The cotton season is now open in the Spur country and the staple is beginning to come in at a rapid rate. During the week and to the present time about seventy five bales have been marketed in Spur, the prices being paid by Spur merchants ranging from eleven to eleven and one-fourth cents a pound.

While possibly the staple grown in the Spur country is somewhat superior to staple grown in other sections, in every instance the buyers of Spur are paying the very highest market price and in many instances are paying more than the market quotations and will continue to do so throughout the fall and cotton season.

From the beginning of the town Spur has maintained a cotton and produce market second to none in all of Western Texas, and during this season the Spur Cotton Market will break former records of high prices, and the merchants are beginning early and will continue to offer special and attractive inducements to the trade. It will be to the material interest of all farmers with in reach of Spur to do both their marketing and trading here this fall. Jones returned last Court No. 377, wherein Jennie Reeves is Plaintiff, and J. A. Reeves is Defendant, and said petition alleging that Plaintiff is an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas, and has resided in the said County of Dickens for at least six months next preceeding the filing of this suit; that on or about the 10th day of January, 1910, in Dickens, Texas, Plaintiff was lawfully married to Defendant and that they had no children born to them; that at, and before said date, this Plaintiff's name was Mrs. Jennie Prichett.

That they continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about June 11th, 1910, when by cruel and harsh treatment and improper conduct of Defendant toward Plaintiff, she was forced and compelled to abandon him, since which time they have not lived together as husband and wife; that during the time of their living together, the Defendant was indolent and made no effort to provide support for this Plaintiff, and that they accumulated no community property nor has this Plaintiff now any property of any nature acquired by their joint efforts.

Plaintiff alleges that during the time she and Defendant lived together as aforesaid, she was kind and affectionate toward him, and at all times conducted herself in a lady-like and prudent manner, but Defendant unmindful of his duties and obligations of his marital vow, one week after their marriage began a course of harsh, cruel, unkind and tyranical treatment toward Plaintiff, which continued to grow worse until Plaintiff was forced and compelled to abandon Defendant as aforesaid.

That Defendant often cursed and abused Plaintiff and applied to her the vilest and most approbious epithets, without any cause or provocation whatever on the part of the Plaintiff.

That on or about February 1st, 1910, at their home in Dickens County, Texas, Defendant cursed and abused Plaintiff by taking hold of her and told her that if she was a man, he would not leave a drop of blood in her, all without any cause or provocation on the part of Plaintiff.

That on divers and different times he told her that he had never loved her: tried to make her leave home end threatened to kill her if she failed to do certain things, and accused this Plaintiff of being an unchaste woman; which accusution was false and untrue.

That said marriage relations between Plaintiff and Defendant still exist. Plaintiff alleges that Defendant's actions and conduct toward her generally are of such a nature as to render their further living together as husband and wife insupportable; the premises considered.

Wherefore Plaintiff prays the Court that Defendant be cited to appear and answer herein and for judgment dissolving their marriage relations, for the restoration of her name to Jennie Pritchett, for costs of suit and for such other and further relief, special and general, in law and equity, that she may be justly entitled to, etc.
