ON THE ROADS OF PERSIA

Vehicles, Called Palakis and Kajavahs, Are Quaint and Very Uncomfortable.

Bushire, Persia.—The most useful vehicles for long journeys in Persia are the palakis and kajavahs, the quaintest contrivances for travel to be seen anywhere. These "Persian cabs" are fixed upon mules. Each animal carries two of them, one on each side. They are furnished with bedding. Men, women and children sit in them cross-legged, a painful and irksome position for Europeans, who usually prefer to ride a horse or donkey rather than screw themselves un

ter is open, while the former is covered with a light water proof roof and is curtained against bad weather.

The most comfortable means of travel, sacred to the use of the wealthlest class, is the takhtiravan, a kind of palanquin, consisting of a box about seven feet long and five feet high, fitted with doors and windows and furnished inside with a soft mattress and luxurious cushions.


