





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Our Garden Still Grows

The daily joys/exaspera- is much of the world. tions of working in a school are inherent to the position. And, the blessings/headaches often extend way beyond the bus, the classroom, or the cafeteria. The perfect metaphor for the school setting is a garden—watching, and helping, kids grow is what we do.

The Galvan Family came to Borden County in 1992, living near the Vealmoor Community. Aida, the oldest, enrolled first as an 18-year-old and would soon be followed by Juan, Karina, Javier, Noemi, and Judith. Aida went on to finish school, getting her GED. Juan and Karina graduated from Borden County in 1995 before the family moved to Humble, Texas, near Houston where the youngest would graduate. Only Aida spoke English be-

fore coming.

The Galvans came—as people are prone to do—to find something better. The only difference in their journey and mine is history. History's events put this land that used to be theirs in my hands. Here this family from San Luis Potosi came, almost 150 years after the Mexican-American War, wanting to return to their native land but not knowing the English language. I've often wondered why we couldn't have found a way to peacefully co-exist, sharing land and lan-guages. Had we done so, we could all be bi-lingual now as

Reality being what it is, though, we tended these children's language garden with our special version of ESL: daily conversations, photo vocabulary books, athletics, relying on friends such as Miguel, Cande, and Jerry Hernandez along with Eva and Rachel Abalos and Brenda Griffin. Mrs. Lydia Baeza, Coach Baeza's mom, was also working with the Borden County ISD at that time and played a major role in nurturing the Galvans. Sisters Connie Hart and Kathy Underwood provided encouragement along the way as the kids worked in the schools during the summer months. Teacher Karan Key, as Noemi mentioned, was "an angel to me" after basketball practices that left Noemi quite bewildered since Noemi had never seen or played basketball. Karan wasn't versed in Spanish, but kindness transcends any language barrier. Karan listened with bi-lingual ears and loved with a bi-lingual

Aida, Juan, Karina, Javier, Noemi, and Judith are always quick to remind me of these people's influences in their lives when I get the chance to visit with them. Each time we gather, their growth from kids to young adults reminds me of the power of embracing every child who walks through our

Today, all six of them are married with beautiful little ones of their own. Judith, the youngest at 28, had a baby while I was there just this past weekend. Aida, the oldest at 38, will deliver her second child this week. Their marriages have given them healthy children who are going to be bi-lingual, educated, and con-

Borden County alone did not "grow" the Galvans. They came with willing hearts, sweet spirits, and fierce determination to accomplish a goal while at the same time maintaining their own heritage. We simply provided the soil for that growth at a particular time in their lives when they were ripe for learning. In return, the fruit they have put forth is as sweet as any I have ever enjoyed as a teacher: phone calls on Mother's Day, texts at mid-night to wish me Feliz Año Nuevo, photos of those whom they allow me to call "nietos" (grandchildren): Kiara, Kiara, Raulito, Giselle, Xavier, Juanito, Getsemani, Ricardito, Allyson, Ali, Christian, Kamila, and soon-to-be Rocio.

Some gardens are grown for show; some for sustenance.

Knowing the Galvans has fed my spirit not padded a resumé. They are the precious reminders of why those who work with children have "heaven in our hands."

Notice of Availability of Electronic Communications

(Gail)—Under a new law, chief appraisers of county appraisal districts, appraisal districts, and appraisal review boards may communicate electronically through email or other methods with property owners or their designated representatives. Written agreements are required for notices and other documents to be delivered electronically in place of mailing.
How does it work? Certain

guidelines must be followed for this local option commu-

Written agreements with the county appraisal district must be entered first, ensuring what electronic means of delivery are acceptable. If you are interested in receiving communications in electronic format, you should contact your local appraisal district.

Public notice regarding the availability of agreement forms authorizing electronic communications may be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the district on or before Feb. 1 each year, or agreement forms may be delivered on or before Feb. 1 each year to property owners shown on the certified appraisal roll for the preceding

The chief appraiser may determine the medium, format, content and method to be used for electronic communications other than notices required by Section 25.19 of the Tax Code, which are prescribed by Comptroller rule.

A decision by the chief appraiser not to enter into agreements may not be the subject of an appraisal review board protest, a lawsuit or a complaint to the Texas Department of Licensing and Regu-







A Showcase of the Texas Spirit Tumbleweed Smith

A Big Day in Borden County

county seat of Borden County, I saw a fleet of law enforcement vehicles and a cadre of uniformed lawmen, all gathered in the small town to provide security for the arrival of some important guests. I stopped at the courthouse to visit with County Judge Ross Sharp and he was as excited as the other residents of the county (population 641). He told me that Nolan Ryan was coming to Gail to throw out the first pitch to dedicate the school district's brand new baseball field. Just building the field was a big deal in itself, since Borden County High School had previously had to play its baseball games out of town. The mascot of the school is a Coyote, pronounced kai-oat, not kai-oatey. If you pronounce it the wrong way, Borden County people are going to think less of you.

As students and others filled the bleachers in the new stadium, a pickup drove up and out stepped Nolan Ryan, Rangers left outfielder David Murphy and Rangers pitching coach Mike Maddox. They were greeted by school officials, then entered the playing field to an enthusiastic chorus of screams and applause. Nolan walked to the pitcher's mound and joined some pitchers on the Coyote baseball team. They all threw baseballs toward home plate simultaneously. I asked Nolan Ryan how it felt to pitch a baseball and he replied, "Strange." During his 27 year playing career he threw nearly 6,000 strikeouts.

An elementary school teacher, Sue Jane Mayes told me how the event came about. "In 2010 my sixth graders were working on letter-writ-

When I got to Gail, the ing. It's a lost art, you know. unty seat of Borden County, We wrote letters to Nolan Ryan and the Texas Rangers to congratulate them on being in the World Series. We wanted to say thank you for a great season. We sent along a photo of the class all wearing Ranger t-shirts and caps. I think he was very touched and said he would come to Gail. And here we are two years later and he's here. We could say all this began with a letter. I really want the kids to make a memory today. But this just isn't for the school. It's for the whole county."

The Rangers have a pre-season public relations program called a Caravan in which members of the team visit towns to get fans excited about the upcoming games. Not many get Nolan Ryan, the owner, president and CEO of the Rangers. "It's always good to come out and be in an environment like this and say thank you to the people who make the effort to come to our ball games,: he said. "Dedicating the new field was real special. That shows a big commitment on the part of the students, coaches and school administrators." Coyote baseball coach Trey Richey said, "to be able to stand next to Nolan Ryan is a genuine honor.

From the baseball field everyone adjourned to the school auditorium where the trio of Rangers was presented with proclamations and the key to the county. Then Nolan Ryan made a presentation of his own to Bertie Copeland, owner of The Coyote Country Store, the only place in Gail where you can buy a meal. She had told someone she wanted a picture of Nolan Ryan. Nolan gave her a Rangers jersey. "We're gonna have it framed and hang it on the wall," Bertie told me.
