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Teens and Distracted Driving-Even Worse Than We Thought! **April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month**

drivers of all ages, the National Highway Traffic Safety Ad-ministration has found that hand-held cell phone use is highest among 16- to 24-yearolds. This age group has the largest proportion of drivers who were distracted. In Texas, 46 percent of urban teens and 52 percent of rural teens talk on a cell phone while driving, and nearly the same percentage text while driving. (Texas A&M Transportation Institute). A recent study by AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety shows that distracted driving among teens was a factor in nearly 6 out of 10 moderateto-severe teen crashes. This is much higher than the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's previous estimate that distraction is involved in 14% of teen crashes.

Video recorders in the teen's vehicles allowed researchers to analyze nearly 1,700 videos and the six seconds leading up to a crash. The videos showed that distraction was a factor in 58 percent of all crashes studied, including 89 percent of road-departure crashes and 76 percent of rearend crashes. The leading dis-traction for the teens was interacting with other passengers in the vehicle while the next most common distraction was the use of a cell phone. Distracted driving along with a teen's inexperience as a driver their destination to use their can be a deadly combination.

In fact, leading experts believe parents play a key role in preventing teen car road and ar-crashes and deaths. Teens with rive alive! parents who set rules, monitor


While distractions affect their driving, and are supportive are half as likely to crash and twice as likely to use seat belts as teens with less involved parents.

The Texas Graduated Driver Licensing (GDL) law is designed to prevent cell phone use as well as limit the number of teen passengers that can legally ride with a novice driver and provides parents with the controls to help keep their teen drivers safe. Many parents, however, are not aware of the provisions of this law, which is divided into two phases. Making sure your teen follows the GDL law can help get a teen safely through the most critical time when driver inexperience can lead to crashes.

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is launching the Talk. Text. Crash. campaign to raise awareness of the dangers associated with distracted driving and to encourage Texas teens as well as adults to put down their cell phones while driving.

Drivers should remember to put away their cell phones and wait until they arrive at phone. 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



The Memory Lane Classic Care Museum in Pecos

Weldon Brookshire's car museum in downtown Pecos, you should rush right over there. You will be amazed. It's like something you'd find in Las Vegas or Phoenix or other clas-sic car centers. When you walk in it's like stepping right back into the 1950's. The lobby is a replica of a small café and soda shop with a menu that reflects prices of the era. Then you go into the museum area that is full of cars and other items, like perhaps the largest collection of Banner Dairy products in the nation. Weldon used to deliver Banner milk when he was a boy growing up in Ballinger and decided to start collecting the bottles and related items. He says some of the tiny cream bottles are quite pricey now, selling for fifty dollars or more.

His impressive collection of advertising signs lines the walls. We're not talking here about your everyday museum in a small town. We're talking about a first class, well-lighted museum that is under constant maintenance. He even has manikins displaying some of the clothes of long ago. Weldon says some visitors stay all day and wear out their cameras taking pictures.

eras taking pictures. It was a real treat to get to meet Weldon and his wife Jeannie, who seem to still be on their honeymoon. I asked Weldon how many cars are in the Memory Lane Car Museum. "I've got 33 in this room and 15 more we're going to put in a second building we've bought just south of this one." He has his favorites. "That '58 Corvette. And that '55 Nomad station wagon. And then the

If you like antique and classic cars and haven't been to Weldon Brookshire's car museum in downtown Pecos, you should rush right over there. '53 Olds represents the first car me and my wife had. It was exactly like that one except it was black and white and this one is maroon."

The first vehicle he bought and restored was a 1912 Republic Truck. His second was a Durant car. "I bought that Durant down in Fort Davis for \$75 and had to pay it out over several months. It was in bad shape and had to have everything done to it."

I asked him why he started collecting cars. "Well, I started out with an old car and never could improve myself, just had to keep driving them." That car was a Model A roadster convertible pickup.

Weldon has had a wrecker service since he was a teenager. He's 81 now and still works every day. And he's still buying cars. He is a good mechanic. "I do everything except the upholstery and paint work on these cars. There's a few in here we bought restored."

One of the most popular items is a 1927 Reo fire truck with a working siren. That belongs to Weldon's son Jack who was about six years old when his daddy started collecting cars more than 50 years ago. The oldest vehicle in the collection, which used to be housed in Ballinger, is a 1903 Oldsmobile. Weldon has had a car in every Pecos rodeo parade since 1959. He recently surprised his wife with a 1940 Ford convertible as a 57th anniversary present.




