## What You Pay In Federal Taxes

All too often people are heard to say something like this: "I'm lucky, with my large family I don't have to pay Federal taxes." Everyone pays Federal taxes—and State taxes—and city taxes.

True, some direct taxes, such as those on income, can be avoided by exemptions for dependents. But the indirect, or "hidden" taxes hit every man, woman and child in the nation.

Special tables prepared by the Carrier Corporation's tax department, based on President Truman's budget estimates, show this most clearly. And remember, these are just the Federal direct and indirect taxes. State and city levies are in addition.

Locate your salary or wage figure in the tax tables and prepare for a shock. Few people have any idea just how much of their income is going into the support of government.

Even the man with eight exemptions — and such is the exception, not the rule — who pays no income tax up to an income of \$6,000, yet nearly 20 per cent of his income is taxed. Ranging from an income of \$2,500 to \$5,000 he pays indirect taxes of from \$418 to \$837 a year.

In fact, no matter what the income level or how many exemptions, the tax levy consisting of the so-called "hidden taxes" is universal. In the case of one of two exemptions the income-tax and indirect tax amounts are about even up to incomes of \$5,000. Then the income-tax amount increases at a higher rate.

As the exemptions increase in number, the income-tax rate declines, but the indirect tax figure increases at a greater rate, for the most goods and services required, the most are the hid-

den taxes.

The tables on the reverse side, give a true picture of just how much is being paid out in taxes to cover the costs of Federal government.

And remember this, government gives only that which the people pay for. You just don't get something for nothing.

## Texas Water Conservation Association

AUSTIN, December 1—Texas moved closer to relief for its acute water problem with Governor Shivers' Statewide Water Committee of 101 members and four task committees meeting here November 19 to consider important "stop gap" legislation to be presented to the new legislature when it meets in January.

J. B. Thomas, Fort Worth Utility executive and chairman of the Governor's committee, announced the four committees that are outlining proposed legislation, will meet in Austin December 4 to co-ordinate their findings. This composite report will be submitted to a steering committee which will meet here December 11. The steering group will pass on the final co-ordinated report of the task committees and a copy will be mailed to all members of the Governor's committee.

A meeting of the general committee will be held and final action will be taken which will then be presented to Governor Shivers and the recommendations to be submitted to the legislature.

The four task committees and their chairmen are: First, one to recommend statutory changes in present laws to give more legal power to the present State Board of Water Engineers, headed by Guy C. Jackson of Anahuac; two, a committee to devise the best method of financing a state water control program, Victor Bouldin, Houston, chairman; three, to co-ordinate participation of state and federal agencies on Texas water projects, chairmanned by J. S. Bridwell of Wichita Falls and fourth, a committee to evolve a program for the control of pollution, headed by Mason Lockwood of Houston.

No effort will be made to write a new water code at the next legislative session, it was agreed. It was also the opinion of the committee that a long range program preceded by a two year survey of all approaches to the Texas Water problem will be necessary before Texas gets the water legislation it needs and desires.

"We feel confident that our committee will be able to come up with immediate, necessary legislation which will amend the present laws and give needed relief to the more pressing water problems which we are facing now," Chairman Thomas said.

## Hunters Warned To Be Careful

AUSTIN, Nov. 30.—The Chief Clerk of the Game and Fish Commission appealed for hunters' cooperation in the grim statistical routine of adding up casualties.

"And the best cooperation," he said, "naturally can come in helping keep down the number of hunters shot."

The Chief Clerk made his ap-

peal as preparations were being made for the big game season under the general law which opened November 16.

At least five Texas hunters have died from accidents in the field this fall. Four died from gunfire and one drowning while trying to retrieve a duck.

A Hillsboro man, a Porter Springs youth and a Houston youth were killed in handling their own guns. Mistaken for a deer, a Livingston man was killed by his own father who is partly blind. The drowning man was from El Paso. He was hunting alone when he vainly tried to retrieve a duck.

The Chief Clerk said the big game season provides even greater hazards than the waterfowl and small game seasons. The reason, he explained is that deer rifles are more powerful and shoot farther.

He listed some pointers covering the more common hunting hazards:

Don't pull the trigger until certain of the target. Each year several hunters are mistaken for game and shot.

## To Fight Tuberculosis

NEW YORK, November 26 — The American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations have called upon all members of organized labor to buy and use more Christmas Seals this year than ever before to support the tuberculosis control programs of the National Tuberculosis Association and its 3,000 affiliated voluntary associations throughout the country, Dr. James E. Perkins, NTA managing director, announced yesterday.

The 46th annual Christmas Seal Sale, which began on Nov. 17, will continue until December 25.

There are 99 county associations in Texas and the Texas Tuberculosis Association which conducts the TB control activity on a statewide level.

"While progress is being made in preventing deaths from this dread disease," the late President William Green of the A.F. of L shortly before his death last week wrote to the NTA, "it is regrettable that less progress is being made in preventing people from getting this disease with its physical, emotional, social and economic problems."

Mr. Green urged support of the "battle against tuberculosis," which, he said, "is being waged on four broad fronts — education, case finding, rehabilitation, and medical research" — by the NTA and its affiliated state and local associations.

In behalf of the C.I.O., the late Philip Murray, in a letter written before his death Nov. 9, urged support of the Christmas Seal Sale. Such support, Mr. Murray's letter said, "will contribute to the research and prevention of this disease, which, like all other diseases of the human mind and body, must be attacked boldly by the joint efforts of both public and voluntary agencies."

## MENTAL MEANDERINGS

We are glad to note one thing about the new administration, and that is that they have already become well aware of the great expectations that the general public have of them. They realize, as do most every thinking man and woman, that they are in no position to work miracles, and that the best they can do under the circumstances which were thrust upon this country and its people, is to try to keep matters from becoming any worse, and indeed it will require all efforts of all concerned to even maintain it, for the time being anyways, at an even keel, or as it is right now. There is a possibility that the outgoing administration will scrap all controls and leave it up to the new administration to handle the situation as best it can. There is inflation present, fear and distrust of Russia and some of the other nations, a budget which will again leave this country in the "red" if not trimmed, or even if trimmed to the barest possible lowest level; there are troubles at home, with changeovers, with graft, past performances, political expediencies, etc. not to mention those who want highest wages for groups and have no wish to think what happens to the rest of the nation. All of which leaves Gen. Eisenhower with a multitude of problems. He is picking, so it seems today, some advisors who have had experience in their fields, and will probably tackle the biggest problems, and the ones that concern all of us most, first. But we should all remember that this is not the "age of miracles".

It seems as if we will have to do something about Korea, and our guess is that there will be something done, whether General Eisenhower visits that country or not. It is inconceivable that the hinese, who claim their men fighting in Korea, are volunteers, would be permitted sanctuary in their own country for their planes. That we should have to warn people of a coming raid and give the enemy time to rally their arms against us. There has been too much pussyfooting in this war, and we would venture a guess that there will be changes made, and soon too.

Made any plans for the Yuletide yet? There are some that you might not have possibly thought about: that of lighting your home, the grounds for the Yuletide with bright lights scenes, festoonings, etc. Giving or planning to help those who will not have any Christmas enjoy this great day more. By planning to go to Church that day, the greatest gift you can give to the Christ Child. Why not help to make it a Merry Christmas for others besides your self.

Those rains which we had the past week or so have given the ground a fine seasoning, and will be of invaluable aid to the ranges which have been parched by one of the longest drouths in recorded history. In many places, so bad had been the effects of the dry weather, that grasses appear to have died out completely, and it may be some time before reseeding is done thereon, if left to Nature or sooner if done by man himself.

Commenting on the widening of the bridges on Highways No. 90 in Kinney County, we heard one speaker make the observation that no matter how wide you make the bridges, even to the width of the right-of-way, there would still be some who would find them too narrow. Perhaps this was a bit far-fetched, but the unfortunate fact remains that in spite of all precautions accidents will occur where people are concerned. Narrow bridges of course add a considerable hazard to the traffic over our highways. But it is the hand on the steering wheel which can eliminate many of these accidents. Speed, carelessness, negligence of car's safety features, these are the three more important items which contribute to or keep accidents.

So many shopping days afore Christmas. Perhaps, but so much money to spend on Christmas makes it a harder problem still.

The one word that seems to be used the most in our language, thought has not been noticed too much, is the one "why?" The question, as it is. Ever notice how many times it is used? Ever wonder why? Well, so someone has figured it out, because it is the one word which by itself asks a question, and everyone understands that it needs an answer. It is rather hard to answer some, or many for that fact, of the questions that it preposes. Whenever we hear that word, we sort of shudder, and get set for an answer—usually long. No longer using any alabias.

Guess we forgot, when mentioning the football season was over, that there were a number of other games — mostly bowl games, — coming up. We tried to remember what some of these were, but had to admit that we were rather befuddled when we got to thinking about them. Rose bowl, Ice bowl, Cotton bowl, Orange bowl, Salad bowl and lots of other bowls. But seems we will be having football with us over into the new year, and while then the games will be just memories for the stove quarterbacks, they will be right good thinking over and catching up with errors.

Don't forget that we in Brackettville will have another lighting contest this year. That is, the usual indoor and outdoor Christmas lighting contest which always seems to pep up the community a lot, and brings out some extra decorations with light that otherwise might not have been used. Let's all get in on this and try our best to outdo our neighbor — it all adds up to a better display for the community anyway.

Quite a number of US transport planes have featured in accidents occurring within the past week or so, with a number of persons being killed. This is something to be expected, especially where plane travel is numerous. But there are conjectures as to what caused all of these to fall about the same time. Possibly coincidence. But we don't think, as someone suggested, that it could have been sabotage.

We have been hollering so much about getting ready for Christmas that we nigh forgot that the end of the year — 1962 — is also coming fast. Soon we will be in 1953, with all that it brings.

**Veterans Questions  
And Their Answers**

Q.—I'm planning to apply for institutional on-farm training under the Korean GI Bill. Does VA need anything more than just my completed application form?

A.—Yes. You must include, with your application, (1) photostats of both sides of your discharge or separation paper; (2) a detailed outline of your training program as approved by your school; (3) a certification from your school stating that the program meets all standards of the law, and (4) evidence that you have control of the farm on which you're going to train and that the training will occupy your full time.

Q.—I am making arrangements to buy a house with a GI loan. Can part of the loan be used for advance payments I'm supposed to make for taxes and insurance?

A.—No. Prepaid items, such as taxes and insurance, must be paid for in cash, and may not be part of the loan.

Q.—I signed up for the total disability income provision in connection with my National Service Life Insurance. If I become totally disabled and draw payments under this provision, will the face amount of my policy be reduced?

A.—No. The monthly income benefits will not decrease the face amount of your policy.

Q.—How much of an allowance will I get if I enroll in a correspondence school under the Korean GI Bill?

A.—Your allowance will be the school's established charge for non-veterans taking the same course. You, of course, must pay the school.
