Coyotes Outlast the Two-Time Defending State Champs

The Borden County Coyotes traveled to Jayton to play the two-time defending state champion Crowell Wildcats in their season opener. The pre-season #1 Coyotes got off to a very good start and then overcame a couple of miscues to hold off the Wildcats in this

neutral site season opener. This game had all the feel of a play-off game between the intensity on the field to the size of the crowd and the sound in the stadium.

The Coyotes won the toss and wasted little time getting on the board as Corbin

Summers hooked up with Trace Richey for a 37 yard scoring strike. The final 10 yards Richey shoved off several tackle attempts by the Wildcats. Easton Edwards kicked the extra point out of the hold of Morgan Wilson and the snap from Nathan Souder to give the Coyotes a quick 8-0 lead.

The Wildcats would waste very little time answering as they cut the Coyote lead to 8 to 7 early in the first quarter. Corbin Summers and the Coyotes pushed the lead to 14 to 7 after rumbling 20 yards behind some nice blocks from center Korbin Martinez, guard Braxton Coor, ends Diego Bernal and Kale Yarbrow, full-back Trace Richey and quarterback Hunter Jones. Edwards added the extra point kick to make the score 16 to 7. The Borden County defense got a nice stop and forced a punt, but a poor play call by me on the first play of the possession gave the ball right back as the Wildcats intercepted the Jones pass. Crowell would take the turnover and turn them into points to cut the lead to 16 to 13. Borden County would again answer back, this time a 9 yard run by Summers. Again, Edwards added the point after to increase the lead

For three generations, the Hendryx family has owned and operated radio stations KVL-AM and KALP-FM in Alpine. Ray Hendryx took over the stations when his dad, former state legislator Gene Hendryx, died. Ray's familiar voice gave residents of Alpine and surrounding community's news, weather and sports about local happenings. People depended on Ray to tell them what was going on in the Texas Mountain Country and beyond. Ray's wife Rita became ill and Ray felt he had to take care of her, so he sold the stations to Martin Benevich, who owns the DISH network franchise in Alpine.

Martin and others hated to see Ray leave and decided to throw a party in Ray's honor. It took place outdoors at Kokernot Lodge. Martin enlisted the help of several resourceful people who arranged for the chairs, sound system, food, drinks and a lineup of speakers who made remarks about the honoree.

Ray received a number of plaques, proclamations and other accolades from city and county officials, Sul Ross State University and others. The first speaker was former US Congressman Pete Gallego, who grew up in Alpine and worked at the Hendryx stations as a young man. He used

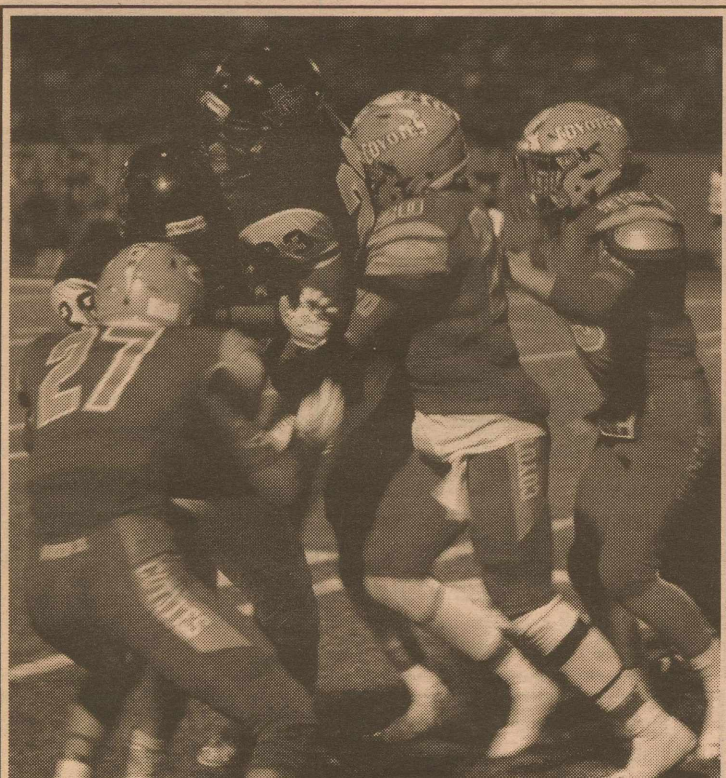

weather terms to describe his time in the nation's capitol "Washington was always a high pressure system with turbulent conditions and a lot of hot air. Many relationships were like a polar front." He said Gene Hendryx was a mentor and described Ray as part of the legend and lore of the Big Bend.

Long time friends said things like: "He's a good man to ride the river with and if you need somebody to watch your back you can't pick a better man."

The tributes were beautiful and emotional and expressed sincere appreciation of the work Ray did as the area's most popular broadcaster. Ray stood quietly and said very little when he was called up to receive a plaque or proclamation. Martin closed out the meeting with these words: "I've known Ray for a long time. But during the last two years or so I've worked closely with him in the process of buying the station. I got to know the real Ray Hendryx. I found out he was the person I always thought he was. With Ray, what you see is what you get. There is no facade, no pretense, he's an old fashioned, hard working, good old boy who loves what he does. And what he does most is love his community. He's a throwback

to 24 to 13.

The Wildcats would again turn around and score against the Coyotes to cut the lead to 24 to 19. Going for the one point, the second team defense of Kale Yarbro, Braxton Coor, Jayton Lewis, Noah Morales, Colby Pennell did a fantastic job stopping the Crowell offense. The Coyotes again would waste very little time in answering the Wildcats as Hunter Jones connected with Korbin Martinez with a nice 45 yard pass and catch play. This score gave Borden County a 30 to 19 lead. The Coyote defense would now come out and hold the Wildcats deep in Coyote territory. After a few plays, Borden County would seemingly take control of this contest as Corbin Sumners would add another score from 28 yards out. Another Edwards kick would make the score 38 to 19. The Wildcats would threaten but come up short to end the half.

The Crowell Wildcats who are used to big games came out of the dressing room to take the momentum in the contest returning the second half kickoff to cut the lead to 38 to 27. The Coyotes immediately threatened, but a touchdown would be taken off the board and some untimely penalties would stall the drive. The defense would answer by stopping the Wildcats, but before the Coyotes could regain the momentum, a busted play resulted in another Borden County turnover and gave the defending champions the momentum back.

This time the Wildcats made them pay, cutting the lead to 38 to 34. The Coyotes, at this time showed a bit of mental toughness, scoring in one play as Sumners sprinted in from 32 yards out behind some nice blocks from Ryan Willborn, Bernal, Coor, Martinez and Jones. The Edwards kick made the score 46 to 34. Again, the Wildcats would not give up and scored to cut the lead to 46 to 42. Borden County would use another one play drive to push the lead back to 10 as Sumners

raced 48 yards behind a pancake block by Richey. With another defensive stop, the Coyotes would extent the lead 58 to 42 late in the contest, as Sumners crossed the goal line for a 6th time. The Wildcats would score with about a minute to play to cut the lead to 58 to 48 and eventually give us the final score.

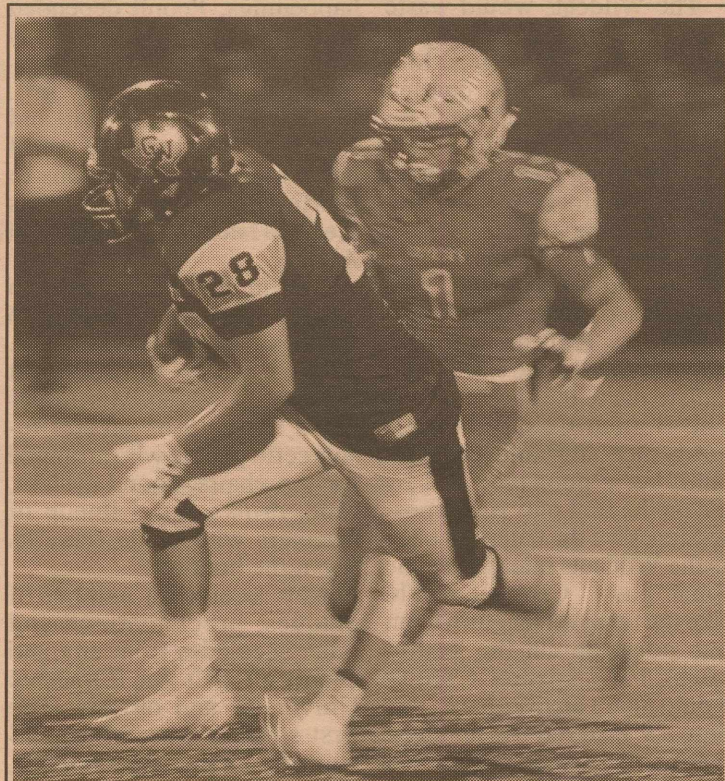
Although the Wildcats made a solid push in the second half, a very game Coyote squad held off the two-time defending state champs. The Coyotes were very impressive in this victory and hope to build on this huge victory.

Leading the way for the Coyotes was Corbin Sumners who had 18 carries for 259 yards and 6 touchdowns, and was 2 of 3 passing for 46 yards and a score. Hunter Jones was 4 of 6 passing for 114 yards and a score. Hunter also had 3 carries for 16 yards. Easton Edwards who was 5 of 8 on extra point kicks. Diego Bernal had a catch for 30 yards, Colby Pennell had a catch for 27 yards. Braxton Coor had a catch for 12 yards. Korbin Martinez had a catch for 45

yards and a score. Trace Richey had a catch for 37 yards and a score and 3 carries for 34 yards.

Defensively, Trace Richey had 19 tackles, 2 big hits, a tackle for loss, and a pressure. Ryan Willborn had 12 tackles, 3 pressures and 2 sacks. Noah Morales had 2 tackles, Brian Torres had a tackle. Braxton Coor had 5 tackles and a pressure. Corbin Sumners had 4 tackles and a pass break up. Morgan Wilson had 2 tackles, Kale Yarbro had a tackle. Jayton Lewis had 17 tackles, 1 pressure, and 1 pass break-up. Hunter Jones had 15 tackles, 2 sacks and 4 pressures. Korbin Martinez had 15 tackles, 1 tackle for loss, and 2 pass breakups. Colby Pennell had 9 tackles and Diego Bernal had a tackle.

Thank you all for traveling to Jayton for this play-off type ballgame and a very late night, but a very happy and exciting late night. Next week the Coyotes will travel to Lueders Avoca to play a Junior Varsity game Friday at 5 followed by the varsity game at 7:30.

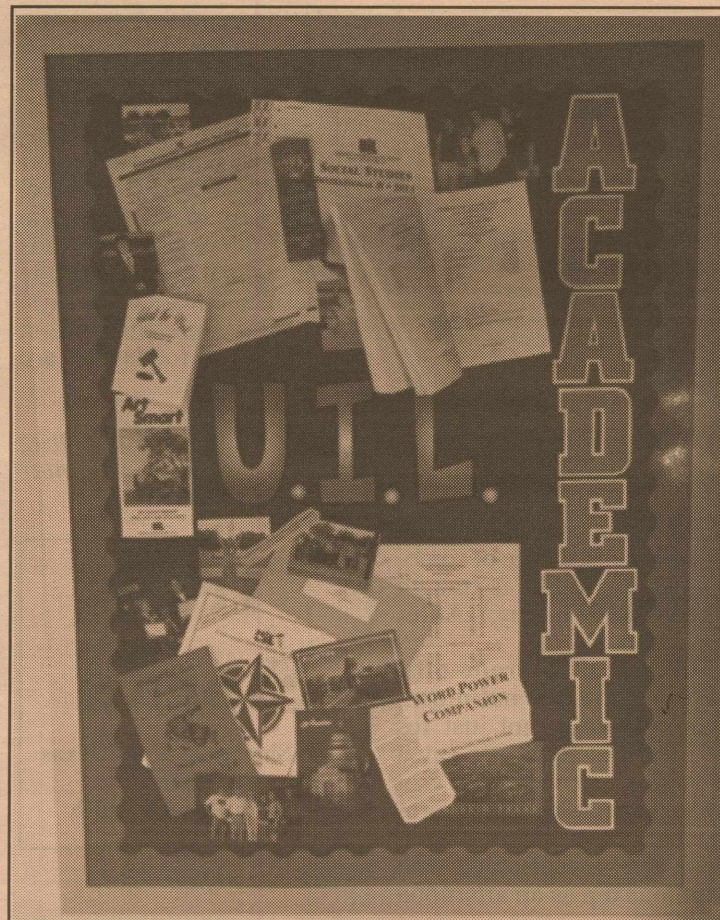

Coyote JV starts the 2015 Season in Convincing Fashion. The Borden County Coyote JV football team of team members, sophomores Braxton Barnes and Nick Proulx, freshman, JW Nix, Payton Merket, Ben Justice, Jeremy Souder, Trent Collins and Lukas Grantham opened the season by traveling to Hermleigh to take on the Cardinals. The Borden County JV wasted very little time establishing control of this contest and would stay in control the entire evening to bring home the first win of the 2015 football season for the Borden County Coyotes.

Payton Merket started the scoring with a nice 13 yard run behind some great blocks by the rest of the Coyotes. Merket

added the kick to make the score 8-0 with 7:55 left in the first. Ben Justice took the hand-off and rumbled 55 yards for the next score and the market kick made it 16-0 with 4:37 left in quarter number one. Borden County forced an errant snap on a punt and Justice tackled the punter in the endzone for another two points and an 18-0 lead.

After another defensive stop forced another Cardinal punt, Nick Proulx returned the punt 28 yards to pay dirt and with the third straight PAT the Coyotes had a 26-0 lead in the second quarter. On the next defensive possession, Jeremy Souder recovered a fumble and

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Healthy Breakfasts for Kids: It's All About Balance

A healthy breakfast is a must for kids. Skip it and your kids will be playing nutritional catch-up for the rest of the day, says Carole L. Adler, M.A., R.D., a dietitian at the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). When kids skip breakfast, they don't get what they need to be at their

best, says Adler. "Growing bodies and developing brains need regular, healthy meals," she says. According to the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, studies show that school children who eat breakfast perform better in the classroom. As with other meals, it's a good idea for your kids (and you) to eat a healthy balance of fruits and vegetables, proteins, grains and dairy—not just for breakfast but throughout the day. Here are Adler's seven quick and easy breakfast tips to ensure your children start their day off right.

Breakfast doesn't have to mean traditional breakfast foods. Anything goes, as long as you maintain a healthy balance. So if your kids want a change from cereal and eggs, think about serving left-overs from last night's dinner. There's nothing wrong with tuna fish with celery on a whole wheat English muffin or a turkey sandwich to start the day.

Give kids foods they like. It's neither necessary nor effective to feed them foods they dislike. Do your kids turn up their noses at vegetables but love pizza? Left-over pizza with a whole-grain crust and veggies works for breakfast, too. Or make muffins with zucchini and carrots, and spread with peanut butter or almond butter for protein with a glass of milk. Your kids love sugary cereal? Mix a little bit of that cereal with a whole-grain, nutrient-packed healthier brand of cereal. "Nothing has to be

off the table altogether, and sometimes just a taste of something your kids like is enough to keep them happy," Adler says.

Make healthy trade-offs. Keep in mind that nutritional balance is key—not just for one meal but for foods eaten throughout the day. Not enough vegetables in the morning meal? Prepare extra carrot, celery, and broccoli sticks with a hummus dip as an afternoon snack.

Take growth and activity levels into account. Growing bodies need nourishment. And if your kids are physically active to boot, they need plenty of calories to keep them fueled. Adler says that having a breakfast that contains protein, fat and carbohydrates helps children feel full and stay focused until lunch. Protein choices might include an egg, some nuts, a slice of deli meat or cheese, or a container of yogurt.

Don't take, "Mom, I don't have time for breakfast" as an excuse. Remember, eating on the go doesn't have to mean forgoing breakfast. Make sure your kids grab a piece of fruit on the way out the door, and hand them a bag of nut-and-fruit trail mix or a whole-wheat tortilla spread with peanut butter or almond butter and a carton of milk. "A fruit filled shake with milk or yogurt takes only a couple of minutes to drink," Adler says.

Prep the night before. Morning is a busy time for everyone—you included. So take ten minutes to think ahead and prep for breakfast the night before. Chop up fruit to layer in a yogurt parfait or add to cereal. Cut up vegetables for an omelet. Mix up muffin or whole-grain waffle batter, cover, and put in the fridge. Get out a pan for pancakes or a blender for smoothies. Put a

bowl of nut and fruit trail mix on the table for kids to grab a handful as they walk out the door.

Use the Nutrition Facts label and ingredient statement when you shop. "The label makes it easy to determine the amounts of nutrients your kids are getting and to compare one product to another," Adler says. Make sure your children get nutrient-dense foods that are low in salt and added sugars.

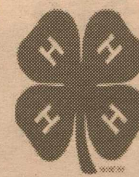

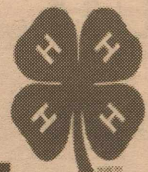

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It's Shaping Up to be a Jubilee Quail Year

SAN ANGELO – From seemingly teetering on the brink of extinction to roaring back with a vengeance, wild quail seem to have made a miraculous comeback across Texas, said one wildlife expert.

The quail hunting forecast looks good, experts say.

"The 2015-16 quail season is going to be the best we've seen since at least 2008 and in some areas even longer than that," said Dr. Dale Rollins, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service coordinator for the statewide Reversing the Quail Decline Initiative at San Angelo. "It's shaping up to be a good to great year depending on where you are."

Rollins said the populations of both bobwhite and scaled or "blue" quail have benefited in most cases from the widespread and timely rains last fall that returned and continued through early summer. The relatively mild, wet winter also contributed to the quail boom, he said.

"This is what I call a jubilee year," he said "There's a lot of forgiveness happening out there this year, and the quail have been recipients of that."

The rains helped quail on several fronts, Rollins said, including better nesting habitat and cover from predators. May and June provided perfect hatching conditions and set the stage.

"We make or break a quail year with a June hatch," he said.

"We're seeing strong numbers in a lot of areas. Some of the best areas are parts of South Texas and from just northeast of San Angelo on up into the lower part of the Rolling Plains, roughly anywhere west of U.S. Highway 83."

Rollins said blue quail, like bobwhites, have "come back with a vengeance," with reports from the Permian Basin and Trans-Pecos region touting

good quail numbers.

"So if the wheels don't fall off — and anybody you'll talk to adds that caveat — this should be a banner year," he said. "This should be a year that you not only get your shotgun out on opening day, Oct. 31, but also take some new people quail hunting and introduce them to the sport."

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will be releasing its annual quail hunting forecast in mid-September. At that time, go to their website at https://tpwd.texas.gov/huntwild/hunt/planning/quail_forecast/forecast/, view the projections broken down by ecoregions. Click on those and find the current forecast as well as what the last 20 years' results have been.

"AgriLife is also hosting the Statewide Quail Symposium Sept. 16-18 in Abilene," Rollins said. "If you are a 'student of quail,' as I call them, you'll want to be there. The symposium will include a summary of what we've done over the last two years with the legislatively funded quail decline initiative research dollars."

Rollins said the symposium will start with a tour of the Trail Ranch near Albany on Sept. 16.

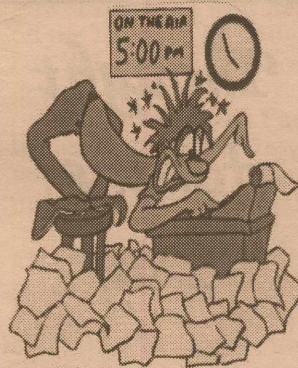

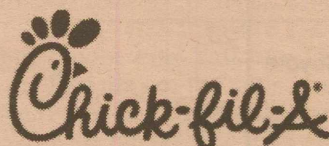
