

UIL Literary Domination Continues for Borden County

It was not too close to call. Borden County wrapped up another district championship at the District 6A Zone 3 Literary Meet. Grades 6-8 students finished with 1,161 points; their closest competitor, Klondike, scored less than half that amount with 498 points. Borden County's K-5 literary program took first place as well in their division, scoring 545.83 points to defeat runner-up Klondike with 420.5 points.

The two-day meet was held on the Grady ISD campus.

Also competing at the zone district meet were Grady (491.83 points/183 points), Midland Academy (259.33 points, 130 points), Sands (286.5 points/195.66 points), and O'Donnell (192 points/212 points). Grades 6-8 points are listed first.





with holiday lights. Signs of an overloaded circuit are lights that flicker or dim; a TV screen that shrinks in size; an outlet or switch that feels warm to the touch and circuit breakers that trip or fuses that blow.

lighting, check the condition of each light strand. If you find broken or cracked sockets, loose connections, frayed or cut insulation, it is best to discard that strand and replace it with a new one.

or other electrical decorations, make sure they have the UL (Underwriters Laboratory) safety-approved label. Do not purchase outdoor light for indoor use. They usually burn

hotter than indoor lights.

* Unplug tree lights when you are not home or when you a metallic tree or a live tree that is dried out.

choose only lights rated for Leviton Institute

are plugged into a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) receptacle, preferably one that has a weatherproof while-inuse cover.






The second half fared no
