farm and ranch land.

All these numbers may sound impressive, but they mean nothing unless the tremendous amount of food and fiber produced is available and worthy of consumption. Is our food safe? Yes, without a doubt. The public's number one concern is food safety. FDA studies show that our life

expectancy continues to increase. In 1900, it was 47 years, and in 1982, it was 75 years. Farmer and ranchers make a living from the environment where others only enjoy it.

Efforts like National Farm-City Week, (November 18-24, 1990), brings people from the farm and city together to better understand the concerns of each.

The agricultural production system in Texas is estimated to have an economic impact of about \$35 billion. The entire food and fiber production, processing and retail marketing chain has roughly twice the impact. Businesses related to agriculture employ more than 20 percent of the workforce.

On the individual farm, only 25 cents of your food dollar actually goes to the farmer. The rest pays for the food to be assembled, inspected, graded, stored, processed, packaged, transported, wholesaled and retailed. We, as Americans, spend only 12 percent of our disposable income on food, the lowest in the world.

Some people think of farms as enterprises run by huge corporations. But farming is America is still very much a family business. Only three percent or about 60,000 of America's farms are owned by corporations. And nearly all of those are actually family-held businesses. Foreign ownership of U.S. farmland amounts to less than one percent and half of that is forest land.

Whether it's a favorite plant, a healthy lawn, a vegetable garden, or enough food and fiber for 114 people, many Americans enjoy growing things. But as the number of farmers declines and the general population increases, one has to wonder where the farmers and ranchers of tomorrow will come from.

Today's farmer and rancher must be a good businessman. He must be aware of global markets and how to penetrate them. He must be an entrepreneur willing to compete at the mercy of flood, drought, tornado or early frost. Days are long with no guarantees of a regular paycheck.

The farmers and ranchers of the future need the encouragement of all of us who are not. After all, so much of our everyday life is directly tied to the success of those that work the land.

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
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
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
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Two Participate in Texas School Improvement Initiative Program

Bobby D. McCall, Superintendent, and Jim Bader, Board President, at Brackett independent School District, have been selected to participate in the 1990 training update of the Academy for Effective Schools Leadership. "Mr. McCall and Mr. Bader are two of approximately 750 participants from across the state named to the academy," reports Dr. Ruben D. Olivarez, deputy commissioner for Accreditation and School Improvement at the Texas Education

The academy is a component of the Texas School Improvement Initiative (TSII) Program, which was established in 1988 by Dr. W.N. Kirby, commissioner of education, to promote high performance standards of educational quality at campus and district levels. "The TSII program," Dr. Olivarez explains, "provides selected school districts, their principals, other administrators, and school board members an opportunity to be part

Bobby D. McCall, Supernt, and Jim Bader, Board tt, at Brackett independent District, have been selected of a statewide school improvement effort that integrates peer evaluation in the state's performancebased accreditation process.

"The 1990-91 school year," the Agency's deputy commissioner continues, "marks the first time that school board members will participate in the TSII program."

"Previously, participants included only superintendents, central office administrators, and secondary and elementary principals," he explains. "The addition of school board members to the program is the next logical step as we continue to provide participating school districts and their administrators and opportunity to make a significant contribution to the improvement of education throughout the state. This involvement of school board members is aimed at producing educational effectiveness, systematic accountability, and fiscal responsibility."

The TSII training was

conducted in Austin this past summer for school administrators in July and for school board members in September. Participants were divided into groups based on their experience in the program. All administrators received intensive two-day training in effective schools research, school improvement strategies. management techniques, and current techniques, and current educational legislative changes. Beginning participants also received initial training in the program to prepare them to be supplementary members of accreditation teams. Returning administrators received additional, comprehensive training aimed at increasing their responsibilities and supplementary accreditation team

School board members received training on characteristics of effective schools, affective governance operations of school districts and the accreditation process.

Brackett Students to Learn About Marine Life at Sea World

San Antonio -- Sea World of Texas will introduce several Brackettville area youngsters to the wonders of the sea during a special visit by Brackettville "gifted and talented" students in grades three to six to the San Antonio marine zoological park on Tuesday, Nov.

As part of this educational field trip, students will be able to gain first-hand knowledge of the ocean and its inhabitants through presentations by Sea World's Staff of state-certified instructors and visits to exhibits and animal areas.

"Education is an integral part of the Sea World philosophy," said Mary Alice Ramirez, director of education for Sea World of Texas. "Over the years, Sea World's education programs have been very instrumental in creating an awareness of the marine environment among students and teachers alike."

Among the most popular programs offered by Sea World, the instructional field trips are held during the school year, in October, November, March and May. The day-long journeys through Sea World allow students in pre-kindergarten through 12th grade to become familiar with marine animals such as whales, dolphins, sharks, penguins and sea lions.

Each field trip features two education-oriented animal shows focusing on the natural behavior, adaptations, anatomy, ecology, communication and training of various forms of marine life, Ramirez explained. The presentations are specially developed for specific grade levels and encourage audience participation.

Active Commercial Utility Accounts, will be allowed one trip per account per month for disposal of brush or garbage. Additional trips will be charged according to fee schedule. (UTILITY CARD MUST BE PRESENTED AT GATE)

Drug Testing

Brackett Independent School District is considering implementing a voluntary drug testing program for the 1991-92 school year to act as a deterrent against the use of drugs. It is recognized nationally that alcohol and drug abuse is a major health problem in adolescents. Fear of detection can often relieve participants from the ordinary peer pressures concerning alcohol and drug abuse. Brackett I.S.D. believes that implementing this program would send a message to students that the school cares about them and what they do to their bodies. It would also be a clear indication that the community and the school district will not tolerate drug abuse.

The drug testing would be strictly voluntary and done in a random drawing on a periodic basis. Screening would be for opiates, cocaine, amphetamines, and marijuana. Steroids could be tested upon request. Counseling would be recommended for students with positive results.


