In the process, BHS won an overall Speech & Debate Team Regional Championship and will now send 5 students to next weekend's UILAcademic State Meet.

Overall, BHS finished with 95 points and finished in 4th place. Regional champion Canadian H.S. finished with 195 points behind strong finishes in many math, computer science, and science contests. Nazareth H.S. was 2nd with 115 points, and Plains H.S. was 3rd with 99 points.

Two additional BHS teams competed well at the contest. ate Meet. The Spelling & Vocabulary Leading the way were a trio team finished in 3rd place while the Calculator Applications team finished in 6th.





Money Talks: Using Communication Skills to Discuss Finances

ever fought over money? You are not alone — most couples have experienced an argument or regular conflict about ing them money. Regardless of income, Keep i money is one of the most common issues of conflict in a re-lationship. When money gets tight, the chance for conflict is even higher. Having to decide priorities of spending when money is tight is not an easy endeavor. However, there are some tips that can help when talking about issues that cause conflict. When bringing up a topic that is likely to be a source of conflict, use the SPEAK/HEAR skills to help.

Start with a positive. Start by saying something positive about your concern, such as "I know that it is important for our family to be financially safe" or "I'm glad that we agree that the bills must be paid first". We are all more eager to listen when the tone for the conversation starts with a posi-

Pay attention to what you say and how you say it. Be careful about the words you use, your tone of voice and your body language. You are more likely to be listened to if you speak in a gentle, nonthreatening way.

Explain how you feel, using details. Share how something makes you feel and what specific situations have upset you. Use an "I" statement to take charge of your own feelings. Name the specific behavior that concerns you and how that behavior makes you feel. For example, "I feel frustrated when you say you will save money and instead you spend money on expensive coffeehouse drinks.

Avoid trigger words, like always and never. Trigger words are words that can quickly turn a conversation

Have you and your partner words like always and never. Everyone has their own set of trigger words as well. Recognize these words and avoid us-

> Keep it brief, then give your partner a chance to talk. Briefly share your concerns with your partner, then allow your partner a chance to paraphrase what you said and share his or her thoughts.

> Once you have had a chance to share your side of the story, give your partner a turn to use the SPEAK skills while you listen using the HEAR skills. Use HEAR skills when you are listening to your partner share thoughts, feelings, or concerns. When using the HEAR skills, you are only listening to your partner's viewpoint, not shar-

ing your own.

Honor your partner's thoughts and feelings. Honoring your partner is about making your partner feel valued and showing respect for his or her thoughts and feelings. Show your partner that you value him or her by listening and focusing on what your partner is saying, not what you want to say next.

Empathize: Put yourself in your partner's shoes. Empathizing with your partner means that you understand and can imagine how your partner might be feeling. Show your partner that you respect his or her feelings as being real and

Allow a difference of opinion. Even if you disagree with your partner, your job as the listener is only to listen to what your partner is saying and to repeat back what you hear. Don't judge your partner or share how you feel

Repeat respectfully. After your partner is done sharing his or her feelings, repeat what your partner said as closely to his or her words as you can. opment & Family Studies, Uni-



What To Do About Deer and The Drought

The drought we have been experiencing is of great concern to most land and resource managers. Wildlife species found in Texas have dealt with and survived drought before, and, as is often the case, the key to maintaining viable wildlife populations on any area is maintaining good habitat for the species of concern. As species requirements increase in variability, or when multiple species are involved, habitat diversity becomes increasingly

important.
With that generalization stated, I will focus on whitetailed deer and the effects the current drought might have on their populations and management. White-tailed deer have survived and flourished in our region regardless of what Mother Nature has thrown at them. They have survived snow storms, ice storms, tornadoes, hurricanes, floods and droughts – but is this drought going to hurt them? Most people agree this drought is a little different from most. Hot, dry summers are the norm for Texas, and deer have evolved and adapted to cope with them. Deer, like all living organisms, require water, but under normal conditions, water is seldom limiting in our area. The thing that is different about this drought is that it did not begin in the hot, dry months of summer – it began last fall. Remember last year's winter pastures? There were not any. The lack of rainfall continued throughout the spring, accompanied by unusually high temperatures. This certainly is not "normal." But back to the question: Will this affect the

deer population?

The bottom line is that this drought will probably not have a long-term effect on deer populations, but it certainly has the potential to have some short-term effects.

Generally speaking, even


up, and free-standing water is not as plentiful or widely distributed as it is in average rainfall years, drinking water is still not a limiting factor. Deer typically range over a fairly large area relative to water source abundance in our area. They might have to travel a little farther to access water or concentrate their activity in areas with available water, but, in most cases, they can find water.

The most negative impact the drought has had on deer relates to the subsequent lack of forage production, particularly forb production. Generally, forb availability and quality is high during spring and early summer and declines during the latter part of summer. This year, many areas saw very little forb production during the spring or summer. This is a critical time period for females producing and raising fawns, when their protein requirements are relatively high. Lack of suitable-quality forage probably will not have a large impact on adult survival, but if does cannot acquire adequate nutrients, fawn survival and recruitment may be adversely impacted. In addition, a drought-induced reduction in herbaceous growth will result in reduced herbaceous cover, which, in turn, may lower fawn survival due to increased coyote predation of fawns.

The lack of fawn survival and recruitment can have significant management implications. Most resource managers that are seriously making efforts to manage white-tailed deer on their land holdings are aware of the need to harvest female deer for population control. With varying degrees of success, many managers have attempted a "doe harvest" of some magnitude.

A common "knee-jerk" reaction in response to reduced fawn survival is to commensurately decrease doe harvest. though many ponds have dried However, if like most people,

My mother told me she and her sisters used to go to a briar patch and take one of the seed capsules from a bull nettle plant, open it up and find a nut inside it. She said it made for a good snack.

Cotton is planted just after the annual spring drought. Then come the high winds and hail and the planting some-times has to be repeated.

If there is sufficient water, and enough hot days with plenty of sun, it breaks ground in early summer. If it endures the elements, August is a month of green leafy cotton plants gently swaying in the Texas breeze.

Farmers are in the fields every day, searching the skies for any sign of a slow, soaking rain. It's always a gamble, but the farmer is touch and has been through it all before. He is not afraid to start again.
