SUBSTANTIAL AND RAPID DEVELOPMENT OF THE SPUR COUNTRY.

More Than Thirty Thousand Acres of Land Have Been Cleared and Will Be Cultivated During The Year, and More Than Two Hundred and Fifty New Farm Homes Adorn The Spur Farm Lands.

While little evidence except the bare statement of facts has heretofore been published concerning the development of the surrounding country, an investigation in securing a detailed report of the conditions reveals the fact that the acreage of cultivated lands as well the progress of Spur and the Spur country as a whole has been underrated even by the most sanguine promoters and boosters.

During the past year and since the Spur Farm Lands were opened to settlement more than two hundred and fifty new farm and suburban homes have been built, all of which are substantial, comfortable and attractive structures and this, in connection with the large acreage of new lands cleared for cultivation, is conclusive proof of the statement that the surrounding country is keeping pace with the town in substantial progress and material development.

Making a total of 29,208 acres in the list to be cultivated.

While the above list probably does not include every one in each community who has cleared new land for cultivation, it being impossible to secure an accurate list, and one or two communities are left entirely out of the enumeration, yet it is sufficient to convince any reader that the claim of thirty thousand acres to be cultivated this year will not cover the actual acreage now being tilled, there now being probably fifty thousand acres of both old and new land under cultivation within the Spur trade territory and from which the town secures its support, and by virtue of advantages in location, facilities and equipments will continue to draw its trade in the years to come.

Taking the list as a basis each farmer of the country will cultivate one hundred and thirty three acres, more than half and probably two-thirds of which will be planted to cotton. The present crop prospects indicate that from one-half to two-thirds of a bale to the acre will be produced, but to figure an average crop of one-half bale to the acre and that only half of the tilled acreage will be planted to cotton the country will produce no less than ten thousand bales during the year. Together with half the tillable acreage of the country growing wheat, oats, maize, kaffir corn, corn and other feed stuff, garden truck, fruit, dairying, stock farming and ranch interests combined contribute to the resources of the country, and insure not only the prosperity of the people but a liberal support and maintenance of a commercial centre of considerable proportions.

Spur and the Spur Farm Lands were opened to settlement just eighteen months ago and the progress made in town building and development of the country has been unequalled in the history of western settlement and development, and at this time the progress in country development and town building continues uninterruptedly, and within a few years the entire acreage of Spur Farm Lands comprising six hundred and seventy three square miles of territory will be one continuous field blooming with every variety of farm product, and Spur will be a city of mills, factories railroads, schools, churches and prosper a population of thousands of the most enlightened, intelligent and progressive citizenship.

The farmers of this country produce raw material for the manufacturer, trade for the merchants, business for the bankers, fees for the lawyers and doctors and freight for the railroads, yet it is proposed to reduce the tariff on what the farmer sells and retain protection upon what he buys. This is the way protection serves farmers. Do you favor taking money out of the pockets of producers to enrich manufacturers?—Farm & Ranch.

The rain he said will be of benefit to the wheat and oats in that section, as well as put the ground in good shape for planting other crops.

FARMING A SCIENCE.

Andy Hutchinson was here Saturday, and while in the city was a very pleasant caller at the News office. Andy is one of those progressive farmers who are falling in line with the diversified idea. He not only owns and operates one of the best farms in the country, both as to fertility of the soil and improvements, but devotes a considerable portion of his farm management to hog raising. He has one of the best herds of the porker fribe in the country, a number of which are full blood stock of high breeding.

Farming is becoming a science in west Texas. It is being conducted on a business basis for the purpose of making money, not purely for scratching from the soil a bare existence. As a result the percentage of agricultural failures are becoming less and the proportion of success is taking rank with other lines of industry.

The farmer who will make his investment and labor pay a dividend will diversify. He will have something of marketable value maturing each month in the year. A bunch of hogs in the hands of the farmer is the same as dollars in his pocket.—Kent County News.
