Girl Scouts Registration Scheduled

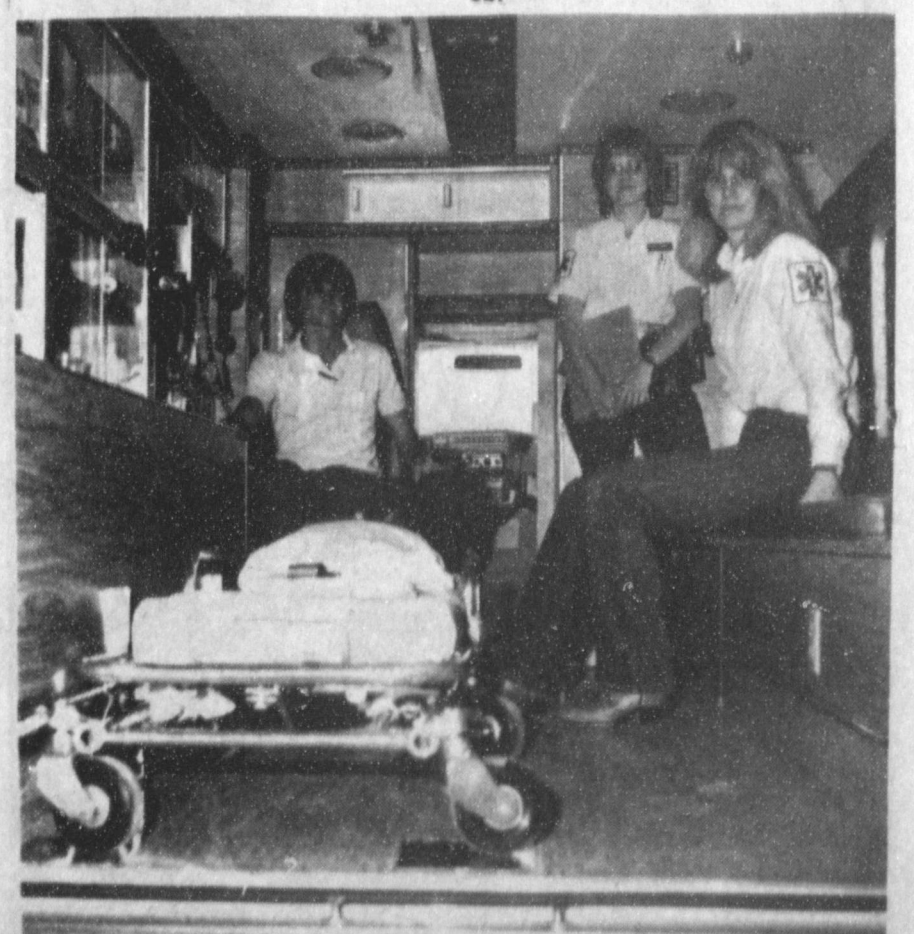
Monday, September 30, has been designated registration night, for all girls, ages six through 17, who are interested in joining the Girl Scouts.

Enrollment Passes Prediction

It has been several years since the enrollment in the Muleshoe Schools has exceeded 1,700, in fact, the 1975-76 school year is the last year that

an average membership exceeded 1,700, according to figures released by H. John Fuller, superintendent.

Currently, the enrollment has climbed to a maximum enrollment of 1,724. According to the school administrator, this has caused some problems in meeting the 22:1 student/teacher ratio required by the state in grades K-2.

The school district has already employed an additional kindergarten teacher on a semester basis, said Fuller, to bring the kindergarten class into compliance with the new state law. Also, a search is underway at this time for a first grade teacher and additional classroom space to bring the first grade into compliance.

The second grade is in compliance with the required student/teacher ratio, he said. According to the superintendent, the district has until 1988 to establish the same 22:1 student/teacher ratio in grades 3 and 4. With projections made by the administration, this will necessitate at least three and possibly four additional class-

rooms at the DeShazo campus.

The DeShazo campus (grades 3-5) is also exceeding projected enrollments this year. According to Fuller, the total enrollment on this campus is a little below last years enrollment, but an increase at one grade level (fourth grade) has brought some concern. The average enrollment in each class at this level is 26 per class with some Language Arts classes exceeding 30 per class. A report on enrollment and class sizes will be presented to the trustees of the school at their next regular board in October.

Fuller has expressed concern over the growth pattern. According to him, "there was little evidence two years ago, to predict the growth that Muleshoe Schools experienced last year and again this year. And furthermore, there is little evidence to predict a substantial growth in the future. However, it is exciting and pleasurable to deal with this situation." He further stated, "I would much rather deal with this situation, than with a declining student

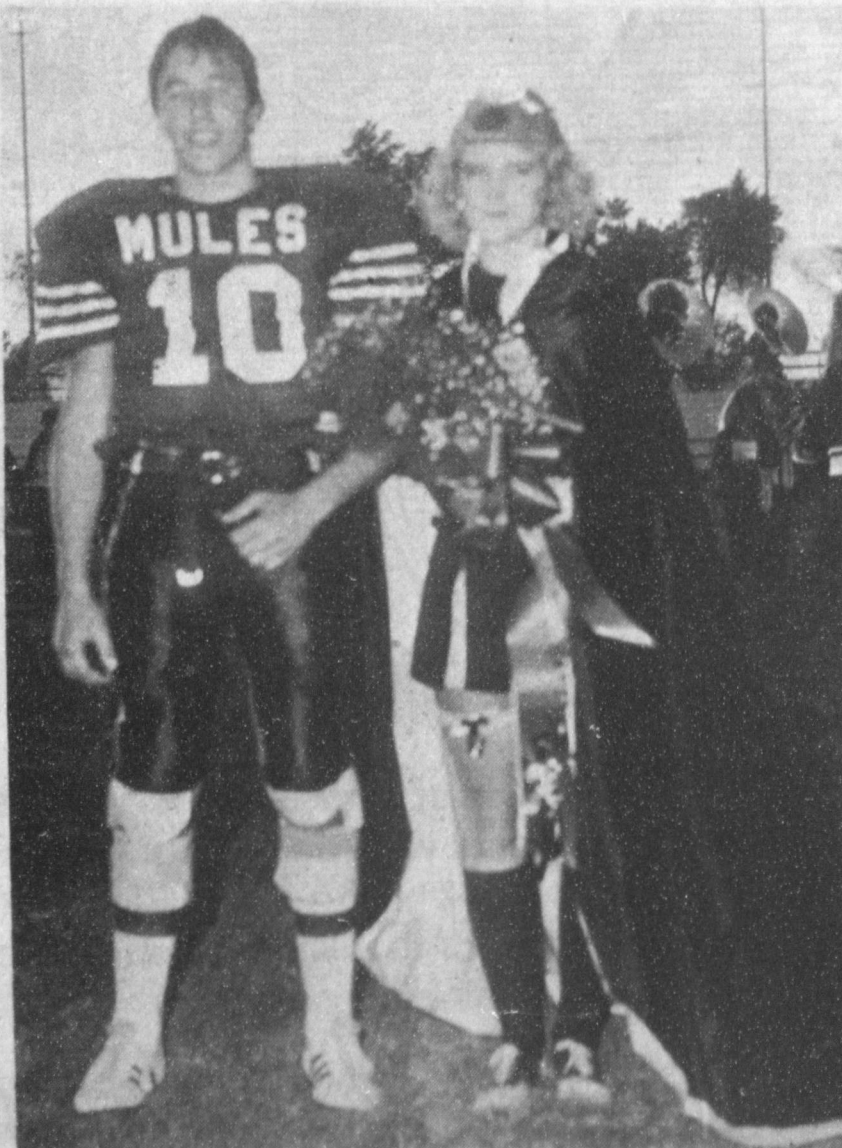

Soft Water

Can Save Energy Most people know that hard water requires use of more detergent or soap to get clothes and dishes clean.

But few people are aware that hard water can also result in wasted energy and higher water heating bills, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Susan Quiring.

Researchers at New Mexico State University documented this problem after a year-long study of the effects of water quality on the performance of both gas and electrical household water heaters, she says.

The study measured the energy consumption of six gas and six electric water heaters that has been in household use for 5 to 15 years in the Las Cruces, N.M., area.

The gas and electric heater groups were chosen so that half of each group had been operated exclusively on the area's untreated hard water. The other half had been operated exclusively on water that was softened in the home to remove harsh minerals, such as calcium and magnesium.

The gas heaters operated on hard water used 29.57 percent more BTUs than those operated on softened water, reports Quiring. Likewise, the electric heaters operated on hard water used 21.68 percent more BTUs.

The researchers then removed and weighed the sediment and scale that had accumulated in each of the tested heaters, says the specialist. In those operated only on softened water, the amount of scale weight from 1.09 to 4.27 pounds. But the heaters operated on untreated water had scale buildup weighing from 3.86 pounds in a 6-year old unit to almost 40 pounds in a 10-year-old heater.

Quiring advises Texans living in hard water areas to prevent such residue buildup either by installing a water softener or by draining enough water softer or by draining enough water out of their water heaters each six months or so to remove sediment.

"People who live in areas with extremely hard water and high sulfur content, may find it advisable to drain the water heater as often as every other month," she adds.

The specialist also recommends following the manufacturer's instructions that come with the heater and observing all safety precautions when draining a water heater.

population. This growth is good for the school district and for the community."

He said the administration and trustees are currently studying various alternatives to deal with the new requirements of smaller student/teacher ratios and with the increase in student population. "It is the desire of the administration to come up with recommendations that are beneficial to students, in compliance with the law, and economical to the district patrons," concluded Fuller.

High school shows a total of 424 students, down by 13 from the 437 last year at this time. There are 105 seniors; 92 juniors; 114 sophomores and 113 freshmen.

Watson Junior High School has 415 students registered this year, compared with the 374 at the same time last year. This breaks down to 133 in the eighth grade; 126 seventh graders and 156 in the sixth grade.

Enrollment at this time in Mary DeShazo Elementary School is 430, down just slightly from the 441 in the school at this time last year. This includes 142 in the fifth grade; 156 fourth graders and 132 in the third grade.

Nearly 1,400 persons to be trained as emergency medical technicians with 890 presently holding state certification and serving the region.

Training is a big part for the volunteers, and there are four levels of EMS certification:

- (1)Emergency Care*Attendant (ECA), 40 classroom hours;
- (2)Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), 100 classroom hours, 40 hospital hours, and five supervised ambulance runs;
- (3)Specially Skilled Emergency Medical Technician (EMT-SS), EMT certification, plus 60 classroom hours and 50 hospital hours;
- (4)Paramedic EMT (EMT-P), EMT certification, plus 160 classroom hours, 140 hospital hours, and 100 ambulance runs.

A minimum number of continuing education hours is required each year for an individual to retain certification. This number ranges from 12 hours for the ECA to 40 hours for the paramedic.

In fact, Westworld Community Healthcare, Inc., the operators of West Plains Medical Center have recently purchased a \$40,000 ambulance, which is in effect, a mobile emergency room. The West Plains Hospital and Nursing Home Auxiliary has purchased sophisticated heart monitoring equipment to be used in the ambulance; and West Plains Medical Center has constructed a new building to house the ambulances, the emergency personnel and training rooms, located at the rear of the hospital.

Also, an Executive Board and Regional Advisory Council, composed of representatives from every emergency service, which meet regularly to determine policy and set standards for care.

Weatherization Funds Released

By Governor

Governor Mark White this week announced the awarding of 54 contracts totaling \$2,254,706 to weatherize the homes of low-income people, with priority given to the elderly and the disabled.

Under program guidelines, as much as \$1,600 can be spent to weatherize a single dwelling by applying caulking, weatherstripping, and insulation and by replacing windows or doors.

South Plains Community Action, Inc. received \$19,458 to be distributed to the program in Bailey, Cochran, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Terry and yoakum counties.

In the past 11 months, 8,560 dwellings have been weatherized under this program.

The weatherization contracts, which are administered by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, uses funds from the U.S. Department of Energy and U.S. Health and Human Services. The Texas Legislature also designated a portion of the accrued interest on oil overcharge funds awarded to Texas for weatherization programs.
