

### **On To Austin BHS** Debate Duo Advances to State Contest

ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Borden County that all outdoor burning is prohibited in the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order roles prohibit outdoor burning activities including trash and outdoor grilling. Welding activities will be permitted when additional personnel are on site with firefighting equipment.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.





### **County Educational Presentation Contest, Share-the**fun and Public Speaking Project



Producers wondering what the profit and financing options are for certain 2009 crops can find out by attending either of two Texas AgriLife Extension Service crop profitability workshops set for 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Feb. 17 and March 5 at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Lubbock

"Our objective is to provide producers the tools, data and skills to evaluate the potential profitability of alternative crops that are grown in the area or have the potential to be grown here", said Dr. Jackie Smith, AgriLife Extension economist at Lubbock. "Each participant will get a printed copy of our presentations and selected crop budgets. They will also receive a CD with Excel crop budgets and break-even tables, reference files and a set of Internet links," Smith said. "This will help them use the Excel spreadsheet on their own computer.

Individual registration is \$20 (by check) and includes lunch and refreshments. The workshops are funded by a grant from the Texas State Cotton Support Committee. "The grant enables us to develop a crop budget projection tool, conduct training workshops, keep the data updated, and then make the tool and information available to producers," Smith said.

The producers will go home with a spreadsheet that they can fine-tune using their own cost figures to make accurate comparisons of the profitability of cotton and sorghum, for example. Smith said the comparison spreadsheet includes four cotton budgets and 17 other crop budgets that can be quickly evaluated with expected input costs and crop prices. He said the Excel spreadsheet allows users to examine the impact of different crop-share rental arrangements on landlord and renter's net income. Smith, along with AgriLife Extension risk management specialists Jay Yates and Jeff Pate at Lubbock, and marketing specialists Dr. John Robinson and Dr. Mark Welch, both from College Station, will conduct the workshops

Other agenda topics will include: input price trends and projections for 2009; a farm bill update; and basis cash contracts and forward pricing tools using futures and options.

planted in the U.S. and around the world during the 2009 growing season.

According to the USDA report, estimated December 2008 marketings totaled only 781,000 bales. The average selling price reported for the month was 51.9 cents per pound.

Based on these figures, the 2008 Upland Cotton Weighted Average Price calculated through December 2008 stands at 54.53 cents per pound. With the first five months of the marketing year now past, the cal-culated 2008 Weighted Average Price continues to fall closer to the 52-cent Upland cotton Base Loan rate.

Price forecasts for the remainder of the 2008 marketing year are following the same downward trend as well. The preliminary mid-month price reported for January 2009 was 47.40 cents per pound.


Lower price expectations were also echoed in the recent announcement of an advance 2008-crop Counter-cyclical payment rate of 5.03 cents, which is 40 percent of the maximum possible Upland cotton CC rate of 12.58 cents per pound.

The following table shows the average price received each month by farmers and the associated weighted average price based on prices and cumulative marketings from August 1 through December 31, 2008.

The 2008 Counter-cyclical payment rate authorized under the 2008 Farm Bill will be based on the 12-month Weighted Average Price Received by growers. For cotton the 12-month Weighted Average Price will reflect price and marketings for the 2008 marketing year. The 2008 cotton marketing year began in Au-gust 1, 2008 and ends July 31, 2009.




