Civil Defense What To Do

Exactly what, you may ask, can an individual do about civil defense?

Quite a bit, civil defense experts answer, especially if you'll follow advice from the State Department and Disaster Relief Headquarters and the Federal Civil Defense Administration.

For that matter, William L. McGill, state coordinator of civil defense, points out that doing quite a bit now is vital to every one of us. You must remember that there is a good chance that any atomic war would be over in just a few weeks, and that the victory could belong to the population which simply does the best job of surviving.

As far as the individual is concerned, civil defense preparation—and that is the surest road to survival—is made up of two main points: (1) Learning to work as a family unit, and (2) learning to work with your neighbors.

Perhaps the first thing to know is the air raid alert signal. This would be either a three-minute wailing siren or short blasts. The all-clear would be three one-minute blasts with two minutes of silence between.

You must also know what to do if you're warned of an atomic attack, and even if you're not warned.

Consider a no-warning situation first:

If you're at HOME, drop to the floor and get under a bed or heavy table.

If you're at WORK, drop to the floor and get under a desk or work bench.

If you're at school, drop to the floor out of line of windows. Bury your face in your arms.

If you're in the OPEN, drop to the ground or dive for cover.

Bury your face in your arms.

If you're in a VEHICLE, drop to the floor and bury your face in your arms.

This is what you do with warning:

If you're at HOME, go to a prepared shelter. Turn off all appliances.

If you're at WORK, obey wardens. Go to your assigned shelter.

If you're at SCHOOL, obey your teacher. Go to your assigned shelter quietly.

If you're in the OPEN, obey wardens. Go to the nearest approved building or shelter.

If you're in a VEHICLE, go to the nearest approved building or shelter.

Finance USO Funds

DALLAS, TEXAS, Dec. 10—

The Texas United Defense Fund Committee this week entered the last lap of its campaign to raise \$740,896 in Texas to finance the many services of the USO. R. R. Gilbert, campaign chairman, announced that the Committee now has \$675,000 of its goal through the inclusion of USO in United Fund and Community Chest campaigns, and in local county campaigns where a share of the State quota has been accepted. This leaves only about \$66,000 yet to be pledged.

"There has been a generous response to the USO appeal throughout the State," Gilbert said. "All the big Community Chest cities have oversubscribed their quotas with the result that chest cities have raised \$550,000 of the reported \$600,000. The remaining \$125,000 represents quotas accepted by county organizations."

Gilbert said that a number of local campaigns are now in progress and that several others have been deferred until after the first of the year. Plans are to complete the fund-raising

program for USO early in 1953. The campaign chairman commended the USO on the magnificent job which it is doing around the globe in the provision of morale services to more than 4,000,000 young men and women in the Armed Forces—thousands and thousands of whom are from Texas.

Civil Service Returns Applications

The Civilian Personnel Office, Laughlin Air Force Base, is in the process of returning applications to citizens of Del Rio and the surrounding area who have applied for positions as Clerk, Clerk-Typist, and Clerk-Stenographer. The fact that these applications are being returned is in no way to be construed to mean that the applicant is not qualified nor that vacancies do not exist in these categories.

Under present Civil Service Regulations an applicant for a Federal Civil Service position must qualify in an appropriate examination administered by the Civil Service Commission for the position applied for. If eligibility has previously been established in an appropriate examination, or if an applicant has previously served in a Civil Service position with permanent or probational Civil Service status, then they may be eligible for appointment and need not take another examination.

Applications being returned by the Civilian Personnel Office do not indicate whether the applicant is eligible for appointment or having served with permanent or probational Civil Service status, they are requested to resubmit their applications with the required proof, otherwise they should consult the list of examinations currently open at the post office and submit the necessary forms to the Regionally Director, 14th U. S. Civil Service Region, 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas 2, Texas.

O.P.S. Eases Slaughtering Rules

The Office of Price Stabilization has eased its regulations pertaining to slaughtering of livestock.

San Antonio O.P.S. officials said persons wishing to slaughter livestock may do so by registering with the district O.P.S. office and marking their registration number on the meat they produce.

The requirement that slaughterers be registered is being continued, O.P.S. said, in order to be prepared in case of a possible future national emergency. The marking requirement is being for the purpose of meat identification.

The O.P.S. action also reduced record-keeping requirements. San Antonio district O.P.S. officials said persons wishing to enter the slaughtering business should contact the district office, 229 West Nueva Street.

Business Briefs

Wyoming is the first state to sign a state-federal cooperative agreement for the inspection of coal mines to prevent major disasters. While the Chamber of Commerce of the United States believe that status, rather than the federal government, should have the power to close dangerous mines, it asserts these cooperative agreements are preferable to strong federal powers over coal mines.

Veterans Questions And Their Answers

Q—I'm studying in college under the Korean GI Bill, and the goal I put down on my VA application is an AB degree. After I get it, I want to go on for my master's degree. Would that step be considered a change of program, even if my advanced studies are in the same field?

A—Yes. The reason would be that your original GI training goal has been changed.

Q—I am a World War veteran drawing a VA pension for a non-service-connected disability. I had to sell my house for a price less than I paid for it. Am I supposed to count the proceeds of the sale as income, in figuring out whether I come under the annual income ceiling of \$2,700 for a married veteran?

A—No. Since you sold your house at less than your purchase price, no part of the proceeds need be considered as income.

Q—I have just received orders that recall me to active duty. I don't think my service pay will be sufficient to allow me to keep up payments on the house I bought with a GI loan. Is there anything I can do about it?

A—Yes. You should discuss your entire situation with the paymaster at the post office while you're in uniform. That part of the payment you cannot make can be postponed until you get out of service. At that time you should see the mortgage holder again, and make arrangements for a repayment schedule.

Q—I hold a National Service Life Insurance policy, and I'm also drawing monthly disability compensation payments from the VA. Would it be possible for VA to deduct the monthly insurance premiums from my compensation checks, so I wouldn't have to bother with the payments myself?

A—Yes. You may authorize VA to deduct premium payments from your monthly compensation, provided your compensation is large enough for this purpose. VA Form 9-887, available at any VA office, should be used in authorizing the deduction.

Q—Assume that a veteran meets all the requirements for Korean GI Bill training. May he enroll under this Act even though he has gone back on active duty and is now in uniform?

A—No. Veterans on active duty are not eligible for Korean GI Bill training, even though they meet all the law's basic requirements.

Q—I've just been discharged from service, and I plan to apply for Korean term insurance sometime within 120 days of my discharge. Is an application sufficient, or must I also pay a monthly premium?

A—An application alone would not be sufficient. You also must pay the required first premium before the 120-day deadline.

It will make you feel good, and will be good for you. And, you will like the Magi of Bible History, who brought presents of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the Christ Child.

There are many legends connected with Christmas, and the one about the Magi, known in legend of the Medieval ages as the three Kings from Cologne, namely, Gaspar, Melchior and Balthazar. Then the one we often wondered about, that is how the Magi knew when the star was over the infant. Another legend has it that the Wise Men stopped at a well in the vicinity where the child was, and noted that down the well they could see the star shining and this indicated it was overhead.

Good Advice From State Health Officer

AUSTIN, Nov. 5 — It is an illogical fact that many people complain about the heat of Texas summers and yet sit indoors during the winter months in a temperature about as high as that about which they complained in the summer season, is the view of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"If the average person would realize the definite hazards in developing and maintaining an indoor temperature about 70 degrees, or at most 72 degrees, when the outside thermometer registers around freezing," he said, "there would be fewer colds, less bronchial conditions, and less pneumonia that there are today."

"Fresh air is one of the body's basic needs and no amount of luxury or artificial pleasure can be substituted for it. It may be a comfortable feeling to be warm, especially with the consciousness of the tough weather outdoors, but it is quite another matter to achieve this comfort at the probable cost of health."

"Winters in the Temperate Zone are sufficiently trying upon the human system with their sudden and sharp temperature changes, without adding to the burden by making a hothouse of one's home. Of course, colds and other respiratory affections can be acquired in many different ways, but one of the easiest methods of becoming victims of such hazards is the overheated house."

"To become overheated and perspire, though the latter condition may not be perceived, and in this softened state to brave the cold winter blasts, is to take a thoroughly unwarranted

chance chance with health. "The wise householder therefore will check up on his artificial heat problem. He will resolve to keep his thermometer within safe limits."

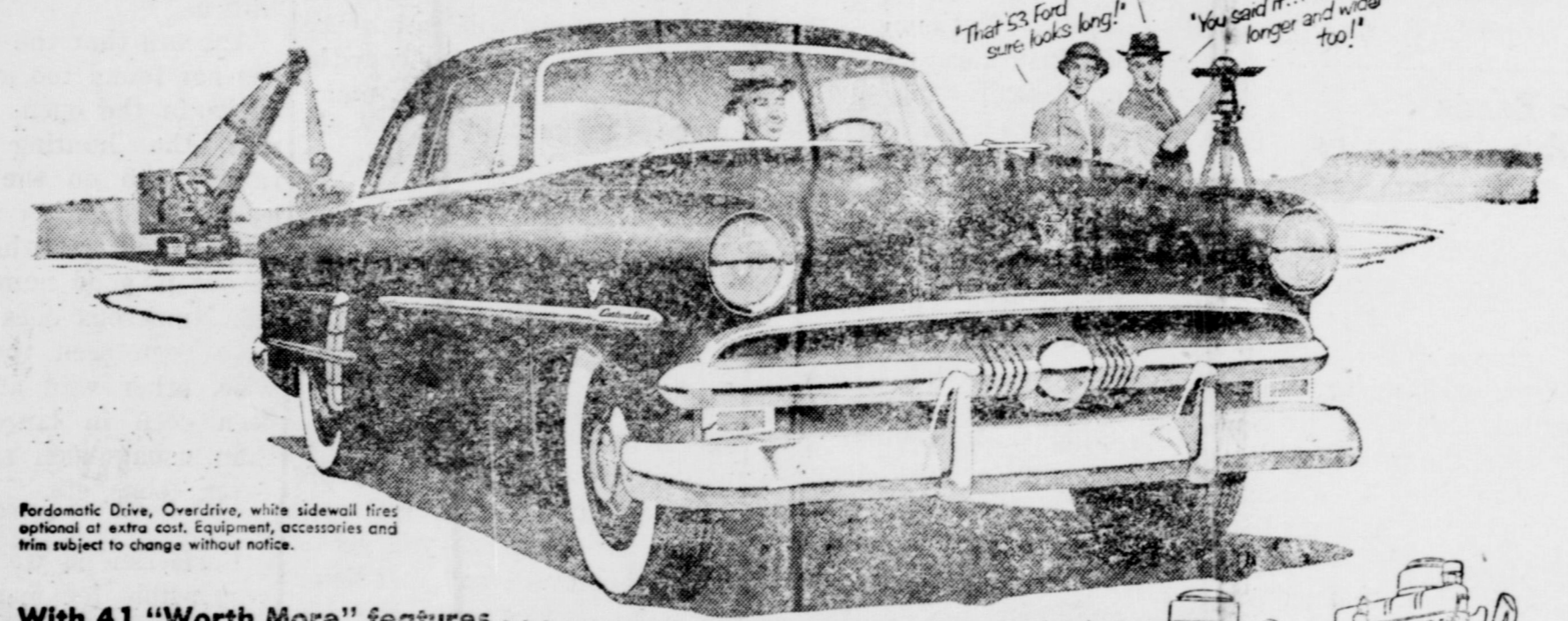

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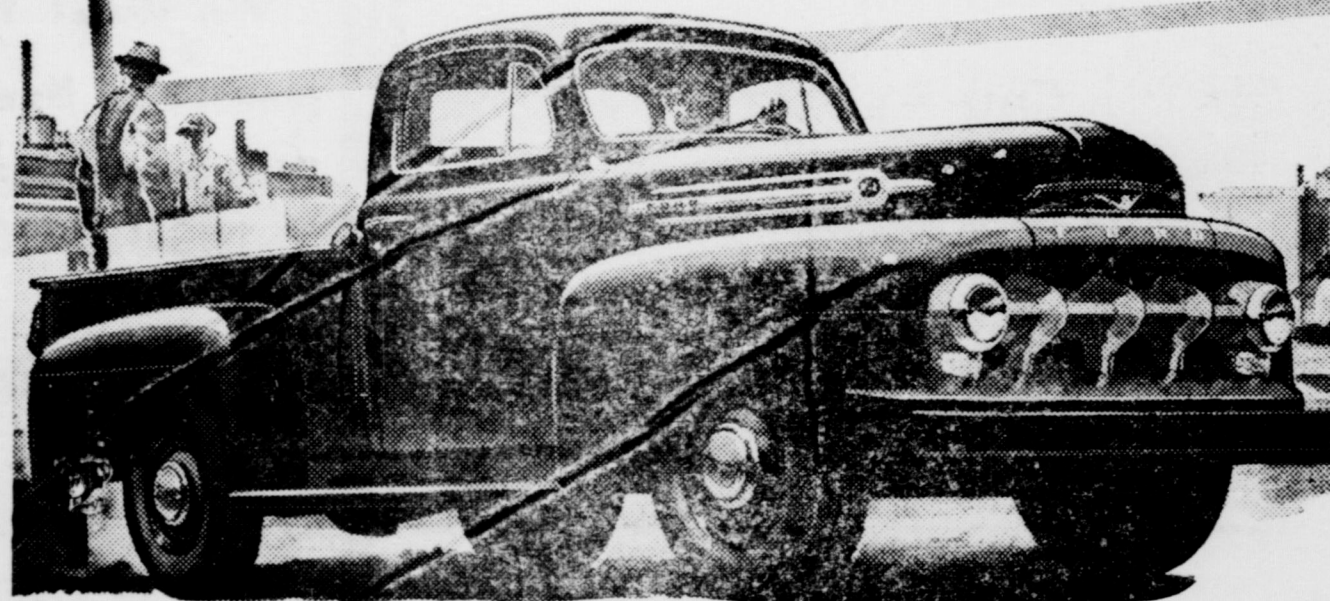

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Veterans Questions And Their Answers

Q—I've been totally disabled for six months, and I applied to the VA for a waiver on my National Service Life Insurance premiums. Now that I've applied, may I stop paying my premiums?

A—No. You should continue to pay your premiums regularly, as they become due, until you have received word from VA that you are entitled to waiver. In that way, you'll avoid the possibility of your insurance lapsing, in case your claim is not granted.

Q—Does the \$310-a-month ceiling under the Korean GI Bill apply to all types of training?

A—No. It applies only to veterans training-on-the-job. It means that if a job trainee's monthly allowance plus his earning as a trainee exceed \$310 a month, VA will reduce the allowance accordingly.

Q—I was under age when I enlisted in the Army during World War II. I was in for six months before the Army found out and sent me home. Would that service entitle me to a GI loan.

A—Yes. A veteran whose entitlement was cancelled because he was under age is entitled to eligibility credit for GI loans.

Q—Are there any types of courses not permitted under the Korean GI Bill education and training program?

A—Yes. Courses in bartending, dancing and personality development are prohibited by law, and cannot be approved under any conditions.

Q—I'm applying for the new type of post-Korean term insurance. Whom may I name as the beneficiary of my insurance?

A—You may name any person or persons. Or, if you want, you also may designate any firm, corporation or other legal entity, including your estate.
