Location was given as 1,183 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 50, Block 4, M&TC Survey. Bendorf has a 100-acre lease on the Reynolds, and has completed several other wells in the same area during the past year.

Historical Marker Is Dedicated In Ranger

A handsome marker commemorating the 50th anniversary of the discovery of oil in the Ranger area was unveiled in special ceremonies in downtown Ranger at 10:30 a. m. Saturday. A large crowd was on hand to participate in the event.

Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, who represents this district in the Texas Senate, was the program speaker and he paid tribute to the pioneer citizens of the community and lauded them for their leadership that launched the city on a firm foundation.

Mr. Creighton noted that good management and leadership was evident at this time, judging from the many indications of projects in the Ranger area. He recounted the oil boom days and the impact that Ranger had on the oil world.

The young law maker was introduced by Glyn Gilliam, president of Commercial State Bank, who called attention to Mr. Creighton's growing prominence in the state government. Mrs. Creighton was also a guest and was presented.

Johnny Bates, long-time Ranger civic leader, served as master of ceremonies, and the invocation was given by the Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Mayor Morris Newham welcomed visitors and guests on behalf of the city. President James Ratliff of the Chamber of Commerce introduced a number of guests, including Carroll Bennett, Lamar Haines, of Dallas, Harold Bilhartz, W. K. Gordon, Jr., of Fort Worth, Dan Champion of Houston, County Judge Scott Bailey and Mike Collins, chairman of the Eastland County

Historical Survey Committee. President E. W. Mince of Ranger Junior College outlined plans for the day's program, which included a downtown parade at 2 p. m., a homecoming dinner at 5:30 and a football game at 7:30 p. m.

The commemorative marker was prepared by the Texas Historical Survey Committee to preserve for all time the significance of the McCleskey No. 1 oil well.

Civic leaders and guests were entertained at a noon luncheon at Lone Cedar Country Club.

Light Vote Is Seen For Proposed Amendments

Absentee voting, which began Monday, on six constitutional amendments has been very light so far.

At week's end, only one person had voted at the courthouse.

Absentee voting runs through Nov. 5.

The Legislature this year approved placing before the voters six proposed changes to the Texas Constitution that has, to date, been amended 178 times.

Fourteen other amendments will be voted on Nov. 5, 1968.

The changes being voted on this year range from a provision that would lump the county's money into one fund rather than four to an amendment that would permit the sale of \$75 million in bonds for development of new state parks.

In each case on the short ballot, voters are asked to vote either "for" or "against."

Game Warden's Training Class Is Being Filled

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is accepting applications to fill the 22nd Game Warden Training School to begin in February at Tex. A&M University College Station, according to J. D. Archer, personnel director.

Under acts passed by the

60th Legislature, the starting salary for game warden trainees will be \$468 per month, a significant increase over the \$397 paid to earlier trainees.

Final deadline for applications will be 5 p. m. Oct. 23. Following application, applicants will be notified where and where to report for competitive written examinations which will be held in eight major cities across the state during November.

grams in Eastland County. The purpose of these articles will be to give local farm and ranch news, which we believe will be of interest to town folks as well as county folks.

The election for 1968 Community Committees has just been completed with the following persons elected: Community A - T. J. Snider, Wayne Eaves, Larry Morrow, J. W. Overstreet, and Durwood Burgess; Community B - N. E. Richardson, Melvin Adams, Morris A. Campbell, J. C. Hathcock, and W. O. Cantwell; Community C - Charles Little, Vern Garrett, Dean Collins, Orval Treadway, and Bobby Tucker; Community D - Lee Starr, N. A. Hagan, Robert Tucker, W. E. Kurklin, and J. H. Reynolds, Sr.; Community E - Clarence Stroebel, Joe Criswell, W. A. Maples, J. W. Gerhardt, and Conrad Schaefer Community F - G. O. Lawson, Kenneth Bostick, Vernon Phillips, Calvin Roady, and G. T. Dawkins.

Community committees have an important responsibility to represent their communities on various farm programs. Recommendations for needed changes on programs are listed among their duties, also. A training meeting will be held sometime before Jan. 1 to review current operations.

1968 newly elected community committeemen met at the annual County Convention on Sept. 27. Charles Little was elected to fill the vacancy on the County Committee. He will serve a 3-year term beginning Oct. 1. Charles is actively engaged in agriculture and devotes all of his time toward production of crops and livestock.

Our thanks to Garland Garrett whose term expired and could not serve due to the fact he has accepted full-time employment. Garland has served on the County Committee since 1962.

The County Committee positions as set up at the Convention will be R. G. Lyerla, Chairman; Charles Little, vice Chairman; and Paul Norris, regular member. Committee meetings are held regularly at 9 a. m. each Tuesday. Anyone may attend the meetings.

We have been busy the last few days accepting requests for cost-shares on rye, vetch, and winter peas. These practices are widely used in the county due to the tremendous wind control problem in the sandy area.

Cost-shares are \$1.40 for rye, vetch, and peas following peanuts, and \$2.75 per acre for vetch and peas on other cropland. The cost-share represents approximately 50 percent of the average cost of carrying out the practice.
