Clean-Up Day in Spur Was Observed And Many Boys Participated.

Wednesday was designated by Mayor Link as clean-up day in Spur and the people in general and the boys in particular observed the day and as a result the private premises as well as the public streets and the alleys today have a neat, clean appearance and the town as a whole is attractive and a more desirable place in which to live.

Early in the morning some twenty or thirty boys armed with rakes, hoes, shovels and little wagons met at the appointed place, the crowd being assigned in squads with overseers who were assigned the several districts of the city and work was begun with enthusiasm on the part of the boys and methodically on the part of the overseers. The work was continued throughout the day and by night the city had the appearance of cleanliness as a result of the labors of the well organized workers.

#### SCHOOL BUILDING PLANS ACCEPTED

Specifications Complete And **Building Contract Will be** Let May 20th.

Architect Waller, of Fort Worth, was here this week and submitted plans and specifications for the Spur Independent School building, the plans meeting the approval of the school board and accepted.

The plans submitted were for a twenty thousand dollar structure when complete, but it is the intention of the Board to leave the sub-basement incomplete for the present school term and expend the eighteen thousand dollars in the completion of the two stories for immediate use.

The building will be two stories with sub-basement of solid concrete, constructed of faced brick, containing eleven rooms with a large auditorium with a seating capacity of seven or eight hundred people.




