The Borden County Varsity started their 2016 season much like their 2015 season went with a high powered offense and a swarming defense. So, in 30 plays this group gave up 2 first downs, a score and 74 total yards. Also, this defense returns 4 all-state football players, Hunter Jones, Jayton Lewis, Ryan Willborn and Richey so a lot of excitement in the air for this unit. The second team group, consisting of Carrillo, Justice, Willborn,

Braxton Barnes, Morgan Wilson, Easton Edwards, Dylan Murphy and JW Nix had a lot of success as well, but did give up a few more yards and a score to each team as well.

On the offensive side of the scrimmage, the Coyotes came out with the hopes of improving their passing game. Well, if Friday was any indication of things to come, mission complete as they not only flashed their new found aggressiveness on defense but throwing the ball around was very successful as well. Returning Region offensive MVP Corbin Sumners had a big day along with several other Coyote athletes as 8 different players caught a pass. The offense ran 53 plays and during those plays, the Coyotes racked up an amazing 970 yards and 14 touchdowns. They had 449 yards rushing on 24 carries and 535 yards passing on 17 of 24 passing and 8 touchdowns. Getting Back to the Basics of Home Canning

With summer comes the wonderful bounty of fresh garden produce. Do you have squash and tomatoes running out of your ears? If so, have you thought about home canning? It is a lost art, and an enjoyable hobby, however, it is important to follow some basic safety when canning food.

Safe Canning Methods

There are two safe ways of canning, depending on the type of food being canned. These are the boiling water canner method and the pressure canner method. The boiling water bath method is safe for fruits, tomatoes and pickles, as well as jam, jellies and other preserves. In this method, jars of food are heated completely covered with boiling water (212EF at sea level).

Pressure canning is the only safe method of canning vegetables, meats, poultry, and seafood. Jars of food are placed in 2 to 3 inches of water in a pressure canner which is heated to a temperature of at least 240EF. This temperature can only be reached by a pressure canner.

<u>Unsafe</u> Canning Methods An old out-dated method of canning - the open-kettle method - is now considered unsafe. In this method, foods were heated in a kettle, then poured into jars and a lid was placed on the jar. No processing was done. With this method there was often spoilage, because bacteria, yeasts and molds that contaminated the food when the jars were filled were not killed by further processing. The growth of these microorganisms, in addition to spoiling the food, often caused sealed lids to become unsealed late. This method is a very real danger for botulism.

Steam canning is not recommended at this time for either acid or low acid foods. Processing time for use with current models have not been adequately researched. Today's steam container looks like an upside-down boiling water canner. One should never use microwave ovens, electric ovens, slow cookers, crock pots or the sun to process canned goods.

Ain't No Mountain High Enough for BHS Grad Philena Farmer Earns PhD from Texas Tech University

"I wanted to keep my mind Thomas's personality matched 2013. active."

Most people feel the same way but resort to the daily newspaper crossword puzzles or word searches. Not 1976 Borden High School graduate Philena Farmer.

After medical issues related to Parkinson's disease, which was diagnosed in November of 2008, Philena continued teaching math-related subjects until the disease progressed, forcing an early retirement after 19 years in the classroom (at O'Donnell and Tahoka).

Retirement, however, is not the word that should be used in her case. When faced with health issues that led to a risky procedure to try and give Philena relief from Parkinson's signature tremors, she accepted not only that challenge but another one: going after her doctorate

The medical aspect of her remarkable story is amazing enough. With some sound advice—"....find a doctor that you like because you are going to live with them"—Philena found herself at Baylor Hospital in Dallas with Dr. Madhavi Thomas, a woman whom she refers to as proactive. Dr.

with Philena's determination and willingness to tackle Parkinson's in order to overcome the "shaking that I always felt inside" even though medicine was helping with the external

Dr. Thomas's recommendation was to have a neurosurgeon proceed with a DBS. a deep-brain stimulator—a device with four electrodes consciousness; this led to the on each side that reside right above the brain stem is now screwed to Philena's skull. Every three or four months now, Philena goes to Dallas for what her family teases her is an "attitude adjustment" but is basically a visit to reprogram the electrodes. The tremors have all but stopped. Philena's main issue today is balance, which she manages with a walker.

With this medical backdrop in place, the rest of the story takes on a remarkable texture. Deciding to pursue the highest educational degree possible was one Philena made because she was not content to just exist. With family support and the encouragement of those in higher education at Texas Tech, the quest for a Ph.D. in IRB (Institutional Review Education began in January

Originally, Philena was in a cohort, an assigned group consisting of Philena and 19 other post-graduate students from around the world. Much of the work on their doctorates would take place online with the occasional mandatory meetings in person. However, in April 2013, a medical episode left her in a three-day state of unretirement from public school teaching and also the decision that the cohort avenue would not be the path to her doctor-

And so began her attendance on the Texas Tech campus for her classes. Philena's residency in Lubbock arranged for her to be taken and picked up on days when she was to be on campus. The next two years would see her tackle the "piled higher and deeper" world that makes up a Ph.D. program; her own dissertation proved to be almost as daunting as her health-related issues.

Philena passed her qualifying exams in August 2015. Work on her dissertation would begin next, in September. The Board) accepted her field of

research which was Teacher Preparatory Programs and Calculator Pedagogy.

The plan was to interview at least 20 college math professors, asking simple questions such as "When was the first time you saw a calculator?' to "How did you learn to teach with a calculator in your classes?

Interestingly enough, the resistance to even answering these questions and giving Philena the time of day was tangible. Some educators even hung up on her.

Characteristically, Philena was not deterred and continued on with her research. With the support of Associate Professor Dr. Shirley Matteson, Philena continued her research and finally had success in contacting twelve professors from around the country who agreed to interviews. On June 20, 2016, Philena defended her dissertation before a committee, a process that usually takes 75 minutes followed by 30 minutes of questioning. Advisors conferred after the defense, voting to pass Philena and recommending her for graduation

Dr. Matteson, Past-President of SERA (Southwest Educational Research Association) was also instrumental in seeing to it that Philena was able to go to conferences in Chicago and New Orleans to present her paper.

On August 12, 2016, Philena was hooded in a ceremony at the Frazier Alumna Center at Texas Tech University with Dr. Matteson having the honor of draping her inspiring student.

In her dissertation's acknowledgements, Philena summed up her gratitude for the village it took to bring her Ph.D. to its culmination.

I would like to thank my family, who, although they thought I was crazy for doing this, stood behind me all the way. I would especially like to thank Mom and Dad who have never failed me in any way—no matter what

I also want to recognize the part that my Yaya's played in keeping me focused and accountable. Without you, I never would have made it, especially my two sub-subs-you know who you are.

And lastly. I would like to thank my committee without whose support and input this would never have been possible. To the best committee chair ever, Dr. Shirley Matteson, thanks are not enough to convey how much I appreciate all you have done for me. I have been places I would never have seen, I have presented at conferences I would have never attended, and I have met the most fascinating people ever all due to your unwavering support. So thank you for everything.

It did take a village, but it was Philena who climbed the mountain.


